HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 273

Offered by Representative Ford:

WHEREAS, Melanoma is the most lethal form of skin cancer, accounting for nearly 75% of skin cancer deaths despite representing a smaller portion of total skin cancer cases; and

WHEREAS, In 2025, approximately 104,960 new cases of melanoma are expected to be diagnosed in the United States, with an estimated 8,430 deaths; and

WHEREAS, Melanoma can spread rapidly and metastasize to distant parts of the body, drastically reducing survival rates when not detected early; and

WHEREAS, Early detection is crucial; when melanoma is caught in its earliest stages, the five-year survival rate is approximately 99%, but that rate drops significantly once the cancer has spread; and

WHEREAS, While excessive ultraviolet (UV) radiation exposure is a major risk factor, genetic predispositions also contribute substantially to melanoma risk, with approximately 10% of all cases being hereditary; and

WHEREAS, The Melanoma Research Foundation urges both the public and healthcare providers to prioritize prevention and regular screening to detect melanoma early; and

WHEREAS, Preventative actions can dramatically reduce the risk of developing melanoma and improve outcomes; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we encourage all residents to follow the prevention guidance provided by the Melanoma Research Foundation, which includes:

(1) Seek shade when possible, particularly between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. when UV rays are strongest; checking the daily UV index can help inform decisions about outdoor activities;

(2) Cover up and use broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher and wear sun-protective clothing year-round; apply sunscreen 15 minutes before sun exposure and reapply every two hours or after swimming or sweating; be aware that 80% of UV rays can penetrate clouds, and water, sand, and snow reflect and intensify exposure;

(3) Avoid tanning and sunburns entirely; there is no such thing as a safe tan; one indoor tanning session increases the risk of developing melanoma by 75%; skin damage is cumulative and significantly increases long-term cancer risk; and

(4) Perform monthly self-skin exams; individuals are most likely to be the first to notice suspicious changes; regularly inspect skin and moles using the ABCDEs of melanoma, asymmetry, border irregularity, color variation, diameter over 6mm, and evolving shape or color; photograph moles or use mole-mapping apps to track changes and use mirrors to examine hard-to-see areas; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge Illinois healthcare providers to promote early skin checks and educate patients on both UV safety and genetic risk factors for melanoma; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we support increased funding for melanoma education, outreach, and screening programs throughout the State; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Melanoma Research Foundation and be made available to the public as part of an awareness campaign during National Skin Cancer Awareness Month in May.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 277

Offered by Representative Faver Dias:

WHEREAS, Neonatal Nurses Week, also known as Neonatal Intensive Care Unit Nurses Week, is an annual celebration of the hard work and dedication of the nurses who take care of babies in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU); and

WHEREAS, The NICU is a unit in a hospital that provides around-the-clock special care to sick or preterm babies from health care providers who have special training and equipment to give babies the best possible care; and

WHEREAS, Common health conditions treated in the NICU include birth defects, breathing problems, feeding issues, gastroschisis, infections, jaundice, problems maintaining a normal body temperature, problems maintaining normal sugar levels, retinopathy of Prematurity (ROP), and surgical conditions; and

WHEREAS, Every baby in a NICU is cared for by many different health care professionals, including registered nurses, nurse managers, neonatal nurse practitioners, clinical nurse specialists, developmental care specialists, and charge nurses; and

WHEREAS, Neonatal nurses perform life-saving and life-changing work each day to help ensure children can lead healthy and successful lives; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare September 13-19, 2025 as Neonatal Nurses Week in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage the celebration of neonatal nurses for the skill, professionalism, and care they provide to newborn babies.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 279

Offered by Representative Hernandez, Norma:

WHEREAS, A Quinceañera is a cherished milestone in Latin American culture, eagerly anticipated by young women and their families as they celebrate the young woman's fifteenth birthday; and

WHEREAS, Quinceañera derives from the Spanish word "quince", meaning 15, and focuses on the importance of religion, family, music, food, and dance to celebrate an important milestone in a young woman's life; and

