INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF BILLS

HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

HOUSE RESOLUTION 173

Offered by Representative La Ha:

WHEREAS, Prader-Willi syndrome is a complex genetic disorder that occurs in approximately 1 out of every 15,000 births and the most commonly known genetic cause of life-threatening obesity; and

WHEREAS, Prader-Willi syndrome affects males and females with equal frequency and affects all races and ethnicities; and

WHEREAS, Prader-Willi syndrome causes an extreme and insatiable appetite, often resulting in morbid obesity, which is the major cause of death for individuals with the syndrome; and

WHEREAS, Prader-Willi syndrome also causes cognitive and learning disabilities as well as behavioral difficulties, such as obsessive-compulsive disorder and struggles with controlling emotions; and

WHEREAS, The hunger, metabolic, and behavioral characteristics of Prader-Willi syndrome force affected individuals to require constant and lifelong supervision in a controlled environment; and

WHEREAS, Studies have shown that there is a high morbidity and mortality rate for individuals with Prader-Willi syndrome; and

WHEREAS, There is no known cure for Prader-Willi syndrome; and

WHEREAS, Increased research into Prader-Willi syndrome can lead to a better understanding of the disorder, more effective treatments, and an eventual cure for Prader-Willi syndrome; and

WHEREAS, Increased research into Prader-Willi syndrome is likely to improve our understanding of common public health concerns, including childhood obesity and mental health; and

WHEREAS, Advocacy organizations have designated May as National Prader-Willi Syndrome Awareness Month; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May 2025 as Prader-Willi Syndrome Awareness Month in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we express our support for raising awareness and educating the public about Prader-Willi Syndrome and increasing research and funding into the causes and treatments of the disease.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 174

Offered by Representative Grasse:

WHEREAS, Prescribed fire provides multiple ecological, economic, and cultural benefits to the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Prescribed fire has been practiced for thousands of years and was a primary tool used by Indigenous peoples to attract game, stimulate a rich ground layer of plants for harvesting, and keep woodlands and grasslands open and easy to traverse; and

WHEREAS, Prescribed fire is a traditional land management practice and public safety tool that helps prevent and lessen the severity of wildfires; and

WHEREAS, Prescribed fire is a valuable tool used by forest, prairie, and wetland landowners and managers in reducing hazardous fuels, reducing the risk of destructive wildfires, preparing sites for both natural and artificial forest regeneration, improving access to and the appearance of land, and controlling detrimental insects and forest diseases; and

WHEREAS, Prescribed fire is an effective natural tool for controlling invasive species; and

WHEREAS, Prescribed fire is one of the most important land management practices in maintaining and restoring healthy landscapes, but only approximately 6% of conservation lands in Illinois are currently being managed with prescribed fire; and

WHEREAS, Prescribed fire is used to restore and maintain fire-dependent ecosystems and to manage wildlife habitat for many species; it is a vital tool to maintain economic, biological, and aesthetic resources across Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Prescribed Fire Council is an organization of both public and private partners with a mission to promote the safe and continued use of prescribed fire on the Illinois landscape; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois General Assembly passed the Illinois Prescribed Burning Act in 2007 defining prescribed fire as "the planned application of fire to naturally occurring vegetative fuels under specified environmental conditions and following appropriate precautionary measures, which causes the fire to be confined to a predetermined area and accomplish the planned land management objectives."; and

WHEREAS, Prescribed fire helps keep Illinois grasslands and forests healthy, which, in return, provides ecological services such as clean air and clean water and contributes to the quality of life of the State's citizens and to local economies; therefore, be it

WHEREAS, In April of 1864, President Abraham Lincoln, who as a state legislator in Illinois supported the creation of the Illinois School for the Deaf, signed a charter establishing Gallaudet University, the first college in the world for deaf students, named in honor of Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet, who acted as an informal advisor to the first board members of the Illinois School for the Deaf; therefore, be it
