**PRESENTATION OF RESOLUTIONS**

Senator Ventura offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

**SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 66**

WHEREAS, Parental alienation is recognized as a behavior by a parent or another trusted adult, such as a grandparent, aunt, uncle, or similar figure, that may unintentionally or intentionally disrupt the relationship between a child and a parent; and

WHEREAS, Such behaviors, including disparaging comments about the other parent, restricting contact, discouraging communication, or fostering unfounded fears, can create barriers to a child's emotional and psychological well-being by undermining their relationship with a caregiver; and

WHEREAS, Research by the Parental Alienation Study Group indicates that approximately 3.9 million children in the United States are affected by moderate to severe forms of parental alienation, and studies further show that over 22 million parents in the United States may experience challenges related to parental alienation; and

WHEREAS, Parental alienation is a matter of concern for the mental and emotional health of children and families, highlighting the importance of raising awareness and fostering understanding to address and mitigate such behaviors; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare April 25, 2025 as Parental Alienation Awareness Day in the State of Illinois to encourage increased understanding, prevention, and intervention efforts to support healthy family relationships; and be it further

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RESOLVED, That we remain committed to equipping communities, educators, and caregivers with tools to identify and respond to behaviors that may negatively impact family relationships, while promoting the mental health and well-being of children; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be made available to organizations and individuals dedicated to supporting families and advocating for children's emotional well-being.

Senator McClure offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

**SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 68**

WHEREAS, Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site provides a historic, interactive interpretation of the reconstructed 1830s village where Abraham Lincoln once lived, which at one time, when it was a premier site, hosted more than 400,000 visitors from around the world per year; and

WHEREAS, Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site has experienced extensive deterioration of the reconstructed log homes, roofs, buildings, foundations, chimneys, fences, steps, footbridge, flatboat, cemetery, and iconic Grist Mill; and

WHEREAS, Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site attracts students on field trips, volunteers, campers, hikers, canoeing and kayaking enthusiasts, college interns, cyclists, children partaking in Pioneer Life Summer Day Camps, historians, visitors from around the world, and descendants of those who lived, worked, and are buried there; and

WHEREAS, Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site serves as a living history museum, with volunteer interpreters in the homes, and features concessions, a gift shop, campgrounds, exercise areas, and trails; the site also hosts a number of events, including the Traditional Music Festival, Theatre in the Park, Summer Frolic, the Independence Day Celebration, which features a reading of the Declaration of Independence, the Fall Festival, the popular annual Fall Candlelight Walk, Boy Scouts of America (BSA) jamborees, and the BSA Abraham Lincoln Pilgrimage, where scouts hike while retracing Lincoln's footsteps to Springfield; and

WHEREAS, Over the past 40 years, the New Salem Lincoln League has invested more than a million dollars in programs and improvements to Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site, including introducing new cultural and educational programs in the village and outdoor theater, purchasing traditional wood shingles to replace the village structures' roofs and treated wood to replace cabin porches and steps, paying for the site's iconic statues to be professionally cleaned, treated, and restored, financing new LED lighting to save the site thousands of dollars, funding the veterinary care and transportation for medical care of the site's animals, and acquiring a horse, a horse trailer, feed, and hay; the league has also made a number of enhancements to the Visitor Center and its parking lot, including the production of an orientation video and the addition of a new state-of-the art system to replace the center's aging audiovisual equipment; and

WHEREAS, The New Salem Lincoln League relies on the work and dedication of volunteers to make Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site a memorable experience for visitors, and in turn, provides supplies and materials for volunteer efforts, such as clothing, materials for demonstrations, candles for the annual candlelight tour, and meals for all volunteers and staff during those tours; the league has also worked with Theatre In the Park, which attracts over 10,000 visitors a year, funding new seating and a new sound board, and it partners with the Illinois College Explorer program to fund up to six college interns each summer; and

WHEREAS, For Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site to continue, it is essential that the State of Illinois honors its commitment to preserve and maintain the site, ensuring its existence for future generations as a living history museum and as an opportunity to learn about Abraham Lincoln's transformative early years; therefore, be it

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RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we support the creation of a New Salem Preservation Commission to monitor and recommend repairs and maintenance for Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site, including structures, signage, statues, overall condition of the grounds, and accessibility, and to make recommendations for the volunteer coordination efforts, including interactions and communications with current and potential volunteers, as well as guidelines for volunteer eligibility and retention; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to Governor JB Pritzker, the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, and the New Salem Lincoln League.

