HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 936

Offered by Representative Ness:

WHEREAS, The Illinois Achieving a Better Life Experience (ABLE) program, also referred to as the Senator Scott Bennett ABLE Program, is an important tool for Illinoisans with disabilities, and ABLE accounts help people with disabilities to improve health, enhance quality of life, and maintain independence while protecting federal benefits and encouraging employment; and

WHEREAS, ABLE programs offer a diverse range of investment options, tax-deferred growth, and withdrawals free of state and federal taxes when those withdrawals are used for a broad range of qualified disability expenses, such as education, job coaching, transportation, accessible equipment, health and wellness, and assistive technology; and

WHEREAS, December 19, 2024 marks the tenth anniversary of the enactment of the Stephen Beck Jr., Achieving a Better Life Experience Act of 2014 (Public Law No. 113-295), commonly known as the ABLE Act, a landmark piece of legislation that was passed unanimously by both chambers of Congress, establishing Section 529a of the Internal Revenue Code to allow states to create ABLE programs; and

WHEREAS, In 2016, the Illinois General Assembly passed the enabling legislation for the Illinois Achieving a Better Life Experience (IL ABLE) account program, which is under the leadership of the State Treasurer's Office as trustee and administrator; and

WHEREAS, Since the launch of the IL ABLE program in January 2017, more than 6,500 IL ABLE accounts have been opened with more than \$90 million contributed; and

WHEREAS, The IL ABLE program has helped Illinoisans with disabilities and their families pay for approximately \$40 million in qualified disability expenses, allowing them to gain greater self-sufficiency while helping to meet their needs; and

WHEREAS, Under State Treasurer Michael Frerichs' leadership, a 19-member, bipartisan consortium of states now exists to provide high-quality, low-cost ABLE programs for more than a quarter of ABLE-eligible people with disabilities nationwide, and its members include Alaska, Arkansas, Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Montana, Mississippi, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, and the District of Columbia; and

WHEREAS, Today's average IL ABLE account balance of approximately \$11,800 is illustrative of the greater economic independence and financial freedom achieved by account owners with disabilities who are no longer trapped in a life of chronic financial insecurity due to asset restrictions imposed by their federal benefit programs; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare December 19, 2024 as Illinois ABLE Day in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the State Treasurer's Office.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 937

Offered by Representative West:

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois recognizes that coroners play an essential role in not only the investigation of deaths and the compassionate notification of families of deceased persons but also in saving lives through tracking patterns of deaths and coordination with organ procurement agencies; and

WHEREAS, Coroners, as elected officials, are not required to have any medical or death investigatory experience and come from a variety of different professional backgrounds and skill sets that provide them with varying levels of expertise related to their position; and

WHEREAS, The Coroner Training Board was established in large part to create and maintain minimum standards for coroner training, provide appropriate certifications, and review and approve training curriculums for all coroners; and

WHEREAS, The Coroner Training Board is currently comprised of five members, four of which were appointed in 2016 and are currently serving on expired terms; and

WHEREAS, The Coroner Training Board website is filled with broken links and, of all of their reported board meetings since January 1, 2022, meetings have lasted on average just 37 minutes, with no meeting lasting longer than one hour; and

WHEREAS, The Coroner Training Board received \$460,000 for operations, including the development and implementation of training opportunities in the FY25 budget, and collects supplemental fees from coroners who attend training opportunities; and

WHEREAS, New coroners, regardless of their backgrounds or expertise, are only required to attend a 40-hour basic training course once elected; and

WHEREAS, Some coroner offices within Illinois have sought additional memberships and training support from national organizations, such as the American Board of Medicolegal Death Investigators, to improve overall training quality for themselves and their staffs; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we direct the Auditor General to conduct a performance audit of the Illinois Coroner Training Board's administration of the Coroner Training Board Act, including its creation, implementation, and execution of basic and continuing education training for coroners; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Illinois Coroner Training Board and any other State agency, entity, or person that may have information relevant to this audit to cooperate fully and promptly with the Auditor General's Office in its conduct of this audit; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we direct the Auditor General to commence this audit as soon as possible and report his findings and recommendations upon completion in accordance with the provisions of Section 3-14 of the Illinois State Auditing Act; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Auditor General and the Illinois Coroner Training Board.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 941

Offered by Representative Mayfield:

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois and the Illinois Department of Corrections (IDOC) are committed to enhancing public safety and reducing recidivism; and

WHEREAS, Studies have shown that community-based residential treatment facilities offering housing, counseling, workforce training, and other supportive services can reduce recidivism rates and improve successful reentry for individuals in the justice system; and

