Senate Bill 1089, an Act concerning health. 3rd Reading of the bill.

SENATOR REZIN:

Thank you, Madam President. Senate Bill 1099{sic} (1089) is also known as Sami's Law would require the State Capitol building in all of the State's rest stops to install at least one publicly accessible adult changing station. Sami's law is a hard fought initiative of one of my district staffers, Renee Abraham. The law garners its name from Renee 26 year old daughter, who suffers from Spinal Muscular Atrophy. Sami's neuromuscular disease has taken away her ability to walk and has limited her ability to eat and breathe without assistance. However, it hasn't taken away her ability to think, learn and enjoy life that she has -- that she was given. As you can imagine, Sami's family have faced many

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obstacles throughout her life, including taking her to places. Like Sami's family, so many caregivers of individuals suffering from a severe physical disability struggle to find a safe and clean place to change their loved ones while not at home. Given the lack of a place to easily conduct such a change on an adult, many caregivers would have to avoid long trips with their loved ones, which limits the life experiences for these vulnerable individuals. People with disabilities should be able to equally enjoy the same amount of access to the outside world as everyone else. According to the 2019 U.S. Census Bureau Report, more than 20 million Americans have limited mobility, 16 million live with a cognitive disability, and more than 8 million need help with daily selfcare. Each and every one of these individuals deserves inclusion and dignity within our world. With the passage of Senate Bill 1089, we can help provide that. Madam President, I would like to thank Senator Castro and our staff, along with your staff, who actually took this bill, which was heard on subject matter only, and thought that it was a good enough idea to put it into a bill and see that we can get this bill passed this -- before we go home. I ask for an Aye vote. Thank you.

SENATOR STADELMAN:

Thank you, Madam President, Members of the Senate. The bill amends the Public Utilities Act to establish the Disconnection Protection Program. Electric and gas utilities, in more than 500,000 customers, must implement a program by June of next year to protect customers from disconnection if they applied for energy payment assistance and costs associated with this program may be recovered through the utilities rates. Not aware of any opposition. Ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

House Bill 4170, an Act concerning transportation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Stadelman.

SENATOR STADELMAN:

Thank you, Madam President, Members of the Senate. Forty-one seventy allows the Secretary of State to issue an International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers decal for universal special license plates. Funding for the program and the proceeds will go to any local chapter of IBEW workers in the State of Illinois. Not aware of any opposition, ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 4170 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? House Bill 4255, an Act concerning transportation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Harriss.

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SENATOR E. HARRISS:

Thank you so much. So, this bill will allow various different emergency service vehicles, including tow trucks, to use green lights, along with their amber and light -- and white lights that they currently use at the scene of emergencies. It's permissive, not a mandate, and will make our roads safer.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 4255 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 4255, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Rezin seeks leave of the Body to return House Bill 40 -- 4350 to the Order of 2nd Reading. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is House Bill 4350. Mr. Secretary, please read the lady's bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4350, an Act concerning children. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Rezin.

SENATOR REZIN:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 4350 requires hotels, motels, tattoo and body piercing establishments, bus stations and general acute care hospital emergency rooms, to post in a conspicuous place a notice developed by DCFS aimed towards children under 18 on how to report physical and sexual abuse. I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 4350 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 57 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 4350, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Halpin, on House Bill 4417. Mr. Secretary, please read the gentleman's bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

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House Bill 4417, an Act concerning education. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Halpin.

SENATOR HALPIN:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 4417 is an initiative of a constituent up in the 36th District in the Senate, 72nd District in the House, which would require, states -- if -- or sorry schools, if they decide to recognize "Workforce{sic} (Workplace) Readiness Week", they would be required to initiate a certain curriculum which discusses State and federal local labor laws, some labor history, and apprenticeship programs, and other opportunities in the labor workforce. Again, it's not a mandate unless the school decides to recognize this week officially. I'm not aware of any particular opposition, and I'll inadequately answer any questions, but would ask for your Yes vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Senator McConchie, for what purpose do you rise.

SENATOR MCCONCHIE:

To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

To the bill, Senator.

SENATOR MCCONCHIE:

Thank you, Madam President. The -- just to notes on this, while it is optional as to whether or not someone can, you know, a school can decide whether to cover it. If they do cover it, it actually limits the -- the breadth of the speech that can be presented as a part of this. And so, for that reason, I'm going to

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be voting No, thank you very much.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Further discussion? Senator Wilcox, for what purpose do you rise.

