WHEREAS, The members of the Illinois House of Representatives are saddened to learn of the death of former Illinois State Representative and City of Springfield Alderperson Irvin Frank "Irv" Smith, who passed away on November 24, 2025; and

WHEREAS, Rep. Smith was born to Frank I. and Emelia Marker Smith in Springfield on September 22, 1929; he completed bachelor's and master's degrees in geology and geography, a master's degree in educational administration, and postgraduate work at Illinois State University and the University of Wisconsin; he married Joan Barbara Reilly at St. Joseph's Church in Springfield in 1952, and they relocated to Fort Monmouth, New Jersey, where he served as a member of the United States Army Signal Corps during the Korean War, for which he later attended an Honor Flight to Washington, D.C. in 2016; and

WHEREAS, Rep. Smith touched many lives, first as a teacher and coach at Harvard Park and Jefferson, and then as principal of Staley and Iles Schools; when he arrived at Iles in 1962, he noticed the basketball nets had been removed from the playground to discourage children from playing after hours; he immediately put the nets up and organized an intra-city basketball competition among the grade schools in Springfield, which Iles won the first year; through his efforts, students learned sportsmanship and pride; over the years, he kept in touch with many of his former students; and

WHEREAS, Rep. Smith served as chairman of the Springfield Recreation Commission, became the principal organizer and first president of the Springfield Community Action Agency to combat poverty in Springfield, and was a force behind the beginning of the Head Start Program in Springfield Public Schools; he served as Sangamon County Regional Superintendent of Schools from 1974 to 1980; he further served his community as vice chairman of the Sangamon County Board, as a member of the Illinois House of Representatives from 1980 to 1982, and as an alderperson for the City of Springfield from 1987 to 2007; and

WHEREAS, Rep. Smith was dedicated to the Republican Party and welcomed people from all walks of life into the political organization; he became chairman of the Sangamon County Republican Party in 1983, serving until 2005; he served as chairman of the Illinois County Chairman's Association and as a delegate to the Republican National Convention six times from 1984 to 2004; under his leadership, the first female Mayor of Springfield, first female chairman of the Sangamon County Board, and the first African American female were elected to local office; and

WHEREAS, Rep. Smith taught thousands of children how to swim and compete during his lifetime, beginning with a summer job as pool manager and coach of Illini CC from 1958 to 1966; he organized and coached the first YWCA Women's Swim Team in 1959, culminating with the YWCA National Swim Meet being held at Eisenhower Pool in Springfield in 1971, and he led the YWCA and YMCA swim teams after they merged in 1972, becoming the SPY Swim Team; he organized and coached Colony West Swim Club from 1967 to 1970, and his team won the City Championship Meet in 1970; he purchased the Olympic Club in 1971 and later purchased the North Suburban Aquatic Club, or Veteran's Memorial Pool, for long course training; he coached the Griffin High School swim team with his friend, Mike Schwartz, and he was named IHSA District Coach of the Year in 1981 and 1982; he was also a member of the International Swimming Hall of Fame in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, where he took his teams to train during Christmas break; he was inducted into the Springfield Sports Hall of Fame as a Friend of Sports in 1999; and

WHEREAS, Rep. Smith was the longest consistent member of the Springfield YMCA at the time of his passing, beginning in 1940; he initially played handball, becoming an 11-time city champion; he held many leadership positions over the years, including as a member of the YMCA Board from 1966 to 1982, where he also served as chairman, as an active member of YMCA Membership Roundups, serving as "Big Boss" in 1977, as a member and chairman of the YMCA Board of Trustees, and as a charter member of the Strong Kids Fund; and

WHEREAS, Rep. Smith had a long, productive, and fulfilling life; he will be remembered for selflessly giving his time and talent to others and for encouraging everyone to realize their potential; and

WHEREAS, Rep. Smith was preceded in death by his wife, Joan Reilly Smith; his parents; his in-laws, Walter R. and Edith Johnson Reilly; his sister, Clara L. Bennett; and his sisters-in-law, Florence Nizzio Smith and Mary Alice Smith; and

WHEREAS, Rep. Smith is survived by his son, Irvin F. "Chip" Smith; his daughters, April Elaine Smith and Sharmin Smith Doering; two grandchildren; his son-in-law, Gary Doering; his brother, John Mark Smith; and two nieces and a nephew; therefore, be it

