RECEIPT OF EXECUTIVE ORDER

The Clerk of the House acknowledges receipt of the following Executive Orders on February 14, 2025:

Executive Order 2025-01

TO REORGANIZE THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES AND CONSOLIDATE THE DIVISIONS OF MENTAL HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE USE PREVENTION AND RECOVERY, CREATING THE NEW DIVISION OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AND RECOVERY

February 14, 2025

WHEREAS, Article V, Section 11 of the Illinois Constitution authorizes the Governor to reassign functions or reorganize executive agencies that are directly responsible to him by means of executive order;

WHEREAS, Section 3.2 of the Executive Reorganization Implementation Act, 15 ILCS 15/3.2, provides that “Reorganization” includes ‘the consolidation or coordination of any part of any agency or the functions thereof with any other part of the same agency or the functions thereof;’

WHEREAS, the Department of Human Services’ (Department) Division of Mental Health (DMH) and the Department’s Division of Substance Use Prevention and Recovery (SUPR) are divisions within an executive agency directly responsible to the Governor and exercise the rights, powers, duties, and responsibilities derived from 20 ILCS 1305 *et seq.*;

WHEREAS, there is a substantial overlap in persons served by DMH and SUPR, as one in four individuals with a serious mental illness also has a substance use disorder, almost 50% of inpatient substance use disorder patients have a co-occurring psychiatric disorder, and approximately 32% of inpatient psychiatric patients have a co-occurring substance use disorder;

WHEREAS, many Illinois service providers serve consumers of both DMH and SUPR, with 61 community mental health centers also licensed to provide substance use disorder services, and 17 having grants with both current Divisions;

WHEREAS, recovery from substance use disorders and mental illnesses, defined as a process of change through which individuals improve their health and wellness, live a self-directed life, and strive to reach their full potential, is a primary goal for behavioral health care and will benefit from the broader availability of integrated substance use and mental health services;

WHEREAS, the consolidation of DMH and SUPR will leverage the expertise of staff from both Divisions, improve accessibility and accountability, improve outcomes for Illinoisans who have both mental illnesses and substance use disorders, reduce administrative burden on providers, and enhance substance use disorder treatment in State-Operated Psychiatric Hospitals, among other improvements;

WHEREAS, for the foregoing reasons, it is appropriate and most beneficial to consolidate DMH and SUPR into a new integrated division;

WHEREAS, pursuant to the consolidation of DMH and SUPR, the initiatives and programs of both agencies will be preserved and maintained; and

WHEREAS, the consolidation of DMH and SUPR will improve access to care for consumers and patients, streamline processes, strengthen the workforce, and allow staff to be more responsive to the needs of Illinois residents.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JB Pritzker, Governor of the State of Illinois, pursuant to the executive authority vested in me by Article V, Section 11 of the Illinois Constitution, hereby order the following:

I. CONSOLIDATION OF FUNCTIONS

Effective on July 1, 2025, or as soon thereafter as practicable, powers, duties, rights, and responsibilities related to DMH and SUPR shall be consolidated into a single entity called the Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery within the Department of Human Services. The statutory powers, duties, rights, and responsibilities of DMH and SUPR derive from the following and all other relevant statutes, as well as the regulations promulgated thereunder, including, but not limited to:

- a. Substance Use Disorder Act, 20 ILCS 301 *et seq.*;

- b. Civil Administrative Code of Illinois (Department of Human Services(Alcoholism and Substance Abuse) Law) 20 ILCS 310 *et seq.*;
- c. Department of Human Services Act, 20 ILCS 1305 *et seq.*;
- d. Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Administrative Act, 20 ILCS 1705 *et seq.*;
- e. Civil Administrative Code of Illinois (Department of Human Services (Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities) Law) 20 ILCS 1710 *et seq.*;
- f. Illinois Public Aid Code, 305 ILCS 5 *et seq.*;
- g. Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Code, 405 ILCS 5 *et seq.*;
- h. Illinois Vehicle Code, 625 ILCS 5 *et seq.*;
- i. Sexually Violent Persons Commitment Act, 725 ILCS 207 *et seq.*;
- j. Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Confidentiality Act, 740 ILCS 110 *et seq.*;
- k. Unified Code of Corrections, 730 ILCS 5 *et seq.*;
- l. Code of Criminal Procedure of 1963, 725 ILCS 5 *et seq.*; and
- m. Illinois Controlled Substances Act, 720 ILCS 570 *et seq.*

