Offered by Representative Gordon-Booth:

WHEREAS, Communities that prioritize school safety, work collaboratively to reduce gun violence in educational settings, and provide tangible resources to guarantee access to affordable education enable our youth to realize their full potential; and

WHEREAS, A lack of job opportunity after graduation is a community responsibility affecting both the current and future quality of life of a community; and

WHEREAS, The programs of Jack and Jill of America, Inc, which was founded on January 24th, 1938, are centered around imparting and educating its youth members with principles and skills around leadership development, awareness and elevation of cultural heritage, and commitment to and involvement in meaningful and consistent community service; and

WHEREAS, Jack and Jill of America, Inc, has established multifaceted initiatives and programs, including STE[A]M, focusing on science, technology, engineering, art, and mathematics, the Healthy Living Initiative, centered on lifestyle improvements and healthy development, and various other projects with national and local partners; and

WHEREAS, This year's Jack and Jill on Springfield's Hill, initiated by St. Clair County's Julian Anderson, is the inaugural, annual hands-on advocacy programming seminar event to be held at the Springfield State Capitol building; and

WHEREAS, Jack and Jill on Springfield's Hill is dedicated to fostering leadership development and providing a platform for local political education and advocacy training concerning issues affecting teens in Illinois and across the nation; and

WHEREAS, By gathering at the Springfield Capitol building each year, participants of Jack and Jill on Springfield's Hill will not only learn firsthand about the legislative process but will also participate in hands-on workshops, policy discussions, and networking opportunities with state officials and community leaders; and

WHEREAS, In this way, Jack and Jill on Springfield's Hill will nurture an enduring spirit of civic responsibility and empower the youth of Jack and Jill, Inc. and beyond to play an active and informed role in shaping the future of their state and nation; and

WHEREAS, Jack and Jill on Springfield's Hill Day, taking place on October 14, 2025, will serve as a catalyst for cultivating political engagement among young people, equipping them with the knowledge, confidence, and the practical skills necessary to advocate for meaningful change within their communities; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare October 14, 2025 as Jack and Jill on Springfield's Hill Day in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we support and promote the development of the Jack and Jill of America, Inc. teen legislative day of advocacy.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 498

Offered by Representative McCombie:

WHEREAS, Hailing from Savanna, Illinois, Major Cameron Jones of the United States Air Force submitted his name as one of over 8,000 applicants for the available slots opened by the United States National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) in 2025; and

WHEREAS, From this significant pool of talented, forward-looking Americans, only ten men and women were selected; and

WHEREAS, Major Jones was one of the ten people selected from this pool of over 8,000 applicants; and

WHEREAS, Illinois-trained as well as native-born, Major Jones earned bachelor's and master's degrees in aerospace engineering from the Granger College of Engineering at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign (UIUC); and

WHEREAS, As a member of the U.S. Air Force, Major Jones compiled more than 1,600 flight hours, including 150 hours classified as combat hours, in more than 30 types of aircraft headed by the F-22 Raptor, and he was promoted to the rank of Major; and

WHEREAS, Major Jones was selected to attend the U.S. Air Force Test Pilot School at Edwards Air Force Base (Edwards AFB) in California, and he experienced further training and leadership at the U.S. Air Force Weapons School at Nellis Air Force Base (Nellis AFB) in Nevada; and

WHEREAS, Major Jones' selection as one of the ten astronaut candidates of NASA's Class of September 2025 was announced on Monday, September 22 at the Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas; and

WHEREAS, As a U.S. Air Force test pilot, Major Jones will follow a well-trodden path into the United States space program; legendary American astronauts, including John Glenn, Neil Armstrong, and Illinois' Jim Lovell, were U.S. Navy and U.S. Air Force test pilots before moving into America's final frontier; and

WHEREAS, As an astronaut candidate selected in NASA's Class of 2025, Major Jones will start what will be nearly two years of additional training before flight eligibility begins, with the astronaut candidates studying robotics, land and water survival, geology, space medicine, high-performance aircraft training, and simulated space-experience training; and

WHEREAS, Major Jones has become one of roughly 370 people who have been selected as NASA astronaut candidates over the life of the program, which officially began in October 1958; and

