Speaker Redmond: "Next order of business is election of a Clerk.

Under the Rules the Clerk must not be a Member of the House,
 nominations are now open for the office, Clerk of the House of
 Representatives of the 79th General Assembly. The Chair recognizes

Representative Corneal Davis, the gentleman from Cook, for the purpose of nomination of the office of the Clerk of the House."

Davis: "Ah... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

I arise to... place in nomination a man of experience, this is the one job where we need a man of experience. Frederick Selcke, who has been our Clerk.... the man of great experience and the man that I arise to nominate has worked with us throughout the years. And I'm sure they will continue to work together, I have often said, and it is true, that experience has no degrees... that experience has no graduates, but experience has many survivors and we have a young man who is a survivor of experience who will carry on the works of this House in a orderly fashion, and this is the one place where we need an orderly fashion and I am privileged to place in nomination, the Assistant Clerk, John F. O'Brien, whom you all know and I believe you will agree with me that he is the man to be the Clerk of the House."

Speaker Redmond: "The Chair reconizes Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I certainly concur in everything that Representative Davis said, and I move that the nominations be closed and an unanimous ballot be cast for John O'Brien, for Clerk of the House of Representatives."

Speaker Redmond: "All in favor say "aye". Opposed. The "ayes" have it. Carried. Jack O'Brien is elected Clerk of the House. Fred Selcke... The Chair recognizes Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Thank you ah... Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. It's an honor for me to ah... nominate a man who has performed the duties of Clerk in an excellent manner for the past ten years, Assistant Chief Clerk of the House, Frederick Selcke, I place Mr. Selcke's name."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Berman."

Berman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

I'm very pleased to, second that nomination an if there are no other nomination, move that the nominations closed and a unanimous

ballot be cast for Fred Selcke, for assistant Clerk."

Speaker Redmond: "On the motion, all in favor signify by saying "aye". Opposed. The "ayes" have it, and so ordered. Fred Selcke is elected Assistant Clerk."

Speaker Redmond: "Next order of business is the election of a Doorkeeper. The Chair reconizes Representative Berman, the gentleman from Cook."

Berman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I am pleased today to place in nomination a local resident, a man who has indicated ah... his desire to act as our Doorkeeper and who will perform in a diligent manner, I'm pleased to place in nomination the name of John Painter, of Springfield, as Doorkeeper."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there anyother nominations? Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "If there be no other nominations, I ah... move that nominations be closed, and an unanimous ballot be casted."

Speaker Redmond: "All in favor signify by saying "aye". Opposed. Carried. The next order is the Assistant Doorkeeper.... Oh, I guess we don't have one."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Clerk accept the office of Clerk... both the Clerk and Assistant Clerk have accepted the offices to which they have been elected.... wait a minute now, the gentleman from Cook, Representative Berman.... Representative Berman."

Berman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I wish to ah... move the adoption of House Resolution 10, this Resolution.... calls for the adoption of temporary rules and I would point out the the Membership, that ah... the.... that the temporary rules of the 79th General Assembly would be the rules of the 78th General Assembly with the following exception. That paragraph 'a' of rule 14, is deleted, that is the schedule of Committee, this is to allow the Speaker to make whatever changes ah... he and his own ah... determination which is to make, also an exception would be the Resolution Number 1, which was adopted

by the 79th General Assembly, that requires the ah... that dealt with the required number of votes for the election of Speaker. And also rule 2, would be amended to read as follows: Majority and Minority Leadership and that the present rule which calls for Majority Leader, three assistants ah... two assistant Majority Leaders and two Majority Whips, would be amended to provide for a Majority Leader.... three assistant Majority Leader, and two Majority Whips, and likewise the Minority Leadership, instead of having two Minority Leaders and two Minority Whips, would be amended to provide for three assistant Minority Leader and two Minority Whips. Ah... this Resolution has been indicated to be the desire of the Minority Leadership and the Speaker, and I would move the adoption of House Resolution Number 10."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Yes, thank you Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Ah... there is one additional provision of the rules of the 78th General Assembly, which has been subject of a good deal of controversy, or was during the 78th General Assembly and I wonder if it might be possible ah... for Representative Berman to... to hold this Resolution for a moment so that we might discuss that additional provision before ah... any action is taken on... on adoption of the temporary rule."

Speaker Redmond: "These are just temporary rules, but ah..."

Lundy: "Well, I understand that but, am I not correct that ah... in order at a later date to ah... to ah...dissect any change in the temporary rules it would be necessary to amend them."

Speaker Redmond: "I think you are correct there. What your pleasure Representative Berman, with respect to discussing it with them."

Berman: "I will hold it for a moment if ah... it's a sincere wish."

Speaker Redmond: "Stand at ease for a minute, Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "No, Mr. Speaker, a point of parliamentary inquiry, when

I drove in the drive this morning I didn't know that we assigned any ah... Minority Leaders yet in the Journal, Representative Tim Simms, has parked in my parking space and I want to know whether that ah... is kosher, as we say up in my district. I understand that Representative Brian Duff, pulled in the other Whips parking space ah... for the... you fellows will be interested in hearing that."

Speaker Redmond: "I don't think that that's kosher and I ah... reprimand ah... Representative Simms and Representative Duff, and from here on in ah... don't do it."

Pierce: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come to order. Representative Berman."

Berman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, we've resolved the... the point that Representative Lundy had raised, and I would like to re... re-explain House Resolution 10, because there were some questions at ah... came from some of the Members as we were in recess. Ah... House Resolution 10, is a Resolution that would adopt for the 79th General Assembly, as a temporary rule of the 79th General Assembly. The rules of the 78th General Assembly with the following changes; Number 1, paragraph 'a', of rule 14 and paragraph 'd' of rule 42, are deleted. Paragraph 'a' of rule 14, is a Committee schedule, Paragraph 'd' of rule 42, is the paragraph that Representative Lundy referred to and that is the paragraph that relates to the required number of votes necessary to pass on a Resolution dealing with Constitutional Amendment. Paragraph 2, change number 2 that House Resolution 1, that we adopted in the 79th General Assembly that's the Resolution requires 89 votes to be elected Speaker, will be included in the temporary rules of the 79th General Assembly. And the third change is the addition of the Assistant Majority Leader and Assistant Minority Leader, in the listing of the ah... leadership position. I would renew my motion to... my motion to adopt House Resolution Number 10."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, I am a bit at loss here ah... my distinguished colleague... colleague on the other side refers to the removal of paragraph 'd', point of information ah... what does the present paragraph 'd' says about Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative... Berman."

