2nd Legislative Day

January 13, 1983

Speaker Madigan: "The House shall come to order. The Members shall be in their chairs. The House shall come to order. Members shall be in their chairs. We will be led in prayer today by the Reverend Bill Peckham with the Contact Ministries in Springfield, Illinois. Reverend."

Reverend Peckham: "Let us bow in prayer. Father, we've gathered here as ordinary men and women who have been charged with the extraordinary task of representing and making decisions about the destinies of many people. We are also at the threshold of a new era in this Assembly. Help us. Help us to be guided by You. Help us to be sensitive to the hurts, and needs, and dreams and fears of those we represent. Speaker Madigan: "Thank you. The plan at this time is to stand
at ease for an early lunch. Is there anyone who wishes to

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, the record should indicate that
Representative Huff is absent due to illness."

Speaker Madigan: "Let the record so show. Alright. At this
time, we shall stand at ease until 12:30; and, while at
ease and in Perfunctory Session, the Clerk shall read into
the record those Bills which have been pre-filed. Mr.
Daniels. Mr. Daniels at Mr. Telcser's chair."

Daniels: "Mr. Speaker, just for the convenience of the Members on
the Republican side, if you'd listen to me for just a

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moment. As you all know, we're going to come back for seat assignments when we return; and, as you're looking at the seats that you'd like to occupy, might I advise you that the rows on the chart that you have starting between 12 and 18 and between 29 and 37 will be non-smoking rows. Thank you."

Speaker Madigan: "The House will come to order. The House will come to order. The Members will be in their chairs. All unauthorized persons shall please leave the floor. Ladies and Gentlemen, I regret to tell you that we'll have to stand at ease for an additional 15 minutes. I will be conferring with Representative Daniels before we go to

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Conference. So, if you will just stand at ease for an additional 15 minutes. Thank you. - The House shall come to order. The Members shall be in their chairs. The House shall come to order. The Members shall be in their chairs. Does anyone know, on the Republican side, if Mr. Daniels plans to come to the floor? You don't know. Because, at this time, we are prepared to go to Conference, and the Democrats will meet... The Chair recognizes Mr. Friedrich."

Friedrich: "There will be a Republican Conference in room 118, immediately upon your recessing."

Speaker Madigan: "And the Democrats will meet in room 114. Is there any further business to come before the Body? Fine. We shall stand in recess for Party Conferences. After the Conferences, we shall return to the floor for the purpose of selecting seats and then later selecting offices. Thank you."

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker? Mr. Speaker, could you tell us approximately how much time that you anticipate using?"

Speaker Madigan: "Well, I would hope about five or ten minutes..."

Friedrich: "I think we need at least..."

Speaker Madigan: "Hope reigns eternal in this world, especially in the House of Representatives."

Friedrich: "I think we'd like to have at least thirty."

Speaker Madigan: "Thirty minutes?"

Friedrich: "Yes."

Speaker Madigan: "That would be fine. Thirty minutes. Thank you. - The House will come to order. The Members shall be in their chairs. Thank you. The House shall come to order. The Members shall be in their chairs. We shall now proceed to the selection of seats, which is done according to seniority. The Clerk shall read the names of those who shall select their seats according to seniority. And..."

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Ladies and Gentlemen, while we are waiting for the Clerk to come to the podium with the seniority list, I would like to announce the names of the Members of the Democratic Leadership. Serving as the Majority Leader will be Representative James McPike. The following people will serve as Assistant Majority Leaders: Representative Giorgi, Representative Greiman, Representative Matijevich and Representative Pouncey. The following two Members will serve as Majority Whips: Representative Capparelli and Representative Breslin. And Representative Yourell will serve as the Chairman of the Conference. Mr. Clerk, are you prepared to begin the seat selection? The Clerk shall read the names in order of priority. The Doorkeeper has asked me to ask the Members not to attempt to move their drawers when they move their seats. The Doorkeeper claims that that reigns havoc with the keys that are used to open the drawers. So, if you'd please leave the drawers where they are when you move your seat. Are we ready, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Leadership should first select their seats. Leadership, I have stickers here that I will call your name. When I call your name, please pick up this sticker, select your desk and then put this on the voting console so we can follow up later and identify the desks that you've selected. I'll give Joe Lucco the Democrat Leadership. Republican Leadership is already handed out. The Democrat Leadership finished, Joe Lucco? You all finished? Eleven termers, eleven termers, DiPrima and Neff. Ten termers, Representative Pierce. All nine termers are in Leadership. Eight terms, Representative Tuerk and Representative Vittek. Seven termers, Monroe Flinn, Representative McMaster, Representative Laurino, Representative Terzich and Representative Jaffe. Six termers, Representative Giglio,