WHEREAS, Major Jones is the second NASA astronaut candidate to be chosen from Savanna, Illinois, with the first selectee being Dale Gardner, chosen in January 1978 and then named to serve on the Space Shuttle flights STS-8 in 1983 and STS-51-A in 1984; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we extend warm congratulations to Major Cameron Jones of the United States Air Force on his selection as a 2025 astronaut candidate by the U.S. National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA); and be it further

RESOLVED, That we support Major Jones as he undergoes the further grueling training necessary as the future flight crews are selected by NASA for future American missions into space; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we look forward to seeing the name of Illinois' Major Jones on the news wires of the world as he flies above it; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to Major Jones of the United States Air Force and NASA as a symbol of our esteem and respect.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 504

Offered by Representative Avelar:

WHEREAS, Due process is what separates lawful detention from kidnapping; and

WHEREAS, The United States Constitution is unequivocal in that no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property without due process of law; and

WHEREAS, Donald Trump's so-called Operation Midway Blitz has been a systematic and pervasive assault on this bedrock principle of our American justice system; and

WHEREAS, Trust is the foundation of safety; at a time when people desperately want to trust their local police, masked agents are marching through Illinois streets and disrupting communities absent of any identification, such as a uniform, badge number, or official identification card to verify their identity; and

WHEREAS, Donald Trump's agents have admittedly detained people "based on their physical appearance", effectively establishing a race-based "stop and frisk" policy; and

WHEREAS, Because of Donald Trump and his agents, minors have been ripped from their homes and separated from their parents, including a raid where children were restrained in zip ties; and

WHEREAS, Donald Trump's agents handcuffed and detained Alderperson Jesse Fuentes simply for asking whether the agents had a signed judicial warrant to detain a patient being treated in an Illinois hospital; and

WHEREAS, Donald Trump's federal agents battered down doors, aggressively interrogated residents of all backgrounds, and caused serious damage to people's private dwellings at an apartment complex in South Shore; and

WHEREAS, Donald Trump's federal agents erected a fence blocking a public street in Broadview, making no effort to go through the village's proper permitting process and with no concern for how their blockade obstructed fire fighters, local police, and emergency medical responders; and

WHEREAS, Donald Trump's federal agents have spread fear and violence, initiating stops that have resulted in people being shot and killed; and

WHEREAS, At practically every step, courts have tried to hold the Trump Administration accountable to the rule of law, only to have the administration delay, ignore court orders, and continue to disregard the people's right to due process; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we reaffirm the right to due process as the bedrock of a fair judicial system; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we condemn racial profiling and the violent tactics that are eroding trust in all of law enforcement; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we condemn the lawless actions of the Trump Administration that have defied local and constitutional laws and denied people of all types of immigration status their rights to due process.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 505

Offered by Representative Harper:

WHEREAS, Illinoisans view the rights to free speech, free expression, free assembly, and a free and independent press as building blocks of a healthy democracy and are committed to preserving these rights against unwarranted encroachment; and

WHEREAS, Despite claiming to be a champion for the First Amendment, President Donald Trump has shown complete and constant disregard for these rights in favor of prioritizing political expediency, power grabs, preservation of his fragile ego, and revenge for even the smallest imagined slight; and

WHEREAS, The Trump Administration appointee and Federal Communications Commission Chair Brendan Carr has already publicly expressed a willingness to "do this the hard way" if late-night comedian Jimmy Kimmel was not immediately silenced, per Donald Trump's wishes; and

WHEREAS, Late-night comedian Stephen Colbert, a critic of Donald Trump, had his long-running satirical program cancelled following pressure from Donald Trump and the FCC on the parent company of CBS, Paramount; and

WHEREAS, President Trump has also encouraged unwarranted crackdowns on peaceful protests when those protests express views contrary to his own or the special interests from whom he hopes to win favor; and

WHEREAS, During all three of his presidential campaigns, President Trump has publicly and repeatedly goaded his supporters to threaten, intimidate, and attack counter-protesters at his rallies and to use violence as a response to criticism; and

WHEREAS, During the 2020 Black Lives Matter protests in Portland, Oregon, at President Trump's urging, federal agents targeted non-violent protestors and specifically journalists with rubber bullets, pepper spray, flash-bang grenades, and mass arrests; and

