PRESENTATION OF RESOLUTIONS

Senator Halpin offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 796

WHEREAS, Approximately one in six people globally experience a disability, including neurological, cognitive, neurodevelopmental, physical, visual, auditory, sensory, respiratory, and processing difficulties; and

WHEREAS, Not all disabilities are visible, and people living with non-visible disabilities often face barriers in their everyday lives and may need additional assistance; and

WHEREAS, People with hidden disabilities may experience difficulty asking for and/or articulating their needs, and they may face stigmatization and lack of understanding when they choose to ask for help; and

WHEREAS, The Hidden Disabilities Sunflower is a globally recognized symbol for non-visible disabilities, and people may use this symbol, a visible sunflower design on a lanyard, card, or silicone wristband, to voluntarily and discreetly share that they have a disability and to signify that they may need increased aid; and

WHEREAS, Airports throughout Illinois have begun to implement the Sunflower Project, having a disability Sunflower decal visible upon entrance, Sunflower wristbands available for passengers, and Sunflower pins available for employees to wear to signify the airport supports people with hidden disabilities; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Senate can utilize its position to spread awareness of the Sunflower project throughout the State; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare the week of October 20 through October 26, 2024 as Invisible Disabilities Week in Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge State facilities to adopt the Sunflower Project, including making Sunflower decals visible upon entry, making Sunflower lanyards, wristbands, and/or cards available, and educating staff on the meaning and desired goal of the Sunflower Project.

Senator Bennett offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 799

WHEREAS, It is appropriate to remember the many sacrifices and contributions to the cause of freedom made by the outstanding men and women who have served in the United States Armed Forces; and

WHEREAS, From 1946 to 1962, the United States conducted approximately 200 atmospheric nuclear tests, more than all other nuclear states combined at that time; and

WHEREAS, Approximately 400,000 servicemen in the U.S. Army, Navy, and Marines were present during these atmospheric tests, whether as witnesses to the tests themselves or as post-test cleanup crews; and

WHEREAS, The Manhattan Project was the code name for the American-led effort to develop a functional atomic weapon during World War II; and

WHEREAS, Two types of atomic bombs were developed concurrently during the war, a relatively simple gun-type fission weapon and a more complex implosion-type nuclear weapon; the Thin Man gun-type design proved impractical to use with plutonium, and therefore, a simpler gun-type called Little Boy was developed that used uranium-235, an isotope that makes up only 0.7 percent of natural uranium; since it was chemically identical to the most common isotope, uranium-238, and had almost the same mass, separating the two proved difficult; three methods were employed for uranium enrichment, electromagnetic, gaseous, and thermal; most of this work was performed at the Clinton Engineer Works at Oak Ridge, Tennessee; and

WHEREAS, In parallel with the work on uranium was an effort to produce plutonium, which was discovered by researchers at the University of California, Berkeley, in 1940; after the feasibility of the world's first artificial nuclear reactor, the Chicago Pile-1, was demonstrated in 1942 at the Metallurgical Laboratory in the University of Chicago, the project designed the X-10 Graphite Reactor at Oak Ridge and the production reactors at the Hanford Site in Washington state, in which uranium was irradiated and transmuted into plutonium and the plutonium was then chemically separated from the uranium, using the bismuth phosphate process; the Fat Man plutonium implosion-type weapon was developed in a concerted design and development effort by the Los Alamos Laboratory; and

WHEREAS, Illinois played an important part in the Manhattan Project; and

WHEREAS, Argonne National Laboratory is a science and engineering research national laboratory operated by the University of Chicago for the United States Department of Energy; the facility is located in Lemont, outside of Chicago, and is the largest national laboratory by size and scope in the Midwest; and

WHEREAS, On July 1, 1946, the laboratory was formally chartered as Argonne National Laboratory to conduct cooperative research in nucleonics; at the request of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, it began developing nuclear reactors for the nation's peaceful nuclear energy program; in the late 1940s and early 1950s, the laboratory moved to a larger location in Lemont and established a remote location in Idaho called "Argonne-West" to conduct further nuclear research; and

