At the hour of 3:43 o'clock p.m., the House convened perfunctory session.

HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 105

Offered by Representative Friess:

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the Rules of the House of Representatives of the 104th General Assembly are amended by changing Rule 41 as follows:

(House Rule 41)

41. Note Requests; Quick Takes.

(a) The House shall comply with all Illinois laws requiring fiscal or other notes. The notes shall be filed with the Clerk, who shall affix each note with a time stamp endorsing the date and time received, and attached to the original of the bill and available for inspection by the members. As soon as practical, the Clerk shall provide a copy of the note to the Legislative Reference Bureau, which shall provide an informative summary of the note in subsequent issues of the Legislative Digest.

~~A motion to have any note request deemed inapplicable may be made by the Principal Sponsor of the bill, or by a chief co-sponsor with the consent of the Principal Sponsor, at any time and shall be adopted by a majority of those voting on the motion. No member, except the Principal Sponsor of the bill, may file a request for a note with the Clerk during debate of the legislative measure to which the note relates. At the request of the Principal Sponsor of a bill, or by a chief co-sponsor with the consent of the Principal Sponsor, a note request for the bill as introduced into the House or received from the Senate shall be automatically deemed inapplicable if (i) one or more House amendments to the bill have been adopted, and (ii) a note of the same type for the bill as amended by each adopted House amendment has been filed with the Clerk. If any such adopted House amendment is later tabled, the note request for the bill as introduced into or received by the House shall immediately become applicable. A note request deemed inapplicable under this Rule shall not be further considered and shall not prevent the bill from advancing.~~

(b) No bill authorizing or directing the conveyance by the State of any particular interest in real estate to any individual or entity other than a governmental unit or agency may be voted upon in committee or upon Second Reading unless a certified appraisal of the value of the interest has been filed. The appraisal shall be filed with the Clerk of the House, and shall be part of the permanent record for that bill.

(c) No bill authorizing the State or a unit of local government to acquire property by eminent domain using "quick-take" powers under the Eminent Domain Act may be voted upon in committee or on Second Reading unless the State or the unit of local government, as applicable, has complied with all of the following procedures:

(1) The State or the unit of local government must notify each owner of an interest in the property, by certified mail, of the intention of the State or the unit of local government to request approval of legislation by the General Assembly authorizing the State or the unit of local government to acquire the property by eminent domain using "quick-take" powers under Section 20-5-5 of the Eminent Domain Act.

(2) The State or the unit of local government must cause notice of its intention to request authorization to acquire the property by eminent domain using "quick-take" powers to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the territory sought to be acquired by the State or the unit of local government.

(3) Following the notices required under paragraphs (1) and (2), the State or the unit of local government must hold at least one public hearing, at the place where the unit of local government normally holds its business meetings (or, in the case of property sought to be acquired by the State: (i) at a location in the county in which the property sought to be acquired by the State is located, or (ii) if the property is located in Cook County, at a location in the township in which the property is located, or (iii) if the property is located in 2 adjacent counties other than Cook County or in 2 adjacent townships in Cook County, at a location in the county or in the township in Cook County in which the majority of the property is located, or (iv) if the property is located in Cook County and an adjacent county, at a location in the other county or in the township in Cook County in which the majority of the property is located), on the question of the acquisition of the property by the State or the unit of local government by eminent domain using "quick-take" powers.

(4) In the case of property sought to be acquired by a unit of local government, following the public hearing or hearings held under paragraph (3), the unit of local government must adopt, by recorded vote, a resolution to request approval of legislation by the General Assembly authorizing the unit of local government to acquire the property by eminent domain using "quick-take" powers under the Eminent Domain Act. The resolution must include a statement of the time period within which the unit of local government requests authority to exercise "quick-take" powers, which may not exceed one year.