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Representative McAuliffe, Representative Ebbesen, Representative Ralph Dunn and Representative Farley. Five termers; and, as I draw these in random, I'm numbering them in case of a tie-breaking situation. Bruce Richmond, LeRoy Van Dyne, Mrs. Satterthwaite, Marco Domico, Winchester, Mrs. Younge, Mulcahey, Mautino, Leverenz, Huff, John Dunn and Jane Barnes. Have all five termers completed selecting your desks? If so, we'll start on the four termers. Woods Bowman, Sam Wolf, Rich Brummer, Ray Christensen, Tim Johnson, Jim Reilly, Terry Steczo, Larry Stuffle and Jesse White. We'll give the four termers a moment to select their desks before we start on the three termers. Have all three termers... or all four termers finished selecting their desks? Are we ready for three termers? Representative Slape, Representative Woodyard, Representative Kulas, Representative Henry, Representative Preston, Representative Karpziel, Representative Keane, Representative Levin, Representative Nash, Representative Oblinger, Representative Piel, Representative Rea, Representative Ronan, Representative Krska, Representative Ropp, Representative Alexander, Representative Birkinbine, Representative Braun, Representative Bullock, Representative Currie, Representative Virginia Frederick and Gary Hannig. We'll give the three termers a moment to select their desks."

Clerk Leone: "Continuing, if we've adopted... if the Members have selected seats for third termers. We'll continue with second termers now. Representative Olson, Representative Tate, Representative O'Connell, Representative Nelson, Representative Mays, Representative Saltsman, Representative Topinka, Representative Rhen, Representative Zwick, Representative Hastert."

Speaker Madigan: "Representative Greiman."

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Clerk Leone: "Representative Klemm, Representative Koehler, Representative Deuchler. We'll wait for a short while for all Members... second-term Members to select their seats. Starting with freshman Members, Representative Harris, Representative Berrios, Representative Kirkland, Representative Wait, Representative Wojcik, Representative Brunsvold, Representative Churchill, Representative Hensel, Representative Brookins, Representative Hawkinson, Representative Hicks, Representative Pangle, Representative Rice, Representative Homer, Representative Hutchins, Representative Didrickson, Representative Panayotovich. Continuing again, Representative McGann, Representative Doyle, Representative Cowlshaw, Representative Cowlshaw, Representative Shaw, Representative Barger, Representative McCracken, Representative DeJaegher, Representative Marzuki, Representative William Peterson..."

Speaker Greiman: "Former Representative Collins is on the floor today with us."

Clerk Leone: "Representative LeFlore, Representative Bernard Pedersen, Representative Curran. That concludes the freshman class. I would ask that all of you place those prominently on the desk so that name plaques that have been printed can be properly placed."

Speaker Greiman: "Alright. Messages from the Senate."

Clerk Leone: "A Message from the Senate by Mr. Wright, Secretary.
'Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has adopted the following Senate Joint Resolution an adoption of which I am instructed to ask concurrence of the House of Representatives, to wit; Senate Resolution #4. Resolved by the Senate of the 83rd General Assembly of the State of Illinois that the Senate inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has now organized by the

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election of a President, Secretary and other permanent officers and are now ready to proceed with the business of the Session. Adopted by the Senate January 12, 1983. Kenneth Wright, Secretary."

Speaker Greiman: "Okay. Would any of the Members indicate where there might be open seats on the Democratic side? We'd like to keep them on one side. Thanks a lot for the help, though. Representative Matijevich, are you... For what purpose does the Gentleman from Lake arise, Representative Matijevich?"

Matijevich: "Tom Hanahan's seat. Mr. Speaker, I'd like to have leave to suspend the provisions of Rule 18, the posting notice, so that the Rules Committee can meet next week to consider House Resolution 4. We've cleared this with the Minority Leader, Lee Daniels."