WHEREAS, Code-named the "Metallurgical Lab", the team constructed Chicago Pile-1, which achieved criticality on December 2, 1942 underneath the stands at the University of Chicago's Stagg Field; because the experiments were deemed too dangerous to conduct in a major city, the operations were moved to a spot in nearby Palos Hills and renamed "Argonne" after the surrounding forest; and

WHEREAS, Red Gate Woods is a forest preserve within the Palos Division of the Forest Preserve District of Cook County and is located near where the Cal-Sag Channel meets the Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal; the original site of Argonne National Laboratory and the Site A/Plot M Disposal Site is in the woods, which contains the buried remains of Chicago Pile-1, the world's first artificial nuclear reactor; and

WHEREAS, It is important to remember and honor the achievements and sacrifices of the men and women of this nation who during their time of service experienced exposure to nuclear radiation while on active duty and served so valiantly in the cause of freedom; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare July 16, 2024 as Atomic Veterans Day in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Atomic Heritage Foundation as a symbol of our esteem and respect.

Senator Bennett offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 800

WHEREAS, The Pontiac Correctional Center has received IEPA violations on water quality; and

WHEREAS, The Pontiac Correctional Center has had multiple assaults on staff by inmates in 2023; and

WHEREAS, In 2022, the Executive Inspector General released a report on the work environment at the Pontiac Correctional Center that noted cases of sexual harassment; and

WHEREAS, In December of 2022, officers at the Pontiac Correctional Center staged a picket in protest of unsafe working conditions; and

WHEREAS, After this issue came to the public's attention, the Illinois Department of Corrections (IDOC) was requested to provide a long-term plan for the Pontiac Correctional Center; one year later, IDOC has failed to do so; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we call upon the Department Of Corrections to provide a long-term plan for the Pontiac Correctional Center that includes the following:

- (1) Plans for physical facilities/buildings, including maintenance needs and any repair projects planned or building closures;
- (2) Planned staffing levels;
- (3) Planned inmate population levels; and
- (3) An analysis of how the Pontiac Correctional Center fits into the overall state correctional system; and be it further

RESOLVED, It is important that plans are made so staff and inmates can operate in a safe and proper environment; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to the Director of the Illinois Department of Corrections.

Senator Simmons offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 801

WHEREAS, The 7th Senate District is one of the most ethnically diverse districts in the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The district has long been and increasingly is home to Black people from every corner of the vast and beautiful Black diaspora; and

WHEREAS, The Black and African-American communities of the district have a rich history of achievements, culture, activism, and countless other contributions to the vibrancy and uniqueness of the district; and

WHEREAS, Graceland Cemetery, located in the district in Lakeview, is the permanent resting place for 29 leaders of the Underground Railroad network that helped many thousands of enslaved African-American people find freedom; and

WHEREAS, Uptown was one of the first places African-Americans could live on the north side outside the Black Belt, despite experiencing intense racism and discrimination once they moved there; and

WHEREAS, The family of Sen. Mike Simmons, who represents the 7th District, was one of the first Black families to move into and integrate the Lincoln Square neighborhood just two years before he was born there in the early 1980s; and

WHEREAS, Sen. Simmons, who is of Ethiopian and African-American descent, is proud to have grown up in one of the very first scattered-site public housing apartment buildings built on the north side of Chicago in Lincoln Square in 1981; and

WHEREAS, Sen. Simmons is the first Black person to represent the far north side of Chicago's 7th District in the Illinois State Senate; and

WHEREAS, Black elders currently residing in the 7th District as longtime residents were some of the first Black people decades ago to move into communities such as Buena Park, Rogers Park, Lincoln Square, Andersonville, Budlong Woods, Uptown, Edgewater, Lakeview, West Ridge, and other areas of the district; and

WHEREAS, Black elders have left a rich legacy in the district by creating safe spaces and being role models for youth of all races and ethnicities; and

WHEREAS, The Black Panther Party established a legacy of mutual aid and humanity across racial lines, which continues to shape the community-led mutual aid efforts in Uptown, on Argyle Street, in Rogers Park, along the Winthrop and Kenmore corridors, and in other 7th District areas; and

WHEREAS, The 7th District is home to the historic Winthrop Family Garden, which honors the legacy of African-American families who made the historic move during the Great Migration and began building a Black residential community along the 4600 North block of Winthrop Avenue as early as the year 1910; and

