TRANSCRIPTION DEBATE

38th Legislative Day

May 3, 1983

Speaker Madigan: "The House shall come to order. The House shall come to order. The Members shall be in their chairs. All unauthorized personnel shall please leave the floor. We shall be led in prayer today by the Reverend George Waddles, Sr., Pastor of the Zion Baptist Church in Springfield. Reverend Waddles is a guest of Representative Michael Curran. Would the guests in the gallery please rise to join us in the invocation?"

Reverend Waddles: "Let us pray. Gracious God, our Father whose breath blows upon us as a refreshing breeze, whose faith in us revives us as cool, clear water does the parched tongue, whose hand rests upon us as a gentle and yet firm touch such as a mother's love, whose power overcomes our weakness and becomes our strength. Today, Father, we pray for Your forgiveness. Forgive us for being filled with our own self-importance, our own self-interest, our own self-sufficiency. Forgive us for those times when we had eyes and did not see, when we had ears and did not hear, for having tongues and yet did not speak, for having hands and yet did not serve. Forgive us for having minds and for those times when we did not use them. Forgive us for being content with that conversation that is but an echo of our own opinions, for hearing only music that is blowing our own horns. Help us today and help these Legislators, these men and women, to be concerned with the cries of the world and the communities in which they serve. We know, God, that you will grant them Your wisdom, and You will grant them Your direction to help them in making their decisions. Help them to recognize that they serve best when they serve without thought of self. We pray Your blessings upon them, knowing that you will strengthen them. In the Name of Jesus, our Christ, we pray. Amen."

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Speaker Madigan: "We shall be led in the Pledge of Allegiance by Representative Ropp."

Ropp - et al: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of American and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Speaker Madigan: "Roll Call for Attendance. Mr. Greiman. Mr. Yourell. For what purpose does Mr. Yourell seek recognition?"

Yourell: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As the principal Sponsor of House Bill 1218, House Bill 316, House Bill 1115, I would ask leave to place these Bills in Interim Study."

Speaker Madigan: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Leave is granted. Those Bills shall be placed on the Order of the Interim Study. Representative Greiman, are there any excused absences?"

Greiman: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Representative Vitek should be excused for reasons of illness and let the record so reflect."

Speaker Madigan: "Let the record show that Representative Vitek is excused because of illness. For what purpose... Representative Oblinger, are you seeking recognition relative to the Attendance Roll Call?"

Oblinger: "No, on those Interim Study."

Speaker Madigan: "We're on the Order of the Attendance Roll Call, and, Mr. Clerk, take the Attendance Roll Call. There being 110 Members responding to the Attendance Roll Call, there is a quorum present. The Chair recognizes Representative Oblinger."

Oblinger: "Mr. Speaker and Members, I would like permission to put House Bill 2082, '84... 2084, 2086 and 2087 in Interim Study."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted. Those Bills

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shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Mr. Olson."

Olson: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, as principal Sponsor of House Bill 1422, I ask leave to place 1422 in Interim Study."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted. The Bill shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Mr. Clerk, Committee Reports."

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Mulcahey, Chairman of the Committee on Elementary and Secondary Education, to which the following Bills were referred, action taken March 15, 1983, reported the same back with the following recommendation: 'Interim Study Calendar' House Bill 201. Representative Wolf, Chairman of the Committee on Personnel and Pensions, to which the following Bill was referred, action taken April 27, 1983, reported the same back with the following recommendation: 'Interim Study Calendar' House Bill 569. Representative Domico, Chairman of the Committee on Registration and Regulation, to which the following Bill was referred, action taken April 27, 1983, reported the same back with the following recommendation: 'Interim Study Calendar' House Bill 2262."

Speaker Madigan: "Messages from the Senate."

Clerk O'Brien: "A Message from the Senate by Mr. Wright, Secretary. 'Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has adopted the following Senate Joint Resolutions and the adoption of which I am instructed to ask concurrence of the House of Representatives, to wit; Senate Joint Resolutions #31 and 32, adopted by the Senate April 27, 1983. Kenneth Wright, Secretary.'"

Speaker Madigan: "Mr... For what purpose does the entire Republican side seek recognition? Now let's begin with Mr. Hastert. Mr. Hastert."

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Hastert: "Mr. Speaker, with leave of the House, I would like to put House Bill 2021 and House Bill 1654 on Interim Study."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted to put those Bills on the Order of Interim Study."

Hastert: "Thank you."

Speaker Madigan: "Are there any other Members who seek recognition for the same purpose? Mr. Ropp."

Ropp: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House..."

Speaker Madigan: "And please indicate the Committee that the Bill is assigned to. Mr. Ropp."

Ropp: "Alright, Mr. Speaker, I have two Bills that were assigned to Revenue Committee, House Bill 94 and House Bill 95. I ask leave of the House to table both of them, please."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted. Those Bills shall be tabled. Mr. Reilly."

Reilly: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I make the same request for Interim Study for House Bill 77... 766, 766 in the Revenue Committee, 1615 in the Executive Committee and 1892 in the Insurance Committee."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted. Those Bills shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Mr. Davis."

Davis: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The same request for House Bill 1298, House Bill 2173 now assigned to Registration and Regulation."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted that those Bills shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Representative Frederick."

Frederick: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like the same request granted please for House Bills 858 assigned to Judiciary, 1692 assigned to Revenue."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted. Those Bills shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Representative Ebbesen. Mr. Ebbesen."

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Ebbesen: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, leave for House Bill 1408, assigned to Registration and Regulation, Interim Study."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted that that Bill shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Mr. Woodyard."

Woodyard: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I also have the same request to place four Bills in Interim Study, and I ask leave of the House to place House Bill 399 that's in Agriculture Committee, 259 in Elementary/Secondary, 1019 and 1435 in Revenue Committee in Interim Study."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted that those Bills shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Representative Hensel."

Hensel: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have the same request for House Bill 1591 for Interim Study in Cities and Villages."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted that that Bill shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Representative Wojcik."

Wojcik: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I ask for leave of the House for House Bill 1977 on the Revenue Committee."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted for that Bill to be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Representative Topinka."

Topinka: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I'd like leave to place House Bill 971, which was assigned to the Labor Committee, on Interim Study."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted that that Bill shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Representative Cowlshaw."

Cowlshaw: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I request, please, that the following Bills, which have been assigned to the following Committees, be placed on Interim Study:

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House Bill 515, Revenue; House Bill 1628, Elementary and Secondary Education; House Bill 1629, Labor and Commerce; 1630, Judiciary; 1690, Energy and Environment; 1865, Public Utilities; 2131, Revenue; 2229, Revenue."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted that those Bills shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Representative Harris."

Harris: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Making the same request on leave, I have two Bills, House Bill 623, which is currently before Revenue, and House Bill 808 in Elementary and Secondary Education."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted that those Bills shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Representative Mays."

Mays: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The same request for House Bill 732 in Human Service."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there ..."

Mays: "And then 1833 in Judiciary, 1841 and 1920 in Revenue."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted that those Bills shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Representative Peterson."

Peterson: "Mr. Speaker, I would like leave to have House Bill 1486 posted for the Counties and Townships Committee meeting tomorrow, and I have concurrence from the Chairman of the Committee, Representative Steczo."

Speaker Madigan: "Is Mr. Steczo in the chamber? Mr. Steczo. Mr. Steczo, there is a request from Representative Peterson to suspend the posting requirements for a Bill that he posted at your Committee. Mr. Steczo."

Steczko: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Representative Peterson has cleared it with me, and..."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Steczo, does that Motion violate the rule which only permits the posting of 50 Bills at any one

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meeting of your Committee?"

Steczo: "No, Mr. Speaker, it does not."

