SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 613

WHEREAS, The United States and Korea first established diplomatic relations on May 22, 1882 with the signing of the Treaty of Peace, Amiry, Commerce and Navigation; following Korea's occupation by Japan from 1905 until the end of World War II, the U.S. formally reestablished its diplomatic relationship with the Republic of Korea (R.O.K.) on March 25, 1949, and the two nations signed their Mutual Defense Treaty on October 1, 1953; and

WHEREAS, In 2023, the U.S.-R.O.K. alliance is marking 70 years since the cessation of hostilities in the Korean War and the signing of the Armistice Agreement on July 27, 1953, which remains in place today and, by its terms, has neither formally ended the Korean War nor constituted a permanent settlement of peace on the Korean Peninsula; and

WHEREAS, The U.S.-R.O.K. alliance is also rooted in mutual trust, shared sacrifice, common values, economic interests, and generations of people-to-people ties that provide a foundation for one of the strongest, most interoperable, and enduring bilateral alliances in the world; and

WHEREAS, The U.S.-R.O.K. alliance was forged in shared sacrifice, as 1,789,000 U.S. soldiers, sailors, airmen, and marines served during the Korean War, of whom 36,574 paid the ultimate sacrifice with their lives in defense of the R.O.K., including 7,174 soldiers in the Korean Augmentation to the U.S. Army; more than 7,500 members of the U.S. Armed Forces remain classified by the Department of Defense as missing in action; casualties of the R.O.K. numbered more than 217,000 soldiers killed and more than 291,000 wounded during the war; and

WHEREAS, The American and Korean people share deeply rooted values of defending freedom, championing economic and social opportunity and inclusion, upholding human rights, and respecting the rule of law; now; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize the 70th anniversary of the United States-Republic of Korea alliance and celebrate the strong cultural and economic ties between the two nations and the special bonds forged between people of the State of Illinois and the Republic of Korea.

Senator Koehler offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 632

WHEREAS, Article 11 SECTION 1 of the Illinois State Constitution states that it is the public policy of the State and the duty of each person to provide and maintain a healthful environment for the benefit of this and future generations; and

WHEREAS, SECTION 2 states that each person has the right to a healthful environment and that each person may enforce this right against any party, governmental or private, through appropriate legal proceedings subject to reasonable limitation and regulation as the General Assembly may provide by the law; and

WHEREAS, The General Assembly is charged by law with providing for the implementation and enforcement of this public policy; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois 30 by 30 Task Force discussed the application of the 30 by 30 concept in Illinois and considered how agriculture is a predominate land use in the state (75% of the State's land area); and

WHEREAS, The Task Force determined that part of a successful strategy would include permanent dedication through fee simple and easement acquisition, as well as voluntary conservation practices; and

WHEREAS, Currently, 4.2% of the total land area in Illinois is formally protected for conservation purposes through public and private mechanisms; and

WHEREAS, Over the past 10 years, the Illinois Department of Natural Resources has acquired approximately 20,000 acres in fee simple acquisitions; and

WHEREAS, The Forestry Development Act provides a reduced property tax rate to private forest owners that enter into agreements to manage their timber through timber stand improvement, to control exotic species, or for wildlife habitat development; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Nature Preserves Commission has two programs that offer the highest level of legal protection for natural lands in Illinois, the Dedicated Nature Preserve and the Registered Land and Water Reserve; and

WHEREAS, The Conservation and Fall Covers for Spring Savings are two programs that support conservation practices on agricultural land; and

WHEREAS, More than 1.5 million acres are currently under contract for three programs in Illinois, which include the U.S. Department of Agriculture, such as the Environmental Quality Incentives Program, the Conservation Stewardship Program, and the Regional Conservation Partnership Program; and

WHEREAS, Measuring of conserved lands would help the State to know the adequate amount of land conserved, their overall percentages, the breakdown of geographical area, and the discussion of access to conserved lands; and

WHEREAS, The amount of work needed for a successful outcome would best be accomplished by collaboration with all coordinating State agencies; and

WHEREAS, In addition, conservation capacity can be built by increasing conservation agency staffing; and

WHEREAS, Aligning programs with local priorities and values provides feedback and actively engages local communities in preparation for new programs and open spaces, and the participation of students on this project is important for the coordination between public and conservation efforts; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the creation of a coordinating council under the Illinois Lieutenant Governor's office to bring together a relevant staff of agencies and non-governmental organizations to develop a strategy for implementation of the 30 by 30 concept; and be it further

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RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the students of Pontiac Township High School.