II. EFFECT OF CONSOLIDATION

- a. The powers, duties, rights, and responsibilities vested in DMH and SUPR shall be consolidated and vested in the new Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery. Each act done in the exercise of such powers, duties, rights, and responsibilities by the Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery shall have the same legal effect as if done by DMH or SUPR.
- b. The employees of DMH and SUPR shall be transferred and consolidated into the new Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery. The status and rights of DMH and SUPR employees under the Personnel Code shall not be affected by the consolidation.
- c. All books, records, papers, documents, property (real and personal), contracts, and pending business pertaining to the powers, duties, rights, and responsibilities related to DMH and SUPR and consolidated by this Executive Order, including but not limited to material in electronic or magnetic format and necessary computer hardware and software, shall be delivered to the new Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery.
- d. Any rules, regulations, obligations, and other actions of DMH or SUPR shall be transferred and continue as rules, regulations, obligations, and actions of the Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery. The Department of Human Services shall modify any rules, regulations, obligations, or other actions, as necessary, to carry out the reorganization.
- e. No obligations arising from any civil or criminal penalties previously imposed are affected by this Executive Order. Every person or entity shall be subject to the same obligations and duties and any penalties, civil or criminal, arising therefrom, and shall have the same rights arising from the exercise of such powers, duties, rights, and responsibilities as had been exercised by DMH or SUPR or its officers or employees.

f. Whenever reports or notices are now required to be made or given or papers or documents furnished or served by any person to or upon DMH or SUPR in connection with any of their functions consolidated by this Executive Order, the same shall be made, given, furnished, or served in the same manner to or upon the new Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery.

g. This Executive Order shall not affect any act done, ratified, or canceled or any right occurring or established or any action or proceeding had or commenced in an administrative, civil, or criminal cause regarding DMH or SUPR before this Executive Order takes effect; such actions or proceedings may be defended, prosecuted, and continued by the Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery.

III. SAVINGS CLAUSE

This Executive Order does not contravene, and shall not be construed to contravene any contracts, agreements, or collective bargaining agreements.

IV. PRIOR EXECUTIVE ORDERS

This Executive Order supersedes any contrary provision of any other prior Executive Order.

V. SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Executive Order or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, this invalidity does not affect any other provision or application of this Executive Order which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application. To achieve this purpose, the provisions of this Executive Order are declared to be severable.

VI. FILING AND DELIVERY

This Executive Order shall be filed with the Secretary of State. A copy of this Executive Order shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Senate and to the Clerk of the House of Representatives and, for the purpose of preparing revisory legislation, to the Legislative Reference Bureau.

VII. EFFECTIVE DATE

Provided that neither house of the General Assembly disapproves of this Executive Order by the record vote of a majority of the members elected, this Executive Order shall take effect 60 days after its delivery to the General Assembly.

WHEREAS, President Trump announced his candidacy for President of the United States on June 16, 2015; he accepted the Republican nomination in July of 2016 and was elected president on November 8, 2016; he was inaugurated as the 45th President of the United States on January 20, 2017; and

WHEREAS, President Trump's accomplishments during his first term included reforming the U.S. tax code, renegotiating trade agreements with Mexico, Canada, China, Japan, and South Korea, expanding the military, defeating the Islamic State (ISIS), responding to the opioid crisis, improving access to healthcare for veterans, responding to the COVID-19 global pandemic, appointing federal judges, including the nomination of three U.S. Supreme Court justices, and lowering the cost of prescription drugs; and

WHEREAS, President Trump was elected to his second term as president on November 5, 2024, becoming only the second president, along with President Grover Cleveland, to serve two non-consecutive terms; and

WHEREAS, President Trump has been married to his wife, Melania, since 2005, and together they have one son, Barron; he also has four adult children, Donald Jr., Ivanka, Eric, and Tiffany and 10 grandchildren; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize the life of President Donald J. Trump as he begins his term as the 47th President of the United States; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we congratulate President Trump on his birthday on June 14, 2025; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to President Trump as a symbol of our respect and esteem.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 122

Offered by Representative Spain:

WHEREAS, In March of 2020, the State of Illinois was ordered into a work from home posture in response to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, The tools and processes that were put in place in response to the pandemic began immediately to provide remote capability to employees who were delivering a myriad of services to Illinois residents in every corner of the State; and

RESOLVED, That we direct the Auditor General to commence this audit as soon as possible and report his findings and recommendations upon completion in accordance with the provisions of Section 3-14 of the Illinois State Auditing Act; and be it further

RESOLVED, That all State agencies or other entities having information relevant to this audit are urged to cooperate fully and promptly with the Auditor General's Office in the conduct of this audit; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Auditor General, the Department Central Management Services, and the Office of Governor.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 124

