Senator Halpin offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 22

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois is committed to promoting sustainable practices, reducing plastic waste, and preserving the environment for present and future generations; and

WHEREAS, Plastic is made from toxic fossil fuels that never decompose, harming people, wildlife, and the environment; and

WHEREAS, More than 280 million tons of short-lived plastic products become waste every year; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois recognizes the importance of proactive measures to address this issue; and

WHEREAS, It is estimated that restaurants have saved an average of \$5,000 per year by adopting accessories-upon-request policies; and

WHEREAS, The Skip the Plastic Campaign, created by Nicolina Pappas of Nicolina's Turtle Co. and in partnership with the Mississippi River Cities and Towns Initiative and the Bi-State Conservation Action Network, aims to reduce the unnecessary use of single-use plastic by promoting the practice of providing such items only upon customer request; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare April 1, 2025 as Skip the Plastic Day in Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge all residents, businesses, and visitors to reduce plastic waste and protect our environment; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we commend all businesses that willingly participate in Skip the Plastic Day by only offering single-use plastic items, including straws and cutlery, by request and that take proactive steps toward reducing plastic waste; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we commend all residents who refuse the use of single-use plastic items.

Senator Villa offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 23

WHEREAS, Cardiovascular disease is the leading cause of death in women, claiming more lives than all forms of cancer combined, and yet only 44% of women recognize that cardiovascular disease is the greatest health threat they face; and

WHEREAS, Among females aged 20 and older, nearly 45% are living with some form of cardiovascular disease, and less than half of women entering pregnancy in the United States have optimal cardiovascular health; and

WHEREAS, Cardiovascular disease is the leading cause of maternal death in the U.S.; more simply put, heart disease is the number one killer of new mothers; and

WHEREAS, Overall, 10% to 20% of women will have a health issue during pregnancy, and high blood pressure, preeclampsia, and gestational diabetes during pregnancy greatly increase a women's risk of developing cardiovascular disease later in life; and

WHEREAS, Most cardiac and stroke events can be prevented through education and lifestyle changes, including moving more, eating smart, and managing blood pressure; and

WHEREAS, In 2020, strokes caused the deaths of 90,627 females, accounting for approximately 56.5% of total stroke deaths; and

WHEREAS, Women are often less likely to receive bystander CPR because rescuers may fear accusations of inappropriate touching, sexual assault, or injuring the victim; and

WHEREAS, There are significant biological differences between men and women, and clinical trials have not always adequately enrolled women or analyzed sex-specific differences in the data; as of 2020, only 38% of cardiovascular clinical research trial participants are women; and

WHEREAS, By increasing awareness, speaking out about heart disease, and empowering women to reduce their risk for cardiovascular disease, we can save thousands of lives each year; and

WHEREAS, Since 2004, the American Heart Association's Go Red for Women movement has addressed the awareness and clinical care gaps of cardiovascular disease, women's greatest health threat, and continues to make bold moves to save lives and pioneer scientific discoveries; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare February 7, 2025 as Wear Red Day in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge all residents of Illinois to raise awareness about cardiovascular disease, the leading cause of death in women, and to show their support for women and the fight against heart disease by wearing the color red to commemorate this day.

Senator Anderson offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 25

WHEREAS, Prader-Willi syndrome is a complex genetic disorder that occurs in approximately 1 out of every 15,000 births and the most commonly known genetic cause of life-threatening obesity; and

WHEREAS, Prader-Willi syndrome affects males and females with equal frequency and affects all races and ethnicities; and

WHEREAS, Prader-Willi syndrome causes an extreme and insatiable appetite, often resulting in morbid obesity, which is the major cause of death for individuals with the syndrome; and

WHEREAS, Prader-Willi syndrome also causes cognitive and learning disabilities as well as behavioral difficulties, such as obsessive-compulsive disorder and struggles with controlling emotions; and

WHEREAS, The hunger, metabolic, and behavioral characteristics of Prader-Willi syndrome force affected individuals to require constant and lifelong supervision in a controlled environment; and

WHEREAS, Studies have shown that there is a high morbidity and mortality rate for individuals with Prader-Willi syndrome; and

WHEREAS, There is no known cure for Prader-Willi syndrome; and

WHEREAS, Early diagnosis of Prader-Willi syndrome allows families to access treatment, intervention services, and support from health professionals, advocacy organizations, and other families who are dealing with the syndrome; and

WHEREAS, Recently discovered treatments, such as human growth hormone, are improving the quality of life for individuals with the syndrome and offer new hope to families, but many difficult symptoms associated with Prader-Willi syndrome remain untreated; and

WHEREAS, Increased research into Prader-Willi syndrome can lead to a better understanding of the disorder, more effective treatments, and an eventual cure for Prader-Willi syndrome; and

WHEREAS, Increased research into Prader-Willi syndrome is likely to improve our understanding of common public health concerns, including childhood obesity and mental health; and

WHEREAS, Advocacy organizations have designated May as National Prader-Willi Syndrome Awareness Month; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May 2025 as Prader-Willi Syndrome Awareness Month in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we express our support for raising awareness and educating the public about Prader-Willi Syndrome and increasing research and funding into the causes and treatments of the disease.

Senator Lewis offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 26

WHEREAS, On an average day, more than 700 injury crashes involve distracted driving, and the economic toll of all motor vehicle crashes in the U.S. annually exceeds \$400 billion; and

WHEREAS, Talking on a mobile phone, even in hands-free mode, texting, and programming your dashboard infotainment system or GPS device can divert your attention away from driving and result in physical or cognitive distraction; and

WHEREAS, Illinois residents and all Americans deserve to live in communities that promote safe driving behaviors and healthy lifestyles; and

WHEREAS, Preventing distracted driving injuries and deaths requires the cooperation of all levels of government, employers, and the general public; and

WHEREAS, The National Safety Council and the State of Illinois work to promote policies, practices, and procedures leading to increased safety, protection, and health in business and industry, in schools and colleges, on roads and highways, and in homes and communities; and

WHEREAS, In 2025, the National Safety Council will provide the nation with a month-long distracted driving public education campaign; and

WHEREAS, Spring is a time when people begin to log more miles on the road, and it is imperative to focus attention on motor vehicle injury risks and preventions; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare April 2025 as Distracted Driving Awareness Month in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the citizens and businesses of the State of Illinois to observe Distracted Driving Awareness Month by practicing safe driving behaviors and pledging to drive distraction-free.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 1**

SC0001

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to add Section 2.5 to Article IV and amend Section 2 of Article V of the Illinois Constitution as follows:

[January 22, 2025]

ARTICLE IV
THE LEGISLATURE

(ILCON Art. IV, Sec. 2.5 new)

SECTION 2.5. TERM LIMITS.

A person may not be elected to the office of State Senator for more than three terms or the office of State Representative for more than five terms. Service before the second Wednesday in January of 2025 shall not be considered in the calculation of a person's service.

ARTICLE V
THE EXECUTIVE

(ILCON Art. V, Sec. 2)

SECTION 2. TERMS

These elected officers of the Executive Branch shall hold office for four years beginning on the second Monday of January after their election and, except in the case of the Lieutenant Governor, until their successors are qualified. They shall be elected at the general election in 1978 and every four years thereafter. A person may not be elected to any Executive Branch office, or any combination of Executive Branch offices, for more than two terms. Service before the second Monday in January of 2025 shall not be considered in the calculation of a person's service for purposes of this Section.