Senator Koehler offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 683

WHEREAS, The American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) stated in its 2021 report card that the United States received a grade of C- regarding the current state of infrastructure and that more than six trillion dollars is needed to restore the nation's infrastructure to a state of good repair; over two trillion dollars is currently not funded, and the remainder is inadequately funded; new, 21st Century projects are also unfunded; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois ASCE 2022 Report Card assigned the State's systems a cumulative grade of "C-"; the report analyzes 11 categories of infrastructure pertinent to Illinois, including aviation (C+), bridges (C), dams (C+), drinking water (D+), inland waterways (D), ports (C-), rail (C+), roads (D+), storm water (D+), transit (D+), and wastewater (C-); and

WHEREAS, Out of four million total water service lines, over 675,000 have been identified as lead and almost 380,000 as copper with lead solder services; and

WHEREAS, Illinois' aging drinking water infrastructure is leading to leaking pipelines, costing taxpayers money and critical resources; in 2017, a total of 106 million gallons per day (MGD) were lost among Lake Michigan allocation permittees, or 13% of total water supplied; additional funding is needed for aging storm water infrastructure that must keep up with increasing rainfall trends from climate change; and

WHEREAS, Illinois needs at least 300,000 new units of affordable housing for the most housing insecure; and

WHEREAS, There are 2,405 bridges in poor condition, or 9% of all bridges in the State that are crossed by motorists every day; approximately 70% of Illinois bridges in poor condition are owned by counties, towns, or cities, suggesting the local maintenance backlog is a significant challenge; and

WHEREAS, U.S. Reps. Danny Davis and Jesus "Chuy" Garcia introduced H.R. 4052 (The National Infrastructure Bank Act) on June 13, 2023 in the 118th U.S. Congress; this would create a \$5 trillion bank to finance all infrastructure requirements to bring the system to a state of good repair and build new projects; and

WHEREAS, The new national infrastructure bank is modeled on previous banks that helped build much of the country's infrastructure under Presidents George Washington, James Madison, Abraham Lincoln, and Franklin D. Roosevelt; the last such bank helped bring us out of the Great Depression and win World War II; and

WHEREAS, The new national infrastructure bank will create 25 million new jobs, pay Davis-Bacon wages, and enforce Buy America provisions; Disadvantaged Business Enterprises will receive significant disbursements, and the bill mandates large-scale minority hiring; the bank will require no new federal spending or federal taxes; according to experts, the bank will grow the economy by 5% per year as did its predecessors; and

WHEREAS, Many organizations are in support of a new national infrastructure bank, including the National Black Caucus of State Legislators, the National Hispanic Caucus of State Legislators, the National Asian-Pacific American Caucus of State Legislators, the Council of State Governments-East, the National Association of Counties, the National Association of Development Organizations, the US High Speed Rail Association, the National Latino Farmers and Ranchers Trade Association, the American Sustainable

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Business Council, the National Association of Minority Contractors, and the United Association of Plumbers and Steamfitters International Union; in addition, 26 state legislatures have introduced or passed resolutions of support, as have county and city councils, including the Chicago City Council; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the United States Congress to pass H.R. 4052 to create a new national infrastructure bank to finance urgently needed infrastructure projects; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the President of the United States, the U.S. Senate Majority Leader, the U.S. Senate Minority Leader, the U.S. Speaker of the House, the U.S. House of Representatives Minority Leader, all members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation, and the Governor.