Berman: "There were... there are two paragraphs that are being deleted in the adoption of the temporary rule. Rule 14, paragraph 'a', 14 'a' is the listing of all the Committees, that is not being adopted in order for... to allow the new Speaker to determine what the Committees will be. Also deleted from the adoption of the temporary rule is paragraph 'd' of rule 42, that paragraph at the moment reads that a hundred and seven votes is necessary in order to adopt a Resolution, dealing with a Constitutional Amendment with the deletion of both of those sub-paragraphs the determination will be made by the Rules Committee and re-submitted to the floor for future adoption. What we're doing is leaving those two provisions of the old rules out... of the temporary rules."

Speaker Redmond: "Respresntative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, my... my second point of information is, when my distinguished colleague talks about.. temporary rules, what is the duration of the temporary rules?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Berman."

Berman: "My understanding is that the temporary rules will... ah... prevail until the Rules Committee meets and submits a ah... ah... permanent ah... ah... Resolution concerning the rules, including the deletions. That should be, time wise... ah... a matter of, my impression would be a week or two."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Then, Mr. Speaker, do I understand from my distinguish colleague, that if the new Rules Committee choses not.... to change those rules they would stay in effect until the end of the Session?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Berman."

Berman: "If the Rules Committee, hypothetically took no action then ah... it would always be the prerogative of any Member to submit rule changes, as is provided in the old rule, which would be the new temporary rule, and ah... they would remain in force until their change."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "In other words, Mr. Berman do I understand you to say then... your answer is yes, the... they say.... and if the Rules Committee doesn't make any changes after such rule be adopted as he proposed today that ah... it stays in effect till the end of the Session."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Berman."

Berman: "No, I want to correct that. Part of what we are adopting here... is rule 73, which was the old rule and it would now be the rule 73, 73 sets forth the procedure... sets forth the procedure for adoption of Rules, Amendments and Addition that can be done either through the Rule Committee or from the floor of the House, that will be enforced."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

I think every Member should know that what this really is, is an effort to bring up the subject of E.R.A., the Equal Right Amendment at this time. It's a terribly controversial subject and there is no reason in the world why we have to delete this provision from the Rules, which provides that Constitutional Amendment to the United States Constitution, require a hundred and seven votes. This is being litigated, it's a very hot issue, everybody knows all about it and why there should be this effort, at this time to slip through... quietly ah... a change to make Constitutional Amendments being ratified by a hundred and seven votes move that down to 89, I don't know, I think that we should take this up much... later, this is not the time to bring up in debate E.R.A."

Speaker Redmond: "I wonder if the Chair might indicate that the purpose of this is to get the temporary rules we were going to

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a request from the.... the Minority ah... for recommendations for Rules Committee, we will have hearings that will be debated fully... I believe the legislative section of the statutes provides that the old rules will prevail until new rules are adopted, now that's my intention... there is no ideal why, as far as I'm concerned, to slip anything through... it's merely temporary rules. And at this time I would like to recognize Representative Katz."

Katz: "Yes, ah... Mr. Speaker, I was going to suggest that maybe a simple solution to the problem, would simply be to adopt the Rule for the period of one week, a temporary rule and then we could deal with the problem next week and the following week, rather than getting into the battle of E.R.A. at this time. It seems to me to be rather futile and a waste of time."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Yes, Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Ah... my intention in raising this issue was persistly ah... that which Representative Deuster stated, and that is to avoid... any controversy about the required majority to ratify a Constitutional Amendment. Now, by dropping this provision out of rule 42, the rule comes forward with no majority specified, it does not say... ah... Representative Deuster, in it's.... in it's amended form, which will be the temporary rule that it will be 89 votes, it doesn't say any majority and the purpose is to permit that, as you rightly point out, very controversial issue to be considered in the first instance, by the Rules Committee. Ah... Representative Washburn, requested my assurance, and I believe Representative Berman's and received it, that there would be no attempt ah... to prevent that issue from being considered by the Rules Committee, or on the floor of the House. The whole purpose of this additional exclusion... in the new temporary rules is to prevent this issue from being considered at this time."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Fleck."

Fleck: "Well, I would submit along with Representative Deuster,

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that I think that this is highly improper at this time, to consider this rule, we know that the State Constitution requires a hundred and seven votes; it's being litigated right now and I see no reason why the House, in adopting rules, should try and overrule the Constitution of this State. Now, if this subject is going to tie up this House and bottle neck us again.... so that we can't get on with the orderly proceedings as having Committees established, named and selective Membership appointed... because we are going to be debating this issue, at this time I think the timing is improper, we should wait till the proper time to bring this up, and that isn't now."

Speaker Redmond: "Any body else want to talk... Representative Maragos."

Maragos: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, I would respectfully request of Representative Lundy, to withdraw his ah... position on this because we have got to get on with the rule.... the business of the House, and I don't think that this is the time, and I would respectfully request that he withdrawn his request that these temporary rules be adopted in the form that he has recommended at this time."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lundy, what is your position in respect to that request?"