Offered by Representative LaPointe:

WHEREAS, Serious mental illnesses like bipolar disorder, major depressive disorder, and schizophrenia often require treatment with antipsychotic medications for effective management, and antipsychotic prescribing rates continue to rise; and

WHEREAS, While prolonged antipsychotic use may be essential for the treatment of certain conditions, it is associated with tardive dyskinesia (TD), a condition marked by uncontrollable, abnormal, and repetitive movements of the face, torso, limbs, or extremities; and

WHEREAS, People at higher risk of TD include those older than 55 years, people who are Black, women, individuals with mood or substance use disorders, intellectual disabilities, or central nervous system injuries, and those with high cumulative antipsychotic exposure; and

WHEREAS, Approximately 60% of the estimated 800,000 U.S. adults living with TD remain undiagnosed, and even mild TD symptoms can be stigmatizing and impair physical, social, and emotional well-being, underscoring the urgency of early screening, detection, and intervention; and

WHEREAS, The American Psychiatric Association recommends routine TD screening in their clinical guidelines for antipsychotic treatment, and individuals treated with antipsychotics or experiencing abnormal movements should consult their health care providers to assess TD risk, receive TD screenings, and determine appropriate treatment together; and

WHEREAS, FDA-approved treatments for TD can provide options for symptom management and improved quality of life for many individuals living with TD; and

WHEREAS, The General Assembly can encourage TD screening education and awareness for health care providers, patients, and care partners to help ensure patients prescribed antipsychotics receive care and support that aligns with clinical best practices, including regular TD screenings; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May 4 through May 10, 2025 as Tardive Dyskinesia Awareness Week (TDAW) in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we support TDAW in recognition of the importance of early detection and intervention to improve outcomes for people living with mental health conditions and prescribed antipsychotics, and we support efforts to raise awareness about the causes and symptoms of tardive

dyskinesia (TD) and the importance of routine TD screening.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 125

Offered by Representative Mah:

WHEREAS, Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists (CRNAs), also known as nurse anesthesiologists or nurse anesthetists, are advanced practice registered nurses who are among the nation's most trusted professions, having provided anesthesia care to patients in the United States for more than 150 years; and

WHEREAS, CRNAs became the first nursing specialty to be accorded direct reimbursement rights by Medicare due to legislation passed in 1986; and

WHEREAS, CRNAs practice in every setting in which anesthesia is delivered, including traditional hospital surgical suites, obstetrical delivery rooms, critical access hospitals, ambulatory surgical centers, and the offices of dentists, podiatrists, ophthalmologists, and pain management specialists; and

WHEREAS, CRNAs are qualified to make independent judgments regarding all aspects of anesthesia care based on their education, training, board certification, and licensure; and

WHEREAS, CRNAs are trusted anesthesia experts, caring for patients safely and compassionately, delivering specialized, cost-effective care to all patients, from newborns to seniors, for every type of procedure in all types of facilities; and

WHEREAS, CRNAs' experience in critical care nursing, in addition to anesthesia care, provides the training and education to address unique healthcare challenges of some of our sickest patients, including veterans; and

WHEREAS, National CRNA Week will be held from January 19 through January 25, 2025; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare the week of January 19 through January 25, 2025 as CRNA Week in the State of Illinois to recognize the importance of Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists (CRNAs) and their role in providing high-quality care to the people of Illinois.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 127

Offered by Representative Weber:

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the Rules of the House of Representatives of the 104th General Assembly are amended by changing Rule 23 as follows:

(House Rule 23)

23. Witnesses, Oaths, and Subpoenas.

(c) A ~~At the discretion of the Speaker, a~~ Committee of the Whole shall ~~may~~ administer oaths to persons before the Committee of the Whole who are not members of the General Assembly and may compel, by subpoena, any person to appear and give testimony before the Committee of the Whole and

produce papers, documents, and other materials relating to the subject matter for which the Committee of the Whole was created or relating to a legislative measure pending before the committee of the Whole.

(d) Oaths may be administered under this Rule by the Presiding Officer or by the Chairperson of a committee or any person sitting in his or her stead.

(e) Subpoenas issued under this Rule must be issued and signed by the Chairperson of the committee and must comply with Rule 4(c)(9).

(f) In the case of special committees with Co-Chairpersons from different political parties, the term "Chairperson" for purposes of this Rule means the Co-Chairperson from the majority caucus.