Senator Holmes offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 699

WHEREAS, Multiple sclerosis (MS) is a neurological disease of the central nervous system, affecting nearly one million people in the United States alone; and

WHEREAS, MS generally strikes people in the prime of life, between ages 20 through 50; the cause and course of the often debilitating symptoms of MS remain unknown, and no cure currently exists; and

WHEREAS, The National Multiple Sclerosis Society is committed to a world free of MS and is working to heighten public knowledge about and insight into the disease; and

WHEREAS, The National Multiple Sclerosis Society has transformed what it means to live with MS and has provided global leadership to help achieve its vision of a world free of MS; and

WHEREAS, Since 1946, the National Multiple Sclerosis Society has been a driving force of MS research, relentlessly pursuing prevention, treatments, and a cure, and has invested more than \$1 billion in groundbreaking research; and

WHEREAS, Funds raised through the National Multiple Sclerosis Society fuel research on pathways to MS cures and invest in the MS research workforce at the best medical centers, universities, and other institutions throughout the U.S. and abroad, leading to many breakthroughs in the treatment of MS; and

WHEREAS, The mission of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society is to cure MS while empowering people affected by MS to live their best lives and is an effort that all Americans and Illinoisans should support; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare March 10-16, 2024 as "MS Awareness Week" in the State of Illinois and encourage all Illinoisans to learn more about multiple sclerosis and what they can do to support individuals with MS and their families; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we recognize the importance of finding the cause and cure of MS and express our appreciation for the dedication that the National Multiple Sclerosis Society has shown toward creating a world free of MS; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the National Multiple Sclerosis Society as a symbol of our respect and esteem.

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Senator Morrison offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 702

WHEREAS, Illinois rivers were once a vital part of the culture and lives of the Peoria, Kaskaskia, Piankashaw, Wea, Miami, Mascoutin, Odawa, Sauk, Mesquaki, Kickapoo, Potawatomi, Ojibwe, and Chickasaw peoples who inhabited the land, which continues to carry their stories; and

WHEREAS, Illinois rivers have been a vital part of the State's history since statehood, including the life of the 16th President Abraham Lincoln, the story of the Underground Railroad up to and during the Civil War, and part of the development story of the City of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, Rivers throughout Illinois are premier natural resources, providing water for agriculture, wildlife, recreation, and residential and industrial uses; and

WHEREAS, Illinois contains more miles of rivers than any other state east of the Mississippi River, and Illinoisans throughout the State enjoy recreation on Illinois rivers, including boating, fishing, angling, kayaking, canoeing, paddleboarding, tubing, and many other sports; and

WHEREAS, Agriculture, water recreation, and water-related tourism are key economic drivers in the State, and the values and services associated with watersheds such as clean water and energy are critical to the State's overall economic health; and

WHEREAS, Tons of trash, junk, and debris are annually dumped into Illinois Rivers along its banks, negatively impacting riparian wildlife, damaging both the aesthetic and biological qualities of a river; and

WHEREAS, Various state legislatures have encouraged waterway clean-up activities by designating September as River Clean Up Month; and

WHEREAS, During the month of September, water levels are usually low, temperatures are warm, and colleges and schools are in session, all of which present an educational opportunity to involve area youth and to highlight the importance of clean rivers and waterways; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare the month of September 2024 as River Clean Up Month in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage chambers of commerce, convention and visitors bureaus, local economic development organizations, area groups and associations, and local schools and colleges to organize and coordinate local cleanup activities along portions of rivers and waterways in their area; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the State of Illinois is encouraged to promote September as River Clean Up Month.

Senator Loughran Cappel offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 703

WHEREAS, Dyscalculia is a condition that affects one's ability to understand mathematical and quantitative concepts and tasks; and

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WHEREAS, Between 3% to 7% of all children, adolescents, and adults suffer from dyscalculia; however, data from the adult population is limited due to a lack of understanding and recognition of dyscalculia, leading many people to go undiagnosed; and

WHEREAS, The symptoms of dyscalculia are most likely to be present during childhood, when one is learning the foundations of math; and

WHEREAS, When dyscalculia goes undiagnosed, a lack of success at mathematical tasks can lead to an increased risk in developing depression and a decline in self-esteem; and

WHEREAS, Treatment for dyscalculia focuses on learning through repetition, positive reinforcement, tutoring, and teaching in a multisensory way, as there are no medications available to treat dyscalculia; and

WHEREAS, While individuals with dyscalculia may have a harder time learning math than their peers, they can still excel in the subject when given the necessary accommodations, constructive criticism, and positive reinforcement; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare March 3, 2024 as Dyscalculia Awareness Day in the State of Illinois.

