HOUSE RESOLUTION 211

Offered by Representative Ammons:

WHEREAS, The Benin Bronzes are a collection of several thousand metal plaques, sculpture heads, jewelry, and other objects that adorned the royal palace of the Oba, or king, of the Benin Kingdom, in what is now Edo State, Nigeria; they were made of brass, leather, wood, and ivory by Edo artists from the 12th to 19th centuries; and

WHEREAS, The Benin Bronzes hold profound spiritual, historical, and cultural significance to the Edo people; however, the 16th to 19th century brass relics hold particular cultural and ethnical significance to heirs, also referred to as descendants, of enslaved captives because this group of relics, referred to as "slave trade Benin Bronzes", were created through the melting and refabrication of metal manilla currency exchanged for their captive ancestors who were sold to European transatlantic slave traders by the Benin Kingdom over a 300-year period; and

WHEREAS, During the Punitive Expedition of 1897, the slave trade Benin Bronzes were taken by British forces to cover the cost of a retaliatory war in response to the Benin Kingdom committing a massacre against an unarmed party of 12 British envoys and 250 African porters, which left only a few survivors; and

WHEREAS, The Benin Bronzes are currently held in various museums and private collections around the world, including one-quarter of the known relics being located in the United States, with the third largest collection in the world, consisting of 393 pieces, being held at the Field Museum in Chicago; while most of the slave trade Benin Bronzes are blood metal bronzes, their slave trade origins are not shared and remain largely unknown to the world; and

WHEREAS, Benin Kingdom heirs have been engaged in a repatriation effort of the Benin Bronzes since 1933, calling for the return of the slave trade Benin Bronzes for moral reasons; however, heirs of enslaved Africans have required modern technology to trace their DNA to Benin Kingdom captives and officially joined the effort in 2022, demanding the following:

- (1) The slave trade Benin Bronzes be shared with them as they have the highest moral grounds for ownership, considering their ancestors were sold for the metal needed to make the bronzes;
- (2) The slave trade Benin Bronzes remain in trust at institutions in the West and the Americas, where the institutions can have access to them for aesthetic, academic, and cultural education; and
- (3) They share in all the benefits of co-ownership; and

WHEREAS, DNA research verifies that 93% of African Americans have Nigerian DNA from ancestors sold into the transatlantic slave trade from the region now called Nigeria, while 82% of Caribbean people have it, as do descendants of captives sold to Portuguese slave traders by the Benin Kingdom and transported to Brazil from the 1500s until the prohibition of the slave trade in 1888; and

WHEREAS, Neither the Benin Kingdom nor Nigeria has ever apologized for the Benin Kingdom's stealing of people and selling them for the manillas used to make the Benin Bronzes; however, heirs of enslaved Africans still suffer from the vestiges of slavery such as racial violence, discrimination, and wealth gaps, and they have never been offered dual-citizenship or been invited to repatriate back home to Nigeria; and

WHEREAS, The Benin Kingdom and Nigeria have been unresponsive to demands by descendants of their captives to share the slave trade bronzes, while Edo State, the home of the ancient Benin Kingdom, still bears a lasting legacy of the historic crime against humanity exemplified by media reports of organ harvesting and human trafficking of Edo girls for sex slavery in Europe and the Middle East; and

WHEREAS, Rewarding the heirs of slave traders with repatriation of their ancestors' ill-gotten gains, the slave trade Benin Bronzes, sends a misguided message to modern Edo State human traffickers and fails to address the historical injustices associated with the relics; and

WHEREAS, The Benin Bronzes must be shared between the heirs of the enslaved captives who paid for the relics with their lives, and the heirs of the Benin Kingdom slave traders must acknowledge the shared cultural history and Benin Kingdom's responsibility; and

WHEREAS, Efforts should be taken to bring these heirs together for healing and to ensure that they collectively benefit from the ownership and preservation of the Benin Bronzes; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we acknowledge and condemn the historical injustice associated with the original creation of the Benin Bronzes, the subsequent British acquisition and distribution of the relics, and the current possession of the Benin Bronzes by museums and collectors who are unwilling to share the relics with the heirs of the enslaved people who paid for them with their lives and the heirs of the Benin Kingdom slave traders, emphasizing the need for redress and equitable sharing and repatriation; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the following steps be taken in regard to the Benin Bronzes:

