#### **HOUSE RESOLUTIONS**

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

#### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 723**

Offered by Representative Schweizer:

WHEREAS, The Congress of the United States of America has proposed budget cuts that would decrease funding to the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), which supports workforce development activities, adult education and literacy, U.S. employment services, vocational services for disabled workers, and numerous other programs that invest in our workforce; and

WHEREAS, The WIOA has had a positive impact on the livelihoods of millions of Americans, having provided job training to 237,836 people nationwide in the midst of a global pandemic in program year 2020; and

WHEREAS, Throughout Illinois, the program has grown substantially in the last several years, having seen the number of local workforce innovation area incumbent worker training projects greatly increase from 64 to 378, the number of businesses utilizing incumbent worker training increase from 62 to 278, and an increase in the number of incumbent workers able to receive training from 125 to 4,228; and

WHEREAS, These efforts and others like it have resulted in a statewide unemployment rate of only 5.1%; and

WHEREAS, Last year, the One-stop Operator in Champaign County, a single location where all four core programs of the WIOA are collocated, helped 362 visitors with resume, interview, career fair, application, employment workshop, and job search advice; it also connected 227 visitors to services, including rent assistance, GED classes, printing, veterans' services, and youth services; and

WHEREAS, Among those visitors, the East Central Illinois Workforce Board provided career coaching and supportive services to 262 low-income or skill-deficient adults as well as 163 youth with barriers to employment; and

WHEREAS, The WIOA gives preference to veterans, low-income individuals, individuals with disabilities, unhoused individuals, youth who have been in the foster care system, eligible migrants and seasonal farmworkers, single parents, and long-term unemployed individuals; and

WHEREAS, Unfortunately, the East Central Illinois Workforce Board was forced to turn away over 600 adults last year who wanted to receive job training but who could not be provided with services due to funding limitations; and

WHEREAS, Budget cuts like the ones proposed recently would make it even more difficult for organizations enacting the provisions of the WIOA to render high-demand services to underserved and underutilized members of the community; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Congress of the United States to enact legislation that maintains funding for the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), and for President Joe Biden to sign that legislation into law; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the President of the United States, Joe Biden, the Vice President of the United States, Kamala Harris, and all members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation.

WHEREAS, Rachel Costabile is known for her charismatic, independent spirit; she has spent the past ten years learning life skills, living with roommates, traveling to see friends in California, working, and volunteering; she works at Lou Malnati's Pizzeria and GIA MIA Restaurant in Naperville, and she volunteers as a teacher's aide at Briar Glen Elementary School; she loves spending time with her friends, crafting, and searching the Internet for fun activities, crafts, and recipes; she is currently working on improving her art and advocacy skills; and

WHEREAS, Ashley McLeod is an incredible young woman with a broad range of gifts and talents; she serves as an advocate for herself and others with Down Syndrome, and she has bravely navigated many challenges in her life with courage and perseverance, becoming an inspirational role model for many people in the process; she is a graduate of Harper College and an actress; she dreams of teaching others how to cook healthier meals; and

WHEREAS, Ruth Pligge is known for her sense of humor, her smile, her independence, and for being the life of the party; she is an avid fan of Chicago sports teams, especially the Chicago White Sox; she enjoys laughing, telling jokes, texting friends and family, working, attending a day program, and pursuing

her hobbies of solving jigsaw puzzles, collecting baseball cards, and bowling; her signature dish is pigs in a blanket; and

WHEREAS, Bridget Brown passionately serves as an advocate for people with disabilities; one day a week, she travels to the University of Illinois Dental School in Chicago, where she acts as a children's dental health educator and assistant at the pediatric dental clinic; she is currently enrolled at the University of Illinois Chicago (UIC) in its new Coop College Disabilities Program; she also works with the Pace bus company as a spokesperson for Hop on the Bus, a program to assist people with disabilities to navigate the Pace bus system; she is the vice president of the National Association for Down Syndrome; she dreams of becoming a television or movie actress, previously acting in the 2012 movie LOL; she loves spending time with her friends and participating in the latest Just a Dollop adventure; and

WHEREAS, Erika Kissel is a courageous, spunky, humorous, and determined young woman; she has had many opportunities to educate and inspire others as a presenter at National Louis University, the Arc of Illinois, the National Association for Down Syndrome, International Best Buddies, St. Raphael Church, the American Culinary Federation, and the Chicago Chefs of Cuisine Association; she is an honorary culinarian member of the culinary profession and hospitality industry, and she has been employed in the food service industry through her alma mater, Neuqua Valley High School, for over 23 years; she has volunteered for a variety of organizations, including at her church, the DuPage Children's Museum in Naperville, and the Cancer Center; in her time off, she assists in a preschool class and enjoys researching various topics; she provides expertise in food preparation and safety; and