Lundy: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I'm sorry that it's become an issue because the entire purpose of the proposed ah... change in House Resolution 10, was to prevent it from becoming an issue. Ah... I believe that the proper course for the House would be to simply ah... delete that paragraph from the rule, which would have the effect of not making it an issue, ah... however if there are Members who are concerned about it... with the assurance of the ah... ah... respected party leaders then I believe a ah... understanding was reached among the ah... party leaders, that this issue will be taken up by the Rules Committee in the first instance in so far as.... the permanent rules of the House of the 79th General Assembly is concerned, I would ah... withdrawn my request in modification of House Resolution 10"

Speaker Redmond: "Berman, Representative Berman, pardon me."

Berman: "In view of that then, the only paragraph from the old rules that's being deleted, will be the paragraph dealing with Committee and I would renew the motion to adopt House Resolution 10, as originally submitted to this body."

Speaker Redmond: "On the motion... Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Ah... in view of what's going on, I wonder if the Clerk would read the Resolution... ah... that we're going to vote on."

Speaker Redmond: "Read the Resolution."

O'Brien: "House Resolution 10, Berman. Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the 79th General Assembly of the State of Illinois, that the rules of the House of Representatives of the 78th General Assembly be adopted as a temporary rule of the House of Representatives of the 79th General Assembly. Subject to the following changes: 1. Paragraph 'a' of rule 14, be deleted. 2. Rule 1 is adopted as amended by House Resolution Number 1 of the 79th General Assembly. 3. Rule 2, is adopted as amended to read as follows: Majority and Minority Leadership, after the offices of the House have been elected, and before the any legislative business is transacted, the Speaker and Minority Leader shall appoint the Members of the Minority... Majority and Minority Leadership. The Speaker shall appoint one Majority Leader, three assistances, Majority Leader and Majority Whip. The Minority Leader is the Leader of the numerically strongest... the Minority Leader is the leader of the numerically strongest political party, other than the party to which the ah... Speaker belongs. The Minority shall appoint three Assistant Minority Leaders and two Minority Whips."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Gene Hoffman, the gentleman from DuPage."

Hoffman: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I would like to address a question to the proposer of this Resolution and let me just see if I heard him correct, ah... correctly. Fourteen... fourteen 'a', ah... has a list of the Committees, and you stated that we were deleting this in order



that the Speaker could determine the, set-up of the Committees, did you mean to say Speaker or did you mean to say Rules Committee?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Berman."

Berman: "Thank you, ah... you're right Gene and I appreciate the correction, it will be submitted and reported back by the Rules Committee as to the ah... ah... schedule of the Committee structure."

Hoffman: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion. Question is on the adoption of the Resolution, all in favor signify by saying "aye". Opposed. The "ayes" have it, the adopted Resolution is adopted and will be so placed in the Journal."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Ah... procedural question Mr. Speaker, don't we have to have a roll call on the adoption of Rule? Would the Parliamentarian advise us."

Speaker Redmond: "I think it would be probably be appropriate, so the Clerk will call the roll and.... Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Parliamentary inquire. Ah... we're not only adopting temporary rules but we are amending the rules, I'm wondering if it wouldn't also be appropriate to suspend rules so that we could amend them."

Speaker Redmond: "The Parliamentarian says that that isn't necessary and I will abide by his judgement."

Speaker Redmond: "Call the roll, please."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, and Members of the House. I arise to express my no vote on House Resolution Number 10, and to express my disappointment with the procedure that's being followed today. House Rule Number 10, purports to adopt as the temporary rules of this House and of this General Assembly, the rules of the 78th General Assembly. Now, if we would refer to the General Assembly Article, of the revised statute Section 22.3, we would find as follows: For the purpose of the organization and operation of the House of Representatives, the rules adopted by, and applicable to the regular Session of the House of Representatives of the preceding General Assembly, and as so far as such rules may be applicable, shall prevail and be the rules governing the House of Representatives of the General Assembly then convene until such rules are changed or new rules adopted. Number one, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I would say... with respect to adopting temporary rules, we already have them, by statute and therefore this Resolution is unnecessary. Number two, the intent and purport of this Resolution is not to adopt rules but, to amend rules, and to amend rules there is a specified procedure to be followed and



that's to the Rules Committee, and if we don't want to send them to the Rules Committee then we must suspend the rule, which has not been done today and therefore I vote no... again with an expression of disappointment by the procedure that is being followed here... on this day."

O'Brien: "Schneider. Schoeberlein. Schraeder. Schuneman. Sevcik. Sharp. Shea. Simms. Skinner. Stearney. E. G. Steele. C. M. Stiehl. Stone. Stubblefield. Taylor. Telcser. Terzich. Tipsword. Totten. Speaker Redmond: "Representative Collins."

Collins: "How am I recorded, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "How is the gentleman recorded?"

O'Brien: "The gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Collins: "Would you change that to 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative from Will, Representative Lein... Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Mr. Speaker, change me from 'aye' to 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Capuzi."

Capuzi: "Mr. Speaker, how am I recorded?"

Speaker Redmond: "How is he recorded?"

O'Brien: "Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Porter."

Porter: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, for the ah... reasons so ably expressed

Speaker Redmond: "Representative ah... what's her name ah...

O'Brien: "The gentleman is recorded as not voting."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Richmond.... Richmond."

Richmond: "Mr. Speaker, how am I recorded?"

O'Brien: "The gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Richmond: "Please change that to 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, how am I recorded?"



O'Brien: "The gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Griesheimer: "Change that to 'no', please."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider.... Representative Caldwell... Representative Washington... Representative Mugalian... he indicates 'no'. Representative Madison, Representative Madison how do you wish to be... 'no'. I wonder if it would be possible for all the Members to sit down, so that we could see those desiring recognition. The gentleman... I don't know your name... Winchester, Representative Winchester."

Winchester: "Mr. Speaker, how did I vote?"

O'Brien: "The gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Winchester: "Change that to 'no', please."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, would you change my 'aye' vote to 'no', please."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Rayson."

Rayson: "Mr. Speaker, ah... I raise a point of inquiry, I'm wondering if we might have a division on this question, it appears like ah... like ah... many of us want to adopt these rules, but there is a controversial section, perhaps if we have a division we could move ahead better, otherwise I'll vote mine ah... 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Wall... "

Speaker Redmond: "In this question there are, a hundred 'ayes' and what was the negative vote? 57 'nos', one present and the motion is adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McAvoy."