WHEREAS, Partnerships with non-profit providers can enable Illinois to offer safe, community-based residential facilities, where individuals receive mental health counseling, job training, substance abuse treatment, and restorative justice services, all of which contribute to lowering recidivism and enhancing community safety; and

WHEREAS, Alternatives to incarceration administered by community-based, non-profit organizations alleviate burdens on the Illinois budget by reducing the cost of incarcerating individuals in IDOC facilities; and

WHEREAS, IDOC currently spends \$4,106 per person per month to incarcerate an individual in a department facility, according to its FY2024 Financial Impact Statement; and

WHEREAS, IDOC is permitted to contract with community-based, non-profit providers at that same rate on a per person, per month basis to house and support these individuals who would otherwise be incarcerated in a department facility at the same cost; and

WHEREAS, The contracts would support eligible individuals when subject to a judicial order to live and be served in a community-based facility as an alternative to incarceration; and

WHEREAS, These community-based non-profit facilities could neither be a private correctional facility nor a private detention facility pursuant to State law, but a residential treatment facility is permitted; and

WHEREAS, This approach envisions long-term outcomes such as reducing recidivism, promoting workforce readiness, and facilitating smoother transitions for individuals back into society; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Illinois Department of Corrections under their existing statutory authority to draft and adopt administrative rules authorizing community-based, non-profit residential treatment providers to apply for the same monthly Financial Impact Statement funds per person and per month to support their operations; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge that these rules enable IDOC to automatically fund qualified community-based non-profit residential providers that meet objective state standards for service provision, safety, and rehabilitative support; and be it further

RESOLVED, That IDOC has existing statutory and budget authority to enter into these funding agreements with community-based, non-profit residential treatment providers that are not private correctional facilities or private detention facilities; and be it further

RESOLVED, That administrative rules governing applications, standards, and metrics for residential treatment facilities to qualify for automatic funding with IDOC would enhance transparency and incentivize more development of these non-profit residential treatment facilities; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Director of the Illinois Department of Corrections and the Governor of Illinois to encourage immediate steps toward implementing alternatives to incarceration contractual programs that emphasize rehabilitation, reintegration, and public safety.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 942

Offered by Representative Faver Dias:

WHEREAS, The Illinois constitution states "a fundamental goal of the People of the State is the educational development of all persons to the limits of their capacities"; and

WHEREAS, The education system in this State produces inequitable outcomes along lines of race and ethnicity with 9% of Black students, 15% of Latinx students, 23% of American Indian or Alaska Native

students, 35% of Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander students, and 31% of multiracial students reaching proficiency in math compared to 38% of white students and 61% of Asian students; and

WHEREAS, More than 20 years of research indicates that teacher diversity has positive impacts on student outcomes, including academic achievement, graduation rates, attendance, instances of exclusionary discipline, and college aspirations; and

WHEREAS, Research demonstrates the positive impact of alignment between teacher and student racial and ethnic diversity; and

WHEREAS, In Illinois, teachers of color make up less than 18% of the workforce while students of color make up 54% of the student body; and

WHEREAS, Representation of Black, Latinx, Asian, American Indian or Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander, and multiracial teachers does not match the respective proportion of Illinois students who are Black, Latinx, Asian, American Indian or Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander, and multiracial; and

WHEREAS, Longstanding systemic racism and ongoing barriers lead to reductions in diversity throughout the teacher pipeline starting with unequal high school graduation rates and rates of enrollment in postsecondary institutions, including racial disparities in educator preparation enrollment and retention in the teaching profession; and

WHEREAS, One of the most significant challenges in the teacher pipeline is the gap in diversity between Illinois colleges and Illinois educator preparation programs; and

WHEREAS, More debt can discourage those in pursuit of a career in the teaching profession; and

WHEREAS, Teachers of color are more likely to borrow money to pay for teacher preparation; and

WHEREAS, The Minority Teachers of Illinois Scholarship was created to encourage academically talented Illinois minority students to enroll in educator preparation and pursue teaching careers so that students of color in Illinois are more likely to be taught by teachers of color; and

WHEREAS, Recipients of the Minority Teachers of Illinois Scholarship are required to teach in schools at which no less than 30% of the enrolled students are minority students in the year during which the recipient begins teaching at the school or, if the recipient received a scholarship as a qualified bilingual minority applicant, in a program in transitional bilingual education pursuant to Article 14C of the School Code or in a school in which 20 or more English learner students in the same language classification are enrolled; and

WHEREAS, More than 8,000 awards have been distributed to aspiring teachers of color through the Minority Teachers of Illinois scholarship; and

WHEREAS, The pool of candidates enrolling in educator preparation programs has indeed grown more diverse over time but is still not as diverse as Illinois colleges; and