Speaker Madigan: "Thank you. The Motion is to suspend the posting requirements. Is there leave? Leave is granted. The posting requirements shall be suspended for the Bill so enumerated in the record. Representative Hannig."

Hannig: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would ask leave of the House to put House Bill 1302 in Interim Study."

Speaker Madigan: "Which Committee is that Bill assigned to?"

Hannig: "It's in the Labor and Commerce Committee."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted to place that Bill on the Order of Interim Study. Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would ask leave to place the following Bills on the Order of Interim Study: House Bill 29 in Judiciary Committee, House Bill 30 in the Registration and Regulation Committee, House Bill 31 Judiciary Committee, House Bill 34, and 35, and 37, and 38 in the Judiciary Committee, House Bill 39 in the Elections Committee, House Bill 40 in the Judiciary Committee, House Bill 44, and 48, and 324, and 559, and 641, and 1200, 1251, 1446, 1447, 1731, 1999... I'm sorry, strike that. The previous Bills are all in Judiciary. House Bill 1999 in Higher Education, House Bill 2205 in Elections. And that's it. I ask leave for the..."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Cullerton, could you give that list to the Clerk's Office? Is there leave that those Bills be placed on the Order of Interim Study? Leave is granted. Those Bills shall be placed on the Order. For what purpose does Mr. Vinson seek recognition?"

Vinson: "Before we grant leave on that, I would like to know if the Gentleman is the Chief Sponsor of each of those Bills. It's a lengthy list, and I couldn't follow him."

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Speaker Madigan: "The Gentleman..."

Cullerton: "No. They're Vinson's Bills."

Speaker Madigan: "The Gentleman indicates that some of those Bills were given to him by you, Mr. Vinson."

Vinson: "So, that violates the understanding that we had."

Speaker Madigan: "Right. You know how those deals are. Is there leave that Mr. Cullerton's Bills be placed on the Order of Interim Study? Leave is granted. Those Bills shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Representative Sam Wolf."

Wolf: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I request the leave of the House to place House Bill 1122, which is in Executive Committee, and House Bill 1123, which is in Counties and Townships, in Interim Study."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted that those Bills shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Representative Currie."

Currie: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would like to have leave to put House Bills 190, 231, 232 and 1643 in Interim Study in the House Judiciary Committee."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted that those Bills shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Mr. Bowman."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I, too, ask leave for the privilege of putting House Bill 1793, which is assigned to Public Utilities, and House Bill 661, which is assigned to Human Services, on the Order of Interim Study Calendar."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted to place those Bills on the Order of Interim Study. Representative Levin."

Levin: "I would make a similar Motion for leave to place the following Bills in Interim Study: House Bill 5 that's assigned Energy; House Bills 1535 and 2005 that are

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assigned to Insurance; and House Bill 1729, 1730 and 1733 that are assigned to the Executive Committee."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted to place those Bills on the Order of Interim Study. Mr. Taylor. Representative Taylor. Mr. Taylor."

Taylor: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to have leave of the Executive Committee, to place on Interim Study, House Bill 1774 and House Bill 1776."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there leave? Leave is granted that those Bills shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Representative Braun."

Braun: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman... Mr. Speaker. I'd ask leave that the following Bills in the Judiciary Committee be placed in Interim Study: House Bills 565, 566, House Bill 568, 586, 590, 591, 692, 693, 785, 786, 788, 1093, 1094, 13... Sorry - 1655, 1657 and there's one other. And 18... No, and that's it. That's all of them. Sorry, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Madigan: "Will take more."

Braun: "That's okay. Yeah, I'll give them all to you."

Speaker Madigan: "The Lady requests leave that those Bills be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Is there leave? Leave is granted that those Bills shall be placed on the Order of Interim Study. Representative McPike in the Chair."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Doyle."

Doyle: "Mr. Speaker, I ask for a request to place on Interim leave Bill 2027 of Motor Transportation, Bill 2125 on Human Services, Bill 1626 in Executive, Bill 1839 on Higher Education, and Bill 2034 on Revenue."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to place those Bills on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted, and those Bills will be

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placed on Interim Study. Representative Didrickson."

Didrickson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I, too, request leave for Interim Study for House Bill 1194 to Elementary and Secondary Education Committee."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady asks leave to place House Bill 1194 on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted, and 1194 will be on Interim Study."

Didrickson: "Thank you."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Nelson."

Nelson: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I would ask for leave to table House Bill 2066, please."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady asks leave to table House Bill..."

Nelson: "2066."

Speaker McPike: "2066. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. House Bill 2066 is tabled. Representative Barger."

Barger: "Mr. Chairman, I would like to have leave to put on Interim Study three Bills in Revenue, 1588, 1631 and 1919."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to place those Bills on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted, and those Bills will be placed on Interim Study. Representative Wait."

Wait: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like leave to place House Bill 1553, in the Transportation, on Interim Study and, also, House Bill 1956, in Executive, in Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to place those two Bills on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. The Bills will be placed on Interim Study."

Wait: "Thank you."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Ralph Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like leave to table House Bill

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2139. It was introduced by a mistake in my name, and I've been... I'd like to have it tabled."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to table House Bill 2139. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. House Bill 2139 is tabled. Representative Mulcahey."

Mulcahey: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would ask leave to waive the proper posting rules so that House Bill 1568, House Bill 1614 and House Bill 1584 to be heard in the Elementary and Secondary Education Committee tomorrow and, also, House Bill 1145 to be heard in Education Committee on Thursday."

Speaker McPike: "Have you checked that with the Minority Spokesman?"

Mulcahey: "Yes, I have."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to waive the posting requirements for those four Bills. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted... The posting... Leave is granted. The posting requirements are waived. The Bills will be heard this week. Representative Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I'd ask leave to table House Bill 1247."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to table House Bill 1247. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, House Bill 1247 is tabled. Representative Giglio."

Giglio: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I'd like leave to have House Bill 13, which is in Judiciary, placed on the Interim Study Calendar."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave for House Bill 13 to be placed on Interim Study. Are there any objections?"

Giglio: "1300."

Speaker McPike: "1300. Hearing no objections, House Bill 1300 will be placed on Interim Study. Representative

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Brunsvold."

Brunsvold: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to place House Bill 1018 on Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 1018 on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. House Bill 1018 is on Interim Study. Are there any other requests? Representative Hawkinson."

Hawkinson: "Mr. Speaker, I would like leave to place the following Bills, which are before the Judiciary Committee, on Interim Study: House Bill 588, House Bill 594, House Bill 822, House Bill 865, House Bill 1863 and House Bill 1935 to be placed on Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has asked leave that those Bills be placed on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted, and they will be placed on Interim Study. Representative DeJaegher."

DeJaegher: "Mr. Chairman, I'd like to have House Bill 309 put on Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "What was that Bill number?"

DeJaegher: "309."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 309 on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, House Bill 309 will be placed on Interim Study. Any further requests? Representative Homer."

Homer: "Mr. Speaker, I would ask leave in Judiciary Committee to place the following Bills on Interim Study: 592, 593, 595, 980, 1307. And I would further ask leave to place the following House Bill on Interim Study in Human Services Committee: House Bill 1554."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to place those Bills on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted, and those Bills will be

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placed on Interim Study. Any further requests?
Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I ask leave to place the following Bills from the Judiciary Committee into Interim Study: House Bill 789, House Bill 790, House Bill 1874, 2142, 2143, 2145."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to place those Bills on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted, and they will be placed on Interim Study. Further requests? On page seven of the Calendar, House Bills Second Reading, Short Debate appears House Bill 115, Representative Terzich. 115, Representative. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk. No, no. Out of the record. How about 116? 123? Any of your Bills? House Bill 278, Representative Levin. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 278, a Bill for an Act in relation to condominiums. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment ... This Bill has Amendment #1 and 2 were tabled in Committee. Amendment #3 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Are there any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #4, Levin, amends House Bill 278 as amended..."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Levin, on Amendment #4."