HOUSE RESOLUTION 548

Offered by Representative Manley:

WHEREAS, The Beautiful Minds Youth Mentoring Foundation, headquartered in Illinois, advances women's health, mental wellness, youth mentorship, and inclusive enterprise through its #MyPinkHealth initiative; and

WHEREAS, The Beautiful Minds Pink Saree 5K & Wellness Expo, held on October 11, 2025, brought together citizens, leaders, and international partners at Whalon Lake in Bolingbrook; the event was sponsored by Mayor Mary Alexander-Basta of the Village of Bolingbrook and State Representative Natalie Manley; and

WHEREAS, The Beautiful Minds Pink Saree 5K & Wellness Expo featured yoga and mindfulness sessions, breast screenings, dental education with kit distribution, and a Women's Enterprise Empowerment marketplace that provided mentorship and sponsored booths for women-owned businesses and artisans; and

WHEREAS, The Beautiful Minds Pink Saree 5K & Wellness Expo further featured the Youth Voice Out program, the Pink Saree Parade, and the #MyPinkHealth Art Showcase from India, through which youth creativity and cultural exchange were amplified; and

WHEREAS, Through the Pink Saree Awards of 2025, volunteers and 5K winners were honored and leaders across diplomatic, legislative, county, municipal, artisan, mentor, and youth spheres were celebrated; and

WHEREAS, These collective efforts embody Illinois' values of preventive health, equity, compassion, and global collaboration; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare October 11, 2025 as Beautiful Minds Pink Saree Day/#MyPinkHealth Awareness Day in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage all residents of Illinois to support initiatives that advance women's wellness, mental health, and youth empowerment; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to Beautiful Minds Youth Mentoring Foundation as a symbol of our esteem and respect.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 551

Offered by Representative Ford:

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois, and particularly the City of Chicago and Cook County, have made measurable progress in reducing violent crime over the past several years, yet the rates of homicide and gun violence remain unacceptably high and continue to cause untold human and economic loss; and

WHEREAS, According to the Chicago Police Department's 2024 year-end data, the city recorded approximately 617 homicides, marking a 12% decline from the prior year, yet this still represents more than one homicide every day within the city; and

WHEREAS, In Cook County, over 90% of homicide victims are male, and approximately 80% are Black, with young Black men aged 15 to 34 representing both the overwhelming majority of victims and perpetrators of gun homicides, a tragic and disproportionate burden that devastates families and communities and demands urgent attention; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois State Police and the Illinois Department of Public Health report that firearm homicide remains the leading cause of death for young Black men in the State, with rates more than 25

times higher than those of their white peers, underscoring the need for practical, evidence-based prevention strategies that reach youth before violence occurs; and

WHEREAS, In 2025, the University of Chicago Press published *Unforgiving Places: The Unexpected Origins of American Gun Violence* by Professor Jens Ludwig, the Edwin A. and Betty L. Bergman Distinguished Service Professor at the University of Chicago Harris School of Public Policy and Director of the University of Chicago Crime Lab; and

WHEREAS, *Unforgiving Places* has quickly become a major contribution to the national conversation about public safety, offering a timely and data-driven reframing of the gun violence crisis, arguing that much of America's violence arises not from organized criminal intent but from split-second decisions made in environments of stress, fear, or disrespect and that behavioral science and decision-skills training offer a path forward that is both humane and effective; and

WHEREAS, Professor Ludwig's research and that of his colleagues have demonstrated that short, structured cognitive-behavioral intervention (CBI) programs, specifically those designed and evaluated to reduce violence involvement among participants, can produce measurable reductions in arrests and violent offending, improve academic outcomes, and achieve these results at a fraction of the cost of traditional law enforcement or incarceration; and

WHEREAS, Such programs include *Becoming a Man (BAM)*, operated by Youth Guidance in Chicago Public Schools, and decision-making curricula implemented at the Cook County Juvenile Temporary Detention Center (JTDC), which have reduced violent offending by up to 45% in rigorous evaluations by the University of Chicago Crime Lab and other researchers; and

WHEREAS, Illinois has already embedded Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) into the State's Illinois Learning Standards, including Goal 3: Demonstrate decision-making skills and responsible behaviors, and the School Code requires violence prevention and conflict resolution instruction under Section 27-23.4, yet current guidance does not specify which evidence-based programs meet those goals or direct school districts toward validated, violence-reduction curricula; and

