Offered by Representative Ford:

WHEREAS, Our state democracy, with policies and laws that come from the will of the people of Illinois, is under threat from a presidential administration that disregards the voice of the people and steps on our rights daily; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois and its citizens cherish the fundamental liberties guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution and the Illinois Constitution, including due process, equal protection, and freedom from unlawful government intrusion; and

WHEREAS, In these last ten months of constant attacks by a presidential administration that disregards our rights, our freedoms, and our democracy in Illinois, the most effective way to safeguard our freedoms has often been in court, appealing to the judiciary; and

WHEREAS, The Office of the Illinois Attorney General, led by Attorney General Kwame Raoul, along with his tireless staff, has demonstrated extraordinary devotion, leadership, and perseverance in the courts to protect our democracy, freedoms, and civil liberties when threatened by federal attacks; and

WHEREAS, The Office of the Illinois Attorney General has taken bold legal steps to defend the interests of Illinois and its residents and has served as one of the most effective tactical instruments of the State of Illinois in securing protection of our rights; and

WHEREAS, Among those critical court-based actions is the lawsuit filed by the Office of the Illinois Attorney General, *Illinois v. Trump*, in which the State challenged the Trump administration's attempted deployment and federalization of the National Guard in Illinois without proper justification, a challenge of far-reaching and historic significance to blocking the forced invasion of our land by federal agents and preserving state sovereignty; and

WHEREAS, The Office of the Illinois Attorney General has pursued or joined litigation to protect Illinoisans from unlawful conditions on federal funding, to defend immigration-related safeguards, to preserve state and local authority, and, in dozens of other cases, to uphold the rule of law, not the whims of the current presidential administration; and

WHEREAS, It is fitting and proper that the Illinois House of Representatives publicly acknowledges and commends these efforts, as they have benefited all the people of Illinois and strengthened the bonds of trust between our citizens and their public institutions; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize and express our gratitude to the Office of the Illinois Attorney General and Attorney General Kwame Raoul for their exceptional devotion, leadership, and perseverance in defending our democracy and our freedoms through the courts; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we acknowledge that the most effective instrument for the protection of our democracy and our civil liberties in the last nine months has been litigation, and that the Attorney General and his team have been incredibly effective in their defense of our democracy; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we recognize the Office of the Illinois Attorney General's filing of a lawsuit against the Trump administration to stop the unlawful deployment of the National Guard in Illinois, challenging federal invocation of 10 U.S.C. § 12406, the Posse Comitatus Act, and the Tenth Amendment, is a case of national significance in protecting state sovereignty and civil liberties; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage the Office of the Illinois Attorney General to continue steadfastly engaging in litigation as necessary to uphold our democracy and our freedoms; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to Attorney General Kwame Raoul and the Office of the Illinois Attorney General.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 538

Offered by Representative Davidsmeyer:

WHEREAS, Scott Humbard was born on May 19, 1970 and earned an associate's degree from Elgin Community College in 1990; and

WHEREAS, Moving to Charleston, Scott Humbard graduated from Eastern Illinois University (EIU) with a bachelor's degree in 1992, remaining with EIU to complete his work for a master's degree in 1993; both of his degrees were in political science and government; and

WHEREAS, These chosen majors helped Scott Humbard gain entry into the Illinois General Assembly legislative staff system through the Illinois Legislative Staff Internship Program (ILSIP), working with the Illinois House Republican staff starting in fall 1994; and

WHEREAS, From the start of his work for the Illinois House, Scott Humbard concentrated on issues centering on energy and the environment; this work reached a peak in the two-year Joint Committee on Electric Restructuring process to negotiate the Illinois electric deregulation bill; and

WHEREAS, The electric deregulation bill negotiated through the Joint Committee process was enacted in the spring of 1998 as P.A. 90-561, and as a key staff participant in these negotiations, Scott Humbard made valuable contacts to help perfect his knowledge and understanding of the legislative process; and

WHEREAS, After the 1998 veto session, Scott Humbard moved to advocacy work for the Chemical Industry Council of Illinois, representing over 150 chemical manufacturers and suppliers, and in this position, he helped secure passage of legislation to reform and modernize the Illinois brownfield remediation program, thereby improving the resale values and safety profiles of manufacturing-affected parcels of Illinois real estate; and

WHEREAS, Until the 1990s, the organizational structure that governed U.S. electricity was the principle of vertical integration, where a single firm held closely regulated, one-company control over the generation and supply of electricity; and

WHEREAS, Scott Humbard's work in 1998 with Illinois electric deregulation presented him with evidence that this paradigm was nearing the end of its useful life; and

