Senator Murphy offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 318

WHEREAS, The Department of Revenue annually calculates equalized assessed valuations of railroad operating properties according to the Illinois Property Tax Code; and

WHEREAS, 35 ILCS 200/11-70 defines what is railroad operating property and what is non-carrier real estate; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Department of Revenue annually determines and publishes the equalized assessed value of railroad operating property subject to its assessment jurisdiction under the Property Tax Code, for each of the railroads operating in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Department of Revenue's authority does not extend to assessing non-carrier real estate; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Property Tax Code provides local assessing officers with the authority to assess non-carrier real estate; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Department of Revenue's administrative law judges have ruled on requests for hearings and challenges to this system in the following cases, PT 09-13 Saint Clair County Assessor and City of Centreville v UPRR, PT 20-03 Spector v Railroads, PT 20-04 Spector v Railroads, and PT 20-07 Spector v Railroads; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Department of Revenue publishes guides and information regarding the property tax system, including its property tax administration responsibilities; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the Auditor General is directed to conduct a performance audit of the Illinois Department of Revenue's (IDR) valuation and assessment of railroad companies' properties as required under the Property Tax Code; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the audit should focus on the following:

(1) The adequacy of IDR's procedures for providing access by members of the public, local assessors, and county treasurers to each year's data, processes, and guides regarding the assessment of railroad operating property;

(2) IDR's procedures for annually determining which railroad properties are no longer operating property;

(3) IDR's procedures for local assessors, municipalities, and private citizens to challenge the classification status of properties in their respective areas as between railroad operating property and non-carrier real estate;

(4) IDR's procedures for notifying members of the public, local assessing officers, and county treasurers of property that is no longer railroad operating property so local assessing officials can assess that property;

(5) Whether IDR procedures assure that railroads adequately inform the department and the relevant county assessor when the classification of property should be reclassified and transferred from operating to non-operating (non-carrier) property so that it begins being assessed by the local assessor;

(6) Whether IDR procedures adequately incentivize local assessors to notify the department about railroad-owned properties that should no longer be classified as operating property;

(7) The procedures, methods, and deadlines for annually obtaining and setting the value for each railroad in Illinois;

(8) Whether a survey of stakeholders, including county assessors, county clerks, county treasurers, and members of the public, suggests that the phrase "any person feeling aggrieved" or the phrase "any party to the proceeding who feels aggrieved by the decision" in 35 ILCS 200/8-35 is clear or should be defined in greater detail, including in a rule or regulation;

(9) The procedures, methods, and deadlines for allocating equalized assessed values for each railroad's operating property to each taxing body in the State of Illinois and the methods, deadlines, and procedures by which members of the public, local assessing officials, and county treasurers can challenge these decisions and request hearings;

(10) Whether IDR's rules, regulations, and guides adequately explain how it administers Sec. 11-110 of the Property Tax Code, which reads in part as follows: "The equalized assessed value of the operating property of every railroad company subject to assessment, when determined as prescribed in Section 11-80, shall be listed and taxed in the several taxing districts in the proportion that the length of all the track owned or used in such taxing district bears to the whole length of all the track owned or used in this state.";

(11) The adequacy of IDR's formula and process for distributing a railroad's statewide value to local taxing bodies;

(12) The notice and deadlines for filing classification challenges and requests for hearings as to whether local assessing officials and others believe these deadlines are adequate;

(13) How administrative law judges are chosen to preside over hearings and challenges to departmental decisions and the degree to which these administrative law judges are independent of the department;

(14) Whether and how members of the public can obtain and review pleadings filed before the IDR's administrative law judges and whether these procedures are available to the public; and

(15) To what extent IDR should issue rules explaining its procedures; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Revenue and any other entity having information relevant to the audit cooperate fully and promptly with the Auditor General's Office in the conduct of this audit; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Auditor General commence with this audit as soon as possible and report his findings and recommendations upon completion in accordance with the provisions of Section 3-14 of the Illinois State Auditing Act; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be delivered to the Auditor General and the Illinois Department of Revenue.

The following amendment was offered in the Committee on Local Government, adopted and ordered printed:

AMENDMENT NO. 2 TO SENATE BILL 1424

AMENDMENT NO. 2. Amend Senate Bill 1424 by replacing everything after the enacting clause with the following:

"Section 5. The Counties Code is amended by changing Section 5-1049.2 as follows:
(55 ILCS 5/5-1049.2)

Sec. 5-1049.2. Lease of county property.

(a) The county board may lease real estate acquired or held by the county for any term not exceeding 99 years and may lease the real estate when, in the opinion of the county board, the real estate is no longer necessary, appropriate, required for the use of, profitable to, or for the best interests of the county. The authority to lease shall be exercised by an ordinance passed by three-fourths of the full county board then holding office, at any regular meeting or at any special meeting called for that purpose.