Speaker Greiman: "Alright. Does the Gentleman have leave to waive the posting requirements of Rule 18(k) regarding the posting of notice of the Rules Committee? Leave. Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Also, as the Speaker announced yesterday, anybody who has any proposal on rules change ought to be at that meeting so we can consider any changes to our rules."

Speaker Greiman: "Alright, we'll make that announcement, perhaps, before we adjourn, Sir. Then, the Gentleman has leave to waive the requirements of Rule 18(k) for the posting of rules for... What date is that, Mr. Matijevich?"

Matijevich: "Next Wednesday."

Speaker Greiman: "For next... For Wednesday the 19th day of January, 1983. Hearing no objections, the Gentleman has leave. For what purpose does the Gentleman from DeWitt arise? Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would sincerely hope that you didn't fail to call on me to get past the objection period,

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because I didn't intend to object. But I did have an inquiry of the Chair. Will we be provided with copies of rules proposals in advance of the Rules meeting that you folks might have?"

Speaker Greiman: "You mean in advance of the Rules Committee meeting?"

Vinson: "Yes, and I would think that that would be more than five minutes in advance."

Speaker Greiman: "Well, if there is a Resolution which is adopted... which is filed, you will have access to that Resolution, of course, but Resolutions can be filed at that time. Committee Bills could be adopted at that time; and, of course, you have the... the temporary rules that we adopted on yesterday."

Vinson: "Mr. Speaker, I thought that you just asked leave to waive the rule in regard to Resolutions, not in regard to Bills."

Speaker Greiman: "Posting Resolutions with respect to the Rules Committee meeting to consider the permanent rules of this House."

Vinson: "Well, Mr... you indicated that Bills could be considered, and I thought that Mr. Matijevich just suggested waiving the rule with regard to Resolutions."

Speaker Greiman: "Well, if I said Bills, we will not... the Rules Committee doesn't, in this Session... this year, consider Bills. It considers Resolutions to amend or adopt the rules and not Bills."

Vinson: "Okay. Then back to the substance of my inquiry. When would we be apprised any rules proposal changes that the Majority Leadership might want to have considered at that meeting? I mean, we have no desire to tie your hands in a fashion that you can't have the meeting when you want to have it, but we would like to know in advance of the

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meeting what those might be so that we would have some time to put some thought in on the subject."

Speaker Greiman: "Well, certainly at the time of the meeting, you would be given whatever proposals they might have, and there is time then to adopt any Amendments that might come after that, since there's a special order of business set for the 26th."

Vinson: "Well, it just seems reason..."

Speaker Greiman: "I can't tell you that you'll be given them, because I'm not sure that they've all been established, frankly, at this point."

Vinson: "It would just seem reasonable that, if we're waiving that posting requirement, that you might give us a couple of days of advance warning so that we will understand what those are and can participate in a meaningful fashion in the meeting."

Speaker Greiman: "Well, you know, that you'd have to take up with people who might be offering rule changes, Resolutions. You might confer with the Chairman of Rules. "

Vinson: "Who would that be?"

Speaker Greiman: "Well, Mr. Matijevich, I believe, will probably be the Chairman of Rules."

Vinson: "Mr. Matijevich is the Chairman of the Rules Committee?"

Speaker Greiman: "He's asked for a waiver. I assume that's correct. He's in the Chair."

Vinson: "I wonder then if I might put my inquiry to him."

Speaker Greiman: "Indeed. Proceed."

Vinson: "Representative, would it be possible for you to give us a couple of days, in advance of the Rules Committee meeting, rules proposals which the Democratic Leadership might be advancing at that meeting so that we could take a look at them?"

Matijevich: "I'll do the best I can. I'll do the best I can. If

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I have something in front of me, I'm sure you'll see it.
If I don't, there's nothing I can show you."

Vinson: "Thank you."

Speaker Greiman: "Thank you. Alright. I'm advised that there's a non-smoking seat in front for Democrats who are looking concerned with their health. And now, on the Order of Senate Joint Resolutions. Mr. Clerk."

Speaker Greiman: "That's right. That's correct."

Giorgi: "It is perfunct. Okay. Then, I move for the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution."
