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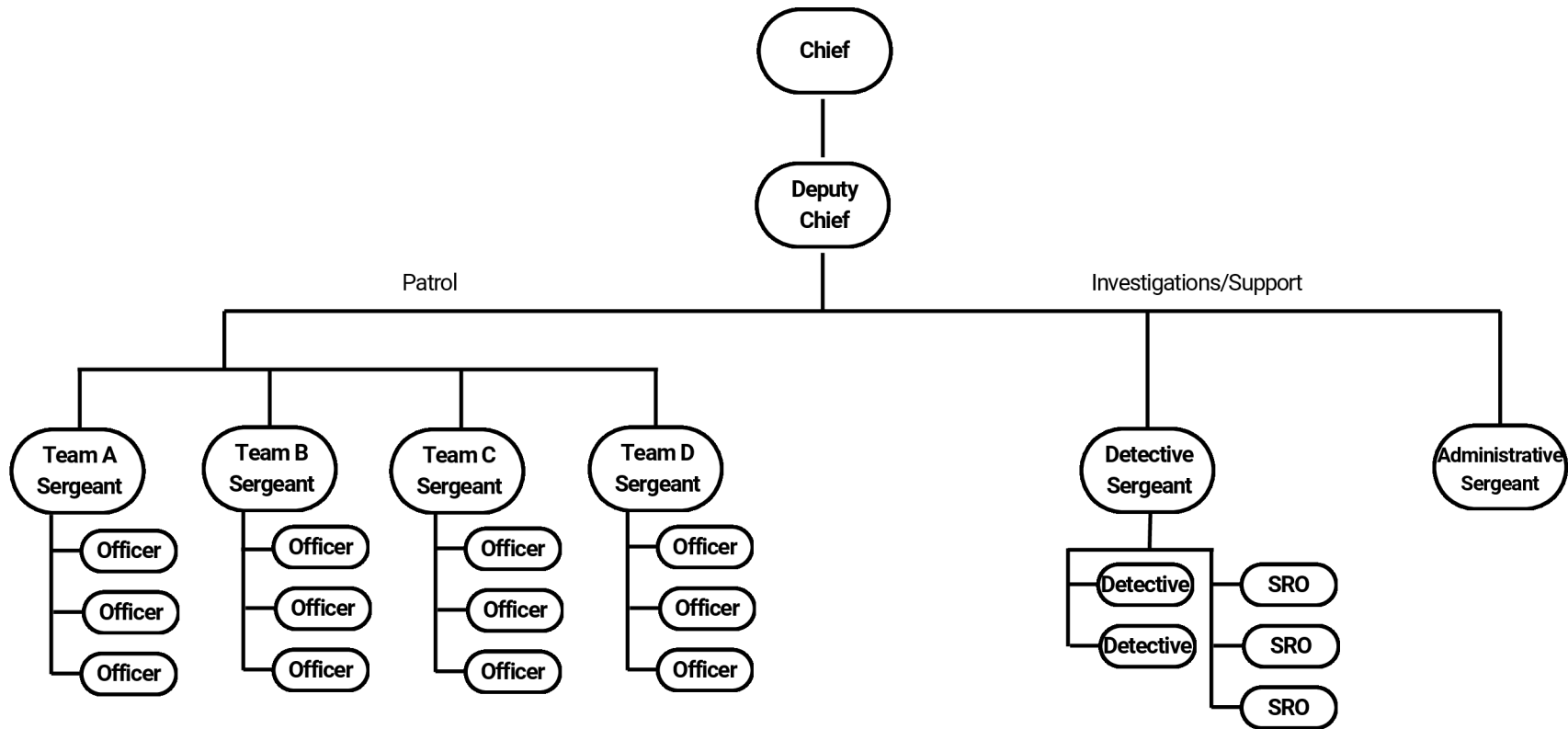

AGENCY OVERVIEW

The Barrington Police Department consists of an authorized force of 25 sworn officers. The organizational structure is as follows:



Patrol members regularly utilize Officer-Worn Body Cameras (OWBC) during their shift. Investigation/Support and Administration members only utilize OWBCs when their duties involve interaction with citizens in a law enforcement capacity, either within the Barrington Police Station or in public.

OFFICER-WORN BODY CAMERA PROGRAM DETAILS

OWBCs Utilized:

The Barrington Police Department (BPD) maintains 27 OWBCs. 25 OWBCs are actively utilized and are issued by the Department, one to each member. 2 OWBCs are maintained as backups/replacements.

BPD utilized Motorola V300 OWBCs until 01/27/25 when they were upgraded to V700 OWBCs, which are currently in service.

Technical Issues Experienced:

A variety of technical issues have been experienced since deploying OWBCS, including:

- OWBC not turning off
- OWBC association failure
- OWBC lens scratched
- OWBC video displaying pink/green lines in view
- OWBC charge fault
- OWBC top button not working
- OWBC failure to sync with squad camera

These issues were remedied by the OWBC being replaced by Motorola, or through firmware updates.

SUPERVISOR REVIEW PROCESS

Barrington Police Policy 454.7.1 (e):

Supervisors are permitted to access and view BWC media of their subordinates.

1. Supervisors should review BWC media that is tagged as a significant event or that the supervisor is aware pertains to a significant event.
2. Supervisors should conduct documented reviews of their subordinate's BWC media at least annually to evaluate the member's performance, verify compliance with [department/office] procedures, and determine the need for additional training. The review should include a variety of event types when possible. Supervisors should review BWC media with the recording member when it would be beneficial to provide guidance or to conduct one-on-one informal training for the member.
3. Supervisors should conduct periodic reviews of a sample of each subordinate's BWC media to evaluate BWC use and ensure compliance with this policy.