WHEREAS, In September 2001, utilizing this insight, Scott Humbard moved from the Chemical Industry Council to Exelon Generation, with a focus on representing this growing electrical utility firm in its state and local government affairs; and

WHEREAS, In the 2010s, the laws governing the regulated rates that Exelon could obtain for the electricity generated by some of its nuclear power generating plants, particularly its Clinton and Quad Cities reactors, made it infeasible for the company to seek these plants' re-licensure and long-term operation; and

WHEREAS, Especially in the years 2014 through 2016, Scott Humbard had the challenging task of presenting these realities to leaders throughout Illinois, especially in the Illinois General Assembly, to convince them to take the difficult step of adjusting Illinois' allowable nuclear power plant rates of return; and

WHEREAS, Scott Humbard worked with the Illinois General Assembly to enact the Future Energy Jobs Act in 2016, which, among other items, preserved nuclear energy generation in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, In 2021, this act was followed by the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act, which expanded the process of bringing the distributed-source-generation of solar power and wind power into full participation in the future Illinois supply grid; and

WHEREAS, As the U.S. electric utility industry continued to evolve into a new paradigm, Exelon spun off its generating arm in February 2022 as a new firm, Constellation Energy; and

WHEREAS, Serving Constellation Energy as its Vice President of State Government Affairs, Scott Humbard directed his firm's state legislative and regulatory initiatives and its operation of clean, carbon-free energy generating plants in 17 U.S. states; and

WHEREAS, In his work with Exelon and with Constellation Energy, Scott Humbard served as board chairman of the Illinois Energy Association and as chairman of the Illinois Competitive Energy Association; and

WHEREAS, Although the holder of several chairmanships, Scott Humbard could not hold a candle, let alone a nuclear reactor, to the true Chairman of the Board, Frank Sinatra; and

WHEREAS, As his challenging professional life continued, Scott Humbard became more and more aware of a certain beautiful lake in western Kentucky, which is filled with crappie fish; and

WHEREAS, Scott Humbard found that one does not have to go to the Canadian border to find a thousand islands; and

WHEREAS, Before he casts his line into the waters of our friendly neighbor state, the University of Illinois Springfield named Scott Humbard to its Illinois Legislative Staff Internship Hall of Fame on April 23, 2024, as a fitting example of the work that the Illinois legislative staffs do in preparing their people for potential statewide and even national leadership; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we congratulate Scott D. Humbard for his successful career, which began in our building and spun outward to encompass 17 states, and the generation of many gigawatts of essential electric energy for America's future; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we wish for Scott Humbard to have many years of sun, water, and music; and be it; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to Scott Humbard, Vice President of Constellation Energy, as a symbol of our respect and esteem.

WHEREAS, The agriculture industry, particularly soybean farmers, have suffered significant financial hardship as a result of Donald Trump's ongoing trade disputes and retaliatory tariffs; and

WHEREAS, The United States Government under Donald Trump's reckless directives has moved to extend a \$40 billion economic aid package to Argentina, effectively doubling prior commitments, despite Argentina being a direct competitor to the United States in global soybean production and export; and

WHEREAS, Argentina has suspended its export taxes on soybeans following Donald Trump's tariff disruptions, an intentional move to drive down prices for U.S. soybeans and erase decades of work by American farmers to build global trust and trade; and

WHEREAS, Federal support for a foreign competitor defies the interests of American farmers who continue to face reduced prices, limited market access, and increased production costs at home; and

WHEREAS, The use of U.S. taxpayer funds to strengthen Argentina's agricultural industry at the expense of our own is a betrayal and a gross misalignment of our country's priorities; and

WHEREAS, This decision comes at a time when millions of American families are struggling to put food on the table, due to Donald Trump's actions to gut SNAP for more than 12% of all Americans, the very program that ensures millions of children, seniors, and working families can eat; and

WHEREAS, It is unconscionable and deeply deceitful for the federal government to spend billions propping up a foreign economy while American farmers and families here at home shoulder the cost, watching their tax dollars go abroad as grocery prices rise and family farms close; and

WHEREAS, America's farmers and working families must come before foreign bailouts to strengthen domestic production, ensure food access, and empower American farmers, as opposed to rewarding foreign competitors at the expense of our own; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we denounce the federal government's \$40 billion bailout to Argentina as a reckless misuse of taxpayer funds and a direct insult to American farmers and millions of American families struggling to afford food; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge President Donald Trump and the United States Congress to immediately redirect these funds toward supporting American agriculture, reopening the federal government, and protecting American families' access to food.