Senator Murphy offered the following Senate Joint Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44

WHEREAS, Volumes of crude oil shipments have risen rapidly in the 2010s relative to previous decades; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) remains committed to transporting flammable liquids by all modes of transportation, including the nation's 140,000-mile freight railroad network that is often located near public areas such as neighborhoods and schools, endangering citizens by placing them unknowingly within blast and evacuations zones; and

WHEREAS, The rail transportation of large volumes of crude oil and other petroleum products presents unique safety risks; and

WHEREAS, Incidents such as the derailment in Lac-Megantic, Quebec, Canada, when a unit train carrying crude oil from the Bakken region of North Dakota killed 47 unsuspecting people and decimated most of the village, have resulted in significant and devastating loss of life and destruction of property and the environment; and

WHEREAS, The safe and successful management of any hazardous materials incident is based on effective pre-incident planning, preparedness, training, exercises, and implementation of an incident management system; and

WHEREAS, The Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (PHMSA), in consultation with the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA), issued a final rule to improve oil spill response readiness and mitigate effects of rail accidents and incidents involving petroleum oil and high-hazard flammable trains (HHFTs); and

WHEREAS, The intent of comprehensive oil spill response plans (COSRPs) requirements is to ensure that local emergency responders and emergency response planning officials have access to sufficient information regarding the movement of HHFTs in their jurisdictions to adequately plan and prepare for emergency events; and

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WHEREAS, Government concern regarding the dissemination of "sensitive security information" should not surpass a parent's right to information necessary in allowing them to make decisions related to securing the safety of their child or the school faculty and staff's right to safe working conditions; and

WHEREAS, In order for school personnel to manage a hazardous materials incident safely and successfully, they too must take part in effective pre-incident planning, preparedness, training, exercises, and implementation of an incident management system; and

WHEREAS, Even without derailling, spilling, or exploding, doctors have warned that proximity to oil trains poses a serious health risk with increasing rates in cancer, asthma, and cardiovascular disease through exposure to particulate matter released as emissions from trains; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that we urge local emergency response planning officials to partner with school districts in their region in order to disseminate information pertaining to safety threats related to the storage and transport of hazardous substances, including petroleum oil and HHFTs, to the parents of attending students, faculty and staff, and schools at risk of being negatively impacted by storage facilities and/or the transport of such hazardous materials; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge local emergency response planning officials to include school districts in their region in the development and implementation of oil spill response plans specific to incidents involving the storage and transport of hazardous materials, including petroleum oil and HHFTs; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge Congress and the Federal Railroad Administration to find a way to better notify and protect communities as hazardous products move through a community; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to all emergency response planning committees throughout the State, the President of the United States, the U.S. Senate Majority Leader, the U.S. Senate Minority Leader, the U.S. Speaker of the House, the U.S. House of Representatives Minority Leader, all members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation, and Federal Railroad Administration Administrator Amit Bose.

Senator Joyce offered the following Senate Joint Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 45

WHEREAS, Certain state agencies have specialty equipment and personnel with expertise that other state agencies do not have; and

WHEREAS, It is in the State's best interest for state agencies to work together on projects and to loan equipment to other state agencies for Illinois to work efficiently and at the lowest cost to taxpayers; therefore, be it

(b) Districts and subdistricts created by this Act for the purpose of electing members of the Chicago Board of Education shall not be altered by operation of any other statute, ordinance, or resolution.

(c) In this Act, blocks are identified by a 15-digit number as follows:

(1) The first 2 digits are the state code used by the United States Bureau of the Census for Illinois.

(2) The next 3 digits are the county code used by the United States Bureau of the Census for Cook County.

(3) The next 6 digits are the census tract number.

(4) The last 4 digits are the block number.

(d) Any part of the City of Chicago that has not been described as included in one of the subdistricts described in this Act is included within the subdistrict that (i) is contiguous to the part and (ii) contains the least population of all subdistricts contiguous to the part according to the 2020 decennial census.

(e) If any part of the City of Chicago is described in this Act as being in more than one subdistrict, the part is included within the subdistrict that (i) is one of the subdistricts in which that part is listed in this Act, (ii) is contiguous to that part, and (iii) contains the least population according to the 2020 decennial census.

(f) If any part of the City of Chicago (i) is described in this Act as being in one subdistrict and (ii) is entirely surrounded by another subdistrict, then the part shall be incorporated into the subdistrict that surrounds the part.

