WHEREAS, From 1877 to 2002, the State of Illinois operated a large residential facility for developmentally disabled children and adults in the City of Lincoln, known first as The Illinois Asylum for Feeble Minded Children and later renamed the Lincoln State School and Colony, the Lincoln State School, and finally, the Lincoln Developmental Center; and

WHEREAS, The Lincoln Developmental Center was located on a sprawling campus, resembling a miniature city, and housed thousands of residents and contained its own power plant, kitchen, bakery, sewing rooms, laundry facility, hospital, nursing school, fire department, jail, and farm, as well as other industrial shops; and

WHEREAS, The Lincoln Developmental Center also contained a cemetery that housed the remains of deceased patients who had lived at the facility when their families could not be located or were indigent; and

WHEREAS, The State opened the Logan Correctional Center, a women's prison, adjacent to the Lincoln Developmental Center in 1978 and opened the Lincoln Correctional Center, a men's prison, on the same grounds in 1984; and

WHEREAS, After the closure of the Lincoln Developmental Center in 2002, the Illinois Department of Corrections (IDOC) became responsible for managing the Lincoln Developmental Center cemetery; and

WHEREAS, With the erection of correctional facilities near the cemetery and management of the cemetery becoming IDOC's responsibility, it became difficult for family members, relatives, and friends of those interred at the cemetery to visit their loved ones, care for their gravesites, and pay their respects; and

WHEREAS, No clear process exists for members of the public to visit their deceased loved ones interred at the Lincoln Developmental Center cemetery, including no public guidelines for families to follow and no public information on who is responsible for managing such visits at IDOC for families to contact; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Illinois Department of Corrections to develop a standard policy/set of guidelines that are public for those who wish to visit gravesites of loved ones including, but not limited to, familial relations and researchers; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Illinois Department of Corrections to consider ease of access to the public for this cemetery during renovations or rebuilding of IDOC facilities at this site; and be it further

WHEREAS, Union registered apprenticeship programs enable employers to develop and train their future workforce while offering apprentices affordable paths to financial security for themselves and their families; and

WHEREAS, President Donald Trump has issued Executive Orders against initiatives that aim to reverse hard won progress to diversify the workforce and will further entrench systemic occupational segregation, robbing women of economic security; and

WHEREAS, President Trump has impeded the ability of the U.S. Department of Labor, the National Labor Relations Board, and the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission to ensure safe, respectful, and harassment-free work sites that uphold workers' rights; and

WHEREAS, The State has invested millions of dollars in innovative programs to increase access to high-wage careers in the construction trades to all Illinoisans, including Illinois Works and the Highway Construction Careers Training Program, which have a strong record of graduating women and people of color who are underrepresented in the industry; therefore, be it

WHEREAS, Transportation planning and funding decisions must incorporate comprehensive input from the ID/DD community, advocates, service providers, and other stakeholders to ensure equitable outcomes; therefore, be it

WHEREAS, In the early 20th century, many Arab families began migrating to southwestern Cook County seeking a better life and the opportunity to build a supportive community in the United States; these families have contributed to the rich cultural landscape of Little Palestine, transforming it into a beacon of hope and resilience; and

WHEREAS, Little Palestine, located in the southwestern region of Cook County, is home to the largest Palestinian community in the nation and the fourth largest Arab American population in the country, spanning a five-mile stretch from 79th and Harlem Avenue in Bridgeview to Harlem Avenue and College Drive in Palos Heights; and

WHEREAS, Little Palestine features over 200 Arab-owned businesses and community-serving institutions, including a community college, a hospital, three high schools, and more than 20 organizations and institutions; and

WHEREAS, Historic disinvestment in the Arab American community, coupled with being targeted for discrimination and hate crimes, threatens the sustainability and growth of this area, with over 70% of Arab-owned businesses in Little Palestine having under 10 employees and driving the economy in this region; and

WHEREAS, There has historically been no means to distinguish Arab American populations, economic activity, health, or any other indicators of Arab Americans on data registers at local, state, or national levels; recent efforts to include Arab Americans in data counts, achieved through decades of mobilization within Arab American communities, remain limited and often specific to certain locales; these omissions hinder the ability to document critical issues such as displacement and the impacts of COVID-19 and are an impediment to ensuring that resources can be sought to help revitalize the economic landscape of Little Palestine to ensure sustainable growth and development; and

WHEREAS, The Arab American Business and Professional Association, along with a coalition of organizations, is advocating for the official recognition of Little Palestine Day on the 7th day of April each year to help build cultural awareness, increase tourism, and boost economic vitality in this region; and

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare April 7, 2025 and April 7, 2026 as "Little Palestine Day" in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge Illinoisans to celebrate Little Palestine Day by supporting businesses and cultural initiatives in Little Palestine and attending or hosting events showcasing the contributions of the Arab American community to the United States; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge local schools and educational institutions to incorporate lessons about the history and contributions of the Arab American community into their curricula, promoting inclusivity and understanding; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be provided to the Arab American Business and Professional Association as a symbol of our respect and esteem.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 19

Offered by Representative Kifowit:

WHEREAS, This year marks the 250th Anniversary of the founding of the United States Marine Corps; and

WHEREAS, The phrase "Semper Fidelis" is Latin for "always faithful" and is the motto of the United States Marine Corps; and

WHEREAS, This promise means that Marines are always faithful to those on their left and right, from the fellow Marines they fight alongside to those in their communities for whom they fight; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we designate the portion of Interstate Route 80 of the National System of Interstate and Defense Highways within the State of Illinois, from mile marker 26 to mile marker 51, as the "U.S. Marine Corps Highway Semper Fidelis"; and be it further
