HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 687

Offered by Representative Harper:

WHEREAS, Chicago Public Schools (CPS) is the fourth-largest school district in the United States, serving more than 325,000 students and providing approximately 350,000 meals daily through participation in federal child nutrition programs, including the National School Lunch Program; and

WHEREAS, In December 2020, the Chicago Board of Education adopted a Local School Wellness Policy that includes a district-wide prohibition on pork products in all CPS breakfast and lunch offerings; and

WHEREAS, Public records requests have not identified documentation explaining the rationale, nutrition analysis, cost analysis, or CPS Board deliberation supporting the adoption of an all-pork prohibition; and

WHEREAS, The 2025-2030 Dietary Guidelines for Americans, issued by the United States Departments of Agriculture (USDA) and Health and Human Services (DHHS), recognize pork as a nutrient-dense, high-quality protein that supports child growth, development, and overall health when prepared in appropriate forms; and

WHEREAS, Pork provides essential nutrients, including complete protein, iron, zinc, B vitamins including B12, and choline, which supports brain development; and

WHEREAS, Illinois ranks fourth in the United States in pork production, contributing more than \$11.9 billion annually to the State's economy; and

WHEREAS, The pork industry contributes approximately 32,690 jobs in Illinois, including in pork production and with input suppliers such as feed and equipment, transportation, and processing; and

WHEREAS, Pork is widely consumed across Chicago households and is culturally relevant to many CPS families, including Latino, African American, Asian-American, and White communities; and

WHEREAS, CPS participates in the National School Lunch Program and receives USDA foods, including pork products eligible for distribution under the USDA Section 32 program at reduced or no cost; and

WHEREAS, The current prohibition prevents CPS from utilizing USDA-provided pork products, limiting menu flexibility and access to cost-effective protein options funded by federal resources; and

WHEREAS, CPS routinely offers multiple entree options to accommodate dietary needs and preferences, reducing the necessity for a blanket prohibition on any single protein source; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Chicago Public Schools (CPS) Board of Education to conduct a formal review of the Local School Wellness Policy provision prohibiting pork products; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge such a review to include identification and disclosure of the original rationale and supporting documentation for the prohibition, consultation with nutrition experts and food service professionals, and consideration of stakeholder input; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage the CPS Board of Education to evaluate whether limited menu testing or pilot programs allowing pork products would better align with current nutrition science, cultural inclusion, fiscal stewardship, and full utilization of available USDA foods.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 688

Offered by Representative Meier:

WHEREAS, The E-15 fuel blend utilizes a combination of renewable ethanol and gasoline to enhance the longevity of our nation's fuel supply, while maintaining the common and everyday usage of motor vehicles; and

WHEREAS, The use of corn to produce ethanol for motor fuel is a proven source of renewable, clean, and sustainable energy that makes motor fuel more affordable for the average Illinoisan; and

WHEREAS, The ethanol by-products that are produced during the distillation of ethanol for motor fuel are recyclable, proving beneficial by turning waste products into a valuable, renewable, and sustainable resource; and

WHEREAS, Both wet and dry distillers' grains are often used in high-protein livestock feed; the carbon dioxide created during the fermentation process is then captured and used for carbonation in the food and beverage industry, for fire extinguishers, and in greenhouses; and

WHEREAS, Illinois is the second largest corn-producing state in the nation and accounts for roughly 15% of the total U.S. corn production; the various uses of corn not only as a source of food but also as a job-producing endeavor enhances the economic outlook of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Illinois corn production for 2023 and 2024 totaled over 2 billion bushels of corn per year, and in 2025, Illinois corn production is estimated to be at 2.35 billion bushels produced; and

WHEREAS, Illinois farmers, especially row-crop farmers, are affected by variable factors that cannot be accounted for, including tariffs and unforeseen weather events, but these issues can be mitigated by the year-round sale of E-15 motor fuel blends due to the near guarantee of improving our domestic renewable fuel marketplace; and

WHEREAS, Illinois is the home of some of the most nutrient rich and healthy soil in the United States, capable of producing world-class grains, vegetables, and fruit, and the utilization of one of Illinois' most vital and abundant natural resources is a key aspect of economic growth, conservation research, and overall better stewardship of our natural environment; and

WHEREAS, E-15 motor fuel blends support domestic biofuel production research and help secure domestic energy independence, while strengthening Illinois farmers' livelihoods and affordable motor fuel for all Illinoisans; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge for the support and passage of the federal Nationwide Consumer and Fuel Retailer Choice Act, which offers a permanent, national solution to allow the year-round, nationwide sale of E-15 fuel blends; and be it further