(g) If any part of the City of Chicago (i) is described in this Act as being in one subdistrict and (ii) is not contiguous to another part of that subdistrict, then the part is included within the contiguous subdistrict that contains the least population according to the 2020 decennial census.

(h) The Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate shall by joint letter of transmittal present to the Secretary of State for deposit into the State Archives an official set of United States Bureau of the Census 2020 geography maps, and those maps shall serve as the official record of all census tracts and blocks referred to in this Act.

(i) The State Board of Elections shall prepare and make available to the public a metes and bounds description of the districts and subdistricts created under this Act.

(j) The Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate shall transmit to the Secretary of State detailed maps of each district and subdistrict. These maps will accurately depict the districts and subdistricts as approved by the General Assembly.

ARTICLE 5.

Section 5-5. The School Code is amended by changing Sections 34-3, 34-4, 34-4.1, and 34-21.10 and adding Sections 34-18.85 and 34-18.86 as follows:

(105 ILCS 5/34-3) (from Ch. 122, par. 34-3)

Sec. 34-3. Chicago School Reform Board of Trustees; new Chicago Board of Education; members; term; vacancies.

(a) Within 30 days after the effective date of this amendatory Act of 1995, the terms of all members of the Chicago Board of Education holding office on that date are abolished and the Mayor shall appoint, without the consent or approval of the City Council, a 5 member Chicago School Reform Board of Trustees which shall take office upon the appointment of the fifth member. The Chicago School Reform Board of Trustees and its members shall serve until, and the terms of all members of the Chicago School Reform Board of Trustees shall expire on, June 30, 1999 or upon the appointment of a new Chicago Board of Education as provided in subsection (b), whichever is later. Any vacancy in the membership of the Trustees shall be filled through appointment by the Mayor, without the consent or approval of the City Council, for the unexpired term. One of the members appointed by the Mayor to the Trustees shall be designated by the Mayor to serve as President of the Trustees. The Mayor shall appoint a full-time, compensated chief executive officer, and his or her compensation as such chief executive officer shall be determined by the Mayor. The Mayor, at his or her discretion, may appoint the President to serve simultaneously as the chief executive officer.

(b) This subsection applies until January 15, 2025. Within 30 days before the expiration of the terms of the members of the Chicago Reform Board of Trustees as provided in subsection (a), a new Chicago Board of Education consisting of 7 members shall be appointed by the Mayor to take office on the later of July 1, 1999 or the appointment of the seventh member. Three of the members initially so appointed under this subsection shall serve for terms ending June 30, 2002, 4 of the members initially so appointed under this subsection shall serve for terms ending June 30, 2003, and each member initially so appointed shall continue to hold office until his or her successor is appointed and qualified.

(b-5) On January 15, 2025, the terms of all members of the Chicago Board of Education appointed under subsection (b) are abolished when the new board, consisting of 21 members, is appointed by the Mayor and elected by the electors of the school district as provided under subsections (b-10) and (b-15) and takes office.

~~(b-10) By December 16, 2024 for a term of office beginning on January 15, 2025, the Mayor shall appoint 10 Chicago Board of Education members to serve terms of 2 years. All appointed members shall serve until a successor is appointed or elected and qualified. Thereafter at the expiration of the term of any member a successor shall be elected and shall hold office for a term of 4 years, from January 15 of the year in which the term commences and until a successor is appointed or elected and qualified. Any vacancy in the appointed membership of the Chicago Board of Education shall be filled through appointment by the Mayor for the unexpired term. The terms of the 10 appointed members under this subsection shall end on January 14, 2027. By December 16, 2024 for a term of office beginning on January 15, 2025, the Mayor shall appoint a President of the board Board for a 2-year term that begins January 15, 2025 of 2 years. The board shall elect annually from its number a vice-president, in such manner and at such time as the board determines by its rules. The president appointed by the Mayor and vice-president elected by the board shall each perform the duties imposed upon their respective office by the rules of the board, provided that (i) the president shall preside at meetings of the board and shall only have voting rights to break a voting tie of the other Chicago Board of Education elected and appointed members and (ii) the vice-president vice president shall perform the duties of the president if that office is vacant or the president is absent or unable to act. Beginning with the 2026 general election, one member shall be elected at large and serve as the president of the board for a 4-year term that begins January 15, 2027. On and after After January 15, 2027, the president shall preside at meetings of the board and vote as any other member but have no power of veto. The secretary of the Board shall be selected by the Board and shall be an employee of the Board rather than a member of the Board, notwithstanding subsection (d) of Section 34-3.3. The duties of the secretary shall be imposed by the rules of the Board.~~