SENATOR WILCOX:

To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

To the bill, Senator.

SENATOR WILCOX:

In line with what the previous Senator mentioned, there's absolutely no doubt that we support workplace readiness and training programs in school, but the breadth of this bill appears to be a bit more indoctrination, if the option is chosen and that is concerning. The weak would remain focused on the objective of educating about workplace rights and opportunities rather than actually becoming or should focus on that, rather than becoming a platform for promoting specific ideological or political viewpoints. Would certainly love to be able to support this in a different manner, but at this point recommend a No vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Seeing no further discussion, Senator Halpin, to close.

SENATOR HALPIN:

Thank you again, Madam President. I would just like to add, in response to the previous speakers, that this bill just sets a minimum requirement for the curriculum. Any school, as long as they -- they have this included in the curriculum, they can add on whatever other information that they want to add when it comes to workforce training or business development in the local community

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and would encourage any Senator that has a school district interested in teaching this information to work with them to develop that additional curriculum. It's a great labor supported bill. I would ask for a Yes vote, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. The question is, shall House Bill 4417 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 40 voting Yea, 19 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 4417, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Leader Holmes, on House Bill 4427. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4427, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Leader Holmes.

SENATOR HOLMES:

Thank you, Madam President. This bill is a clause of the -- it -- it amends the Assisted Living and Shared Housing Act. Provides that the Director of Aging shall consult with the Director of Public Health on the appointment of representative of the Department on Aging, rather than the Director of Public Health. It also ensures that one -- one voting member, must be a resident of an assisted living or shared housing establishment. This was an agreement with everybody and finally getting leading age on board.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thanks, Senator. Is there any discussion? Any discussion?

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Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 4427 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 57 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 4427, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Holmes, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR HOLMES:

I would like to blame it on the computer rather than human error, but could you record me on that last vote as being an Aye on my own bill?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Sure. The record will reflect your intentions. Senator Faraci, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR FARACI:

Thank you, Madam President. Correction on the voting. I would -- had intended to vote Yes on House Bill 4170. And it was not a -- was not an error by the computer, it was my fault.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

No worries, Senator. Record will reflect your intentions. Leader Murphy, on House Bill 4447. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4447, an Act concerning business. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Leader Murphy, on your bill.

SENATOR MURPHY:

Thank you, Madam President. As amended, this bill creates

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the Motor Vehicle Dealer Protection Act, which simply means that a car dealer can file charges against someone that is using their image without permission. So, I would -- happy to entertain any questions, but I know of no opposition and would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 4447 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 4447, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Leader Cunningham seeks leave of the Body to return House Bill 4460 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading is House Bill 4460. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Cunningham.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Leader Cunningham, on your amendment.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM:

Thank you, Madam President. Amendment No. 1 adds university police officers to the bill. I move for its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

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SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Cunningham.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Cunningham, on Amendment No. 2 please.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM:

Thank you, Madam President. Amendment No. 2 adds firefighters who work for fire protection districts to the bill. I move for its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is House Bill 4460. Mr. Secretary, please read the gentleman's bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4460, an Act concerning government. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Leader Cunningham.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM:

Thank you, Madam President. House Amendment{sic} (Bill) 4460, as amended, would require group insurance programs to provide coverage for joint mental health therapy services to police officers and firefighters in the State of Illinois. The idea behind this bill, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, is that first

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responders often face job related stress and trauma, and sometimes that can affect their family lives. So, this bill will ensure that it is easy as possible, for first responders, to access joint family therapy whenever they need it. I would appreciate the Chamber's support. Be happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 4460 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 4460, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Stadelman, on House Bill 4498. Gentleman indicates he wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4498, an Act concerning health. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Stadelman.

SENATOR STADELMAN:

Thank you, Madam President, Members of the Senate. Forty-four ninety-eight is an initiative of the Illinois Guardian and Advocacy Commission. It clarifies what paperwork is required to be filed with the court for a mental health facility to petition to hold a hearing to continue to hold that patient. Not aware of any opposition. Ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall

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House Bill 4498 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 4498, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Bryant, on House Bill 4570. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4570, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Bryant.