(5) Following the public hearing or hearings held under paragraph (3), the head of the appropriate State office, department, or agency or the chief elected official of the unit of local government, as applicable, must submit to the Chairperson and Minority Spokesperson of the House Executive Committee a sworn, notarized affidavit that contains, or has attached as an incorporated exhibit, all of the following:

- (A) The legal description of the property.
- (B) The street address of the property.
- (C) The name of each State Senator and State Representative who represents the territory that is the subject of the proposed taking.
- (D) The date or dates on which the State or the unit of local government contacted each such State Senator and State Representative concerning the intention of the State or the unit of local government to request approval of legislation by the General Assembly authorizing the State or the unit of local government to acquire the property by eminent domain using "quick-take" powers.
- (E) The current name, address, and telephone number of each owner of an interest in the property.
- (F) A summary of all negotiations between the State or the unit of local government and the owner or owners of the property concerning the sale of the property to the State or the unit of local government.
- (G) A statement of the date and location of each public hearing held under paragraph (3).
- (H) A statement of the public purpose for which the State or the unit of local government seeks to acquire the property.
- (I) The certification of the head of the appropriate State office, department, or agency or the chief elected official of the unit of local government, as applicable, that (i) the property is located within the territory under the jurisdiction of the State or the unit of local government and (ii) the State or the unit of local government seeks to acquire the property for a public purpose.
- (J) A map of the area in which the property to be acquired is located, showing the location of the property.
- (K) Photographs of the property.
- (L) An appraisal of the property by a real estate appraiser who is certified or licensed under the Real Estate Appraiser Licensing Act of 2002.
- (M) In the case of property sought to be acquired by a unit of local government, a copy of the resolution adopted by the unit of local government under paragraph (4).

(N) Documentation of the public purpose for which the State or the unit of local government seeks to acquire the property.

(O) A copy of each notice sent to an owner of an interest in the property under paragraph (1).

A request for quick-take authority shall not be considered by a House committee fewer than 30 days after the date of the notice to each property owner as required by paragraph (1).

Every affidavit submitted by the State or a unit of local government pursuant to this Rule 41(c), together with all documents and other items submitted with the affidavit, must be made available to any person upon request for inspection and copying.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 106

Offered by Representative Kelly:

WHEREAS, Home fires are the biggest element of the U.S. fire problem for civilians and responders; and

WHEREAS, Eighty-six percent of all civilian structure fire deaths are in homes, and home fires cause \$8.7 billion in direct property damage each year (NFPA); and

WHEREAS, Residential structure fires accounted for 67 percent of firefighter injuries (USFA), and firefighters are 11 times more likely to be injured fighting structure fires (NFPA); and

WHEREAS, Home fires are deadlier today as a result of unprotected lightweight construction material, open floor plans, abundant synthetic furnishings, and emerging technology such as lithium-ion batteries, which make homes burn faster, becoming deadly in two minutes or less (UL/NIST); and

WHEREAS, The United States Fire Administration (USFA) estimates that home fire sprinklers could save thousands of lives each year if more were installed in homes; and

WHEREAS, Fire sprinklers are a proven and cost-effective means of protecting lives and property from the threat of fire; and

WHEREAS, Fire sprinklers offer the highest degree of fire protection and are critical in saving lives and property; and

WHEREAS, Fire sprinklers can control a fire, and thereby the smoke, while it is still small, as a room can be engulfed in flames in less than two minutes, saving the lives of occupants and first responders; and

WHEREAS, From January 1, 2007 through December 31, 2023, a span of 17 years, there have been 4,031 injuries in one and two-family home fires in Illinois without a fire sprinkler system and 1,072 fatalities; and

WHEREAS, During that same 17-year period, there have been only seven injuries in one and two-family home fires in Illinois with fire sprinkler systems and zero fatalities (NFSA); and

WHEREAS, Including fire sprinklers in local building codes and community risk reduction helps support fire service resources, staffing, and budgets because when new housing stock is sprinklered it becomes safer, improving communities and allowing fire service resources to be directed to those at highest risk; and