(g) This Rule may be suspended only by the affirmative vote of 71 members elected.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 128

Offered by Representative Halbrook:

WHEREAS, Daylight Saving time began in Germany during World War I as an effort to conserve fuel; and

WHEREAS, Daylight Saving Time was instituted in the United States in 1918 under the title of "War time" and proved so unpopular that Congress abolished it when the war was over; and

WHEREAS, Local jurisdictions then had control over their clocks until the Uniform Time Act of 1966, which mandated standard time within time zones and instituted the practice of advancing clocks one hour in the spring and turning them back one hour in the fall; and

WHEREAS, In 1986, Congress amended the Uniform Time Act, moving the beginning of Daylight Saving Time from the last Sunday in April to the first Sunday in April; and

WHEREAS, Congress, as part of the Energy Policy Act of 2005, moved the beginning of Daylight Saving Time to the second Sunday in March and the end to the first Sunday of November; and

WHEREAS, States were allowed to exempt themselves from Daylight Saving Time, resulting in a patchwork of time differences throughout the nation, especially in states with multiple time zones, such as Indiana; and

WHEREAS, Uniformity of time among the states is essential for interstate commerce; and

WHEREAS, Numerous studies indicate that the biannual time change interferes with the body's circadian rhythm, affecting sleep cycles, stress levels, and drowsiness during the day; and

WHEREAS, A 2009 study in the Sleep Medicine journal indicated that it may take some people up to three weeks to adjust to the time change; and

WHEREAS, According to the American Journal of Cardiology, there is a ten percent increase in the number of heart attacks on the Monday following the time change; and

WHEREAS, A 2004 study in the Accident Analysis and Prevention journal estimated that instituting Daylight Saving Time permanently could save up to 366 lives due to a reduction in automotive accidents; and

WHEREAS, The rationale for switching clocks twice per year to aid in the war effort was laudable over 100 years ago, but modern and scientific research now clearly favors the institution of Daylight Saving Time year round, eliminating the stress and negative health effects caused by changing clocks; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we believe that the United States should move away from biannual time change, instead instituting Daylight Saving Time permanently; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Congress of the United States of America to enact permanent Daylight Saving Time to minimize confusion and disruption to people's lives, transportation, and commerce; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the President of the United States, the Secretary of the United States Department of Energy, and the Congressional Delegation of the State of Illinois.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 129

Offered by Representative Moeller:

WHEREAS, Vaccination is proven to be a safe, invaluable tool to proactively safeguard public health and prevent the devastating effects of vaccine-preventable diseases; and

WHEREAS, Vaccination has averted over 154 million deaths globally since 1974, of which 146 million were among children younger than five years of age; and

WHEREAS, Vaccination has greatly reduced morbidity and mortality by eradicating vaccine-preventable diseases (e.g., smallpox) and has greatly reduced the incidence of infections such as meningitis, measles, polio, and rubella; and

WHEREAS, Timely meningococcal vaccination in children and young adults helps protect against the debilitating effects of meningococcal disease, including death, and has led to a significant decrease in incidence; and

WHEREAS, Vaccination for highly contagious diseases such as measles is incredibly important; in order to achieve herd immunity against measles, 95% of the population must be vaccinated; if measles vaccination coverage rates drop below that threshold, outbreaks and preventable deaths will ultimately occur; therefore, maintaining high vaccine coverage rates is critical to protect the public and prevent transmission; and

WHEREAS, An analysis of costs associated with invasive meningococcal disease outbreaks found that the average cost per outbreak containment strategy was almost \$440,000 (\$299,641 and \$579,851 for small and large containment strategies, respectively); and

WHEREAS, Among the approximately 117 million children born during 1994-2023 in the United States, vaccination averted 508 million lifetime cases of illness, 32 million hospitalizations, and 1.1 million deaths, resulting in estimated savings of \$540 billion in direct medical costs and \$2.7 trillion in societal costs; and

WHEREAS, Vaccination can prevent the development of cancers later in life (e.g., human papillomavirus vaccination, which has contributed to a 65% reduction in cervical cancer incidence over the last decade); and

WHEREAS, Vaccination for four common diseases in older adults, including shingles, is estimated to prevent 64 million cases and \$185 billion in treatment costs over the next 30 years in the United States; and

WHEREAS, While vaccinating children provides substantial health and economic benefit, vaccinating adults is also important; many childhood vaccines provide life-long protection; however, immunity can decrease over a person's lifetime, and some vaccine-preventable diseases can be more severe in adults; and

WHEREAS, There continues to be disease burden in adults, especially in those with comorbidities, advanced age, or immunocompromising conditions, warranting continued, timely vaccination, especially against viruses that change frequently (e.g., influenza, COVID-19); and