(1) That all museums and private collectors who possess slave trade Benin Bronzes enter into discussions and negotiations with the descendants of the enslaved and the heirs of the Benin Kingdom for the sharing and repatriation process, with particular concern paid to the Field Museum and all other stakeholder museums located in the United States;

(2) That a Repatriation Committee shall be established, comprising of representatives from the Restitution Study Group and other relevant advocates on behalf of descendants of the enslaved captives, the heirs of the Benin Kingdom, relevant academia, cultural associations, and international experts, and the Committee shall facilitate negotiations, oversee repatriation of select relics, and ensure equitable sharing and ownership;

(3) That the Repatriation Committee shall work with museums and collectors to create an inventory and comprehensive documentation of the slave trade Benin Bronzes and all other Benin Bronzes, ensuring their accurate identification and classification;

(4) That the Repatriation Committee shall develop a transparent and inclusive decision-making process which includes the voices and perspectives of the descendants of the transatlantic enslaved Benin Kingdom captives and the heirs of the Benin Kingdom, ensuring their equal participation in determining the future of the Benin Bronzes;

(5) That the Repatriation Committee shall develop a framework for sharing the Benin Bronzes, considering factors such as display language in museums and cultural institutions both in the Benin Kingdom and internationally, touring exhibitions, educational programs, and initiatives that promote cultural understanding and healing;

(6) That resale royalties shall be collected from private sale of Benin Bronzes anywhere in the world based on agreements with auction houses or laws passed in legislative bodies, and these royalties shall be paid into a trust shared by descendants of Benin Kingdom captives sold into transatlantic enslavement and Benin Kingdom heirs and used for the management of relics and other matters to be determined by the two groups of heirs;

(7) That adequate resources shall be allocated from museum exhibit, loan, and resale royalty fees to ensure the sustainable preservation and conservation of the Benin Bronzes, safeguarding their historical and cultural value for future generations;

(8) That the Repatriation Committee shall initiate programs and initiatives aimed at bringing the heirs of the enslaved and the heirs of the Benin Kingdom together for healing and reconciliation, with efforts being made to support the economic, educational, and cultural development of the heirs, ensuring they share in the benefits of ownership of the Benin Bronzes through a trust created with exhibit, loan, and resale royalty fees; and

(9) That each group of heirs is expected to participate in the repatriation process, but should either group of heirs refuse to participate in the Repatriation Committee process after being given proper notice, the proceedings shall move forward without their involvement; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge all nations, stakeholder museums, and collectors to support and adhere to this resolution, recognizing the importance of equitable sharing, redress, and healing in the context of the Benin Bronzes; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Congressional Black Caucus, the National Black Caucus of State Legislators, the Illinois African American Family Commission, The African American Genealogy & Cultural Society, the Restitution Study Group, and the American Alliance of Museums.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 213

Offered by Representative Rashid:

WHEREAS, The United Nations General Assembly recommended on November 29, 1947 to partition Palestine into two states against the wishes of Palestine's majority indigenous inhabitants; and

WHEREAS, This partition plan nevertheless provided for the "Full protection for the rights and interests of minorities, including the protection of the linguistic, religious and ethnic rights of the peoples and respect for their cultures, and full equality of all citizens with regard to political, civil and religious matters"; and

WHEREAS, Before the State of Israel declared its independence on May 14, 1948, there were already between 250,000 to 300,000 Palestinian refugees who were expelled or fled from their homes, often after attacks by Zionist militias on major Palestinian cities and villages; and

WHEREAS, By the time the war ended with the signing of armistice agreements between Israel and neighboring Arab countries in 1949 that established Israel's sovereignty over 78% of Palestine and, in the process, conquered an additional 23% of Palestine beyond those areas allocated to the Jewish state under the partition plan, there were at least 750,000 Palestinian refugees, approximately 75% of the indigenous population that had lived in areas that became Israel; and

WHEREAS, By 1949, Israel had depopulated more than 400 Palestinian villages and cities, often demolishing all structures and planting forests or repopulating them with Jewish Israelis; and

WHEREAS, Palestinians refer to this experience of uprooting, dispossession, and refugeedom as the Nakba, meaning "catastrophe" in English; and