WHEREAS, A Quinceañera celebration blends Spanish culture with indigenous traditions, incorporating influences from both the Aztec and Mayan civilizations; and

WHEREAS, Indigenous tribes traditionally taught young women who turned 15 the skills needed for taking on their roles in society, considering them ready for adulthood at that age; and

WHEREAS, When the Spaniards colonized Mexico, they adapted many of these local customs into their own culture and beliefs, introducing the tradition of Catholic mass to the Quinceañera; and

WHEREAS, With historic indigenous roots in modern-day Mexico, a Quinceañera is primarily celebrated among many Latin American countries and is considered a popular tradition among Latine communities in the United States; and

WHEREAS, The focal point of a Quinceañera celebration is the young woman wearing a lavish ball gown adorned with layers of tulle, intricate beading, and elegant lace, which can take upwards of three to seven months to make; and

WHEREAS, A Quinceañera celebration traditionally begins with a religious ceremony that has family members and godparents in attendance, and it is followed by a reception with family and friends; and

WHEREAS, The reception celebration features various symbolic traditions, including the gifting of the last doll, symbolizing the end of childhood, the changing of the shoes, where the father or a close family member replaces the young woman's flats with heels, a coronation, where the young woman is given a crown, a father-daughter waltz, and a waltz of honor from the chambelan de honor, known as the escort of honor, and her court of damas and chambelanes, or the court of honor, consisting of girls and boys chosen to be a part of the Quinceañera; and

WHEREAS, A unique father-daughter waltz, known as Baile de Papa, marks the beginning of a Quinceañera reception, symbolizing the father's role in guiding the young girl as she transitions into adulthood; and

WHEREAS, The waltz of honor, known as Vals de Honor, is when the young woman, her escort of honor, and the court of damas and chambelanes showcase a choreographed dance to symbolize the fifteen years of the young woman's life, anticipated by esteemed family and guests; and

WHEREAS, A Quinceañera provides new generations with the ability to recall their cultural heritage, preserve traditions, and strengthen the bonds between family and community; and

WHEREAS, Quinceañeras have evolved while honoring tradition, and as the 15th year of Latino Unity Day is celebrated, it is important to realize the power of lifting up Latine voices, amplifying Latine stories, and advocating for equity in Latine communities while continuing ongoing efforts to ensure that the next generation of Latine leaders is empowered towards shaping a more just and inclusive future; and

WHEREAS, A Quinceañera is a beloved celebration among Spanish-speaking communities across the globe, and it emphasizes the importance of the Latine family and the historical traditions of their indigenous ancestors; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May 8, 2025 as Quinceañera Day in the State of Illinois.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 283

Offered by Representative Meier:

WHEREAS, The members of the Illinois House of Representatives mourn the passing of Caleb Thomas Elliott, a constituent of the 109th House District, and would like to spread awareness of his tragic and preventable incident; and

WHEREAS, Caleb Elliott, the son of Doug and Dawn Elliott, tragically passed away on August 11, 2017 at the young age of 19 years; his family wishes for this tragedy to bring to light the dangers of unsafe electrical wiring; and

WHEREAS, Caleb Elliot was electrocuted to death while working at a house in Troy; despite an inspection, the building was not wired to code; simple mistakes like this can have devastating consequences on communities and families; and

WHEREAS, Caleb Elliot is survived by his two sisters, Lauren Schmidt and Rachaelle Elliott; his three brothers, Christian, Brannon, and Jadon Elliot; and his parents, Doug and Dawn Elliot, who wish to spread awareness about his case to prevent it from happening again; and

WHEREAS, In the State of Illinois, electricians are certified on the local and county level with each jurisdiction passing its own rules or codes with which each electrician must abide; and

WHEREAS, Illinois does not offer a statewide standardized electrician license; and

WHEREAS, Practicing electricians and those who hire electricians must practice their profession with the utmost caution and safety; and