WHEREAS, Clarifying that evidence-based, decision-making, and impulse-control curricula specifically demonstrated to reduce violence involvement, including those validated by the University of Chicago Crime Lab and other leading researchers, qualify as approved SEL instruction would empower schools to teach lifesaving skills using existing time, staff, and resources; and

WHEREAS, Likewise, the Illinois juvenile justice system, which includes the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts (AOIC), the Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ), and county probation and diversion programs, has the authority to require educational or counseling programs for youth under supervision, but it lacks statewide guidance on validated, violence-reduction curricula that can be implemented at minimal cost; and

WHEREAS, Integrating such programs as a standard early touchpoint for youth entering the justice system could help young people develop reflection skills, reduce recidivism, and rebuild community safety more effectively and humanely than punitive measures alone; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS), particularly through the Office of Firearm Violence Prevention and the Reimagine Public Safety Act, and the Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority (ICJIA), particularly through the R3 Program's violence prevention and youth development initiatives, are leading state agencies in funding community violence intervention programs focused on individuals at the highest risk of firearm violence involvement and victimization; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) to:

(1) Identify and publish a list of evidence-based, decision-making, and impulse-control curricula that have been demonstrated to reduce violence involvement;

(2) Make at least one free or low-cost curriculum available statewide for optional integration into existing Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) instruction;

(3) Encourage districts to implement these programs using existing resources and staff development; and

(4) Develop, pilot, and rigorously test new school-based, decision-making, and violence-prevention curricula that can be easily adopted by ISBE and schools statewide if proven effective in reducing violence; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts (AOIC), the Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ), and county probation and diversion programs to identify and approve evidence-based, decision-making curricula appropriate for minors under supervision, diversion, or detention, to encourage their integration as standard early interventions, and to implement these initiatives within existing budgets and structures; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) and the Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority (ICJIA) to coordinate with ISBE, AOIC, DJJ, and local partners to align violence-prevention curricula and community-based interventions across settings; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we recognize Professor Jens Ludwig for his groundbreaking research, leadership, and publication of *Unforgiving Places*, and we acknowledge the contributions of other scholars and organizations advancing behavioral approaches to violence prevention, including Patrick H. Tolan, John E. Lochman, the University of Chicago Education Lab, Youth Guidance, Arnold Ventures, and others; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Illinois State Board of Education, the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts, the Department of Juvenile Justice, the Illinois Department of Human Services, the Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority, Professor Jens Ludwig, and the Governor of the State of Illinois.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 565

Offered by Representative Ford:

WHEREAS, Interventional cardiologists, radiologists, and other health care professionals in Illinois are routinely exposed to scatter radiation during fluoroscopically guided procedures, and they have long relied on heavy lead aprons for personal protection; and

WHEREAS, Decades of reliance on wearable lead aprons have caused a substantial burden of occupational injury, including chronic back pain, spinal disc disease, joint degeneration, and other serious orthopedic conditions that shorten careers and diminish quality of life for health professionals; and

WHEREAS, It is estimated that between 10,000 and 12,000 Illinois health care professionals, including physicians, nurses, and technologists, are required to wear lead aprons in cardiac catheterization

laboratories and interventional suites on a routine basis, placing a large segment of the health workforce at risk of such preventable injuries; and

WHEREAS, Current law in Illinois Administrative Code Title 32 Part 360 requires wearable protective garments as the standard shielding for fluoroscopic procedures, which has the effect of prohibiting hospitals and facilities from adopting fully "lead-free" interventional labs; and

WHEREAS, New technology, known as Enhanced Radiation Protection Systems (ERPS), provides non-wearable, externally mounted radiation shielding that meets or exceeds the protective equivalent of 0.5 millimeters of lead under clinical use conditions while eliminating the long-term orthopedic hazards associated with wearable lead garments; and

WHEREAS, Modernizing protective garment regulations to allow the use of ERPS as an equivalent protective option would permit Illinois facilities to implement lead-free labs while maintaining or exceeding existing levels of radiation protection without eliminating safety standards; and