Levin: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #4 simply corrects one word in Amendment #3, changing the word 'interest' to instruments'. I would ask for its adoption."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #4. Are there any... Is there any debate? There

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being no debate, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #4 be adopted?'. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Further Amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave for House Bill 278 to remain on Third Reading Short Debate. Is there any objections? Hearing no objections, House Bill 278 will appear on Third Reading Short Debate. House Bill 279, Representative Levin. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 279, a Bill for an Act in relation to condominiums. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Levin, amends House Bill 279..."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Levin."

Levin: "Can I have a clarification? I don't have numbers on. I have two Amendments. I have one that's proposed by the LRE. Is that Amendment #2? Yes?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment 2 is proposed by Legislative Reference Bureau."

Levin: "Okay. Yes, Amendment #2 is proposed by the Legislative Reference Bureau. It simply underlines new language which, when they drafted the Bill, they inadvertently did not underline."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #2. Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #2 be adopted?'. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's

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adopted. Further Amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Levin, amends House Bill 279 on page four, line 13..."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Levin."

Levin: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #3 simply changes the word 'filling' to 'filing' in the text of the Bill. It was a typographical error. I move its adoption."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #3. Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #3 be adopted?'. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, and the Amendment's adopted. Further Amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave that House Bill 279 remain on the Order of Short Debate. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted, and House Bill 279 will appear on the Calendar on the Order of Third Reading Short Debate. House Bill 281. Cut of the record. House Bill 395, Representative Leverenz. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 395, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Uniform Disposition of Unclaimed Property Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Are there any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, O'Connell, amends House Bill 395 by deleting the title..."

Speaker McPike: "Representative O'Connell. Representative O'Connell on the floor? Representative Leverenz on the

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Amendment."

Leverenz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I agree to the Amendment. It would change the law with regard to the revenue derived off of the abandoned property. Instead of going to the pension fund..."

Speaker McPike: "Excuse me. Excuse me, Mr. Leverenz. Representative Vinson, for what reason do you rise?"

Vinson: "Mr. Speaker, my copy of the Amendment indicates that the only Sponsor of the Amendment is Mr. O'Connell, and I don't believe anybody else can handle the Amendment."

Speaker McPike: "Your point is well taken. Representative O'Connell on the floor? Representative Leverenz..."

Leverenz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker McPike: "Representative O'Connell is not on the floor."

Leverenz: "I understand that. If I may have leave to take the Amendment, I would be happy to handle it. I agreed to it."

Speaker McPike: "There are objections. Out of the record. House Bill 466, Representative Bopp. Do you wish to have your Bill heard, Sir? Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 466, a Bill for an Act in relation to debts owed to and by the State of Illinois. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Are there any Committee Amendments, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. Mr. Clerk, House Bill 466. Was that on Third Reading? Thank you. House Bill 589, Representative Hawkinson. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 589, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Criminal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

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Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 635, Representative Cowlishaw. Out of the record. House Bill 756, Representative Pangle. Read the Bil... Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 756, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Are there any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 922, Representative Davis. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 922, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Are there any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Davis, amends House Bill 922.."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman from Will, Representative Davis."

Davis: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I would move - verbally at this point, I apologize for not have it right - table Amendment #1 which is to be replaced by Floor Amendment #2."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman moves to table Amendment #1. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted, and Amendment #1 is tabled. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Davis."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Davis on Amendment #2."

Davis: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #2 is offered by... in conjunction with the Department of Insurance and the Audit

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Commission to tighten the Bill up and put a threshold on businesses or insurance businesses that are in liquidation or rehabilitation - put a threshold of 500,000 dollars and to definitively pick a list of certified public accountants who should do the audit. I don't believe there's any controversy, Sir, on the Amendment, and I would move for its adoption."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #2. Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #2 be adopted?'. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, and the Amendment's adopted. Further Amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave for House Bill 922 to remain on the Order of Third Reading Short Debate. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. House Bill 922 will be on the Calendar under Third Reading Short Debate. House Bill 947, Representative Terzich. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 947, a Bill for an Act to create sanitary districts and remove obstructions. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 960, Representative Birkinbine. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 960, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Governmental Ethics Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

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Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Birkinbine, amends House Bill 960..."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Birkinbine."

Birkinbine: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Floor Amendment #2 is proposed by the Legislative Reference Bureau. It corrects an oversight in the original drafting of the Bill. It simply changes a number from 25,000 to 35,000, which makes it consistent with the rest of the Bill."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #2. Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #2 be adopted?'. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, and the Amendment's adopted. Further Amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave for House Bill 960 to remain on the Order of Short Debate. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. House Bill 960 will be on the Calendar under Third Reading Short Debate. House Bill 1034, Representative Terzich. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1034, a Bill for an Act to create sanitary districts and remove obstructions. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Are there any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 1114, Representative Didrickson. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1114, a Bill for an Act in relation to

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special education services for handicapped children.

Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 1192, Representative Koehler. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1192, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Court Reporters Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Koehler, amends House Bill..."

Speaker McPike: "Lady from Marshal, Representative Koehler."

Koehler: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #2 makes clear the method of determining seniority when two court reporters share one job. The Bill itself amends a Court Reporters Act to allow two individuals to share one court reporter position. This is called job sharing, where two people split one job and also split the salary and benefits. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee, and Amendment #1, as I indicated, makes clear the method of determining seniority. I would urge your adoption."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady moves for the adoption of Amendment #2. Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #2 be adopted?'. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady asks leave for House Bill 1192 to remain on the Order of Third... to remain on the Order of

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Short Debate. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. House Bill 1192 will appear on the Calendar under Third Reading Short Debate. House Bill 1252, Representative Flinn. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1252, a Bill for an Act to release highway easement rights to certain described land. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Are there any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "A Motion to table Amendment #1 by Representative Flinn."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Flinn on the Motion."

Flinn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #1 is technically wrong. It causes the word 'beginning' to show up twice in the Bill, one's right behind the other, and I've asked that we table that so we can adopt Amendment 2."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman moves to table Amendment #1. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Amendment #1 is tabled. Further Amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Flinn, amends House Bill 12..."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman from St. Clair, Representative Flinn."

Flinn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, this makes a correction that Amendment #1 caused, and it technically corrects the Bill. It will read like it should, and I ask for its adoption."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #2. Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #2 be adopted?'. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's

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adopted. Further Amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave for House Bill 1252 to remain on the Order of Short Debate. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. House Bill 1252 will appear on the Calendar under Third Reading Short Debate. House Bill 1337, Representative Hallock. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1337, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act concerning children and family services. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 1409, Representative Ebbesen. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1409, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Liquor Control Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. Gentleman from DeWitt, Representative Vinson, for what reason do you rise?"

Vinson: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise for purposes of an introduction. Mr. Bob Albert and the Rotary Club of Lincoln, Illinois is here today with a group from Japan... from Tokyo touring the United States, and I wonder if they might rise, in the gallery over here on my right, and be introduced property to this House."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Will, Representative Van Dwyne."

Van Dwyne: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. While we have a break, I'd like to take leave of the House to suspend the appropriate posting rule so that House Bill 2244 can be heard in

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Representative Terzich's Committee this week. I've checked with Representative Terzich and also Representative Karpziel on the Republican side, and there's no objection."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to waive the posting requirements. What's your Bill? So that House Bill 2244 can be heard in Executive. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. House Bill 2244... The Motion carries to hear that Bill in Executive. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Leverenz."