WHEREAS, Stronger state and federal support of home fire sprinkler education will help address confusion and anti-code negativity and encourage fire service advocacy of home fire sprinkler installation; and

WHEREAS, More installation of fire sprinklers in new homes will directly and indefinitely protect and improve communities of every size; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare the week of May 11, 2025 through May 17, 2025 as Home Fire Sprinkler Week; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to Erik Hoffer, Chicago IP Director for the National Fire Sprinkler Association.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 108

Offered by Representative Davis, Will:

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois established a sister-state relationship with Taiwan, the Republic of China (ROC), in 1992; since that time, Illinois and Taiwan have enjoyed strong bilateral trade, educational and cultural exchanges, and tourism; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan shares the same values of freedom, democracy, human rights, the rule of law, peace, and prosperity with the United States and the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The United States ranks as Taiwan's second-largest trading partner, and Taiwan is the eighth-largest trading partner of the United States, ranking higher than France, India, Brazil, and Australia; bilateral trade between the U.S. and Taiwan reached more than US\$ 128 billion in 2023, and Taiwan is the 13th-largest export market for U.S. goods; and

WHEREAS, The United States is a leading destination for Taiwan's overseas investment, and the trade and investment with Taiwan creates and supports 360,400 well-paid American jobs in the United States; the first agreement under the U.S.-Taiwan Initiative on 21st-Century Trade came into effect in December 2024; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan imported nearly US\$ 3.7 billion worth of U.S. farm products in 2023, making it the seventh-largest market for U.S. agricultural products overall and the fourth-largest market on a per capita basis among the top 10 U.S. agricultural export destinations; due to its high quality produce, the U.S. remains one of Taiwan's largest sources of agricultural products, supplying more than one-fifth of the country's major agricultural imports; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan and the State of Illinois have enjoyed a long and mutually beneficial relationship with the prospect of future growth; Taiwan was Illinois' sixth-largest export market in Asia and 19th-largest export market globally in 2023, with US\$ 758 million worth of Illinois goods being exported to the country and a US\$ 51 million investment from Taiwan being received by the State of Illinois; trade and investment from Taiwan supports up to 6,285 quality jobs in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, To strengthen the Taiwan-Illinois bilateral economic relationship, it is essential to support Illinois businesses to enhance their economic engagement with Taiwan based on the 1979 Taiwan Relations Act (TRA, Public Law 96-8, 22 U.S.C. 3301); Article 4, Section b of the TRA stipulates that "wherever the laws of the United States refer or relate to foreign countries, nations, states, governments, or similar entities, such terms shall include and such laws shall apply with respect to Taiwan"; it is legitimate for Illinois businesses to refer to Taiwan, ROC, as Taiwan in conducting their business ties with the country; and

WHEREAS, Negotiations for a Bilateral Trade Agreement (BTA), the Avoidance of Double Taxation Agreement (ADTA), and the Indo-Pacific Economic Framework for Prosperity (IPEF) between Taiwan and the United States are important steps toward further strengthening bilateral trade between our countries, thereby increasing Illinois' exports to Taiwan and creating bilateral investment and technical collaboration through tariff reduction and other trade facilitation measures; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan has undertaken a policy of integrated diplomacy, values-based diplomacy, and allied diplomacy in its international relations; Taiwan is capable of, and willing to, fulfill its responsibilities and to collaborate with the world to deal with the challenges of humanitarian aid, disease control, and so forth; and

WHEREAS, The United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) passed Resolution 2758 in 1971 to include representatives of the People's Republic of China (PRC), but the above-mentioned resolution was never intended to address Taiwan's ultimate political status and did not preclude Taiwan's meaningful participation in the UN system on its own merit; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we reaffirm our commitment to the strengthening and deepening of the sister ties between the State of Illinois and Taiwan, the Republic of China (ROC); and be it further