WHEREAS, Rachel Costabile, Ashley McLeod, Ruth Pligge, Bridget Brown, and Erika Kissel successfully operate Just A Dollop through supporting and helping one another, and their efforts have led to the creation of a cookbook that features such recipes as pumpkin spice greek yogurt dip, no sodium taco seasoning, crack chicken, low-carb tortilla chips, greek yogurt dressing, sweet potato leek soup, and others; they have also expanded into producing how-to cooking videos, which they present on their business website and YouTube channel; therefore, be it

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 731

Offered by Representative Du Buclet:

WHEREAS, Illinois Alliance for Clean Transportation (IACT), the 10th "Clean Cities" coalition designated by the U.S. Department of Energy in May 1994, is celebrating its 30th anniversary; and

WHEREAS, The Clean Cities national network has built bipartisan support, deep connections within the transportation industry, and active partnerships with hundreds of public and private stakeholders; and

WHEREAS, IACT and its members are celebrating 30 years of boosting the State's energy security, economic vitality, and quality of life by advancing affordable, efficient, and clean transportation fuels and technologies; and

WHEREAS, IACT and its members act locally in urban, suburban, and rural communities to help Illinois businesses and residents meet their climate, financial, and energy goals, to foster the State's economic, environmental, and energy security, and to move transportation systems into the clean energy future; and

WHEREAS, IACT and its members work to advance the State's transportation system and to help businesses and consumers adopt alternative fuel vehicles and advanced transportation technologies, contributing to the coalition's activities over the past 30 years through eliminating an estimated 2.2 million tons of emissions; and

WHEREAS, IACT has become one of the most successful Clean Cities coalitions in the country thanks to many federal, State, and local government agencies, auto manufacturers, local car dealers, fuel suppliers, conversion companies, environmental organizations, corporations, small businesses, and individuals providing their time and resources during the past 30 years; and

WHEREAS, IACT's mission in deploying "American fuels" and clean fuel vehicles, such as those running on natural gas, ethanol, propane, biodiesel, and electricity, have helped improve air quality, provided for greater energy independence, and led to the creation of many small businesses and jobs in our State; and

WHEREAS, IACT and its members have partnered with many government and business fleets in Illinois that have become national leaders in greening their fleets and demonstrating the environmental and economic benefits of using Illinois' own domestic and renewable energy sources; and

WHEREAS, IACT and its members have worked to implement over 15,000 alternative fuel vehicles and more than 400 fuel stations for E85, propane, natural gas, biodiesel, hydrogen, and electric vehicle charging throughout Illinois; and

WHEREAS, IACT and its members have helped school districts adopt school buses with low to no tailpipe emissions, creating cleaner air at local schools, and have incorporated community-driven choices to improve equitable access to advanced transportation; and

WHEREAS, IACT and its members have tailored projects to respond to unique needs through partnerships with hundreds of stakeholders and shared mobility options, including shuttles, buses, e-bikes, and scooters, have reduced travel costs, energy consumption, and traffic congestion; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May 21, 2024 as Illinois Alliance For Clean Transportation Day in the State of Illinois.

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 69

Offered by Representative Hernandez, Elizabeth:

WHEREAS, On June 30, 2022, the U.S. Supreme Court affirmed that U.S. immigration law expressly authorizes the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to grant "parole", permission to temporarily remain in the United States and apply for a work permit to certain people who are undocumented without Congressional approval for "urgent humanitarian reasons or significant public benefit" so long as the exercise of such discretion is "reasonable and reasonably explained" on a case by case basis per *Biden v. Texas*, 142 S. Ct. 2528 (2022); and

WHEREAS, The U.S. government has exercised its parole authority in a wide variety of ways for humanitarian reasons and significant public benefit; and

WHEREAS, A program known as Military Parole in Place already exists for spouses, parents, or children, who are undocumented, of active-duty or former active duty members of the U.S. Armed Forces and the Selected Reserve of the Ready Reserve; and

WHEREAS, Amidst Congressional inaction on immigration reform, President Biden has utilized parole more than any other U.S. president in history, extending the program to more than 1 million people who are undocumented over the past two years; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. is experiencing an unprecedented labor shortage across multiple sectors of our economy that are vital to our national well-being; and

WHEREAS, In the State of Illinois, the fifth largest economy in the United States, critical industries, such as manufacturing, transportation, warehousing, agriculture, healthcare, childcare, senior/home care, hospitality, construction, and education, are experiencing a prolonged staffing shortage that is harming their growth and competitiveness; and