Leverenz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise for purpose of an introduction. We have 60 students from the Melrose Park School with us today in the Republican gallery on the west. The teacher, Mrs. 'Holian', the principal, Jan 'Baditski' and Andy 'Stickane', who is right behind me. If you'll stand up. Welcome to Springfield."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Mulcahey."

Mulcahey: "Mr. Speaker, I, likewise, ask leave to put House Bill 1040 - I'm the principal Sponsor of it - in Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 1040 on Interim Study. Are there any objections? No objections, leave is granted. House Bill 1040 will be on Interim Study. Gentleman from Cook, Representative Bowman."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As long as we are on the Order of Interim Study, I would like to place the famous bottle Bill, which is in control of the House Environment Committee, and I believe that that is House Bill 13... what? 1353, as I am reliably informed by staff that it is House Bill 1353."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 1353 in Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. House Bill 1353 is on Interim Study."

Bowman: "Thank you for your kind indulgence."

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Speaker McPike: "Yes. Gentleman from Champaign, Representative Johnson."

Johnson: "I'd ask leave to put House Bill 792 - Representative Woodyard and I are the Chief Sponsors - on the Order of Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 792 on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. House Bill 792 will be placed on Interim Study. Gentleman from Cook, Representative Peterson."

Peterson: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to ask leave of the House to place House Bill 2127 in Interim Study. It's in the Cities and Villages Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Is that House Bill 2127?"

Peterson: "Yes."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 2127 on Interim Study. Are there any objections? No objections, leave is granted. House Bill 2127 is on Interim Study. Gentleman from DuPage, Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "Mr. Speaker, I ask leave to place House Bill 1848, from Judiciary Committee, on Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 1848 on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. House Bill 1848 will be placed on Interim Study. On the Calendar, on page eight, House Bills Second Reading there is House Bill 3, Representative Levin. Representative Levin, House Bill 3. Out of the record. House Bill 64, Representative Terzich. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 64, a Bill for an Act regarding automobile warranties. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

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Speaker McPike: "Are there any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Preston, amends Senate Bill 64 as amended by deleting everything after..."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Preston. Representative Preston on the floor? Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "I oppose the Amendment, and I'd like to move the Bill, Mr. Speaker. I oppose Amendment #2, and I'd like to move the Bill to Third Reading."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman from DeWitt, Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "I move to table the Amendment."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Vinson moves to table Amendment #1 to House Bill 64. I'm sorry, Amendment #2. Is there any discussion? Representative Cullerton on the Motion."

Cullerton: "Mr. Speaker, I understand that what we're about to do is the first time we've done this this year and that is to table an Amendment because a proponent of the Amendment on the floor is not on the floor. I wonder if there's ... if it would be a good practice if we would have the Sponsor of the Bill just explain why he is opposed to the Amendment. In other words, explain what the Amendment does so that we have an idea of how we should vote. So, I would ask a question of the Sponsor, if he could explain the Amendment that's been proposed by Representative Preston."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Vinson has made the Motion. Your question is to Representative Vinson. He indicates he will yield."

Cullerton: "Is Representative Vinson... Are you in a position to explain what the Amendment does?"

Vinson: "Yes. It's a bad Amendment which unduly harms industry in the State of Illinois."

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Cullerton: "And if I could have an explanation from the Sponsor of the Bill, Representative Terzich, as to why he would be opposed to this Amendment, I would appreciate it."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "The reason for it. There was a period of time that the Bill was heard in Subcommittee, and there was a determination of whether the period of reporting for recovery should be 18 months or 24 months. I felt that 18 months was satisfactory. Representative Preston feels 24 months. And it's my Bill, and I would as soon go with the 18 months. Therefore, I oppose the Amendment."

Cullerton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Vinson has moved to table Amendment #2. Question is, 'Shall Amendment #2 be tabled?'. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's tabled. Further Amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 99, Representative Bea. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 99, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act concerning public utilities. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Are there any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 207, Representative Currie. Representative Currie. Out of the record. House Bill 234, Representative Currie. Out of the record. House Bill 244, Representative Nash. Representative Nash. House Bill 244. Do you wish to have your Bill heard, Sir? Out

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of the record. House Bill 245, Representative Nash. Out
of the record. House Bill 252, Representative Levin. Out
of the record. House Bill 275, Representative McGann. Out
of the record. House Bill 280, Representative Levin. Out
of the record. 283. Out of the record. 284. Out of the
record. 285. Out of the record. House Bill 312,
Representative Taylor. Out of the record. House Bill 336,
Representative Preston. Out of the record. House Bill
338, Representative Stuffle. Out of the record. House
Bill 394, Representative Leverenz. Read the Bill, Mr.
Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 394, a Bill for an Act to amend
Sections of the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of
the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Davis - Mays and Neff, amends
House Bill 394..."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman from Will, Representative Davis."

Davis: "Well, thank you. Mr. Speaker, when we heard this Bill in
Committee, apparently there is some problem with inspection
of fire vehicles, and Representative Leverenz put forth the
Bill in Committee with the idea that all fire equipment
should be inspected as the second division vehicles are
throughout the state. We don't perceive downstate, in the
collar counties and all the other 101 counties, that there
is any problem with fire inspection.. or firetruck
equipment or inspection thereof. In fact, you'll find that
most downstate communities paid better attention to their
fire equipment than anybody else in their private car or
any other sector of the community of the State of Illinois
that drives trucks, and especially emergency vehicles. The

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care that is lavished on those particular situations is such that... This Amendment #1? Well, I beg your pardon. I'm talking to Amendment #2. Now I'm talking to Amendment #2. Amendment #2 simply mandates that if House Bill 394 should pass, that the firetruck inspection provision only apply to municipalities having more than 500,000 inhabitants where the problem seems to be. I would move for its adoption or answer any questions."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #2. On that question, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Leverenz."

Leverenz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. And, first of all, if your Amendment... If you are serious in your Amendment, you would be just as serious as having firetrucks tested throughout the entire state, rather than just in the City of Chicago. That is number one. Number two, the Bill would not have been introduced if it were not for a township in DuPage County, which is in the collar area, that asked me to introduce the Bill, because that's where the problems are. And Amendment #3 will solve the small, single firetruck... fire protection districts, as I agreed to work something out. So, your Amendment is ludicrous, to say the least; and, if you really believe in your Amendment that firetrucks should be tested in part of the state, then you would vote red, as I ask everyone to do so that we have uniformity in the state."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Henderson, Representative Neff."

Neff: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I support this Amendment. What we've got to keep in mind in many of our rural areas, these firetrucks to be inspected are going to have to go 40 or 50 miles. Some of them just have one fire... firetruck; and, if that has to leave for two or three hours to go and get

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inspected, there will be no protection there. And that's the reason why Representative Davis has this Amendment on; because, in rural areas, it's entirely different. And these are volunteer fire departments. They take care of those trucks. I don't think there's any... any truck on the road that's taken better care of than these people do as volunteers. And, therefore, it will work a real handicap, and we're going to have places where they're going to be without fire protection for three... or three to five hours. And so, therefore, I think this is a good Amendment and should be supported."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman from McLean, Representative Ropp."

Ropp: "Yeah, thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I want to speak in support of the Amendment, in that to truly reiterate what the previous speaker said. There are a number of small towns in downstate Illinois that really only have one piece of fire equipment. And the fact is that if it is required to be away from that community for any length of time, as is truly the case, that we're asking for a real fire problem should a fire come about in that particular community. I know of no other piece of equipment, other than maybe a law enforcement's revolver, that's taken any better care of than is a fire engine. And I think that in small communities, for fire protection, is an uppermost importance to them that this particular area need not be inspected, and that I urge support of this Amendment so that these small communities are well protected."