McAvoy: "How am I recorded on that, I've been trying to get your attention for about four minutes."

O'Brien: "The gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

McAvoy: "Change it to 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "For what purpose does the gentleman from Lake arise, Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, my light has been flashing too, I was seeking recognition to change my vote, from 'aye', the way



I believe it was recorded, to 'no'. And the light had been flashing for at least 10 minutes."

Speaker Redmond: "I ah... I have announced the roll call, the electrician hasn't been able to put the... the wires here, and there are no flashers on here and I'm very sorry, but it has carried, I would like to ah... I can assure the Membership that this is only an adoption of the temporary rules, we will have the permanent ones as quickly as we can. I would like to move to the matter of the adoption of ah... I mean to selections of seats and the other things which you have to do."

Speaker Redmond: "At this time... I wonder if the gentleman would ah... take their seats, it's a little bit difficult. I have a little trouble seeing over the top of this thing and ah... This time the Speaker would like to appoint the following Members of the House of Representatives to serve as the Majority Leadership of the House, the Representatives for the 79th Session. Majority Leader, Gerald W. Shea, Assistant Majority Leader, Corneal Davis, Assistant Majority Leader, Zeke Giorgi, Assistant Majority Leader, Michael J. Madigan, Majority Whip, Don Brummet Majority Whip. Gerald Bradley. And at this time I would like to make a public confession, that I made a mistake, I extended an invitation to one of my dear friends, who I thought would have served with the State to, I found out that I made a mistake and that was premature and I am publicly apologize to him and to everybody concerned.

Does the Chair recognizes the Minority Leadership."

Washburn: "Ah... thank you, ah... Mr. Speaker. I'm proud to announce ah... not a leadership team, but to ah... announce the leaders of a Republican team, comprised of 76, distinguished Members The Leadership ah... I feel are persons of integrity and honesty and dedication in different philosophies, and certainly ah... geographically located throughout the State, and they are Assistant Minority, Arthur Telcser, William Walsh, Celeste Stiehl.. Whips, Brian Duff and Timothy Simms."

Speaker Redmond: "These appointments have been committed to the



Clerk in writing and will be placed in the Journal."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea, for the purpose of offering a Resolution."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Resolution 11, reads as follows: Resolved, That the Clerk notify the Senate that the House is organized by the election of a Speaker and Clerk and other permanent officers, and is now ready to proceed with the business of the session, and I move for the adoption of the Resolution."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is the adoption of the Resolution, all those in favor signify by saying 'aye'. Opposed. Adopted and will be placed in the Journal."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Resolution Number 12, reads as follows: Resolved, That a Committee of nine members be appointed by the Speaker to wait upon the Governor and notify him that the House is organized by the election of a Speaker and Clerk and other permanent officers and is now ready to receive any communication which he may have to present. I would move for the adoption of the ah... Resolution."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye'. Opposed. The 'ayes' have it. The Resolution is adopted, and will be placed in the Journal."

Speaker Redmond: "I now appoint the Committee to call on the Governor. Representative Eugenia Chapman, Representative Ann Willer, Representative Wyvetter Younge, Representative Helen Satterthwaite, Representative Joe Fennessey, Representative Geokaris, Representative Mary Lou Kent, Representative Susan Catania, Representative Jane Barnes and may I caution Representative Fennessey to ah... to be very certain in effect."

Speaker Redmond: "Will the Committee meet, you have all have received your investiture. Representative Shea... no Representative Berman."

Berman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the



House. Ah... the following three Resolutions ah... deal with the seating of Independents. Ah... House Resolution Number 13, reads as follows: Be it resolved, By the House of Representatives of the 79th General Assembly of the State of Illinois, that the Honorable Thaddeus "Ted" Lechowicz, Representative from the 17th Legislative District, with his concurrence, be seated on the Democratic Party side of the House of Representatives, and be recognized, treated, and deemed, for all purposes of law, parliamentary practice, and legislative procedure under the Constitution and legislatives rules as a member of the Democratic Party for the term of the 79th General Assembly, notwithstanding his election as an independent without benefit of party label. I move the adoption of House Resolution Number 13."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved for the suspension of rule and immediate consideration of the House Resolution. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye'. Opposed. The 'ayes' have it."

Speaker Redmond: "Now on the... the ah... Resolution, the adoption of the Resolution. Question on the adoption of the three Resolutions. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye'. Opposed. The 'ayes' have it. The Resolution is adopted and will be placed in the Journal. Representative Berman."

Berman: "The motion was to suspend and adopt Resolution 13, House Resolution 14, ah... is to the same effect that affects Representative Lawrence DiPrima and House Resolution 15, affects Representative Taylor Pounce. I would move for the suspension of the appropriate rules and immediate adoption of House Resolution 14, and House Resolution 15."

Speaker Redmond: "All in favor indicate by saying 'aye'. Opposed. The rules have been suspended, now the question is the adoption of the Resolution. All in favor signify by saying 'aye'. Opposed. The Resolution is adopted.... will be placed in the Journal."

Speaker Redmond: "There has been a request made that a section of the House floor, be set aside for non-smokers. This poses a ah... very serious problem in logistics and the plan is that...



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to set aside enough seats, right here in front of the ah... what used to be the Republican side, for the non-smokers. We have no idea how many non-smokers there are who want to sit... ah... in pure atmosphere, so should those non-smokers kinda raise their hands and see if we... it looks like ah... I really don't know how we're going to handle this, it would of course be the front seats here, and some Democrats ah... of course some of them will probably be over here anyway. Another show on the Democratic side, please... ah... their's Dunn ah... Marovitz, Barnes, Choate and Madison... Wonder if we could stand at ease and maybe the Minority Leader could... it seems like you have the ah... hosts of saints, may you can... the House will be at ease for 5 minutes."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come back to order. I'm sorry to say, that it looks like the possibility of... of arriving at a successful solution to the non-smoking thing is beyond my ken, so I think that under the rules that we should proceed to the next order of business, which is the selection of permanent seats and if after that has been done, if they can work anything out among themselves... fine. I hear a name but I can't ah... Representative Skinner, he was hiding behind the flowers."