WHEREAS, Several states, including Michigan, Colorado, and Florida, have recently updated their medical radiation protection regulations to provide a regulatory pathway for ERPS adoption; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Chapter of the American College of Cardiology (IL-ACC) formally requested in a July letter to IEMA-OHS to amend Part 360 in order to establish a clear approval process for ERPS, supported by manufacturer data, peer-reviewed studies, and facility-specific safety protocols; and

WHEREAS, Other organizations that are members of the Modern Radiation Policy Alliance, including the Society for Cardiovascular Angiography & Interventions and the Illinois Association of Orthopedic Surgeons, support the inclusion of the amendments to allow for ERPS; and

WHEREAS, Protecting the health and longevity of Illinois' frontline cardiovascular and interventional specialists is critical in ensuring that patients across the State continue to have access to life-saving procedures, and reducing preventable workplace injuries will strengthen our health care workforce at a time of increasing demand; and

WHEREAS, Updating Illinois' rules to accommodate ERPS will better protect health care professionals, reduce workplace injuries, and align Illinois' standards with peer jurisdictions while preserving the core mission of patient safety; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we strongly urge the Illinois Emergency Management Agency - Office of Homeland Security (IEMA-OHS) to heed the petition and comments submitted by the Illinois Chapter of the American College of Cardiology (IL-ACC) and supported by the Modern Radiation Policy Alliance and to promulgate rules establishing a pathway for the approval and safe use of Enhanced Radiation Protection Systems (ERPS) in Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to the Acting Director of IEMA-OHS, the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules, and the Governor of the State of Illinois.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 572

Offered by Representative Grant:

WHEREAS, In the State of Illinois, all driver's license applicants must have a vision screening or submit a Vision Specialist Report completed by a licensed optometrist, ophthalmologist, or physician dated within six months of a facility visit; and

WHEREAS, Vision requirements include a minimum visual acuity of 20/40 with or without corrective lenses and at least a 140-degree peripheral vision, or the ability to see to the side, with or without corrective lenses; those applicants with a visual acuity between 20/41 and 20/70 are limited to daylight driving only; and

WHEREAS, If you wear glasses or contact lenses, a restriction will be noted on your driver's license, requiring you to wear glasses or contact lenses when operating a vehicle; and

WHEREAS, If you wear telescopic lenses, you must meet special requirements and undergo additional vision testing to receive a driver's license; and

WHEREAS, The Secretary of State utilizes machines that assist personnel in screening applicants' respective vision; and

WHEREAS, These machines often require direct contact with an applicant's forehead and the area near the eyes; and

WHEREAS, Some bacterial and viral eye infections, such as conjunctivitis, commonly known as pink eye, can be spread from person to person; someone may develop pink eye after coming into contact with an infected eye or after touching surfaces contaminated with the germs of an infected person; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Secretary of State to develop uniformed training and to provide sanitary materials for cleaning the vision screener machines between uses; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 575

Offered by Representative Kifowit:

WHEREAS, Recent public statements, attributed to the President of the United States, have been widely interpreted as threats of political violence or retaliation against elected representatives who have publicly affirmed that members of the United States Armed Forces must refuse unlawful orders; and

WHEREAS, The Constitution of the United States establishes a system of separated powers and checks and balances designed to prevent the consolidation of authority in any one individual, including the president, and guarantees that all elected officials may discharge their duties free from threats of retaliation or violence; and

WHEREAS, The Declaration of Independence states that governments derive their just powers from the consent of the governed and that the legitimacy of our Republic depends upon the free exercise of representative government without fear, intimidation, or coercion; and

WHEREAS, Any rhetoric, regardless of the speaker or political party, that could reasonably be construed as encouraging, endorsing, or threatening political violence or prosecution against members of the legislative branch for the lawful exercise of their constitutional duties is of grave concern; and

WHEREAS, The Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ) and the long-standing traditions of the United States Armed Forces make it unequivocally clear that service members have a legal and moral obligation to refuse unlawful orders, consistent with Articles 90, 91, and 92 of the UCMJ, which require obedience only to lawful orders; and

WHEREAS, The Nuremberg Principles, the rulings of American military tribunals, and U.S. military doctrine establish that following orders is not a defense for participation in illegal acts, and that the rule of law requires individual responsibility; and

WHEREAS, Any attempted direct or implied threat to elected representatives for affirming these foundational principles represents a danger to constitutional governance, civilian control of the military, and the rule of law itself; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we condemn any statements, threats, or insinuations of political violence, from any official, including the President of the United States, that seek to intimidate or punish elected representatives for upholding the Constitution or for reaffirming the duty of service members to refuse unlawful orders; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we reaffirm the constitutional and statutory obligations of all uniformed military personnel to obey only lawful orders, to protect the Constitution of the United States, and to reject any directive that violates the rights of the people or the rule of law; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the President of the United States, the U.S. Secretary of Defense, the U.S. Senate Majority Leader, the U.S. Senate Minority Leader, the U.S. Speaker of the House, the U.S. House of Representatives Minority Leader, and all members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation.