SENATOR BRYANT:

Thank you, Madam President. This bill amends the Barber, Cosmetology, Esthetics, Hair Braiding and Nail Technology Act. It basically says that an applicant who has at least three years of experience, as a licensed cosmetology teacher, shall be given credit for hours of instruction completed for his or her cosmetology teacher's license in subjects that are common to both barbering and cosmetology in the supplemental barber course. We found was at a community college someone who was already teaching all of the classes was going to be required to take classes that she was actually teaching. This fixes that problem for all of what I mentioned previously. I know of no opposition, and it passed unanimously, in the House. I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall a House Bill 4570 pass. All those in favor

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will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 4570, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Syverson, on House Bill 4789. Gentleman indicates he wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4789, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Syverson.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Thank you, Madam President. This is just some cleanup language that is on behalf of the Dental Society that clarifies some contracting issues between the dentists and the insurance industry. All the concerns have been worked out. Know of no opposition, would ask for a favorable roll call. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 4789 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 4789, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Holmes, on House Bill 4863. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

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House Bill 4863, an Act concerning land. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Holmes.

SENATOR HOLMES:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 4863 authorizes the Department of Military Affairs to transfer a plot of land located in Sugar Grove to the City of Aurora. Before the conveyance can take place, the Department must first determine that the property is no longer required for military purposes. The city will acquire the property "as is" and pay all required costs and expenses. The reason doing this is that the Department is in the process of consolidating excess land and returning it to the original landowners, because the excess land can sometimes prohibit the Department from receiving federal money. I would like to request an Aye vote from everyone in the Chamber, including myself, on this bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 4863 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 4863, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Feigenholtz, on House Bill 4891. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4891, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading

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of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Feigenholtz.

SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 4891 is a consumer protection bill that addresses third-party financing for dental care. The bill, as amended, in the House, moved all the opposition to neutral, and the bill passed out with bipartisan support. I'm happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 4891 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 voting Yea, 1 vote Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 4891, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Please turn your Calendars to page 8. Page 8, House Bills 3rd Reading. At the top of page 8, House Bills 3rd Reading. Senator Bryant, on House Bill 4954. Senator Bryant, on House Bill 4954. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4954, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Bryant.

SENATOR BRYANT:

Thank you, Madam President. This is a bill that we worked on with IDNR. It fixes some issues that we had with the State mine

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rescue stations. We had some opposition, previously, from the trial lawyers and concerns about who would be responsible if an -- if a lawsuit was filed. Those were all fixed. At this point, I know of no opposition. Went through the House unanimously, and I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 4954 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4961, an Act concerning civil law. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Halpin.

SENATOR HALPIN:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 4961 provides for certain notices to be issued in a probate guardianship proceeding in advance of a hearing that would replace a successor or guardian. Just -- it requires that notice be given to the person with the alleged disability, the proposed successor guardian, and anyone listed on the petition for adjudication of disability. I'm not aware of any opposition. I'll answer questions on a need-to-know basis and I ask for your Yes vote.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Well, good, Senator. Is there any discussion on a need-to-know basis? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 4961 pass. All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 4961, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Lewis. Senator Lewis seeks leave of the Body to return House Bill 4966 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading is House Bill 4966. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Lewis.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Lewis, on your amendment.

SENATOR LEWIS:

I wish to adopt the amendment, Madam President. And discuss on 3rd.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is House Bill 4966. Mr. Secretary, please read the gentleman's bill.

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SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Forty -- House Bill 4966, an Act concerning transportation.
3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Lewis.

SENATOR LEWIS:

Thank you, Madam President. This bill allows motorcycle and autocycle enthusiasts to order specialty plates, as our auto owners do. It is an initiative of ABATE, and I know of no opposition and request an Aye vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 4966 pass? All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 4966, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Sally Turner, on House Bill 4993. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4993, an Act concerning health. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Turner.

SENATOR S. TURNER:

Thank you, Madam President. This bill comes to us through a constituent of Representative Ryan Spain. And it was an individual, their family member passed away outside the county in which they

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lived. And that family was having a difficulty -- getting a death certificate in that other county, because they lived far away. So this bill, what it will do, it provide that if a death occurs outside the county in which they are of a residence of, and the local registrar in that district, in which that death certificate was filed, after seven days of its filing, they can send a death -- a copy of that death certificate to the local registrar in the district in which they had lived. I know of no opposition, and this was 109 to nothing in the House, and I'd appreciate an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 4993 pass. All those in favor would vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 voting Yea, 0 -- 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 4993, having received a constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Feigenholtz, on House Bill 5022. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5022, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Feigenholtz.

SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

Thank you, Madam President. A few years ago, we rewrote the Advanced Practice Registered Nurse Act. This is a cleanup that specifically clarifies that certified ARPN -- APRNs that work with

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a psychiatric medical director of a facility have the authority to act as the medical director pursuant to the Public Act passed years ago. I'm happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5022 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there is 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5022, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 3rd Reading, on page 8. Senator Villivalam, House Bill 5023. Out of the record. House Bill 5027, Senator Joyce. Senator Joyce, on House Bill 5027. Out of the record. Senator Glowiak Hilton, on House Bill 5047. Please read the lady's bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5047, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Glowiak Hilton.

SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

Thank you, Madam President. This bill, HB 5047, under current law applicants under the Nurse Practice Act applying for examination who have graduated from an approved Illinois nursing program, passed a background check, and have received passing results, are eligible to practice with a license pending status, which is revoked after three months. This bill just extends it to six months to allow IDFPR to complete the application review, while allowing nurses to practice in the interim.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5047 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 57 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5047, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Glowiak Hilton, on Senate Bill, excuse me, House Bill 5059. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5059, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Glowiak Hilton.

SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

Thank you, Madam President. Here we are again...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Ladies and Gentlemen, can you lower your voices just a little bit? Just turn it down a little bit so we can hear Senator Glowiak Hilton, on House Bill 5059.

SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

Thank you. This is another workaround for IDFPR because we are experiencing significant delays in licensing various professions. This one is for the dental profession. It is -- aims to establish a pre-practice{sic} (pre-license) allowance, allowing individuals to practice in their specialty and residency training programs for three months while awaiting their licenses.

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Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5059 pass. All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5059, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Hunter, on House Bill 5084. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5084, an Act concerning State government. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Hunter.

SENATOR HUNTER:

Thank you very much, Madam President. House Bill 5084 amends the Department of Human Services Act and the Administrative Article of the Illinois Public Aid Act{sic} (Code). The purpose of this bill is to help streamline and reduce duplicative reporting for certain benefits administered by the Department of Human Services. I know of no opposition, and I would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5084 pass. All those in favor vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5084, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Villivalam,

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on House Bill 5085. The gentleman indicates he wishes to proceed.
Please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5085, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading
of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Villivalam.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5085 will correct for
a situation that ambulance providers currently face where payers
do not authorize or reimburse ambulance services for patients
experiencing mental health conditions. By including mental health
in the definition of "clinical observation" patients with mental
health conditions will receive the same care from EMTs, as any
other patient in need of a medical assistance, and ambulance
providers will be compensated for treating these patients well.
This bill will also -- also allows for EMT and paramedic education
to be performed outside of the EMS system overseeing such
education. I know of no opposition. This is an initiative of the
Illinois State Ambulance Association and supported by the Illinois
Fire Chiefs Association. I would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Senator
Hastings, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR HASTINGS:

Thank you, Madam President. A question of the Sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

The Sponsor indicates he will yield, Senator Hastings.

SENATOR HASTINGS:

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Senator Villivalam, thank you very much for working on this bill. We appreciate you coming before our committee. It was in our committee where there was an amendment filed but you chose not to adopt an amendment or to consider that amendment. Is there a reason why you chose to conduct that course of action?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Villivalam.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Madam President, and thank you to the Senator for his question. Yes, we did not adopt an amendment. After a stakeholder call with IDPH and EMS professionals, IDPH agreed to remove language regarding the Emergency Medical Responder National Registry testing from the proposed administrative rules for second notice. Therefore, there was no need for the language to be included in the -- in the amendment. EMR -- EMR -- EMRs have become an essential part of the EMS system, and they often arrive and begin patient care before an ambulance arrives. This is especially true for downstate EMS agencies and fire departments who rely on volunteer EMRs. IDPH also acknowledged that the EMS staffing shortage has -- had caused a lower level of care provided for patients in 911 -- 9-1-1 settings, like here in Springfield, where most ambulances are basic life support and not advanced life support. IDPH has agreed to work with the Illinois State Ambulance Association on legislation that will allow for more flexible paramedic education programs. IDPH has also agreed to collect diversity data within the industry, which will help inform future efforts to addressing staffing shortages while also growing a more diverse EMS workforce.