Skinner: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, I'm sorry my flowers aren't as fresh as yours, they have been here since we were sworn in. Ah... I stand to remind those Members who have been in the General Assembly for at least two years, that two years ago, almost to the day, well to the day of choosing seats. A Representative from the First Ward stood up, Representative Arrigo, and basically pleaded for his life. He said, I have had one of my lungs cut out, and I don't want to have to sit with smokers, now some of us who are raising our hands just find smoking personally offensive there are others, such as myself who are certified to be allergic to cigarette smoke and it seems to me that if not in memory to Representative Arrigo, then in consideration to some of the others of us who are... who have negative reaction to... to cigarettes and cigar smoke, that you should make a stronger effort to find some



section that we may spend the next two years in a healthful atmosphere."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Washburn, do you have any... helpful suggestions."

Washburn: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, I had consulted with those down in the front rows here that ah... nobody seems to have any objection on my side that perhaps the first two rows, or a portion of the third could be used for that purpose, but apparently they are going to have to work it out for themselves ah... I would suggest, maybe that non-smokers attempt to find seats down in this area and I think that's about the best we can do under the circumstances, if you're not going to designate ah... ah... specific spot for each party."

Speaker Redmond: "It appears to the Chair that the Republicans will honor the suggestion of their Leader, and then the choice of seats, the people that... by virtue of seniority might be able to select a seat in the front rows if they will refrain from that and ah... move back ah... maybe that would be accomplished. I wanted to get this job done... and ah... I would ask the Republicans to ah... work that out among themselves, we don't be seeming.... very.... for this purpose we must recess the House, to clear the floor."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Ah... Mr. Speaker of the House, Ladies and Gentlemen. Representative Fennessey, with his delegation of ah... the ah... the Lady Members of the House appointed to report to the Governor that the House was ah... organized the wave of communications... ah... dutifully performed their duties except that the Governor was not in."

Speaker Redmond: "I wonder.... I wonder if.... I wonder if the Chair might... might inquire of the Ladies from Lake County, if you are proud of Representative Fennessey and his conduct."

Geo-Karis: "Ah... I have never had it so good, but I had my eye on him first."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummet."

Brummet: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. We have a young colleague today here today with a Birthday, Chuck Keller, and I wonder if we might get Representative Tipsword and Representative Geo-Karis to sing Happy Birthday to him."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "In that connection, Mr. Speaker, there is a Resolution on the Clerks desk and ah... I wanted to ask Representative Geo-Karis, if she gave the Governor any message from her Buddy Joe Lucco."

Speaker Redmond: "I may... I may say that... that we aren't going to be able to select seats if we... don't get off what where... 12 o'clock we have a Joint Session, I would prefer that we get the seats and then pass on to that order, if it's satisfactory."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, clear the floor... on the double." The Clerk has prepared stickers, which you should have affix... it says here affix to your seat, but I don't think that's really appropriate. Affix to the chair, of the desk, voting console, I understand is the correct word. The Democratic Members will occupy 11 seats on the Republican side, which the seats which have been selected for this purpose are the first three rows on the inside bank of the Republican side and the first two aisle seats in the fourth row, next to the center aisle and the House is in recess while we're clearing the floor. Will the leaders select their seats.... have all the leaders selected their... voting console."

O'Brien: "16 Terms, Randolph. 15 Terms, McAvoy. Choate. 11 Terms, Robert Craig. John Fary. 10 Terms, Louie Capuzi. 9 Terms, Jack Hill. 8 Terms, Garmisa and McPartlin. 7 Terms, Mann. Neff. Merlo. DiPrima. Friedrich and Leon. 6 Terms, Wall. Campbell. Eugenia Chapman. Washington. Hanahan. J. D. Jones. Schoeberlein. Katz. Fennessey. Schlickman. Rayson. Stone. and Pierce. Please stick these on your consoles, so they can wire your voting machine. 5 Terms, Klosak. Yourell. Sevcik. Gene Hoffman. Brinkmeier. McLendon. Tipsword. Yourell."

seats. The hour having arrived for the purpose of a Joint

Session of the Senate and House of Representatives, for the purpose which ah... the inauguration of the Honorable Alan J. Dixon, Treasurer of the State of Illinois."

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Doorkeeper, is the Senate ready to be admitted to the Chambers? No... The House will be at ease until the Senate arrives."

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Doorman, you have ah... the Doorman advises us that the Senate is ah... ready to enter the Chamber, and the Senate, preceded by President and Secretary appears in the hall of the House of Representatives. By direction of the Speaker take seats assigned to them. Will the Senate please enter the House Chambers. Here comes the Senate... Here comes the Senate... "

O'Brien: " Is Buck Simmons from Madison County here, would you please come up to the rostrum."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come to order. President of the Senate, would he advise us whether or not there is a quorum of the Senate."

President Partee: "Mr. Speaker, a quorum of the Senate is present."

Speaker Redmond: "There is a quorum of the House of Representatives and therefore, a majority of each House being present I announce that the Joint Session is duly formed. The Chair recognizes Representative Shea, for the purpose of introducing a Resolution."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, will the Clerk read the Resolution, please."

O'Brien: "Senate.... Joint Session Resolution Number 1, Resolved that a Joint Committee of 10 be appointed, five from the House by the Speaker of the House. Five from the Senate by the Committee of the Senate to escort the Honorable Alan J. Dixon, to the Hall of the House of Representatives, for his inauguration as Treasurer of the State of Illinois."