WHEREAS, For example, vaccination against shingles for high-risk adults aged 19 and older, as well as all adults aged 50 and older, has proven highly effective in preventing both the infection and its transmission, offering long-lasting protection for several years after immunization; and

WHEREAS, For example, respiratory syncytial virus vaccination in older adults is an effective preventive measure that reduces the likelihood of hospitalization and critical illness due to respiratory syncytial virus infection; and

WHEREAS, Vaccines remain a safe and effective public health measure; in the United States, vaccines undergo a thorough regulatory review process, which includes Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approval and a recommendation from the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) after careful evaluation; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare April 10, 2025 as Vaccine Awareness Day in the State of Illinois to educate the public about the importance of vaccinations, initiate meaningful dialogue around vaccinations, and encourage the uptake of vaccines; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Illinois Department of Health to continue to promote to healthcare providers and the people of this state that vaccinations are a highly effective and safe public health measure and increase public awareness about the importance of all Illinois residents receiving recommended immunizations, and to promote outreach and education efforts concerning vaccinations; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Illinois Department of Health to continue to prioritize immunization initiatives, develop policies, and invest in immunization infrastructure to ensure broad and open access to immunizations to safeguard public health and protect the well-being of Illinois residents.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 130

Offered by Representative Syed:

WHEREAS, Genetic counselors empower patients and their families with vital healthcare information, guidance, and emotional support to help them understand their family history, evaluate genetic testing options, and make informed choices based on test results; and

WHEREAS, There are over 150 certified genetic counselors in Illinois working in prenatal, fertility, pediatrics, metabolic, cardiovascular, neurology, and cancer care; and

WHEREAS, Many people benefit from increased genetic sequencing research and genetic counseling, including anyone with a condition linked to a specific gene or anyone who has a family history of an inherited disease; and

WHEREAS, The 5,000 genetic counselors across the country streamline the healthcare industry by ensuring the right tests are being ordered, avoiding costly and unnecessary costs and tests, by helping patients and providers understand complex test results and how to best use this information, by helping consult with potential parents on the intimidating potential of passing on inherited diseases, by sharing information with family members, and by providing recommendations for community support services; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare November 13, 2025 as "Genetic Counselor Awareness Day" in the State of Illinois, and be it further

RESOLVED, That we recognize that the sequencing of the human genome is one of the most significant scientific accomplishments of the past hundred years and express our support for genetic counselors, who are using this research to improve the lives of many throughout the State.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 133

Offered by Representative Didech:

WHEREAS, The demands of the 21st century require a new approach to education to fully prepare our State's youth for college, careers, and citizenship; a whole child approach to education addresses students' comprehensive needs through the shared responsibility of students, families, schools, and communities; the goal of such an approach is to ensure that each child is challenged, supported, healthy, safe, and engaged; and

WHEREAS, The children of Illinois are our future and will provide the leadership, creativity, and productivity to sustain and strengthen the quality of life in our State; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois has the responsibility to ensure that our children have every possible opportunity for a quality education and future success; and

WHEREAS, Each student in Illinois deserves to be challenged academically and prepared for college, meaningful employment in our global economy, and lifelong success; and

WHEREAS, Each student in Illinois deserves to be supported by qualified, caring adults and to receive access to personalized learning; and

WHEREAS, Each student in Illinois deserves to learn about and practice a healthy lifestyle; and

WHEREAS, Each student in Illinois deserves to learn in an environment that is physically and emotionally safe; and

WHEREAS, Each student in Illinois deserves to be actively engaged in learning and connected to the school and broader community; and

WHEREAS, The consequences of not ensuring that our young people are challenged, supported, healthy, safe, and engaged are clear; and

WHEREAS, The current high school graduation rate is 87%; and

WHEREAS, SAT Math scores for 11th graders who achieve "meets or exceeds" are at only 29%; and

WHEREAS, SAT English/Language Arts scores for 11th graders who achieve "meets or exceeds" are at only 30%; and

WHEREAS, In science, only 51% of all students in all grades are testing at the proficient or exemplary level; and

WHEREAS, Only 64% of high school seniors enroll in a college program within 12 months of graduation; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare March 2025 as Illinois Whole Child Month to recognize the value of assuring that each student is challenged, supported, healthy, safe, and engaged; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge parents, educators, and community members to support a whole child approach to education for each student; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge every school in Illinois to celebrate Whole Child Month by adopting at least one of the whole child tenets to promote and encourage throughout the month; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Illinois Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development as a symbol of our respect and esteem.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 135

Offered by Representative Stuart:

WHEREAS, The ongoing teacher shortage and declining student performance in Illinois could be mitigated by increasing preparation time for educators; and

WHEREAS, Adequate preparation time allows teachers to enhance their effectiveness in the classroom, which contributes to improved student performance and academic success; currently, on average, teachers receive approximately half an hour of prep time within their contract hours; and

WHEREAS, Teachers consistently report that increased planning and collaboration time is a key factor in improving both retention and job satisfaction as well as effective instruction; research suggests that the ideal preparation-to-teaching time ratio should be 1:1 to 2:1, meaning that for each hour of classroom instruction, a teacher should have one to two hours for preparation; and

WHEREAS, With an ongoing shortage of substitute teachers, educators across the state are often asked and even coerced to forgo their own planning time in order to cover the education of students of other teachers, often with short notice, forcing them to spend uncompensated hours to prepare for their own student's instruction, adding to burn out and increasing the rate of individuals leaving the profession; and

WHEREAS, If teachers had adequate paid preparation time within the contracted school day, Illinois would benefit with improved student outcomes and the mitigation of a cause of early departure of teachers from classrooms; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that meaningful reform of education in Illinois requires structural changes at all levels, including increases to paid teacher preparation and collaboration time, staffing models, and systems for recognition and incentives for educators; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge school districts across the state to provide adequate paid planning time for teachers; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the appropriate education stakeholders as an expression of our support for meaningful educational reforms.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 137

Offered by Representative Mason:

WHEREAS, Decades of research demonstrate that high-quality early care and education programs are effective in supporting the learning and development of young children, increasing their likelihood of success in school and in later life; and

WHEREAS, Studies similarly reflect the substantial contributions that early childhood services make in strengthening the well-being of communities, the stability of our workforce, and the quality of our economy, as well as public safety and national security; and

WHEREAS, The quality of early childhood services depends largely upon the quality of their infrastructure, ranging from well-qualified teachers to supportive data systems; and

WHEREAS, Such infrastructure also includes safe, developmentally appropriate classrooms and related physical space for young children's care and learning; and

WHEREAS, The availability and quality of early childhood facilities are an equity concern for many underserved populations of Illinois, including communities of color, areas of pronounced socio-economic pressure, and rural regions; and

WHEREAS, The Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis has stated that high-quality environments not only help keep children safe and healthy but also facilitate concentration, ease of play, and more positive child-teacher and child-child interactions; providing a high-quality environment includes ensuring such conditions as adequate space, ventilation, thermal comfort, and lighting; and

WHEREAS, The national Bipartisan Policy Center has reported that investments in early care and learning facilities should be an element of federal, state, and local economic-development strategies; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois reflected these realities in establishing the Early Childhood Construction Grants (ECCG) initiative in 2009 and growing the grant's resources to \$100 million in 2019, with approximately \$40 million of that amount still remaining to be awarded to qualified building-and-repair projects; and

WHEREAS, Owing to resource limitations, the number of ECCG grant applications and the needs they represent have vastly outpaced the number of actual grant awards that could be made to early childhood providers over the years; and

WHEREAS, In Illinois' mixed-delivery system of early childhood services, community-based providers play an important role by helping relieve capacity pressures on maxed-out school facilities while also meeting the specific needs and choices of many parents in their own localities; and

WHEREAS, Community-based service providers typically have far less access to capital, including the technical assistance required to seek building resources, than do schools; and

WHEREAS, The vast scope of the State's construction-and-renovation needs is also evidenced by Early Childhood Regional Needs Assessments produced in 2023 by Birth to Five Illinois in which stakeholders from approximately one-fifth of Illinois counties, ranging from Jo Daviess to Kankakee to Pope and beyond, expressly named capital matters among their most pressing concerns; and

WHEREAS, School districts participating in the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) 2024 Capital Needs Assessment Survey identified the need for building 269 additional school-based preK classrooms statewide; and

WHEREAS, ISBE's biennial Capital Needs Assessment Survey captures only a portion of Illinois' early childhood facilities needs, considering that fewer than half of elementary and unit districts took part in the most recent assessment and that the assessment does not extend to community-based service providers; and

WHEREAS, A national report from the Reinvestment Fund and National Children's Facilities Network declared that "limited supply of licensable facilities, cramped spaces, and deferred maintenance have been common features of child care infrastructure for decades," adding that their findings "suggest a significant remaining need for funding for facilities infrastructure, from maintaining and repairing facilities, expanding existing programs, to developing new high-quality learning environments; and