RESOLVED, That we reaffirm our support for the Taiwan Relations Act (TRA) and support Illinois businesses referring to Taiwan, ROC, as Taiwan; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we endorse Taiwan's efforts to secure the signing of a Bilateral Trade Agreement (BTA), the Avoidance of Double Taxation Agreement (ADTA), and the Indo-Pacific Economic Framework for Prosperity (IPEF) with the United States, and we support the further strengthening of a closer economic and trade partnership between the State of Illinois and Taiwan with multiple possible approaches, including signing an economic and trade memorandum of understanding, exploring the possibility of establishing an Illinois Office in Taiwan, and sending Illinois high-level officials to visit Taiwan; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we support Taiwan's meaningful participation in international organizations, including the United Nations (UN), the World Health Organization (WHO), the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO), the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), and the International Criminal Police Organization (INTERPOL), which impact the health, safety, and well-being of the peoples of Taiwan, the State of Illinois, the United States, and the world; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we oppose any distortion or misuse of UNGA Resolution 2758 to attempt to deny Taiwan's aspiration to make more contributions in international societies; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation and the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office in Chicago.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 111

Offered by Representative McCombie:

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois enacted a State sales tax holiday that occurred over a ten-day period in August 2022, during which consumers were able to purchase school-related items and certain clothing while paying sales tax at a reduced rate, which was unlimited for school supplies and covered clothing up to \$125 per item; and

WHEREAS, Due to this holiday, and with respect to eligible items covered by it, the current sales tax rate of 6.25% was reduced to 1.25% during this period; and

WHEREAS, The sales tax holiday applied to items that are essential to academic success in the classroom, and such items included bookbags, binders, pencils, notebooks, erasers, and index cards; and

WHEREAS, The August 2022 sales tax holiday was not renewed in the summer of 2023 for FY24 or any year thereafter despite the fiscal impact of the holiday in 2022 only being \$6.6 million, according to Illinois Department of Revenue Annual Report FY23, compared to a State budget of \$53 billion; and

WHEREAS, According to the U.S. Department of Labor, the cost of school supplies has spiked more than 24.5% since 2022, resulting in parents having to pay more per child on school supplies; and

WHEREAS, A 2024 survey conducted by Intuit Credit Karma found 33% of parents expressed that they could not afford to complete back-to-school shopping that year; and

WHEREAS, According to the Tax Foundation, 11 states enacted a tax holiday for school supplies in 2024, bringing much needed tax relief to their constituents; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the General Assembly and the Governor to enact a tax holiday for school supplies in 2025 and thereafter to bring relief to working parents; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Governor, the Speaker and Minority Leader of the Illinois House of Representatives, and the President and Minority Leader of the Illinois Senate.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 112

Offered by Representative McCombie:

WHEREAS, The exclusion of taxing retirement income encourages residents to remain living throughout their retirement in Illinois and encourages newly retired Americans to relocate to the State; therefore, be it

WHEREAS, Sydney Daniel, founder of the Time to Turn Off platform, has impacted over 260 classrooms and over 6,000 students statewide through her distracted driving education curriculum, and her efforts include collaborations with Illinois State Police, Country Financial Insurance, and national organizations such as Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) and End Distracted Driving (endDD); her advocacy emphasizes driver safety and social media education, particularly for young drivers aged 15 to 19; and

WHEREAS, Initiatives like Time to Turn Off and partnerships with advocacy groups and State agencies demonstrate the importance of community involvement in reducing distracted driving; and

WHEREAS, Recognizing April as Distracted Driving Awareness Month aligns with nationwide efforts to promote safe driving habits, to educate the public on the dangers of distracted driving, and to encourage all citizens to take personal responsibility for their actions behind the wheel; and

WHEREAS, Heightened awareness during the month of April contributes to creating a culture of safe and responsible driving in Illinois, thereby reducing traffic accidents and saving lives; therefore, be it