WHEREAS, Winthrop Avenue was the only block on which Black families could live because of segregation, with scores of racial covenants hindering them from moving onto other blocks in Uptown; with only 18 families living on 4600 North Winthrop Avenue, they formed a community that supported each other and became one family despite the restrictive covenants intended to keep Uptown segregated; the Winthrop Family Garden stands as a place of remembrance and celebrates what it took to make Uptown what it is today; and

WHEREAS, Many Black residents, including whole villages and communities, have been displaced from the far north side over the decades, including from parts of neighborhoods within the 7th District; and

WHEREAS, Those same Black residents left their mark on nearly every neighborhood in the north lake front district; and

WHEREAS, The future of the 7th District is as bright as the past, as Black people continue to run small businesses of every type, continue to graduate from schools, and assume leadership roles in their communities, in the region, and in our state in every imaginable way; and

WHEREAS, Uptown features small businesses from West and Central Africa, such as Osas African Kitchen, the Nigerian Kitchen Restaurant, the Mukase African Restaurant, the Makola African Supermarket, Amen African Braiding, the Iyanze Bar & Cafe, The Good Shepherd Enterprise, B&Q Afro Root Cuisine, the Queen African Hair Braiding Salon, and Chem's African Hair Braiding, among others; and

WHEREAS, Edgewater, Uptown, and Rogers Park are home to an extensive Eritrean and Ethiopian population spread along Broadway and Clark Street with family-run businesses such as the Axum Ethiopian Restaurant, the Ethiopian Diamond, the Awash Ethiopian Restaurant, Tesfa Ethiopian Cuisine, the Selam Ethiopian Kitchen, Queen Sheba, the Ethio Mart, the Mella Cafe, the Demera Restaurant, the Kukulu Market, the Ethio Mart, the Denden Restaurant, and Meron Injera; and

WHEREAS, Howard Avenue in Rogers Park is home to many Black-owned Caribbean small businesses, such as the Kizin Creole Restaurant, Caribbean Cuts, the Good To Go Restaurant, the Caribbean American Baking Co., and Ashley Beauty Supply; and

WHEREAS, The 7th District is home to many Black Americans and African-Americans and is comprised of a glorious multitude of ethnic groups from all over Africa, including those from Ghana, Nigeria, Ethiopia, Eritrea, Somalia, Senegal, Mali, Togo, Congo, Cameroon, Sudan, the Caribbean, and South America, many of whom found refuge along Broadway and Sheridan in Uptown and along Howard Avenue in Rogers Park and built a community; and

WHEREAS, The Bryn Mawr Historic District in Edgewater is home to a growing number of new African-American and Black and LGBTQ+-owned small businesses that bring vibrancy to this historic corridor; and

WHEREAS, Ebony DeBerry, a Black woman and lifelong resident of Rogers Park, wanted to build a community of people who lifted each other and gave back to the community she had growing up; she helped develop ONE Northside, which is a mixed income, multi-ethnic, intergenerational community-based organization that brings together the diverse communities of Chicago's far north side and uses collective power to address injustice and advance the community's interests; she has created safe spaces for women of color to come together, share resources, and encourage each other; and

WHEREAS, Jackie Taylor, a Black woman and longtime resident of Uptown, founded the Black Ensemble Theater in 1976, which is the first cultural center in the nation dedicated to eradicating racism through the arts; the Black Ensemble Theater is a crown jewel of the 7th District, bringing together not only Black residents but people from all racial and ethnic backgrounds to celebrate through free outdoor concerts for the community on the 4400 block of North Clark Street, unique plays, and other programming that celebrates the arts in the district; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Ana Vicky Castillo, an advocate for the education of the Latin and African diaspora, created the Afro Latino Historical Society and the African Diaspora Museum; she has worked tirelessly to reclaim the legacy of the forgotten history of the African-American and Latin community; she has helped inform the public of the great achievements of the Afro-Latino and African immigrant communities; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize the Black and African-American communities of the 7th Senate District and express our deep appreciation and respect for the myriad of Black communities that currently reside in and have lived in the 7th District; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we celebrate the history, achievements, culture, activism, and countless other contributions that Black people from a vast and beautiful diaspora have made to the 7th Senate District of Illinois on the far north side of Chicago.