~~(b-15) Beginning with the 2024 general election, 10 members of the Chicago Board of Education shall be elected to serve a term of 4 years in office beginning on January 15, 2025. Beginning with the 2026 general election, 10 members of the Chicago Board of Education shall be elected to serve a term of 4 years in office beginning on January 15, 2027. Whenever a vacancy of a Chicago Board of Education elected board member occurs, the President of the Board shall notify the Mayor of the vacancy within 7 days after its occurrence and shall, within 30 days, fill the vacancy for the remainder of the unexpired term by majority~~

vote of the remaining board members. The successor shall have the same qualifications as his or her predecessor.

For purposes of selection of members of the Chicago Board of Education ~~elections conducted under this subsection~~, the City of Chicago shall be divided into 10 districts, and each of those 10 districts shall be subdivided into 2 subdistricts ~~electoral districts~~ as provided in ~~under~~ subsection (a) of Section 34-21.10.

Until January 15, 2027, each ~~From January 15, 2025 to January 14, 2027, each~~ district shall be represented by one ~~elected~~ member who is elected at the 2024 general election to a 2-year term that begins January 15, 2025 and one ~~appointed~~ member who is appointed by the Mayor by no later than December 16, 2024 to a 2-year term that begins January 15, 2025. Each elected member shall reside within the district that the member represents, and each appointed member shall reside both within the district that the member represents and outside of the subdistrict within which the elected member of the district resides.

Beginning ~~After~~ January 15, 2027, each subdistrict ~~district~~ shall be represented by one ~~elected~~ member who is elected at the 2026 general election. If a member is elected at the 2026 general election to fill the expired term of an appointed member, then the elected member shall serve a 2-year term that begins January 15, 2027. If a member is elected at the 2026 general election to fill the expired term of an elected member, then the member shall serve a 4-year term that begins January 15, 2027.

If a member is elected at the 2026 general election to serve a 2-year term, then the member elected at the 2028 general election shall serve a 4-year term that begins January 15, 2029. If a member is elected at the 2026 general election to serve a 4-year term, then the member elected in that subdistrict at the 2030 general election shall serve a 2-year term that begins January 15, 2031.

Beginning with the members elected at the 2032 general election, the members of each subdistrict shall serve two 4-year terms and one 2-year term for each 10-year period thereafter. As determined by lot, the terms of the members representing the subdistricts shall be the following:

(1) the members representing 7 subdistricts shall be elected for one 2-year term, followed by two 4-year terms;

(2) the members representing 7 subdistricts shall be elected for one 4-year term, followed by one 2-year term, and then one 4-year term; and

(3) the members representing 6 subdistricts shall be elected for two 4-year terms, followed by one 2-year term.

Each elected member shall reside within the subdistrict that the member represents.

(b-20) All elected and appointed members shall serve until a successor is appointed or elected and qualified.

Whenever there is a vacancy in the office of an appointed board member, the Mayor shall appoint a successor who has the same qualifications as the member's predecessor to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the unexpired term.

Whenever there is a vacancy in the office of an elected board member, the President of the Board shall notify the Mayor of the vacancy within 7 days after its occurrence and shall, within 30 days, fill the vacancy for the remainder of the unexpired term by majority vote of the remaining board members. The successor to the elected member shall have the same qualifications as the member's predecessor.

(b-30) No member shall have, ~~or be an employee or owner of a company that has~~, a contract with the school district or be an owner or partial owner of a company that has a contract with the school district. Members must publicly disclose whether they have a financial interest in any matter before the Board and recuse themselves from deliberations and abstain from voting on the matter. No Board member may be hired by the school district in any capacity for a period of one year after terminating service as a member of the Board. In addition, during that year, the member cannot enter into any contracts or agreements with the school district. ~~No former officer, member, or employee of the board shall, within a period of one year immediately after termination of service on the board, knowingly accept employment or receive compensation or fees for services from a person or entity if the officer, member, or employee, during the year immediately preceding termination of service on the board, participated personally and substantially in the award of contracts with the board or the school district, or the issuance of contract change orders with the board or the school district, with a cumulative value of \$25,000 or more to the person or entity, or its parent or subsidiary.~~

(c) The board may appoint a student to the board to serve in an advisory capacity. The student member shall serve for a term as determined by the board. The board may not grant the student member any voting privileges, but shall consider the student member as an advisor. The student member may not participate in or attend any executive session of the board.