Speaker Redmond: "You have heard the Resolution, all in favor signify by saying 'aye'. Opposed. The Resolution is adopted. The Chair appointes Senator Donnewald, of course on recommendation of the President of the Senate, I don't want you to think that I've... usurp any of his prerogative. Senator Donewald, Senator Hall,



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Senator Vadalabene, Senator Bell, Senator Merritt. And the Speaker appoints Representative Reed, Representative Dyer, Representative Calvo, Representative Boyle, and Representative Sharp. Will you please assemble and escort the Treasurer into the Chamber."

Speaker Redmond: "Doorkeeper, do you have an announcement?"

Speaker Redmond: "The Committee appointed to escort the State Treasurer and State Treasurer and his party are at the door, let them be admitted."

Speaker Redmond: "The Honorable Mr. Justin Goldenhersh, will administer the Oath."

Goldenhersh: "Raise your right hand and repeat after me: I do solemnly swear."

Dixon: "I do solemnly swear."

Goldenhersh: "That I will support the Constitution of the United States."

Dixon: "That I will support the Constitution of the United States."

Goldenhersh: "And the Constitution of the State of Illinois."

Dixon: "And the Constitution of the State of Illinois."

Dixon: "Lieutenant Governor Hartigan, Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, Members of the Senate and House, Ladies and Gentlemen. Twenty-four years ago this month, I came to this place and took a seat in the rear of this Chamber, as a twenty-three year old freshman Member of this House. Adlai Stevenson, was Governor of Illinois and Everett McKinley Dirksen had just been sent to the Senate

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of the United States where he would become a giant among his leaders. MacCarthyism and Korea was a great national issue. Ladies and Gentlemen, the Illinois budget that year, for the biennium was a little over one billion dollars, Martin Konnelley was Mayor of Chicago, there were a hundred and fifty-three House Members, fifty-one Senate Members, nobody had ever heard of one man, one vote, and the Chicago Herald American had the best funny papers in America. Since that time, the people of my district and now the people of Illinois have given me the opportunity to serve 12 years in this House, 8 years in the Senate and 4, as Treasurer of Illinois. It's a privilege for which I am humbly grateful, if I take the liberty today of suggesting to you therefore, a course of conduct that I believe would be wise for you to follow, I hope you will not consider it presumptuous of me, you must remember in all those years, for the Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, and six as a party floor leader in the Senate, I learned a lot about this Illinois Government, enough to make me feel that I can objectively state to you today that I believe I know as much about this Government, the budget and how it functions as any man can know. Let me assure you my message will be brief, but I would like to discuss three matters with you that I regard as important consideration if you are to have a successful Session of the General Assembly. First, be kind to the Minority... remember you will be one again someday... I figured that would get a cheer. I know that my colleagues on the Democratic side grow tired of hearing me preach this, but in all my years of service the Democrats have been a true Majority in the House only twice, in 1959 and 1965, and we never before in my time achieved a true Majority in the Senate. I served as a leader in the Senate, when we were out-numbered two to one, and I can personally assure everyone here of the fact, that nothing is more frustrating than serving in a democratic body with a small 'd' that is democratic in name only. I have resented Government by Majority caucus, Government by Leadership direction and Government by Executive decree as a Member of

the Minority and shall resent it even more as a Member of the Majority. Give the Minority a full opportunity to be heard, take no advantage, remember... they just could be right and conduct your business so that, when it's done you'll be satisfied that every... Illinoisan, of every political persuasion and point of view had a chance to present, his or her case. Fight here for your rights and that of your constituents, but never be small. Listen to the Lobbyist, he serves a legitimate function, but remember the ordinary citizen has no Lobby, never compromise your vote, it isn't worth it, but, compromise on the issue when it's necessary, Government can't function without it. Finally, finally remember this... however high you go or wherever destiny takes you, you will never serve with a finer or more representative group of citizens again, in your life... enjoy it, few are granted this delightful privilege. Second, I strongly urge you to immediately take the hard, but necessary step to improve the image of the Legislature, as a man who sincerely loves the Legislative branch and particularly the Illinois Legislature I'm genuinely concerned about it's lowest state with the people generally. Many of you know that no one in Illinois does a role in roastbeef circuit more than your State Treasurer and I can personally assure you that every Kiwanis, Rotary Exchange, Chamber of Commerce or Labor Meetings I attend, the subject finally turns to the Legislators: you are the Board of Directors of a Corporation who's annual budget exceeds 8 and ½ billion dollars and as such... I believe that you should have the salary and emoluments of office to accompany that responsibility. On the other hand, I believe that you should discharge the duties of your office in such a way... as to give evidence of the sound business acumen that warrants your high position and your awesome responsibility. As one, who has consistently opposed budget session, I still believe the experiment has failed, I believe Illinois would be better served and would achieve substantial savings by limiting the session in the even numbered years, to budgetary session only, it should

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be remembered that the Governor or Legislative leaders can call special sessions when any emergency exist, I believe the Senate was wise to adopt Senator Rock's Resolution, introduced at my request, which would have submitted such a Constitutional Amendment to the people of Illinois and I regret very much that his Resolution failed to achieve the necessary 3/5's Majority in the House. I have again requested that Senator Rock, introduce this Resolution and I would once again urge you to adopt this, so that the people of this State can vote on the proposition in the nineteen-hundred seventy-six election. But, more important than this question is the orderly disposition of the Legislator's business, through-out the Session and with special emphases on avoiding the tragic last minute rush that has brought this General Assembly into frequent disrepute, I've said many times that my first Session in 1951, under Speaker Warren Wood, of Plainfield, who incidentally, was a very fine Speaker, ajourned on June 29th with a clear Calendar. As time went on however, we began the fixing of stopping that clock, at midnight on June 30th and working just a few hours longer by the time I was a Senior House Member and Chairman of the Judiciary, we were stopping that clock and working until dawn and by the time I was a Member of the Senate, we were stopping the clock over there and working until almost noon, the next day and as you know... the last session of this Legislature went into a number of additional days and I suggest that before long, you'll be stopping the clock at midnight on June 30th and working until snow is falling on the Capitol grounds, unless something traumatic and hard nosed is done about the Joint Rules of the House and the Senate. I am absolutely confident that the State's business can not be carefully and diligently considered and the Legislator's image can not be improved until firm... inflexible rules are adopted insuring the careful and the deliberate consideration of the peoples' business. Duplication of Legislation in both Houses should be abolished and it should be grounds for the mandatory tabling of Legislation, that it's duplication of legislation introduced on an earlier occasion in