WHEREAS, The Nakba refers not only to the historical event but also to an ongoing process of Israel's expropriation of Palestinian land and its dispossession of the Palestinian people that continues to this day through the establishment and expansion of approximately 300 illegal settlements and outposts in the occupied Palestinian West Bank in which approximately 674,000 Israelis reside as of 2020; and

WHEREAS, The United States knew of the scale and magnitude of the Palestine refugee crisis as it unfolded as is documented in an October 1948 telegram to the President and Secretary of State from the United States Embassy in Israel warning that the "Arab Refugee tragedy is rapidly reaching catastrophic proportions and should be treated as a disaster"; and

WHEREAS, The United States voted in favor of United Nations General Assembly Resolution 194 on December 11, 1948, which states that Palestinian "refugees wishing to return to their homes and live at peace with their neighbors should be permitted to do so at the earliest practicable date, and that compensation should be paid for the property of those choosing not to return and for loss of or damage to property which, under principles of international law or in equity, should be made good by the governments or authorities responsible"; and

WHEREAS, Palestinian refugees' right of return is not only stipulated in a General Assembly resolution but is also anchored in international law and in Article 13 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which states "Everyone has the right to leave any country, including his own, and to return to his country"; and

WHEREAS, On December 8, 1949, the United Nations General Assembly adopted Resolution 302 establishing the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East, which the United States has financially supported on an almost continuous basis since its establishment; and

WHEREAS, Of the more than 7,000,000 Palestinian refugees, the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East provides much-needed social services to 5,700,000 Palestine refugees today; and

WHEREAS, International law also recognizes that descendants of refugees retain their rights as refugees, and according to the United Nations, "Palestine refugees are not distinct from other protracted refugee situations such as those from Afghanistan or Somalia, where there are multiple generations of

refugees, considered by UNHCR as refugees and supported as such. Protracted refugee situations are the result of the failure to find political solutions to their underlying political crises"; and

WHEREAS, A just and lasting resolution requires respect for and the implementation of Palestine refugee rights as enshrined in United Nations General Assembly Resolution 194 and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize the Nakba; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we reject efforts to enlist, engage, or otherwise associate the United States Government with denial of the Nakba; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage education and public understanding of the facts of the Nakba, including the United States' role in the humanitarian relief effort and the relevance of the Nakba to modern-day refugee crises; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we support the provision of social service to Palestinian refugees through the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we support the implementation of Palestinian refugees' rights as enshrined in United Nations General Assembly Resolution 194 and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 216

Offered by Representative Morris:

WHEREAS, Nurses are the backbone of the healthcare system, providing essential care, advocacy, and expertise in a variety of settings, including hospitals, clinics, schools, long-term care facilities, and community health organizations; and

WHEREAS, Registered Nurses (RNs) and Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs) in the United States constitute our nation's largest healthcare profession, meeting the different and emerging healthcare needs of the American population, such as serving on the frontline of the pandemic; and

WHEREAS, Professional and licensed practical nursing is an indispensable component of the safety and quality of care of hospitalized and non-hospitalized patients; and

WHEREAS, Certified Nurse Assistants (CNAs) play an essential role in the healthcare team, providing critical support to nurses and direct care to patients, ensuring positive health outcomes and enhancing the quality of care; and

WHEREAS, CNAs assist with daily living activities, monitor patient conditions, and provide compassionate care in hospitals, nursing homes, assisted living facilities, and home health settings; and

WHEREAS, The contributions of nurses and CNAs extend beyond direct patient care to include leadership in healthcare policy, research, education, and innovation; and

WHEREAS, The demand for nursing and CNA services will be greater than ever due to the aging of the U.S. population, emerging health challenges, the continuing expansion of life-sustaining technologies, and the explosive growth of home healthcare services; and

WHEREAS, More qualified RNs, LPNs, and CNAs are needed in the future to meet the increasingly complex needs of healthcare consumers in this State; and

WHEREAS, The cost-effective, safe, and high-quality healthcare services provided by RNs, LPNs, and CNAs will be an increasingly important component of Illinois' healthcare delivery system in the future; and

WHEREAS, Nurses and CNAs serve as advocates for patients, ensuring their voices are heard and their needs are met with dignity and respect; and

WHEREAS, National Nurses Week, observed annually from May 6 to May 12, recognizes and celebrates the dedication and invaluable service of nurses, coinciding with the birthday of Florence Nightingale, the founder of modern nursing; and