Sec. 34-4. Eligibility. To be eligible for election or appointment to the board, a person shall be a citizen of the United States, shall be a registered voter as provided in the Election Code, shall have been, for a period of one year immediately before election or appointment, a resident of the city and, if applicable, district, and subdistrict that the member represents the electoral district, for at least one year immediately preceding his or her election or appointment, and shall not be a child sex offender as defined in Section 11-9.3 of the Criminal Code of 2012. A person is ineligible for election or appointment to the board if that person is an employee of the school district. For the 2024 general election, all ~~At~~ persons eligible for election to the board shall be nominated by a petition signed by at least 1,000 but not more than 3,000 of the no less than 250 voters residing within the electoral district on a petition in order to be placed on the ballot. For the 2026 general election and general elections thereafter, persons eligible for election to the board shall be nominated by a petition signed by at least 500 but no more than 1,500 voters residing within the subdistrict on a petition in order to be placed on the ballot, except that persons eligible for election to the board at large shall be nominated by a petition signed by no less than 2,500 voters residing within the city. Any registered voter may sign a nominating petition, irrespective of any partisan petition the voter signs or may sign. For the 2024 general election only, the petition circulation period shall begin on March 26, 2024, and the filing period shall be from June 17, 2024 to June 24, 2024. Permanent removal from the city by any member of the board during his term of office constitutes a resignation therefrom and creates a vacancy in the board. Board members shall serve without any compensation; however, board members shall be reimbursed for expenses incurred while in the performance of their duties upon submission of proper receipts or upon submission of a signed voucher in the case of an expense allowance evidencing the amount of such reimbursement or allowance to the president of the board for verification and approval. Board members shall not hold other public office under the Federal, State or any local government other than that of Director of the Regional Transportation Authority, member of the economic development commission of a city having a population exceeding 500,000, notary public or member of the National Guard, and by accepting any such office while members of the board, or by not resigning any such office held at the time of being elected or appointed to the board within 30 days after such election or appointment, shall be deemed to have vacated their membership in the board.

Sec. 34-4.1. Nomination petitions. In addition to the requirements of the general election law, the form of petitions under Section 34-4 of this Code shall be substantially as follows:

To the Board of Election Commissioners for the City of Chicago:

We the undersigned, being (... or more) of the voters residing within said district, hereby petition that ... who resides at ... in the City of Chicago shall be a candidate for the office of ... of the board of education (full term) (vacancy) to be voted for at the election to be held on (insert date).

Name: Address:

In the designation of the name of a candidate on a petition for nomination, the candidate's given name or names, initial or initials, a nickname by which the candidate is commonly known, or a combination thereof may be used in addition to the candidate's surname. If a candidate has changed his or her name, whether by a statutory or common law procedure in Illinois or any other jurisdiction, within 3 years before the last day for filing the petition, then (i) the candidate's name on the petition must be followed by "formerly known as (list all prior names during the 3-year period) until name changed on (list date of each such name change)" and (ii) the petition must be accompanied by the candidate's affidavit stating the candidate's previous names during the period specified in clause (i) and the date or dates each of those names was changed; failure to meet these requirements shall be grounds for denying certification of the candidate's name for the ballot, but these requirements do not apply to name changes resulting from adoption to assume an adoptive parent's or parents' surname, marriage to assume a spouse's surname, or dissolution of marriage or declaration of invalidity of marriage to assume a former surname. No other designation, such as a political slogan, as defined by Section 7-17 of the Election Code, title or degree, or nickname suggesting or implying possession of a title, degree or professional status, or similar information may be used in connection with the candidate's surname.