the other House. By Request Bills, ought to be abolished but most important of all there should be a mandatory deadline for the introduction of Bills, there should be a requirement that a Bill be heard in Committee and on Second and Third Readings by a date certain the same rules should apply in a similar way in the House, not of origin, and there should be no exceptions to the rule. Note, that I have capitalized and underlined those last few words, there should be no exceptions to the rules, for those words... are the key to the success of the rule, if you are to make an exception to the rule for Administration Bills, for Revenue Bills for Bills of Elected State Officials, Bills for the Speaker, Bills for the President, Bills for the Legislative Leaders or anybody else.... then you have failed, only a hard strict rule will succeed, only a rule that treats Dan Walker, my colleague, Neil Hartigan, Bill Scott, George Lindberg and George, forgive me for not recognizing you when I was making my introductory remarks, our great Comptroller, George Lindberg... Cecil Partee, Bill Redmond and Alan Dixon the same as John Doe will succeed and to those who say that emergencies can arise and that there should be exceptions for emergencies, I say there are special Sessions for emergencies and that is enough. The people want deliberate, thoughtful, careful, fair... government and Ladies and Gentlemen they ought to have it. Finally, I believe the most important single thing that you can do in this Session, is ask yourself this question, on each piece of legislation you consider... Can we afford it... can we afford it. I'm afraid my answer to that question, in most cases has to be, no. Illinois fiscal position is a truly precarious one, we are beginning to experience the first very pronounced forewarning of a growing national recession, in terms of its impact upon our own revenue picture in this State. I suppose, I ought to give you the good news first, the good news that we will end this fiscal year 1975. with a balance of approximately three-hundred fifty-million dollars, assuming no sufficient changes in existing conditions between now and June 30, 1975. Assuming last period spending of approximately one-hundred and seventy-five million

dollars, and I assume that, we spent a hundred sixty-five million last year in the last year in the lapse period. Illinois should enter fiscal year 1976 with a real surplus of only about a hundred and seventy-five million dollars, in my judgement, Ladies and Gentlemen this means that we can probably get through fiscal 1976 without any new Revenue needs of a substantial character but, unfortunately that is about the end of the good news. On the Debit side, one would have to observe that the State has experienced a loss in its reserve, assuming the accuracy of our figures of a hundred-fourteen million dollars in a year, or nearly 40% of its reserve this last year, the State clearly can not absorb another loss of this magnitude during fiscal 1976 without jeopardizing the level of services it now provides. To say nothing at all of any new legislative proposals for 1976, in addition, the accelerated revenue growth of the past 18 months, due to inflation is beginning to slow down. Due to one, a depressed consumer sentiment, which is effecting the growth of retail sales and thus the sales tax yield, and too, rising unemployment and declining Cooperate profit which is effecting the growth of the income tax yield. We have experienced a drop in anticipated growth in sales tax yield, for the last two months of November and December in that period, of twenty-two million dollars and we're not at all optimistic about the January yield, for this month which will reflect our Christmas retail sales, and which, as you know, is historically our best month. My staff advises me that in real terms, Christmas buying overall in Illinois declined about 5% this year. In summary the recession's dollar value impact on the States two largest Revenue producers is very difficult to pin point however, in general terms, the economic role could easily cost Illinois as much as seventy-five million dollars, by June 30, 1975, in reduced yield from the income and the sales tax. I can only leave you with this advice concerning the future, if you don't want to be setting in that seat, sometime in the very near, and foreseeable future considering a very unpleasant and unpalatable tax increase that may materially damage your own re-election hopes, be parsimonious... in conclusion, let me say

thanks, thanks from the bottom of my heart, thanks for all the good fights in these Halls and on the House seat and thanks for the moments together as friendly adversaries that followed those great battles, thanks for the lifetime friendships, on both sides of this aisle many of the deepest ones with Republican colleagues of over two decades that have made my service very rewarding. Thanks, for the sadness and for the joy of it, for the failures and the triumphs, thank for the times that wouldn't fit together and for the times that every piece had its place, thanks for the time I sat in the football stadium in St. Louis, on a Sunday and thought I was a candidate for United States Senator, only to find out at the half, that I wasn't, Jim, thanks for the call. Thanks for the time I carried 89 of a 102 Counties and won the greatest Democratic victory by a State Candidate, in the history of Illinois politics, by 842,000 votes. Thanks my friends, I wouldn't swap one precious second of any precious minute of any day, month or year, for all the money in the world or for all the power in the universe."

Speaker Redmond: "Will the Committee, previously appointed come forward and escort the Treasurer from the Chambers."

President Partee: "If there is no further business to come before the Joint Session, I now move that the Joint Session do now arise."

Speaker Redmond: "You have heard the motion, all in favor signify by saying 'aye'. Opposed. The 'ayes' have it, carried and so registered in the Journal"

Speaker Redmond: "For purpose of an announcement this is relatively unimportant but the supplemental checks will be in the Speaker's office in about five minutes."

Speaker Redmond: "I wonder if the Members listen to an announcement, I waited intention until the Senate had adjourned and had left the Chambers, because we have a new Member on the Democratic side that used to play ball for the Chicago Cubs and he has with him here today a former Cub Player, Bob Wills, I wonder where Bob Will is... there he is in the back. And the former Cub, that is a

member here now is Jessie White and I didn't want to scare the Senatetoo much, to let them know that we had a former professional ball player."