Senator Koehler offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

#### **SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 71**

WHEREAS, Transportation is the largest source of greenhouse gas emissions in the State of Illinois; driving and encouraging the use of electric vehicles, which generate no tailpipe emissions, is an important step towards reducing air pollution and mitigating the effects of climate change; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois has made significant strides in promoting clean energy and reducing the State's carbon footprint by advancing electric vehicle programs, developing and expanding infrastructure conducive to electric vehicles, and passing several key pieces of legislation that support the use and development of electric vehicles; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois has become a leader in the United States in electric vehicle adoption with the Secretary of State's Office reporting 126,231 registered electric vehicles in January 2025, marking a 34.5% increase from January 2024, and 4,051 public charging ports; and

WHEREAS, Illinois remains committed to promoting and expanding programs, such as electric vehicle programs, that aim to protect public health and the climate and has been able to honor that commitment partly in thanks to support from the federal government; and

WHEREAS, On November 15, 2021, the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) was signed into law by President Biden and allocated \$7.5 Billion to various programs to promote the adoption of electric vehicles across the nation; the federal government's support for electric vehicle programs has been instrumental in the growth of the electric vehicle market in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, In January 2025, it was announced by Governor JB Pritzker that Illinois received the federal government's largest grant in the nation, totally \$114 million, for the expansion of the State's electric vehicle charging infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, The current federal administration has an opportunity to expand on the progress that has been made by maintaining and promoting policies that support research, development, and the implementation of electric vehicles to aid Illinois and the rest of the nation in meeting their environmental and economic goals; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge President Trump, the members of the United States Congress, and the current federal administration to continue to support electric vehicle programs at the federal level and to continue to prioritize policies that foster innovation and address climate change in order to continue helping the move towards a cleaner, healthier, and more sustainable future.

Senator Koehler offered the following Senate Joint Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

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**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15**

WHEREAS, The American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) stated in its 2021 report card that the United States received a grade of C- regarding the current state of infrastructure and that more than six trillion dollars is needed to restore the nation's infrastructure to a state of good repair; over two trillion dollars is currently not funded, and the remainder is inadequately funded; new, 21st Century projects are also unfunded; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois ASCE 2022 Report Card assigned the State's systems a cumulative grade of "C-"; the report analyzes 11 categories of infrastructure pertinent to Illinois, including aviation (C+), bridges (C), dams (C+), drinking water (D+), inland waterways (D), ports (C-), rail (C+), roads (D+), storm water (D+), transit (D+), and wastewater (C-); and

WHEREAS, Out of four million total water service lines, over 675,000 have been identified as lead and almost 380,000 as copper with lead solder services; Illinois will require at least \$12 billion to replace the lead water lines, and federal appropriations will cover less than 10% of that cost; and

WHEREAS, Illinois' aging drinking water infrastructure is leading to leaking pipelines, costing taxpayers money and critical resources; in 2017, a total of 106 million gallons per day (MGD) were lost among Lake Michigan allocation permittees, or 13% of total water supplied; additional funding is needed for aging storm water infrastructure that must keep up with increasing rainfall trends from climate change; and

WHEREAS, Illinois needs at least 300,000 new units of affordable housing for the most housing insecure; homelessness increased in Illinois in 2024 by 116%, and there are 26,000 unhoused in the State; and