WHEREAS, In 2019, the Governor appointed a bipartisan Illinois Commission on Equitable Early Childhood Education and Care Funding (Early Childhood Funding Commission) that, after a year of research and expert deliberation, issued recommendations for making the State's system of birth-to-five services "simpler, better, fairer" for children and families; and

WHEREAS, The Funding Commission's report expressly acknowledged the significance of Illinois' urgent bricks-and-mortar needs, stating that future studies must assess the costs of facility footprint expansion across the mixed delivery system to help adjust projections of future funding needs; and

WHEREAS, The Funding Commission recommended substantial increases in birth-to-five programmatic resources that Illinois has begun to pursue through the Governor's multi-year Smart Start Illinois initiative, representing important and desperately needed growth in early childhood program

capacity that will understandably increase physical-infrastructure needs even further, over time, as more families are helped to access the services they seek; and

WHEREAS, The Commission and the Governor also recommended the creation of a single State agency to streamline, improve, and assume responsibility for the administration of core birth-to-five services that historically have been spread across multiple other departments; and

WHEREAS, By an overwhelmingly bipartisan vote, the General Assembly accordingly authorized the establishment of the State's new Department of Early Childhood via Public Act 103-0594, which also launched a two-year planning process for development of the new agency; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the new Department of Early Childhood and its planning process should prioritize appropriate attention to the facilities needs of our State's mixed-delivery system of early care and education; and be it further

RESOLVED, That such prioritization should include development of a biennial measure of physical-infrastructure needs among community-based providers of child care, preschool, and other core early childhood services for children from birth to age five, as well as continue to assess the capital needs of school-based providers of such programs, to better inform state policy decision-making, and reflect the Funding Commission's call for deliberate assessment of facility-expansion costs; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the State should move expeditiously to award its remaining Early Childhood Construction Grant monies to qualified applicants, to assist providers of critical birth-to-five programs in meeting their growing building-and-repair demands; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the State should also move as quickly as feasible to replenish Early Childhood Construction Grant resources to help Illinois achieve the long-term vision of the bipartisan Funding Commission for making services "simpler, better, fairer" for young children, their families, and communities statewide; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the offices of the Governor, the Illinois Department of Early Childhood, the Illinois State Board of Education, the Illinois Department of Human Services, the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services, and the Capital Development Board.

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Article IV of the Illinois Constitution by changing Sections 11 as follows:

ARTICLE IV
THE LEGISLATURE

(ILCON Art. IV, Sec. 11)

SECTION 11. COMPENSATION AND ALLOWANCES

The annual base salary of a member shall be the same as the annual median household income in this State in the first year of a General Assembly as reported by the United States Bureau of the Census. A member shall receive a salary and allowances as provided by law, but changes in the allowances salary of a member shall not take effect during the term for which he has been elected. The General Assembly shall pass no law that increases the base salary of a member of the General Assembly.

ARTICLE IV
THE LEGISLATURE

(ILCON Art. IV, Sec. 2.5 new)

SECTION 2.5. TERM LIMITS.

A person may not be elected to the office of State Senator or the office of State Representative for terms totaling more than 20 years in each office. Service before the date of the adoption of this amendment shall be considered in the calculation of a person's service. Any person in office at the time of the adoption of this amendment who meets the term limitation set forth in this Section shall be allowed to complete his or her term of office.

ARTICLE V
THE EXECUTIVE

(ILCON Art. V, Sec. 2)

SECTION 2. TERMS

(a) These elected officers of the Executive Branch shall hold office for four years beginning on the second Monday of January after their election and, except in the case of the Lieutenant Governor, until their successors are qualified. They shall be elected at the general election in 1978 and every four years thereafter.

(b) A person may not be elected to any single office of the Executive Branch for terms totaling more than 20 years in each office. Service before the date of the adoption of this amendment shall be considered in the calculation of a person's service. RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Article IV of the Illinois Constitution by changing Section 3 as follows:

ARTICLE IV THE LEGISLATURE

(ILCON Art. IV, Sec. 3)

SECTION 3. LEGISLATIVE REDISTRICTING

(a) Legislative Districts and Representative Districts shall be compact and ; contiguous. For the purposes of this Section, "compact" means having the minimum distance between all parts of a district, such as a circle, square, or hexagon. For the purposes of this Section, "contiguous" means that all parts of a district are connected at some point with the rest of the district and substantially equal in population. ~~Representative Districts shall be compact, contiguous, and substantially equal in population.~~

Legislative Districts and Representative Districts shall preserve the political subdivisions of this State. The boundaries of a Legislative District or Representative District shall not cross the boundaries of a county, village, city, town, or township.