WHEREAS, Multimeter tools are a readily available way to test wiring work for safety; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we mourn the passing of Caleb Thomas Elliott on August 11, 2017 and extend our sincere condolences to his family, friends, and all who knew and loved him; and be it further

RESOLVED, That to honor Caleb Elliot and to spread awareness of electrocution from faulty wiring and prevent this type of tragedy in the future, we declare August 11, 2025 as Caleb's Legacy: Electrical Awareness for a Safer Tomorrow Day in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge local units of government to require electricians and electrician trainees in the State of Illinois to be properly trained on and equipped with a certified multimeter tool sold by a licensed retailer that regularly sells such devices and to require use of the same; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge a donation program be created to promote awareness for this cause; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the family of Caleb Elliott as an expression of our deepest sympathy.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 284

Offered by Representative Gill:

WHEREAS, Parkinson's disease is a chronic, progressive, neurological disease and is the second most common neurodegenerative disease in the United States; and

WHEREAS, Parkinson's disease is estimated to affect approximately one million people in the United States, and the prevalence will rise to 1.2 million by 2030; and

WHEREAS, Each year, 90,000 people in the United States are newly diagnosed with Parkinson's disease; and

WHEREAS, Parkinson's disease is the 14th leading cause of death in the United States according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; and

WHEREAS, The economic burden of Parkinson's disease is estimated to be at least \$52 billion annually, including direct and indirect costs, which include treatment, social security payments, and lost income to patients and family members; and

WHEREAS, Research suggests the cause of Parkinson's disease is a combination of genetic and environmental factors, but the exact cause and progression of the disease is still unknown; and

WHEREAS, There is no objective test or biomarker for Parkinson's disease, and there is no cure or drug to slow or halt the progression of the disease; and

WHEREAS, The symptoms of Parkinson's disease vary from person to person and can include tremors, slowness of movement and rigidity, difficulty with balance, swallowing, chewing, and speaking, cognitive impairment and dementia, mood disorders, and a variety of other non-motor symptoms; and

WHEREAS, Volunteers, researchers, caregivers, and medical professionals are working to improve the quality of life of persons living with Parkinson's disease and their families; and

WHEREAS, Increased research, education, and community support services, such as those provided by the Parkinson's Foundation and other organizations, are needed to find more effective treatments and to provide access to quality care to those living with the disease today; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare April of 2025 as Parkinson's Awareness Month in the State of Illinois.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 30

Offered by Representative Niemerg:

WHEREAS, It is highly fitting that the Illinois General Assembly pays honor and respect to veterans who have served their country and the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Jackie Wayne "Jack" Steinman, the son of Joseph Henry and Rosa Ellen (Rich) Steinman, was born in Hardinville on December 8, 1949; he graduated from Newton Community High School in 1968; he married Sandy Staley on August 24, 1978; and

WHEREAS, Jack Steinman served in the U.S. Army during the Vietnam War; he began his military service on May 29, 1968, and he was honorably discharged on March 15, 1971; and

WHEREAS, Jack Steinman worked as a custodian and bus driver at Willow Hill Elementary School in the Jasper County Community Unit School District No. 1, retiring after 20 years of service; and

WHEREAS, Jack Steinman was a member of the Potter's House Ministry and a life member of VFW Post #1769 in Effingham; he enjoyed dancing, mushroom hunting, grilling, and spending time with his family and friends; and

WHEREAS, Jack Steinman of Willow Hill passed away on July 18, 2023; and

WHEREAS, Jack Steinman was preceded in death by his parents; his son, David Childress; and his brothers, Randy Steinman and Dannie Steinman; and

WHEREAS, At the time of his passing, Jack Steinman was survived by his wife of 44 years, Sandy Steinman; his children, Sandra "Sam" (Mike) Hires, Jackie (Jeremy) Smock, and Peggy (Ben) Stodden; his brothers, Dick (Carol) Steinman and Sam (Brenda) Steinman; his mother-in-law, Leda Short; 16 grandchildren; and 11 great-grandchildren; therefore, be it