WHEREAS, National CNA Week, observed annually from June 12 to June 18, recognizes the dedication and commitment of CNAs, whose contributions are critical to patient care and the healthcare system; and

WHEREAS, It is fitting and appropriate that the General Assembly acknowledge the significant impact of nurses and CNAs and express gratitude for their service to the people of this State; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May 6 through May 12, 2025 as Nurses Week and June 12 through June 18, 2025 as CNA Week in the State of Illinois in recognition of the contributions of nurses and Certified Nurse Assistants (CNAs); and be it further

RESOLVED, That we recognize the need to invest in the nursing and CNA workforce through policies that address staffing shortages, provide mental health support, and improve working conditions for healthcare workers; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage all residents, businesses, and healthcare organizations to show appreciation for nurses and CNAs and support efforts to enhance the nursing profession and CNA workforce, including workforce development, education, and workplace well-being; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage the residents of Illinois to celebrate the accomplishments and efforts of nurses and CNAs to improve our healthcare system and show our appreciation not only during these weeks but also at every opportunity throughout the year; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to nursing and CNA organizations, healthcare institutions, and educational institutions as a symbol of our appreciation and recognition of their vital contributions to healthcare and society.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 24

Offered by Representative Ness:

WHEREAS, The Illinois Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) partners with community-based organizations to provide foster care services for nearly 70% of the youth in care, over 13,000 children, in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, To contract with the State to provide these vital services, foster care providers are required to maintain adequate liability insurance, but foster care agencies are struggling to get quality and effective liability insurance coverage and are unable to continue providing these vital services to the youth and families under their care; and

WHEREAS, The remaining two major insurance carriers have publicly announced that they will not be writing any new policies in 2025 and will be renewing existing policies on a case-by-case basis with many providers renewing at exorbitant increases to premiums and significant reductions in coverage; and

WHEREAS, Without a viable alternative for liability insurance, foster care agencies are preparing to transfer hundreds of foster youth to DCFS; and

WHEREAS, Under normal circumstances, DCFS is able to transition services to another agency when a foster care provider discontinues providing services; and

WHEREAS, Without certainty that insurance coverage will be renewed, DCFS will be unable to transition services to another agency unable to absorb foster youth and/or families from other agencies without significantly jeopardizing their own coverage; and

WHEREAS, Foster care agencies will be forced to scale back or discontinue foster care services entirely due to inaccessible liability insurance coverage as there are currently no State plans for transition services for the thousands of already trauma-exposed children in the system; and

WHEREAS, The foster care system will experience disruptions that will result in the transfer of foster youth to the direct supervision of DCFS, increased lengths of stay for foster youth, loss of foster families, and additional budgetary constraints on DCFS and any remaining foster care agencies; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that the Child Welfare Agency Liability Task Force is created to develop and recommend a permanent solution to address the unavailability of liability insurance for child welfare agencies in the State; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall consist of the following members, who shall serve without compensation:

- (1) The Director of Department of Insurance or his or her designee, who shall serve as chair;
- (2) One member of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- (3) One member of the House of Representatives appointed by the Minority Leader of the House;
- (4) One member of the Senate appointed by the Senate President;
- (5) One member of the Senate appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate;

(6) The Director of the Department of Children and Family Services or his or her designee;
 (7) One representative from the insurance industry with expertise in liability coverage appointed by the Governor;

(8) One representative from a statewide organization that advocates on behalf of Illinois attorneys appointed by the Governor; and

(9) One representative from a statewide organization that advocates on behalf of the community-based services for children and families appointed by the Governor; and be it further

RESOLVED, That initial appointments to the Task Force shall be made no more than three months after adoption of this resolution; and be it further

RESOLVED, That if a vacancy occurs in the Task Force membership, it shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Insurance and the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services shall provide administrative support for the Task Force; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall hold its first meeting within 30 days after all Task Force members have been appointed and then on a monthly basis thereafter; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall submit its final report to the General Assembly no later than December 31, 2026, and upon filing of the report, the Task Force is dissolved; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Speaker of the House, the Minority Leader of the House, the Senate President, the Minority Leader of the Senate, the Director of Department of Insurance, the Director of Children and Family Services, and the Governor.