Legislative Districts and Representative Districts shall preserve communities of common interest in this State. The boundaries of a Legislative District or Representative District shall not separate neighborhoods or other areas where the residents of that area have common interests that do not necessarily coincide with the boundaries of a political subdivision.

(b) In the year following each Federal decennial census year, an Apportionment Commission ~~the General Assembly by law~~ shall redistrict the Legislative Districts and the Representative Districts.

The Apportionment ~~If no redistricting plan becomes effective by June 30 of that year, a Legislative Redistricting~~ Commission shall be constituted not later than July 10. The Commission shall consist of one member from each county in this State, appointed by a majority vote of the respective county boards ~~eight members, no more than four of whom shall be members of the same political party.~~

~~The Speaker and Minority Leader of the House of Representatives shall each appoint to the Commission one Representative and one person who is not a member of the General Assembly. The President and Minority Leader of the Senate shall each appoint to the Commission one Senator and one person who is not a member of the General Assembly.~~

The members of the Commission shall be certified to the Secretary of State by the appointing authorities. A vacancy on the Commission shall be filled within five days by the authority that made the original appointment. A Chairman and Vice Chairman shall be chosen by a majority of all members of the Commission.

Not later than August 10, the Commission shall file with the Secretary of State a redistricting plan approved by a majority of its ~~at least five~~ members.

If the Commission fails to file an approved redistricting plan, the Supreme Court shall submit the names of two persons, not of the same political party, to the Secretary of State not later than September 1.

Not later than September 5, the Secretary of State publicly shall draw by random selection the name of one of the two persons to serve as a ~~the ninth~~ member of the Commission.

Not later than October 5, the Commission shall file with the Secretary of State a redistricting plan approved by at least five members.

An approved redistricting plan filed with the Secretary of State shall be presumed valid, shall have the force and effect of law and shall be published promptly by the Secretary of State.

The Supreme Court shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction over actions concerning redistricting the House and Senate, which shall be initiated in the name of the People of the State by the Attorney General.

(c) No public body that determines the borders of Legislative Districts, Representative Districts, or voting districts of any other unit of local government shall preserve the political subdivisions of this State.

No public body that determines the borders of Legislative Districts, Representative Districts, or voting districts of any other unit of local government shall use partisan data or rely on recommendations derived in any part from partisan data or use election results, voting history political party registration, or any other socioeconomic data.

No public body that determines the borders of Legislative Districts, Representative Districts, or voting districts of any other unit of local government shall consider the places of residence of incumbent office holders or candidates for public office or favor or disfavor an incumbent office holder, candidate for public office, or political party, except that the boundaries of a voting district shall avoid placing multiple incumbent office holders in the same voting district.

To the extent practicable, a public body that determines the borders of Legislative Districts, Representative Districts, or voting districts of any other unit of local government shall favor competitive voting districts and avoid the creation of voting districts that favor a particular political party or coalition when doing so does not violate any other provision of this Section.

We, the People of the State of Illinois - grateful to Almighty God for the civil, political and religious liberty which He has permitted us to enjoy and seeking His blessing upon our endeavors - in order to provide for the health, safety and welfare of the people; ensure access to education, employment, food, healthcare, housing, and transportation; maintain a representative and orderly government; eliminate poverty and inequality; assure legal, social and economic justice; provide opportunity for the fullest development of the individual; insure domestic tranquility; provide for the common defense; and secure the blessings of freedom and liberty to ourselves and our posterity - do ordain and establish this Constitution for the State of Illinois.

ARTICLE VIII FINANCE

(ILCON Art. VIII, Sec. 2)

SECTION 2. STATE FINANCE

(a) The Governor shall prepare and submit to the General Assembly, at a time prescribed by law, a State budget for the ensuing fiscal year. The budget shall set forth the estimated balance of funds available

for appropriation at the beginning of the fiscal year, the estimated receipts, and a plan for expenditures and obligations during the fiscal year of every department, authority, public corporation and quasi-public corporation of the State, every State college and university, and every other public agency created by the State, but not of units of local government or school districts. The budget shall also set forth the indebtedness and contingent liabilities of the State and such other information as may be required by law. Proposed expenditures shall not exceed funds estimated to be available for the fiscal year as shown in the budget.

(b) The General Assembly shall pass a balanced budget that is based on funds estimated to be available by the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability, or its successor agency, and that makes ~~The General Assembly by law shall make~~ appropriations for all expenditures of public funds by the State. Appropriations for a fiscal year shall not exceed funds estimated by the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability, or its successor agency, ~~General Assembly~~ to be available during that year. (Source: Illinois Constitution.)