Speaker McPike: "Further discussion? There being no further discussion, the Gentleman from Will, Representative Davis, to close."

Davis: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker. The Sponsor of the Bill, Representative Leverenz, called the Amendment ludicrous."

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It certainly is not. We think, perhaps, even the Bill is ludicrous. I'm not certain that there is a problem in the City of Chicago, which the Amendment aims at, but the truth of the matter is - downstate, there is no problem. I don't know what township Representative Leverenz refers to in DuPage County, but the perception of all downstaters and virtually every Member that lives outside of suburban Cook in this House and in the Senate would agree that fire equipment, as Representative Ropp said, gets better care than mother's milk and policemen's revolvers. I think this Amendment should be adopted, if for no other reason, to point out the ridiculous nature of the Bill itself. So, I would move for its adoption."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #2. Question is, 'Shall Amendment #2 be adopted?'. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 60 'ayes', 46 'nos', none voting 'present'. Amendment #2... Amendment #2 is adopted. Further Amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Leverenz, amends House Bill 394 on page three by inserting between line 1 and 2 the following."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Leverenz."

Leverenz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would you now recognize me to table House Bill 394?"

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman moves to table Amendment #3."

Leverenz: "No, no. Excuse me. I asked if you would recognize me to table House Bill 394."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Leverenz, proceed."

Leverenz: "I simply ask that I have leave of the House to table

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394."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to table House Bill 394. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. House Bill 394 is tabled. Gentleman from Effingham, Representative Brummer."

Brummer: "Yes, I have several Bills I would like leave to place on Interim Study. I am the principal Sponsor of each of them. They are House Bill 2253, House Bill 2137, House Bill 1347 and House Bill 1348."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to place those Bills on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. The Bills will be placed on Interim Study. Representative Alexander."

Alexander: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have three Bills..."

Speaker McPike: "Excuse me, Representative Alexander. Representative Brummer."

Brummer: "Yes, I omitted from that list House Bill 492. I'm also the principal Sponsor of that, and I'd like it placed in Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "House Bill 492 the Gentleman requests to place on Interim Study. Are there any objections? No objections, leave is granted. House Bill... House Bill 492 will be placed on Interim Study. Representative Alexander."

Alexander: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have three Bills - I'm the principal Sponsor - I would wish to be placed in Interim Study. House Bill 109, House Bill 737 and House Bill 2168."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady asks leave to place those Bills on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. The Bills will be placed on Interim Study. Representative Ebbesen."

Ebbesen: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, House Bills 953 and 955, posted in

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Registration and Regulation. I would like leave to have those placed in Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 953 and 955 in Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. The Bills will be placed on Interim Study. Representative Rea."

Rea: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I am principal Sponsor of House bill 560 and would like leave to place it on Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 560 on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted, and House Bill 560 is on Interim Study. Representative Wolf."

Wolf: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to make the same request for House Bill 202 now in Judiciary Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 202 on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted, and House Bill 202 is on Interim Study. Representative Mulcahey."

Mulcahey: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I am the Chief Sponsor of House Bill 1059, and I would ask leave to have this placed in Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 1059 on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted, and House Bill 1059 will be on Interim Study. Representative Churchill."

Churchill: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to make the same request for House Bills 1574 and 1854."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to place those two Bills on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. The Bills are in Interim Study. Representative Mulcahey. Representative Currie."

Currie: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like leave to put House

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Bills 189, 191, 192, 193, 194 on Interim Study in the House Committee on Energy and Environment; House Bill 237 on Interim Study in Executive Committee; House Bill 2192 on Interim Study in House Revenue; House Bill 2245 Interim Study in the Cities and Villages Committee; and House Bill 2214 on Interim Study in Elementary and Secondary Education."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Currie, would you bring that list of Bills down to the Clerk so that we could have it for the records? The Lady asks leave to place those Bills on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. The Bills will be placed on Interim Study. Representative Hutchins."

Hutchins: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to put Bill... House Bill 2044 on Interim Study. Election."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 2024..."

Hutchins: "2044."

Speaker McPike: "2044. Mr. Clerk, 2044, on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. 2044 will be placed on Interim Study. Representative Berrios."

Berrios: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like leave to put House Bill 2152, assigned to Judiciary, into Interim Study, please."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 2152 on Interim Study. Are there any objections? No objections, leave is granted. 2152 is on Interim Study. Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "Mr. Speaker, I filed a Motion pursuant to Rule 20(k) to suspend the posting requirements for the Executive Committee tomorrow for House Bills 748, 1388, 1621, 1871, 1933, 2269, 2277 and 1939."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to waive the posting

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requirements so that those Bills can be heard in Executive tomorrow. Are there any objections? Gentleman from DeWitt, Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Has the Gentleman cleared that with the Spokesman in the Committee?"

Speaker McPike: "Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "Would he repeat that question?"

Speaker McPike: "He wants to know if you've cleared that with the Minority Spokesman on the Committee."

Terzich: "He's sitting right next to me."

Speaker McPike: "Yes."

Vinson: "I think she's nodding. So, I don't object."

Speaker McPike: "Hearing no objections, leave is granted. The posting requirements are waived. Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I would ask leave to waive the posting requirements for three Bills. I have cleared it with the other side. These Bills will be heard Thursday at 2:00 p.m. before the Judiciary Committee. The first Bill is House Bill 428, Representative White; second Bill is Representative Reilly, 1263; and the third one is Representative Braun, 1859."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to waive the posting requirements for those three Bills so they can be heard in Judiciary this week. Are there any objections?"

Jaffe: "In addition... In addition, the following people have asked me to put their Bills in Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "Could you wait on that Motion?"

Jaffe: "Alright."

Speaker McPike: "Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. The posting requirements are waived for those Bills. Representative Jaffe on additional Motions."

Jaffe: "Okay. We would ask leave to put the following Bills in

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Interim Study: Representative Braun, House Bill 1129, 1383, 1763, 2186 and 2254; Representative DeJaegher, House Bill 2158; and Representative Giglio, House Bill 1300."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to place those Bills on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. The Bills will be placed on Interim Study. Representative Doyle."

Doyle: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like permission to... I'm the Sponsor of Bill 1294 in the Revenue Committee to put on Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 1294 on Interim Study. Are there any objections? No objections, leave is granted. House Bill 1294 will be on Interim Study. Representative Preston."

Preston: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd ask leave of the House to place House Bills 75, 211 and 260 in Interim Study. They're before the Committee on Public Utilities."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to place those three Bills on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. The Bills will be placed on Interim Study. Representative Deuchler."

Deuchler: "Leave of the House to place House Bills 473, 748 and 1107 on Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady asks leave to place those three Bills on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Those Bills will be placed on Interim Study. Any further requests? Continuing on Second Reading. House Bills Second Reading, page ten. Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I have a request. I'd like to waive the posting rules so that House Bill 1762 can be heard in Subcommittee tomorrow morning. I've cleared it with the Minority Spokesman, Danny Hastert, and I would ask leave of

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the House to have this Bill posted."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman asks leave to waive the posting requirements for House Bill 1762 so that it can be heard tomorrow. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. The posting requirements are waived. On page ten of the Calendar appears House Bill 424, Representative Bowman. Out of the record. House Bill 494, Representative Younge. Mrs. Younge on the floor? House Bill 514, Representative Steczko. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 514, a Bill for an Act to add Sections to the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted previously."

Speaker McPike: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 537, Representative Bastert. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 537, a Bill for an Act in relation to child abuse prevention shelters. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 538, Representative Jaffe. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 538, a Bill for an Act to amend the Abused and Neglected Child Reporting Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

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Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 539, Representative Barnes. Representative Barnes on the floor? House Bill 561, Representative Panayotovich. Out of the record. House Bill 573, Representative Mautino. Do you wish to have your Bill called, Sir? Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 573, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Horseracing Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 580, Representative Van Duyne. Out of the record. House Bill 601, Representative Braun. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 601, a Bill for an Act in relation to the care and treatment of persons..."