WHEREAS, According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, as analyzed by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, Illinois has, on average, 76 available workers for every 100 jobs; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Department of Employment Security (IDES) reports that the largest number of high-demand, high-wage job openings through 2030 are in occupations that require short-term or moderate-term on-the-job training, including over 56,000 annual openings in the restaurant sector, over 41,000 annual openings for laborers, assemblers, and maintenance workers, over 59,000 annual openings for cashiers and retail sales and customer service representatives, and over 15,000 annual openings in home health and personal care aides; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Farm Bureau has indicated that local worker shortages are among the top current challenges for Illinois farmers, suppliers, and processors, including locating qualified truck drivers to haul grain and sourcing enough hands to pick vegetables or manage livestock, and furthermore, that this shortage in the agricultural supply chains continues to not only undermine the financial health of farms in Illinois but, more importantly, threaten food security, and, ultimately, our national security; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois State Board of Education's (ISBE) 2023 Unfilled Positions Report shows that school districts in Illinois reported more unfilled positions in FY23 than they did in FY22, and there continues to be a high demand for paraprofessionals and teachers, particularly in the City of Chicago, the Northeast region, and the East Central region, and the demand for paraprofessionals, who often serve special education and bilingual students, outweighs the supply; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Nursing Workforce Center reports the State is facing an estimated shortfall of nearly 15,000 nurses by 2025 and a deficit of 6,200 physicians by 2030, fueled in part by pandemic burnout and by providers leaving the profession or retiring, as 52% of the almost 195,000 RNs in Illinois are over the age of 55 with 27% planning to retire in the next five years and less than 8,000 nurses graduating each year; and

WHEREAS, The Migration Policy Institute estimates that there are more than 12,000 Illinois residents with international healthcare degrees who are prohibited from providing care due to licensing or worker authorization; and

WHEREAS, The Service Employees International Union (SEIU) reports that many seniors in the Illinois Community Cares Program (CCP) are already going without the care they should receive due to a severe workforce shortage, and the number of authorized CCP hours not serviced has increased by 46%; much of the increased need for home care is associated with the increasing number of senior Illinoisans, a strong preference for in-home rather than nursing facility services, and a strong preference for culturally competent care; IDES projects that Illinois will need an additional 9,000 home care workers annually for each of the next ten years; and

WHEREAS, Despite the State's critical need for labor, nearly half a million Illinoisans who are undocumented are still unable to legally work; and

WHEREAS, Nearly 30% of Illinoisans who are undocumented have been residing and contributing to the workforce in the U.S. for over 20 years; and

WHEREAS, The majority of residents in Illinois who are undocumented reside in mixed status families with U.S. citizen and lawful permanent resident family members; and

WHEREAS, Long-term immigrant workers in Illinois who are undocumented empower key sectors of the economy, including manufacturing, farming, food production, senior/home care, child care, healthcare, education, construction, hospitality, and warehousing, contributing to our State's prosperity and also contributing approximately \$1.5 billion in taxes per year; and

WHEREAS, Granting work permits will provide a significant public benefit to Illinois' economy by expanding the formal workforce to include all who have the eligibility to work, while increasing taxes paid to the State; and

WHEREAS, In the education sector alone, Illinois school districts report a high number of unfilled teaching and paraprofessional positions; and

WHEREAS, Teachers and paraprofessionals are essential for primary and secondary school students in our State, particularly for special education and bilingual students; and

WHEREAS, The existing worker shortage is so great that many school districts have been forced to contract workers directly from abroad, even though long-term immigrants are well-suited to fill these positions; and

WHEREAS, The exclusion from federal benefits leaves long-term immigrant workers who are undocumented and their families vulnerable and forces the State of Illinois to spend our tax dollars to provide critical health care and other benefits; and

WHEREAS, Granting work permits would allow workers to earn a fair wage and secure benefits, including health insurance; and

WHEREAS, Granting work permits would aid in the enforcement of existing labor laws, thereby reducing the exploitation of our lowest wage workers, the majority of whom are workers of color and immigrants; and

WHEREAS, Work permits would protect from deportation tens of thousands of students in Illinois who are undocumented and without the protection of Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) and would ensure that youth who are undocumented get the education they need to support themselves and their families and contribute to the State and national economies; and

WHEREAS, Illinois provides limited benefits and resources for individuals who are undocumented, including limited healthcare coverage for low-income qualifying immigrants, much of which would be unnecessary if the undocumented had work permits and could secure such benefits through their employment; and

WHEREAS, Despite the protections Illinois has enacted to protect long-term immigrant workers who are undocumented, they continue to be at risk of deportation, family separation, exploitation at work, and exclusion from health care and other benefits due to their immigration status, all of which negatively affects Illinois' economy and public safety and the quality-of-life in our communities; and

WHEREAS, For all these reasons, work permits for long-term immigrant workers would be a significant public benefit to the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Only the federal government can issue work permits to people who are undocumented under its parole authority; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we urge the President of the United States to authorize the DHS Secretary to establish a program to evaluate parole and work authorization on a case-by-case basis for long-term immigrant workers who are undocumented and residing in Illinois to address this State's critical need for labor and to secure the family life for tens of thousands of mixed status families in Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Governor to work with federal partners to urge, by all possible means, the establishment of such a parole and work authorization program for the long-term immigrant population who are undocumented and residing in Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Office of the President of the United States and to all members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation.