WHEREAS, Families and children of first responders, through the commemoration of a day of unity focused on their community and their particular struggles, have the opportunity to combat social isolation while finding strength in one another; therefore, be it

HOUSE RESOLUTION 580

Offered by Representative Meier:

WHEREAS, Soil is an essential natural resource, and Illinois farmers and professionals play a critical role in managing Illinois soil and water resources; and

WHEREAS, The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) defines soil health as the continued capacity of soil to function as a vital living ecosystem that sustains plants, animals, and humans; and

WHEREAS, The implementation of soil health principles across the Illinois landscape is not new but has only recently been recognized as an urgent part of the need to prevent soil degradation, return organic resources to the soil or compost, protect groundwater used for drinking water, and combat climate change; the degradation of soil can be rapid, while the formation and regeneration processes can be very slow; and

WHEREAS, The protection of Illinois soils is essential to long-term prosperity and sustainability of the soil and water resources of our State, counties, and cities, and the six basic principles of soil health necessary for that protection are to:

- (1) Minimize soil disturbance and external inputs, including reduced tillage and using compost as a beneficial product to increase soil organic matter;
- (2) Maximize plant and microbial diversity;
- (3) Maintain the presence of living roots;
- (4) Keep the soil covered, including with cover crops and crop residue, to armor the soil;
- (5) Integrate animals into land management, including grazing animals, birds, beneficial insects, or keystone species, such as earthworms; and
- (6) Incorporate the context of local conditions in decision-making, including soil type, topography, and time of year; and

WHEREAS, Farmers using voluntary practices of no-till, cover crops, nutrient management plans, and longer crop rotations contribute to the advancement of non-point source pollution goals for nitrate-nitrogen and phosphorus; Illinois farmers work to reduce the amount of nutrients flowing off of farm fields and into our watersheds; with these reduced nutrient losses from agriculture lands, which are detailed in the Illinois Nutrient Loss Reduction Strategy (NLRS), farmers will be able to meet desired outcomes as outlined by the Mississippi River Basin Hypoxia Task Force for the Gulf of Mexico; and

WHEREAS, Soil health principles provide for the reduction of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere through the sequestration of carbon within the upper reaches of the soil profile; this carbon mitigation improves the organic matter content in the soil and provides a stable biome for soil organisms, improves nutrient transfer from soil to root, and increases water infiltration and water-holding capacity; and

WHEREAS, Despite soil's importance to human health, the environment, nutrition and food, feed, fiber, and fuel production, there is little public awareness of the importance of soil protection; and

WHEREAS, Illinois soils are some of the best in the world, having the ability to sink carbon and reverse climate change, grow nutritious food for Illinois communities, and keep waterways clean; and

WHEREAS, It is imperative that the State of Illinois actively raise awareness on the importance of soil health and promote its stewardship to safeguard this resource for future generations of Illinois citizens; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare March 1 through March 7, 2026 as Illinois Soil Health Week in the State of Illinois; and be it further

WHEREAS, Despite their essential on-scene and emergency response responsibilities, medicolegal professionals are not uniformly recognized as first responders, notwithstanding their exposure to hazardous environments, traumatic scenes, biohazards, and significant occupational stressors; and

WHEREAS, Acknowledging medicolegal professionals as first responders affirms the critical nature of their work, supports parity in professional recognition and resources, and enhances coordinated emergency response, responder wellness, and public safety outcomes; and

WHEREAS, The National Association of Medical Examiners (NAME) and the International Association of Coroners and Medical Examiners (IACME) have each issued position statements recognizing the importance of Medicolegal Professionals' Week, affirming the essential role medicolegal professionals play in death investigation, public health, the administration of justice, and emergency response; and

WHEREAS, Recognizing Medicolegal Professionals' Week fosters public awareness of the indispensable role these professionals play in protecting public health, ensuring accountability, and upholding justice across the State of Illinois; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare the week of January 25 through January 31, 2026 as Medicolegal Professionals' Week in the State of Illinois.