Speaker McPike: "Out of the record. Excuse me, Mr. Clerk. Out of the record. House Bill 615, Representative Homer. Out of the record. House Bill 637, Representative Krska. Out of the record. House Bill 723, Representative Levin. Out of the record. House Bill 749, Representative Deuchler. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 749, a Bill for an Act to require the installation of smoke alarms in dormitory bedrooms of state colleges and universities. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

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Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 761, Representative Terzich. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 761, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act relating to certain investments of public funds by public agencies. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 767, Representative Matijevich. Out of the record. House Bill 774, Representative Levin. House Bill 799, Representative Matijevich. Out of the record. House Bill 825, Representative Ropp. Representative Ropp on the floor? Out of the record. House Bill 872, Representative Bowman. Do you wish to have your Bill called, Sir? Representative Bowman? Out of the record. House Bill 928, Representative Jaffe. Out of the record. House Bill 932, Representative Ronan. Representative Ronan? You want to have your Bill called? Read the Bill, Mr Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 932, a Bill for an Act to provide for use of community buildings and services for community educational programs in need. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 954, Representative Ebbesen. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 954, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to revise the law in relation to coroners. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

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Speaker McPike: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Ebbesen, amends House Bill 954..."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman from DeKalb, Representative Ebbesen."

Ebbesen: "Yes, Amendment #2 to House Bill 954 is technical in nature. It was pointed out by the Democratic staff and changes a couple of words in one sentence. I move for its adoption."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #2. Is there any discussion? Being no discussion, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #2 be adopted?'. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, and the Amendment's adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 977, Representative Farley. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 977, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Pharmacy Practice Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 1000, Representative Karpiel. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1000, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to revise the law in relation to counties. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker McPike: "There's a request for a fiscal note. The Bill will remain on Second Reading. House Bill 1078,

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Representative O'Connell. Out of the record. House Bill 1079, Representative O'Connell. Out of the record. House Bill 1104, Representative Levin. Out of the record. House Bill 1120, Representative Stuffle. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1120, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker McPike: "Fiscal note has been filed. Third Reading. House Bill 1134, Representative Mautino. Representative Mautino? Out of the record. House Bill 1139, Representative Cowlishaw. Representative Cowlishaw. Out of the record. House Bill 1148, Representative Giorgi. Out of the record. 1153, Representative Giorgi. Out of the record. House Bill 1164, Representative Keane. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1164, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the County Auditing Law. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 1182, Representative Stuffle. Out of the record. House Bill 1202, Representative McGann. Out of the record. House Bill 1223, Representative Matijevich. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1223, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

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Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 1232, Representative Bowman. Out of the record. House Bill 1305. Out of the record. House Bill 1313. Out of the record. House Bill 1339, Representative Brummer. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1339, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act concerning public utilities. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman from Effingham, Representative Brummer."

Brummer: "Yes. I wonder if the Clerk could read the Amendment, the underlined portion of the Amendment. As I recall, this was a Bill that was amended in Committee. There was... the Bill was amended on its face in Committee. Has that been reflected on the...?"

Speaker McPike: "Representative Brummer, I don't believe it's within our rules to amend a Bill in Committee on its face. And it would not..."

Brummer: "No No, the correction was made on the face of the Bill."

Speaker McPike: "That that would not indicate here. I think..."

Brummer: "Hold it right now."

Speaker McPike: "I think you should hold this on Second Reading. House Bill 1339 will remain on Second Reading. On page 29, of the Calendar, under Motions, Senate Joint Resolution Motions, appears Senate Joint Resolution 33. Representative Curran. Read the Motion, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Motion pursuant to rule 43 (a), I move to bypass Committee and place Senate Joint Resolution 33 on the Speaker's Table for immediate considerat... consideration. The Resolution has been reproduced and distributed on the Members' desk. Representative Curran."

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Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Sangamon, Representative Curran, on the Motion."

Curran: "This Resolution simply promises that we will pay back the money..."

Speaker McPike: "Excused me, Representative Curran. The Gentleman from Champaign, Representative Johnson. For what purpose do you arise?"

Johnson: "Am I correct in saying that we're now on the Order of Motions? And we're going to consider with S.J.R. 33, is that right?"

Speaker McPike: "The Order of Business is Senate Joint Resolution Motions. Under that order appears Senate Joint Resolution 33. Proceed, Representative Curran."

Curran: "This Resolution simply promises that the money that we quote, unquote, borrowed from the various retirement systems will be repaid..."

Speaker McPike: "Excused me, Representative Curran. The Gentleman from Champaign, Representative Johnson. On what reason do you arise?"

Johnson: "I wasn't allowed to continue my inquiry."

Speaker McPike: "I'm sorry, proceed."

Johnson: "We have..."

Speaker McPike: "I'm sorry, proceed. You walked away from your microphone. I thought you were finished talking."

Johnson: "I didn't walk away. It was just shut off. I'm looking at the Calendar each day, and the Order of Business that I see is Motions. Where do you find in the rules any special provision for Motions Senate Joint Resolutions? The Order of Business, and we have specific orders of business listed in the rules are designated. There isn't any Order of Business that I know of called S.J.R. Motions."

Speaker McPike: "Mr. Johnson, the Chair has gone to the Order of Senate Joint Resolutions Motions. There is only one Motion

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filed under that. That is..."

Johnson: "Well... okay, I just want to know. That's not my question. My question is, 'Where in the rules or anywhere else, do you derive the authority for declaring to this chamber that there is an Order of Business known as Senate Joint Resolutions Motion? The Order of Business is Motions. And that starts on page 26. I don't know how we get to the end of all that on page 29 when there isn't any Order of Business to that affect. Does that mean, is your ruling then, that we can go through each one of these and pick out a particular Bill we want called, and then say the Order of Business is House Bills Second Reading, House Bill 1202 out of order in the middle of an Order of Business, or at the end as we have in this case? I don't think..."

Speaker Mcpike: "Go ahead. Mr. Johnson, we go to Senate Bills Second Reading, House Bills Second Reading. We go to House Bills, Appropriations Bills only, Second Reading. House Bills Third Reading, Appropriations only. The Order of Business at this time is Senate Joint Resolutions Motions. There is only one filed. That is the Order of Business. Now, if you object to that, you have a recourse. But that is the Order of Business. Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "I would call the Chair's attention to page 4 of the rules... Rule 7, Daily Order of Business. Now, you'll find under Daily Order of Business, the things that the Chair can go to. You will find nothing that suggests the Chair can go to Senate Joint Resolutions. That's not an Order of Business. The only thing under there is Rule 7s, which permits the Chair to go to Motions. Now, I will join Mr. Johnson in asking, 'where does it suggest that you can go to a specific Order of Business like that, and where on the Calendar is that specific Order of Business listed?' Mr. Speaker, where on the Calendar is that Order of Business

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listed, and where in Rule 7, does it suggests you can go to such an Order of Business?"

Speaker McPike: "Mr. Vinson, for the third time, the Chair has the authority to go to this Order of Business. I've explained it. You have a right to make a Motion to overrule the Chair, but the Order of Business now is Senate Joint Resolutions Motion. Mr. Vinson."

Vinson: "Mr. Speaker, you explained it, that the Chair can always go to Senate Bills Second Reading, Senate Bills Third Reading, and so forth."

Speaker McPike: "Right."

Vinson: "That's clearly within the prerogative of the sheriff, is listed in Rules 7k, 7l, 7m, 7n. Where in Rule 7, does it list the Order of Business that you're suggesting it can go to? Would you please just answer that simple question?"