All petitions for the nomination of members of a board of education shall be filed with the board of election commissioners of the jurisdiction in which the principal office of the school district is located within the time provided for by the general election law, except that petitions for the nomination of members of the board of education for the 2024 general election shall be prepared and certified as outlined in Article 10 of the Election Code. The board of election commissioners shall receive and file only those petitions that include a statement of candidacy, the required number of voter signatures, the notarized signature of the petition circulator, and a receipt from the county clerk showing that the candidate has filed a statement of economic interest on or before the last day to file as required by the Illinois Governmental Ethics Act. The board of election commissioners may have petition forms available for issuance to potential candidates and may give notice of the petition filing period by publication in a newspaper of general circulation within the school district not less than 10 days prior to the first day of filing. The board of election commissioners shall make certification to the proper election authorities in accordance with the general election law.

The board of election commissioners of the jurisdiction in which the principal office of the school district is located shall notify the candidates for whom a petition for nomination is filed or the appropriate committee of the obligations under the Campaign Financing Act as provided in the general election law. Such notice shall be given on a form prescribed by the State Board of Elections and in accordance with the requirements of the general election law. The board of election commissioners shall within 7 days of filing or on the last day for filing, whichever is earlier, acknowledge to the petitioner in writing the office's acceptance of the petition.

A candidate for membership on the board of education who has petitioned for nomination to fill a full term and to fill a vacant term to be voted upon at the same election must withdraw his or her petition for nomination from either the full term or the vacant term by written declaration.

Nomination petitions are not valid unless the candidate named therein files with the board of election commissioners a receipt from the county clerk showing that the candidate has filed a statement of economic interests as required by the Illinois Governmental Ethics Act. Such receipt shall be so filed either previously during the calendar year in which his or her nomination papers were filed or within the period for the filing of nomination papers in accordance with the general election law.

Sec. 34-18.85. Chicago Board of Education Black Student Achievement Advisory Board.

(a) The Chicago Board of Education Black Student Achievement Advisory Board is created to provide Black students with the maximum opportunity for success during their elementary and secondary educational experience.

(b) The Chicago Board of Education Black Student Achievement Advisory Board shall be composed of individuals appointed by the President of the Chicago Board of Education to advise the Chicago Board of Education on, without limitation, the following issues:

(1) helping students excel in their educational performance;

(2) providing students with the character-building tools to succeed;

(3) reducing absenteeism and truancy while increasing graduation rates;

(4) ensuring that students enjoy a fulfilling, memorable, and affirming elementary and secondary educational experience;

(5) preparing Black students for post-secondary success in a global economy;

(6) facilitating educational transparency through developing channels of communication that keep the Black community informed on progress toward achieving specific educational quantitative metrics and qualitative goals, as well as any barriers to progress; and

(7) increasing the engagement of students' parents or guardians in ways that lead to improved academic and social outcomes for Black students in the school district.

Sec. 34-18.86. Committees and advisory boards concerning disparities and individualized needs. The Board may establish committees or advisory boards to seek guidance on addressing disparities or individualized needs.

(105 ILCS 5/34-21.10)

Sec. 34-21.10. Creation of districts and subdistricts ~~electoral districts~~; reapportionment of subdistricts ~~districts~~.

(a) For purposes of the election of Chicago Board of Education members under elections conducted pursuant to subsection (b-15) (b-5) of Section 34-3, the General Assembly shall subdivide the City of

Chicago ~~shall be subdivided into 10 electoral districts for the 2024 general election, and it shall divide each of those districts into 2 subdistricts elections and into 20 electoral districts for the 2026 elections after the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 102nd General Assembly by the General Assembly for seats on the Chicago Board of Education.~~ The subdistricts ~~electoral districts~~ must be drawn on or before April 1, 2024 and ~~Each district~~ must be compact, contiguous, and substantially equal in population and consistent with the Illinois Voting Rights Act.

(b) In the year following each decennial census, the General Assembly shall redistrict the ~~subdistricts electoral districts~~ to reflect the results of the decennial census consistent with the requirements in subsection (a). The reapportionment plan shall be completed and formally approved by the General Assembly not less than 90 days before the last date established by law for the filing of nominating petitions for the second school board election after the decennial census year. If by reapportionment a board member no longer resides within the ~~subdistrict electoral district~~ from which the member was elected, the member shall continue to serve in office until the expiration of the member's regular term. All new members shall be elected from the subdistricts ~~electoral districts~~ as reapportioned.