WHEREAS, Military veterans are disproportionately affected by ALS, and multiple studies show that they are more likely to develop and die from the disease than the general population; and

WHEREAS, Securing access to new therapies, durable medical equipment, and communication technologies is of vital importance to people living with ALS; clinical trials also play a pivotal role in evaluating new treatments, enhancing quality of life, and fostering assistive technologies for those living with ALS; and

WHEREAS, To truly confront ALS, awareness must be raised, and policies should reflect the urgent needs of those living with this disease as increased advocacy and legislative support are critical to advancing research, easing the burden on families, and ultimately finding a cure; and

WHEREAS, Recognizing ALS Awareness Month provides an opportunity to increase public awareness of the dire circumstances of people living with ALS, acknowledge the terrible impact this disease has on those individuals and their families, and support research to eradicate this disease; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May 2026 as ALS Awareness Month in the State of Illinois, and we call upon all Illinoisans to join in supporting amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) research and advocating for increased funding and to stand in solidarity with those affected by this relentless disease; and be it further

WHEREAS, Lyme disease is a growing national public health crisis; and

WHEREAS, According to the Illinois Department of Public Health, Lyme disease cases are on the rise in the State; and

WHEREAS, Lyme disease is a bacterial infection caused by several different strains of bacteria that are carried and spread by ticks; and

WHEREAS, Those who are bitten by ticks and subsequently become infected with Lyme disease suffer from fever, fatigue, joint pain, and skin rashes and, in the most severe cases, can be afflicted by serious joint and nervous system problems; and

WHEREAS, In the United States, 35,000 to 45,000 cases of Lyme disease are reported to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) each year; as it is estimated that only one out of every 10 cases of Lyme disease is reported, the actual number of diagnosed cases is closer to 476,000 annually; and

WHEREAS, Since the late 20th century, there has been a dramatic increase in the Lyme disease infection rate each year, with infection rates having doubled from 3.74 cases per 100,000 to 7.95 cases per 100,000 since 1991, indicating that the disease is one of the fastest-growing infectious diseases in the United States and the western world; and

WHEREAS, Lyme disease is difficult to diagnose as diagnostic tests analyze blood samples to look for the presence of antibodies, an immune response that may not be detectable in the blood until many weeks after the initial tick bite and infection; and

WHEREAS, Up to 60% of acute cases of Lyme disease are misdiagnosed; and

WHEREAS, Those who are diagnosed with the disease early and prescribed sufficient quantities of antibiotics may recover quickly; and

WHEREAS, If the diagnosis is delayed or individuals are treated with insufficient antibiotic therapy, many experience late-stage symptoms that become chronic; and

WHEREAS, A diagnosis of chronic Lyme disease for those who are not cured by antibiotics and who continue to suffer the apparent effects of the disease is controversial; and

WHEREAS, The newest research seemingly validates the diagnosis of chronic Lyme disease and suggests that heretofore unknown bacterial persister cells remain dormant in the body, evading antibiotics and the immune system, before reinfecting the individual after the standard course of antibiotics has been taken; and

WHEREAS, Those who suffer from chronic Lyme disease experience terrible symptoms and often have difficulty finding treatment or answers, and many are unable to continue working; and

WHEREAS, Public funding for Lyme disease research receives less than 2% of the funding allocated for researching West Nile virus and less than 0.2% of the funding that HIV/AIDS research receives, despite Lyme disease having annual case counts that dwarf those of both diseases; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the federal government to allocate more funding toward finding a cure for the devastating and increasingly prevalent public health crisis that is Lyme disease; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage the Illinois State Board of Education to begin health education to prevent tick bites for children who represent the highest risk group for tick-borne diseases; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we declare the month of May 2026 as Lyme Disease Awareness Month in the State of Illinois.

WHEREAS, Lance Corporal Rowe had only four months remaining in his enlistment, and he hoped to marry his fiancée and pursue a career in dentistry following his military service; and

WHEREAS, Lance Corporal Rowe was laid to rest at Mount Olivet Memorial Park in Zion, where his memory continues to be honored by his family, friends, and fellow service members; and