Speaker McPike: "Mr. Vinson, I have answered the questions, and you have your recourse. Do you have any Motions to put to the Chair?"

Vinson: "Well, Mr. Speaker, would you answer the question, where it lists in Rule 7, that you can go to the Order of Business you're trying to go to, and how you can bypass some three pages of Motions to go to that Order of Business?"

Speaker McPike: "Mr. Vinson, the Chair is not going to get into dialogue on this point. The Order of Business has been stated. Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I don't think that all this is necessary. I think the Gentleman knows by the Speaker's power of the Chair, he can under the rules, under priority of subject matter, that calls certain Bills, that relate to subject matter, and there are two issues relating to this Senate Bill, and the urgency of it, that he can call those under his power under that subject matter. And this

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happens to be one of the two issues under that subject matter. And I believe every Speaker's done that since I've been here, and little longer than Sam. But he has that power, and he made a ruling, and I think we ought to proceed."

Speaker McPike: "We are going to proceed. Representative Huff, do you have a point?"

Huff: "Yes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I... you know I... I think the Gentlemen is being dilatory and capricious, and arbitrary. There is a rule. I draw his attention to, page 6, 11(a), where the Speaker can go to any Order of Business that he wishes to. And I think he should recognize the power of the Chair as they ultimately will in Chicago as well."

Speaker McPike: "We are going to proceed. The Gentleman from Sangamon, Representative Curran."

Curran: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I move to bypass Committee and place Senate Joint Resolution 33 on the Speaker's Table for immediate consideration."

Speaker McPike: "You have heard the Gentleman's Motion. Is there any discussion on the Motion? There being no discussion the question is, 'Shall the Gentlemans' Motion pass?' All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Motion carries. Representative Curran."

Curran: "This Resolution simply promises to repay to the various retirement systems, the amount that we borrowed over the last couple of weeks, about \$71,000,000 by House Amendment #1, to Senate Bill 177. It says that we will repay that money \$71,000,000, 20% each year over the next five fiscal years, plus interest at the rate of 6%. I think it's a good idea. I think we've 'borrowed' quote, unquote, 'borrowed' money from these pension systems, when we should

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not have... at least we ought to promise to pay it back.

And that's all this Resolution does."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of S.J.R. 33. On that question, the Gentleman from Marion, Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker McPike: "He indicates, he will."

Curran: "You've used the term borrow, when as a matter of fact, actually, we did not fully fund this... I believe there's a difference. Do you want to continue to using the word borrow?"

Curran: "Last week I... two weeks ago, I used the word 'stole'. I am being generous here to use the word 'borrowed'."

Friedrich: "You're making progress, but your word is still incorrect."

Speaker McPike: "Further discussion. There being no further discussion, the question is... Representative Reilly."

Reilly: "Thank you. Jimmy Stewart can't sound discouraged, Mr. Speaker. On the Resolution, this is one of those kind of things we always have to vote for, so that we can write back to our constituents and tell them what a wonderful job we are really not doing. The Resolution doesn't mean anything. Therefore, I guess it doesn't hurt anything. What it says is, 'We're going to pay back'. Well, as Representative Friedrich already pointed it out, we didn't borrow. So, it's a strange phrase to use. But in addition to that, it doesn't mean anything even taking that exception. Because it doesn't set out anything about what we will put into the pension systems in the five years this covers. What it says is, that we will divide the amount we quote, unquote, 'owe by five and add 6% interest'. And then we will pay that back. But, of course, the logical thing will be, and I predict what will happens is that we

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will come to some conclusion as to how much we can afford to put into the system. And then we will deduct from that the amount of the quote, unquote, 'pay back'. And we will all pat ourselves on the back and say, 'We did a wonderful job, and everything is safe for American has been saved again.' And then we will go home with the pension fund in whatever shape it may be in. All in the world that happened here is that it took the Senate a couple of weeks to screw its courage up to the sticking point, at a cost to the state of about \$15,000,000. And all that came out of that was this meaningless piece of paper. Like I say, this is one of those things we'll vote for. And then we will write our constituents, and tell them what a wonderful job we haven't done. I think everybody ought to vote for it."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Will, Representative Davis."

Davis: "Well, Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I agree, of course, with Representative Reilly. I also agree with Representative Curran. We all are going to support this Resolution. We should all support this Resolution. And Mr. Speaker, with indulgence of the fine Freshman Representative from Springfield, I would ask leave of the House that all members be added as Cosponsors of this Senate Joint Resolution."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asked leave that all Members of the House be added as Cosponsors of Senate Joint Resolution 33. Are there any objection? Hearing no objection, leave is granted. The Gentleman from McLean, Representative Ropp."

Ropp: "Yeah. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm a little bit amazed as to the reason for this, because I think the state will be in better fiscal condition. And I don't know why we have to wait five years to pay it back, if we owe it. I think it ought to be paid back a lot quicker, and that would be

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subject to the financial situation of the state. And when we are in a position to determine that 'X' number of dollars are available for that fund, we ought to do it. I don't want to wait five years to do something we ought to do maybe next year, or the year after. So, I think that's a portion of that Resolution that ought to be seriously amended."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "I have a separate Motion. I'm not going to interrupt this debate."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from DeWitt, Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Mr. Speaker, I wonder if the Gentleman would agree to amend his Resolution on its face in the form that Mr. Ropp, suggested."

Speaker McPike: "Mr. Vinson, this is a Senate Resolution, and our rules do not permit that."

Vinson: "What rule?"

Speaker McPike: "Any further discussion?"

Vinson: "H..."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Mr. Speaker, we can amend Bills on the face. We can amend anything on the face with leave of the House. No rules prevents that. I'm simply trying to facilitate, the Gentleman's intention. Why can't we simply amend it on its face in the form that Mr. Ropp suggests? All I would be asking for, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Vinson, The Chair recognizes what you're asking. It would then be sent back to the Senate for their approval. The proper thing would... would be... the proper thing to do would be file an Amendment to that affect. Proceed, Mr. Vinson."

Vinson: "Well, that's fine. But if they... if the rules permit

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Amendment on the face, and the rules do permit that, why can't we before you... after the word 'year', then prior to the period at the end of the Resolution simply insert the two words, 'or sooner'? What's wrong with that? I'm sure the Senate would approve to that. It's a good principal. It simply puts us on record as wanting to do this as quickly as possible, wanting to protect the pension funds as much as possible. I can't believe Mr. Curran, or anybody in this chamber would object to that."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Van Duyne."

Van Duyne: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I think doing something like this would be tantamount to killing the Resolution on the floor, and I object."

Speaker McPike: "Mr. Vinson. There are objections. Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Hoffman."

Speaker McPike: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker McPike: "He indicates, he will."

Hoffman: "As I understand the Resolution, as I now have it before me, that we're to pay back 20% each year. How much is that going to amount to in dollars?"

Curran: "20% of 71, is approximately 14.2."

Hoffman: "I... I... I thought the number was 85."

Curran: "About two weeks ago it was, but then there had to be a state payment into these pension funds, which reduced the amount of this savings."

Hoffman: "Alright. What... on 6%, on what basis was that chosen, why did they use 6 rather than prime or some other figure?"

Curran: "We thought 6% was a reasonable figure over the next several years."

Hoffman: "In other words, that the pension funds wouldn't do any better than that, or their experience has not been any better than that recently. Is that the reason 6% was

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chosen?"

Curran: "No 6% was chosen because we felt that it was a reasonable figure of figuring over the next five years."

Hoffman: "Am I to assume from your statement that you were involved in the discussions that developed this Resolution?"

Curran: "No. But I heard about those discussions."

Hoffman: "Alright. Is this going to be done by a separate appropriation, or is this going to be included in the appropriations for those funds?"