Senator Bryant offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 802

WHEREAS, Child abuse and neglect is a major social problem in Illinois; according to the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services Child Maltreatment Report for 2022, 35,330 neglect and maltreatment cases were reported in Illinois in 2022, and 1,955 child fatalities were reported nationally in 2022; and

WHEREAS, It is estimated that more than 100,000 cases of abuse go unreported each year; the impact of abuse on children manifests itself in various ways; the affected children may experience a range of emotional, psychological, and physical trauma resulting from abuse or neglect; and

WHEREAS, There are various organizations and agencies devoted to combatting this concern; such groups seek to provide preventative solutions and possible exit strategies to at-risk youth and victimized children; and

WHEREAS, In 1982, Congress designated June 6-12 as National Child Abuse Prevention Week; the following year, President Ronald Reagan proclaimed April to be the first National Child Abuse Prevention Month, a tradition that continues to this day; and

WHEREAS, Illinois law requires that mandated reporters, including most professionals employed within education, healthcare, law enforcement, and social work sectors, report suspected child neglect or abuse; and

WHEREAS, Healthcare professionals and concerned private parties continue to educate parents and raise awareness of child abuse within the State; and

WHEREAS, Effective preventative measures concerning child abuse succeed because of partnerships created between the courts, social service agencies, schools, religious organizations, law enforcement agencies, businesses, and civilian communities; the establishment of an Illinois Child Abuse Prevention Month would cohesively promote such successful partnerships aiming to eradicate the social ill of child abuse and neglect; and

WHEREAS, National Child Abuse Prevention Month promotes the social and emotional well-being of children and families and thus serves to acknowledge the importance of community cooperation throughout the nation with respect to the prevention of child abuse and neglect; the institution of an Illinois Child Abuse Prevention Month would functionally reiterate such principles within Illinois and would reinforce Illinois' commitment to educating residents and helping prevent any more children from being subjected to child abuse and neglect; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare April 2024 as Child Abuse Prevention Month in the State of Illinois.

Senator Belt offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 803

WHEREAS, Chronic kidney disease is the progressive, gradual loss of kidney function, which results in a decrease in the ability of the kidneys to remove waste from the body; and

WHEREAS, It is estimated that 37 million adults in the U.S. have chronic kidney disease, and of those, approximately 90% remain undiagnosed; and

WHEREAS, Without diagnosis and treatment to slow the progression of the disease, chronic kidney disease can progress to end-stage renal failure, which is fatal without dialysis or kidney transplant; and

WHEREAS, Regular screening and early detection can prevent the progression of kidney disease to kidney failure; and

WHEREAS, Kidney disease is the eighth-leading cause of death in the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The month of March is designated as National Kidney Month to raise awareness of kidney disease and the importance of prevention and early detection; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare March of 2024 as Kidney Month in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the National Kidney Foundation of Illinois as a symbol of our respect and esteem.

Senator Lightford offered the following Senate Joint Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 49

WHEREAS, The Professional Review Panel is responsible for evaluating and recommending modifications to the Evidence-Based Funding Formula to ensure all students have access to a quality education, including special education and related services; and

WHEREAS, High caseloads, meaning the number of students assigned to an individual clinician, are contributing to Illinois' clinician shortage and are adversely impacting the related services districts can provide; and

WHEREAS, The National Association of School Social Workers recommends that individual caseloads of school social workers should not exceed 250 students; and

WHEREAS, The National Association of School Psychologists recommends that individual caseloads of school psychologists should not exceed 500 students; and

WHEREAS, The American School Counselor Association recommends that individual caseloads of school counselors should not exceed 250 students; and

WHEREAS, The National Association of School Nurses recommends that individual caseloads of school nurses should not exceed 750 students; and

WHEREAS, The American Speech-Language-Hearing Association recommends that individual caseloads of speech-language pathologists should not exceed 60 students; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that we direct the Professional Review Panel and the Illinois State Board of Education to conduct the analysis and financial modeling required to evaluate the implications of implementing the recommended maximum caseloads for school social workers, school psychologists, school counselors, school nurses, and speech-language pathologists working in schools; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Professional Review Panel and the Illinois State Board of Education shall submit their findings in a written report to the General Assembly and Governor by December 31, 2025.