WHEREAS, Donald Trump has similarly decried peaceful protests against Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) actions as chaotic, violent, and unlawful without any basis in reality; and

WHEREAS, Donald Trump has repeatedly revoked credentials from members of the White House Press Corps who voice viewpoints contrary to those of his administration, ask questions he does not want to answer, or act beyond the remit of his personal propaganda arm; and

WHEREAS, Affected outlets include the Associated Press, Bloomberg News, Reuters, Huffington Post, New York Times, Politico, and NPR, all of which were pushed aside in favor of near-hagiographic coverage from conservative outlets, such as Breitbart and One America News Network; and

WHEREAS, Freedom of the press has been further curtailed following extensive restrictions on membership of the Pentagon Press Association as well as a memo circulated to journalists requiring the Department of Defense approval on reporting prior to public release even in cases that do not involve classified materials; and

WHEREAS, Reporters attempting to cover important stories have faced much greater pushback from law enforcement coming on the heels of violent anti-journalism rhetoric from Donald Trump; and

WHEREAS, As recently as October 10, 2025, WGN Producer Debbie Brockman was forced to the ground and handcuffed to prevent her from covering protests against ICE enforcement operations; and

WHEREAS, These examples represent only a fragment of Donald Trump's pattern of corrupting the First Amendment, his attempts to manipulate and control all information Americans receive, and his disregard for the American people's ability to express themselves without fear of retribution; and

WHEREAS, The United States House of Representatives approved a Trump Administration plan to rescind \$1.1 billion, for the first time in 60 years, to the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, which consists of organizations such as National Public Radio and Public Broadcasting Service, causing CPB to begin closing their operations; and

WHEREAS, In smaller communities in particular, the Associated Press or a local NPR affiliate is one of the primary resources for national news, state news, and emergency notifications; and

WHEREAS, Undermining free speech and the free press undermines democracy; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we affirm our support for the freedom of the press and the freedom of speech as outlined in the First Amendment to the United States Constitution; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we recognize the Trump Administration's efforts to exert editorial control over media companies by using the official powers of the government to punish dissent and reward acquiescence as textbook corruption; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we condemn President Trump's efforts to restrict the right to free speech as attacks on democracy itself.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 506

Offered by Representative Buckner:

WHEREAS, It is important to build a comprehensive public transit system that works for everyone, supports local businesses, creates good-paying jobs, nurtures tourism, fosters equity for underserved communities, and stimulates the statewide economy for the benefit of all Illinoisans; and

WHEREAS, In an unwarranted attack on these goals, the Trump Administration is freezing \$2.1 billion in congressionally approved federal funding that would pay for vital and long-sought-after extensions to the far south end of the Red Line of Chicago's train system and miscellaneous improvements to its Purple Line so it may substantially expand its ridership; and

WHEREAS, This new public transit availability would bring greater freedom of movement to an estimated 175,000 daily riders, including people from underserved communities who face transportation deserts that pose unfair roadblocks to low-cost commutes as well as people living in the south Chicago suburbs who have limited access to Chicago public transit, and would so stimulate the Illinois economy; and

WHEREAS, Construction of the new train stops would create numerous new good-paying job opportunities for local workers and so stimulate the Illinois economy; and

WHEREAS, Local businesses that manage these construction projects would thrive and further stimulate the Illinois economy; and

WHEREAS, President Biden unequivocally signed off on this funding, and the Chicago Transit Authority later secured a legal obligation from the federal government that the money would be released; and

WHEREAS, President Trump is portraying this indefensible act as an attack on diversity, equity, and inclusion, despite the fact that extending the Red Line train will benefit all Illinoisans regardless of race, age, ideological affiliation, or economic background; and

WHEREAS, President Trump's motivation is his vendetta against his political opponents, as this is just a part of the \$28 billion Donald Trump is defunding for similar projects across the country, all from Democratically-controlled cities and states; and

WHEREAS, Reneging on promised grants with no warning fosters fiscal uncertainty and will threaten the long-term economic stability of every state in this country; and

WHEREAS, Maintaining this funding freeze would cause millions of Illinoisans to be deprived of a future that is more equitable and more financially robust; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we call on President Trump to unfreeze all promised funding for a Red Line train extension on Chicago's South Side; and be it further