WHEREAS, The teacher workforce has gradually grown more diverse over the last decade but still lags student diversity significantly; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we affirm the importance and targeted value of the Minority Teachers of Illinois scholarship in increasing diversity in the teacher workforce; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we celebrate the support that the Minority Teachers of Illinois scholarship has offered to aspiring teachers to date and the scholarship's role in growing the diversity of teacher preparation in Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Illinois Student Assistance Commission to continue to administer the Minority Teachers of Illinois scholarship in order to support aspiring teachers of color to enter the teaching profession; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the State of Illinois and its entities to continue to support efforts grounded in research and data that increase the diversity of the educator workforce in order to improve outcomes for all students in this State.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 944

Offered by Representative Ford:

WHEREAS, Illinois-based businesses play a critical role in driving economic growth, innovation, and community vitality within the State; and

WHEREAS, Lifeway Foods, Inc., headquartered in Morton Grove, has established itself as a leading producer of probiotic and cultured dairy products, exemplifying excellence in business operations and community engagement; and

WHEREAS, Lifeway Foods, Inc. was founded in 1986 by Michael Smolyansky, who immigrated to the United States from the former Soviet Union with the vision of introducing the health benefits of kefir to the American market; and

WHEREAS, Lifeway Foods, Inc., under the leadership of Julie Smolyansky, has continued to expand and excel, achieving significant milestones as a publicly traded company and as an industry leader in innovative, health-focused food and beverage solutions; and

WHEREAS, Lifeway Foods, Inc. has consistently prioritized excellence, sustainability, and corporate responsibility by delivering high-quality products; and

WHEREAS, Lifeway Foods, Inc. has significantly expanded its global footprint, exporting its products to numerous countries, including Mexico, the Caribbean, South Africa and, as a co-packer, Ireland for further distribution in France, thus showcasing Illinois as a leader in health-focused food manufacturing on the international stage; and

WHEREAS, Lifeway Foods, Inc. entered into a groundbreaking distribution agreement in the United Arab Emirates in November of 2024, bringing its kefir and farmer cheese products to supermarkets and hypermarkets in Dubai and across the Emirates, further cementing its global presence; and

WHEREAS, Exports are vital to the Illinois economy, driving job creation, enhancing global trade relationships, and reinforcing the State's position as an economic leader; and

WHEREAS, Lifeway Foods, Inc. has demonstrated exceptional financial success, achieving record annual net sales of \$160.1 million in 2023, representing a 13.1% year-over-year increase, and reporting a net income of \$11.4 million, a substantial rise from \$0.9 million in 2022; and

WHEREAS, Lifeway Foods, Inc. employs approximately 288 individuals, with a significant portion of its workforce based in Illinois, thereby strengthening the local economy and providing valuable employment opportunities for residents; and

WHEREAS, Lifeway Foods, Inc. has received widespread recognition for its contributions to health and wellness, with its products becoming a staple in households across Illinois and beyond; and

WHEREAS, Lifeway Foods, Inc., along with other innovative food manufacturers, are essential to the economy of Illinois, driving advancements in the food and beverage sector, fostering sustainability, and contributing to the State's global competitiveness; and

WHEREAS, Lifeway Foods, Inc. has recently been the target of an unsolicited acquisition proposal from Danone North America PBC, which seeks to acquire the remaining shares of Lifeway that it does not already own; and

WHEREAS, Such an acquisition could result in significant operational changes, including potential relocation or restructuring, which might negatively impact the State's workforce and corporate leadership currently provided by Lifeway Foods, Inc.; and

WHEREAS, Maintaining Lifeway Food's independence and Illinois-based operations is crucial for preserving the jobs, innovation, and economic benefits the company delivers to the State; and

WHEREAS, Supporting local businesses and preventing the loss of corporate headquarters to out-of-state entities, which usually diminish economic activity and employment opportunities within Illinois, is vital; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we commend Lifeway Foods, Inc. for its outstanding achievements and invaluable contributions to the State of Illinois, and we celebrate its dedication to excellence, innovation, and community enrichment; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we express our concerns regarding the potential acquisition of Lifeway Foods, Inc. by Danone North America PBC and urge all stakeholders to carefully consider the potential adverse effects on the Illinois economy and workforce; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we reaffirm our commitment to supporting Illinois-based businesses like Lifeway Foods, Inc., especially those founded by immigrants drawn to the freedom of our shores and nurtured in Illinois' economic climate, whose continued success and presence are essential to the State's economic health and prosperity; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to Lifeway Foods, Inc. as a testament to our admiration and our best wishes for its continued success as an independent, Illinois-owned company for many years in the future.