(b) Notwithstanding subsection (a), upon three-fourths vote, by the full county board, the county board may lease farmland acquired or held by the county for any term not exceeding 5 years. Farmland may be leased to either public or private entities via a cash lease, crop-sharing arrangement, or custom farming arrangement. The bid process for a lease entered into under this subsection must be publicly advertised and sealed bids must be opened at a county board meeting for public review. Counties shall not acquire farmland for the sole purpose of entering into a cash lease, crop-sharing arrangement, or custom farming arrangement or other speculative purpose.

(c) A county with a population of between 500,000 and 600,000 inhabitants may lease vacant real estate, structures, or facilities that are owned by the county if doing so promotes economic development, job creation, or community revitalization and does not interfere with existing public services. This subsection does not authorize the lease to the public of properties, structures, or facilities currently used for government-operated services. A lease is not permitted under this subsection if the lease may result in the elimination or privatization of existing government-operated services. The authority to enter into a lease shall be exercised by an ordinance passed by three-fourths of the full county board then holding office, at any regular meeting or at any special meeting called for that purpose. The term of a lease entered into under this subsection may not exceed 99 years. The provisions of this subsection shall become inoperative 5 years after the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 104th General Assembly.

PRESENTATION OF RESOLUTION

Senator Collins offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 334

WHEREAS, The Racial Equity Rapid Response Team (RERRT) was formed at the request of the City of Chicago Mayor's Office under the leadership of Mayor Lori Lightfoot in March 2020; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT was co-convened by West Side United, an organization consisting of a collaboration of hospital partners, including Ascension Illinois, Cook County Health, Ann & Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital of Chicago, the Rush University Medical Center, the Sinai Health System, and the University of Illinois Hospital & Health Sciences System; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT was established in order to mitigate a data-driven response to the high rates of COVID-19 mortality and to save lives and lessen further harm to Black and Latinx communities; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT formed coalitions between government agencies, health care providers, and community organizations to identify needs and disparities by gathering community insight, to advocate for resources, and to champion reliable data and information in order to better promote healthy behavior; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT partnered with 21 health care providers to proactively contact patients in communities that were most impacted by COVID-19, connecting with approximately 75,000 patients; of those who provided race/ethnicity information, 48% self-identified as Black and 40% self-identified as Latinx; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT consisted of several key local partners, including the City of Chicago Mayor's Office, the Chicago Department of Public Health, West Side United, the Civic Consulting Alliance, the Rush University Medical Center, the Sinai Urban Health Institute, the University of Chicago, Advocate Health, the University of Illinois Chicago, Austin Coming Together, the Greater Auburn Gresham Development Corporation, South Shore Works, Enlace, Latinos Progresando, the Northwest Side Housing Center, ChiByDesign, the Southwest Organizing Project, the Chicago COVID Response Fund, and the Oprah Winfrey Charitable Foundation; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT, in partnership with the Civic Consulting Alliance, facilitated collaboration between health care providers, which culminated in an unprecedented joint statement being released in June 2020, in which 40 institutions spoke in a unified voice to declare racism a public health crisis and pledge collective action to improve health equity; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT worked to ensure testing sites were in historically underserved communities, resulting in eight testing sites in RERRT target locations and mobile testing sites, which made testing more accessible to these communities; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT, in partnership with local and national philanthropic organizations, secured financial support for those most impacted by COVID-19, including \$3.1 million in grants secured by partners, \$155,000 in rent assistance, and cash assistance in the amount of \$120,000 for 120 individuals ineligible for federal stimulus dollars; and

WHEREAS, Within the first two months of its launch, the RERRT distributed critical resources to communities, including 130,000 masks and 13,000-plus meals, reaching 8,000 households and more than 2,000 seniors; the team also enabled public access to COVID-19 data by way of a Slalom dashboard that provided testing, case, and death rates by race/ethnicity and at the zip code-level, thereby establishing Chicago as a national leader in data transparency; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT further commissioned the Driving Equitable Resource Distribution report, which was compiled by ChiByDesign, proposing five strategies and 14 guiding principles to ensure cross collaboration between businesses, governments, and philanthropic organizations; and

WHEREAS, The work of the RERRT evolved to focus on vaccine equity through the creation of Protect Chicago Plus, a plan based at the Chicago Department of Public Health and designed to provide consistent access to vaccines for Chicagoans, especially those in low vaccinated areas, to make vaccines available where people live, work, and play, and to focus energy and resources on the lowest vaccinated communities; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT inspired the creation of six Healthy Chicago Zones (HCZ), a network of hyper-local partnerships established to achieve the Healthy Chicago goal of closing Chicago's racial life expectancy gap, ensuring that community members have the power and resources to identify local assets and develop solutions that meet their most pressing health needs; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT ultimately became a model worth replicating in other cities, including New York City, which was struggling to address inequitable health outcomes, including COVID-19 and beyond, and the systemic issues that underpin them; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare June 5, 2025 as Racial Equity Rapid Response Team Day in the State of Illinois in recognition of the efforts of the Racial Equity Rapid Response Team (RERRT).