RESOLVED, That failing to release the promised funding, we condemn President Trump's actions as motivated by spite, counter to the cause of a fairer and more economically strong Illinois, and in direct opposition to his purported goal of "making America great"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we will always support transit for historically underserved communities and the rights of diverse contractors.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 507

Offered by Representative Briel:

WHEREAS, Robert F. Kennedy Jr. has repeatedly promoted false, disproven claims linking childhood vaccines and common medications to autism; and

WHEREAS, These reckless statements directly contradict decades of peer-reviewed research and scientific consensus showing no connection between vaccines or Tylenol and autism or autism spectrum disorder; and

WHEREAS, Secretary Kennedy's rhetoric undermines public trust in science, dismisses the expertise of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the National Institute of Health (NIH), and spreads misinformation that has fueled a resurgence of preventable diseases like measles; and

WHEREAS, Secretary Kennedy has advised pregnant women and parents to withhold safe medications such as Tylenol, endangering maternal and fetal health by increasing the risk of miscarriage, preterm birth, and complications from untreated fever; and

WHEREAS, Secretary Kennedy's public comments describing children with autism as those who "will never pay taxes, never hold a job, never play baseball, never write a poem, never go out on a date, and may never use a toilet unassisted" are deeply cruel and dehumanizing and disregard the lived experiences of millions of neurodiverse individuals and their families; and

WHEREAS, Autism is not a disease to be cured but a complex neurodevelopmental condition influenced by genetics and environmental factors, not vaccines or medications, as confirmed by decades of scientific research; and

WHEREAS, Secretary Kennedy's embrace of divisive and anti-scientific rhetoric mirrors the dangerous misinformation that flourished under the Trump Administration during the COVID-19 pandemic, misinformation that politicized science, eroded public trust, and contributed to more than 39,000 deaths in Illinois alone; and

WHEREAS, Both President Trump and Secretary Kennedy's deliberate weaponization of public health for political gain replaces fact with fear, exploits vulnerable families, and ultimately jeopardizes the health and safety of American children, families, and communities nationwide; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we condemn the dangerous, false, and demeaning statements of Robert F. Kennedy Jr. and reaffirm Illinois' commitment to defending science, truth, and respect for all individuals with developmental differences; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge Robert F. Kennedy Jr. to immediately resign as Secretary of Health and Human Services; and be it further

RESOLVED, That if Secretary Kennedy fails to resign, we urge President Trump to immediately remove him as Secretary of Health and Human Services.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 508

Offered by Representative Hernandez, Elizabeth:

WHEREAS, Unacceptable acts of violence have scarred our democratic process; and

WHEREAS, This violence has touched a campus political rally in Utah, the quiet suburban streets of Minnesota, a synagogue in Pittsburgh, the oldest Black church in Charleston, South Carolina, a Wal-Mart in El Paso, Texas, and so many communities in between; and

WHEREAS, The toxic combination of violent political rhetoric and racial hatred led to an appalling crime here in Illinois, when a 73-year-old man brutally murdered 6-year-old Wadee Alfayoumi and attempted to murder the boy's mother after racially profiling the Muslim family and falsely linking them to international events in which they had no involvement; and

WHEREAS, While stated and speculated motivations of perpetrators vary, some radicalized on the darkest corners of the internet, some driven by hateful racist ideology, and some lost in the apocalyptic rhetoric that pervades our political discourse, their common goal is to inflict violence on someone they view as different and to instill fear; and

WHEREAS, Even as people from all sides of the ideological spectrum stand united in condemning these violent acts, we cannot truly condemn politically motivated violence while condoning the politically motivated violence Donald Trump is inflicting on people across Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Donald Trump's agents are profiling people simply because of how they look and deploying chemical munitions in communities where people just want to live in peace; acting on Trump's orders, they are inflicting violence on people they view as different and are instilling fear; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize that politically motivated violence, whether in the form of a mass shooting or a mass deployment of masked troops empowered to instill fear, is a threat to our democracy; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we condemn politically motivated violence in all of its forms, whether caused by individuals radicalized by extreme rhetoric or by extremists who use political violence to advance their own agendas.