Curran: "This will be done next year, and four years following, five separate appropriations."

Hoffman: "By separate appropriations, so this will break out, this will break out the dollar amount plus the interest as a separate line item, or as in a separate appropriation Bill, is that correct?"

Curran: "That's correct."

Hoffman: "Alright. Is the 6% to be paid on the total amount, or is it to be paid on the reducing amount as it goes down each year?"

Curran: "On the total amount."

Hoffman: "The total amount. So, it's 6% of 71,000,000 using your number, so, 6 times that, and that would be multiplied each year and that interest would be added, is that correct?"

Curran: "It's correct."

Hoffman: "Thank you very much. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I think the last explanation is going to be mathematically a little difficult to do. But considering the significance of the Resolution, I supposed it really doesn't make any difference."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from DeWitt, Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Yes. Mr. Speaker, I do just want the record to show

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that Representative Van Duyne was against paying this back quicker."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Will, Representative Van Duyne."

Van Duyne: "A parliamentary re inquiry Mr. Speaker. How many times do... does one person under our rules get to speak on the same subject?"

Speaker McPike: "One time."

Van Duyne: "Well then why do you persist in allowing Mr. Vinson to speak at least ten?"

Speaker McPike: "The Chair tries to accommodate Representative Vinson. The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Hoffman, do you seek recognition?"

Hoffman: "I just want to remind Representative Van Duyne, he spoke twice."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Birkinbine."

Birkinbine: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I wish Representatives Vinson, Van Duyne, and Hoffman would not mention other Members' names in debate, otherwise this could go on forever."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman... Is there further discussion? Being no further discussion, the Gentleman from Sangamon, Representative Curran to close."

Curran: "I simply ask for a favorable vote. I think this is the thing we ought to do to pay this money back to teachers and state employees over the next five years. Thank you."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 33. The question is, Shall the Resolution be adopted? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question, there are 114 'ayes', no 'nays', 1 voting

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'present'. Senate Joint Resolution 33 is adopted. There has been a Motion filed with the Clerk relative to House Resolution 216. Mr. Clerk, read the Motion."

Clerk O'Brien: "A Motion pursuant to rule 43(a), I move to bypass Committee, and place House Resolution 216 on the Speaker's Table for immediate consideration. By Speaker Madigan."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentlemen from Cook, Speaker Madigan."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in support of House Resolution 216. This Resolution would provide for the creation of a select House Committee on the question of the proposed Worlds' Fair for Chicago in 1992. With the adoption of this Resolution, we will have created a Special Select Committee, whose only charge would be consideration of that question. I have been joined by Representative Daniels in support of this Resolution. I move for the adoption of the Resolution."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for the immediate consideration of House Resolution 216. Are there any objections? Representative Ebbesen, on that Motion."

Ebbesen: "Well. Mr. Speaker, I don't have a copy of the Resolution in front of me. And I was wondering Worlds' Fair, how do you spell fair, f-a-r-e, or f-a-i-r, in this for Chicago?"

Speaker McPike: "It's a question, Speaker Madigan."

Speaker Madigan: "I believe that the word is adequately spelled in House Bill 700."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has asked leave to use the Attendance Roll Call for immediate consideration of House Resolution 216. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. The Gentleman has now moved for the adoption of House Resolution 216. Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, 'Shall House Resolution 216 be adopted?' All those in

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favor signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question, there are 112 'ayes', no 'nays', none voting 'present'. House Resolution 216 is adopted. Announcements. Are there any announcements?
Representative Keane."

Keane: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I move to suspend the posting requirements for House Bills 1781, and 2149 to be heard in Revenue tomorrow. I am Vice-chairman of the Revenue Committee. Representative Pierce is not here. We've discussed the matter with Minority Spokesman on Revenue, Representative Hastert, and he has no opposition."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to suspend the posting requirements on those two Bills. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Posting requirements is suspended. Representative Leverenz."

Leverenz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. For purpose of an announcement in the Appropriations Committee that's coming Thursday, we will not, we will not hear the Department of Commerce and Community Affairs' subject matter of their Bill. DCCA's postponed until next week. Thank you."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As the principal Sponsor of House Bill 2275, I ask leave to put that Bill in Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to place House Bill 2275 on Interim Study. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. 2275 is on Interim Study.
Representative White."

White: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Human Services Committee will meet at 4 o'clock on the House Floor, at 4 o'clock on the House Floor of the Human Services Committee. Thank you."

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Speaker McPike: "Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, due to inadvertence, a Bill previously posted in Human Services wasn't posted for this week, House Bill 1086. I would like to waive the posting requirements for Friday's Human Service meeting, their Friday, 8 a.m. meeting, not their meeting this afternoon. House Bill 1086, to be heard Friday at 8 a.m."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to waive the posting requirements for House Bill 1086, so it can be heard in Committee this week. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Representative Hannig."

Hannig: "Yes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to ask leave of the House to put House Bill 1675 in Interim Study, that's in the Public Utilities Committee."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asked leave to place House Bill 1675 in Interim Study. Are there any objection? Hearing no objection, leave is granted. Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "I just received a... from one of the mushrooms, a Motion to post House Bill 1712 in Revenue. It had been posted an earlier week, but it was neglected to be posted this week. House Bill 1712, for 11 a.m., tomorrow morning in Revenue. 1712."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asked leave to waive the posting requirements on House Bill 1712, so it can be heard in Committee this week. Are there any objection? Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Has the Gentleman discussed that with the Minority Spokesman on the Committee?"

Speaker McPike: "Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "I don't think I did, but we just did it for Representative Friedrich. Can I speak to you now? Okay? He says, 'It's okay'. 1712."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Christensen."

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Christensen: "Yes. Mr. Speaker. I'd like to have leave of the House to put House Bill 686 in Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asked leave to place House Bill 686 in Interim Study. Are there any objection? Representative Christensen."

Christensen: "Yes. Mr. Speaker. Just for an announcement to the..."

Speaker McPike: "Let me finish this Motion. Hearing no objections, leave is granted. House Bill 686 will be placed in Interim Study. Representative Christensen."

Christensen: "Yes. I just want to announce that Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, the Select Committee on Aging will be meeting. And I'd like to remind the Members to get there. We've only got one Bill, and we'll be out in 10 minutes."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Pierce on that posting Motion. Well, you will have to make it again. Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Yes. This is on Representative Kulas's Bill, House Bill 1712. Would like to have that posted for Revenue Committee tomorrow at 11 a.m., to waive the posting requirements."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to waive the posting requirements on House Bill 17... There is an objection, Representative Pierce. The Lady from Sangamon, Representative Oblinger objects."

Pierce: "She objects?"

Speaker McPike: "Yes, she objects."

Pierce: "Go see Representative Kulas, I don't care."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Yeah. She can get lost in Lake Springfield, because it was done Thursday. Apparently, she wasn't in her seat to stop it."

Speaker McPike: "If there are no further announcements, or

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requests, the Chair is prepared to adjourned.
Representative Mulcahey."

Mulcahey: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just to announce that Elementary and Secondary Education Committee will meet tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock sharp. We got exactly 50 Bills to hear. And we don't want to come back Thursday."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Greiman on the Adjournment."

Greiman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I move that the House stand adjourned until the hour of 12 o'clock tomorrow, giving the Clerk 5 minutes to read in First Readings."

Speaker McPike: "Allowing the Clerk 5 minutes of perfunctory, the Gentleman has moved that the House stand adjourned until the hour of 12 noon tomorrow. All those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it. The House stands adjourned."

Clerk O'Brien: "A message from the Senate by Mr. Wright, Secretary. 'Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives the Senate has concurred with the House in passage of Bills of the following titles to wit: House Bill 1297, and House Bill 311, passed by the Senate May 3, 1983.