Speaker Redmond: "Will the Doorkeeper, please close the doors? I never knew why the previous Speakers used to ~~ask the Members to please take their seats, until now.~~ Will you please take your seats, we have a little business to do."

Speaker Redmond: "The Chair recognizes Representative Shea, for the purpose of introducing a Resolution."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, would you ask the Clerk to read the Resolution, please."

O'Brien: "House Resolution 6, Fary et al. House Resolution 16, Merlo, et al. House Resolution 17, Hart, et al. House Resolution 18, VonBoeckman. House Resolution 19, Geo-Karis, et al. House Resolution 20, Lemke, et al. House Resolution 21, Cunningham. House Resolution 22, Juckett. House Resolution 23, Nardulli. House Resolution 24, DiPrima, et al."

Speaker Redmond: "These are the Agreed Resolutions, all in favor... Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, "These are the Agreed Resolutions, they are all Congratulatory except House Resolution 16, which recreates the House Condominium Study Committee and sets a reporting date of March 3, 1974... 1975, so with... with regards to all except 16, I would now move for the adoption of the Resolutions."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? All in favor signify by saying 'aye'. Opposed. Resolutions are adopted and shall be..."

Shea: "Now... now with regards to House Resolution Number 16, with leave of the House I would ask to use the Attendance roll call for the passage of that, it does require a roll call vote and it requires 89. So, in order to facilitate the passage of it and save the time of the House, I would ask leave of the House to use the attendance roll call."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Would the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Shea: "Yes."

Walsh: "What's the reporting date for that Committee."

Shea: "March 3, 1975."

Walsh: "Why is it that soon."

Shea: "It has been in existence and it's just a recreation of it, ah... I think you could probably ask Mr. Telcser, better than I, he and Mr. Merlo are joint sponsors of the Resolution."

Walsh: "Well...there is going to be all new Members on it, we're in a new Session of the General Assembly, it seems to me that ah... what has been done before is going to have to be re-done."

Shea: "Might I yield to Mr. Merlo, for an explanation please."

Merlo: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, and Members of the House. The 78th General Assembly recognizing the Condominium phenomenon as a issue of great controversy and concern, created this condominium Study Committee. This Committee has been conducting a comprehensive and exhausted study and also public hearings, throughout the State and however, it has directed itself to the ownership and the ah... construction, sales and management of Condominium properties. We were suppose to report back to this body on January 8, 1975, however, we found ourselves unable to meet this deadline date and all we're asking for an extension of time... to report to the General Assembly and the date certain is March 3, of this year and, so I'm asking ah... ah... respectively requesting leave of the House for the suspension of Rule 41 'a', for the immediately adoption of the Resolution."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I'm... I'm more concerned with the procedure than I am with the substance now I had another Member ask that a Property Tax Study Commission be recreated, so that ah... they could function in exactly the same way and I'm... I suppose there... anyone that has been here before has an interest in a Commission or Committee that they would like to do the same thing with, but that isn't the way the thing works, we have all new people here. Ah... I don't have any objection to this but ah... maybe you'd talk to Cal Skinner, and make a deal with him about

recreating his Commission and anyone else who might have something of interest."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Ah... Bill, Cal's already been over to see me on that one, we're working on that Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further, Representative Shea."

Shea: "With... with... with leave of the House, I'd ask that ah... the attendance roll call be used for the passage of Resolution House Resolution 16."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? So ordered."

Shea: "And then we have one more Resolution ah... by Corneal Davis, House Resolution 25, ah... it's a Birthday Resolution for Representative Gaines, and I would move for the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "All in favor signify by saying 'aye'. Opposed. The Resolution adopted."

Shea: "And I would remind the House that House Resolution 17, is a Congratulatory Resolution on our good friend Chuck Keller, on today being his Birthday."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, ah... I've had a request from the sponsors if the Clerk would read House Resolution 17."

O'Brien: "House Resolution 17. Whereas, on January 22, 1939 the City of Effingham was blessed with the birth of a great leader and Statesman; and whereas, this politically precocious young man has lived up to all expectations of his family, friends and community; and whereas, The Democratic Party and the people of the State of Illinois expect this able legislator to rise to even greater heights in the years to come; and whereas, The Members of the Illinois House of Representatives wish to join with his wife, Nome, and his children Chuckie and Keidrah in celebrating the 36th birthday of their friend, Chuck; Now, Therefore be it Resolved by the Members, that we wish Representative Charles Keller a very happy birthday, and best wishes for a long and happy life."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart, are you objecting."

Hart: "Ah... no ah... I think we ought to follow our time honored tradition of having Geo, and Tip lead us in... Happy Birthday."



Speaker Redmond: "Who did you recommend would be the song bird. Representative Hart, will you lead us in Happy Birthday please."

Hart: "I hate to break tradition... but for Chuck Keller I'll do anything."

Hart & Geo-Karis: "Happy Birthday to you, Happy Birthday to you, Happy Birthday dear Charlie, Happy Birthday to you."

Speaker Redmond: "Thank you very much. Representative Keller."

Keller: "Thank... Thank you, Mr. Speaker and I just noticed, I didn't know if there was anything done and thanks to every Member in here, to ah... see that that became House Resolution 17. That has a sufficient resemblance on this side of the aisle right now."

Speaker Redmond; "Anything else Mr. Clerk, further Resolutions."

O'Brien: "House Resolution 29, Deuster."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll sent... assign those to Committee. Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, the adjournment Resolution is on the Clerk's desk and wondering if he might read it."

Speaker Redmond: "Read the Resolution."

O'Brien: "House Joint Resolution 3, Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the 79th General Assembly, the State of Illinois. Lessaris. House Resolution 27, Capuzi et al. In memory of Mrs. Frieda Crane Zlatnik. House Resolution 28, Emil Jones et al. In memory of Melvin McNairy.

Shea: Mr. Speaker, I would now move for the adoption of the Death Resolutions."