WHEREAS, There are 2,405 bridges in poor condition, or 9% of all bridges in the State that are crossed by motorists every day; approximately 70% of Illinois bridges in poor condition are owned by counties, towns, or cities, suggesting the local maintenance backlog is a significant challenge; and

WHEREAS, U.S. Reps. Danny Davis and Jesus "Chuy" Garcia introduced H.R. 4052 (The National Infrastructure Bank Act) on June 13, 2023 in the 118th U.S. Congress; this would create a \$5 trillion bank to finance all infrastructure requirements to bring the system to a state of good repair and build new projects; and

WHEREAS, The new national infrastructure bank is modeled on previous banks that helped build much of the country's infrastructure under Presidents George Washington, James Madison, Abraham Lincoln, and Franklin D. Roosevelt; the last such bank helped bring us out of the Great Depression and win World War II; and

WHEREAS, The new national infrastructure bank will create 25 million new jobs, pay Davis-Bacon wages, and enforce Buy America provisions; Disadvantaged Business Enterprises will receive significant disbursements, and the bill mandates large-scale minority hiring; the bank will require no new federal spending or federal taxes; according to experts, the bank will grow the economy by 5% per year as did its predecessors; and

WHEREAS, The new national infrastructure bank will complement the Rebuild Illinois infrastructure program passed by the legislature in 2019 and provide the additional new money to bring all infrastructure in Illinois to a state of good repair; and

WHEREAS, Many organizations are in support of a new national infrastructure bank, including the National Black Caucus of State Legislators, the National Hispanic Caucus of State Legislators, the National Asian-Pacific American Caucus of State Legislators, the Council of State Governments-East, the National Association of Counties, the National Association of Development Organizations, the US High Speed Rail Association, the National Latino Farmers and Ranchers Trade Association, the American Sustainable

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Business Council, the National Association of Minority Contractors, and the United Association of Plumbers and Steamfitters International Union; in addition, 29 state legislatures have introduced or passed resolutions of support, as have county and city councils, including the Chicago City Council; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that we urge the United States Congress to pass H.R. 4052 to create a new national infrastructure bank to finance urgently needed infrastructure projects; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the President of the United States, the U.S. Senate Majority Leader, the U.S. Senate Minority Leader, the U.S. Speaker of the House, the U.S. House of Representatives Minority Leader, all members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation, and the Governor.

Senator Koehler offered the following Senate Joint Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

#### **SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16**

WHEREAS, Small and Midsize Manufacturing Enterprises (SMEs/MSMEs) play an important role in the job creation process since they account for between 40 and 80 percent of total manufacturing employment worldwide; and

WHEREAS, SMEs/MSMEs typically have a much simpler structure than larger businesses or manufacturers; there is much less red tape, and decisions that can take weeks or months for other companies can sometimes be made in minutes; often, customer service is personalized, and industry partners are considered friends more than clients; and

WHEREAS, The management of SMEs/MSMEs is usually better connected to, and more in touch with, their staff than at companies with thousands of employees; since everyone is working toward the same goal, there is a greater feeling of camaraderie; this often shows itself in community initiatives generated inside an SME, such as fundraisers suggested by employees to benefit favored causes; while large corporations have research and development departments, SMEs often encourage all staff members to contribute ideas for new products to manufacture or ways to improve existing ones; and

WHEREAS, Illinois is home to an unmatched manufacturing workforce and renowned universities and community colleges that train a talent pipeline for the advanced manufacturing jobs; 23,000 students graduate with manufacturing or manufacturing-related degrees each year, and Illinois' community colleges yield over 3,531 students from 371 programs with manufacturing degrees and certificates; many Illinois institutions partner with businesses and incubators to create custom training programs; and

WHEREAS, In 2017, the average U.S. manufacturing worker received \$77,186 annually, including pay and benefits; in 2023, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics estimated the annual mean wage of production workers in Illinois to be from \$45,460 to \$73,820; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that we encourage young people to consider a career in small to mid-sized manufacturing, which can lead to stable jobs that range from \$50k-\$70k a year.