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Senator Hastings.

SENATOR HASTINGS:

Thank -- thank you, Madam President. And thank you, Senator Villivalam, for that explanation. I just want to for the record, note that Senator Villivalam and the IDPH have reached a verbal agreement, and I hope that IDPH honors that agreement based on the explanation from Senator Villivalam. Thank you very much, Madam President. And I urge an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you. Is there any further discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5085 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 57 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. Fifty-eight, yes sir, voting Yea. 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 58 -- 5085, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Castro. Out of the record. Senator Fine, on Senate Bill, excuse me, House Bill 5094. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5094, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Fine.

SENATOR FINE:

Thank you, Madam President. This legislation creates a task force whose goal is to reduce the administrative burden that causes barriers for behavioral health providers. The Behavioral Health

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Administrative (Burden) Task Force will review policies and regulations impacting the field, and it will identify the inefficiencies that create barriers to service.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5094 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5094, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Please turn your Calendars to the top of page 9, on the Order of House Bill 3rd Reading. Senator Turner, Doris Turner, on House Bill 5095. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5095, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Turner.

SENATOR D. TURNER:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5095 requires a nursing home to inform a resident whose Medicare benefits are ending prior to the full 100 day benefit period, that their benefits are expiring in five days. The intent of the bill is to provide residents with some notification that their Medicare coverage is expiring, and that they will need to either move out of the facility if they are not eligible for Medicaid and not able to pay for their stay. Medicare typically covers up to 100 days in a nursing facility for rehabilitation stays. At the end of that

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period, residents need to pay out of pocket or through Medicaid or other insurance if they wish to continue staying in the facility. And I'm happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator Turner. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5095 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish. Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5095, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Simmons, Senator Simmons. Out of the record. Senator Martwick, on House Bill 5104. The gentleman indicates he wishes to proceed. Please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5104, an Act concerning public employee benefits. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Martwick.

SENATOR MARTWICK:

Thank you, Madam President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. House Bill 5104 amends the Policemen's Annuity and Benefit Fund and the Firemen's Annuity and Benefit Fund. Current law provides certain rebuttable presumptions for Chicago Police and Firefighters who became disabled or died as a result of COVID-19, holding that they did so while on the job, thus entitling them to hire death and disability pension benefits than non-line of duty benefits. This bill extends those presumptions to apply to any Chicago Police or Firefighter who is exposed to and contracted

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COVID-19 on or after March 9th, 2020, and on or before January 31st, 2022. So, folks, this is one of those bills where we all like to say that we support our first responders. When we were ordered to stay home because of the pandemic they were ordered to go to work, and they were subjected to many cases of COVID. This is an initiative of our Comptroller whose brother contracted COVID while in the workplace but was denied the rebuttable of presumption and had to pay all sorts of out-of-pocket expenses for really, really severe illness and disability. This extends that rebuttable of presumption that if we order them to go to work, we presume that they're contracting COVID was as a line of or was in the line of duty and it extends to them that better benefit package. I'm happy to answer any questions. And I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5104 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 5104 -- excuse me. There's 57 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 1 voting Present. House Bill 5104, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Fowler, on House Bill 5128. The gentleman indicates he wishes to proceed, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5128, an Act concerning government. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Fowler.

SENATOR FOWLER:

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Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5128 is an initiative of the Illinois Sheriffs Association. It adds sheriffs to the list of members that may be appointed to a 9-1-1 Board. Not aware of any opposition, passed the House unanimously and I ask for a favorable roll call. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5128 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5128, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Holmes, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR HOLMES:

For a correction, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

State your correction, Senator.

SENATOR HOLMES:

Madam President, I meant to vote Yes on 5104, that's House Bill 5104. Could I be recorded as a Yes vote?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Yes. The record will reflect your intention. Senator Plummer, on House Bill 5138. Gentleman indicates he wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5138, an Act concerning State government. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

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Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

Thank you. Senate or House Bill 5138 amends the Department of Transportation Law (of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois) to require IDOT to make public any study or survey completed by the Department that involves traffic or environmental impact on road construction. This passed the House unanimously with -- with no opposition, and I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5138 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 50 -- 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5138, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Murphy, on House Bill 5166. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5166, an Act concerning local government. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5166 simply corrects the problem where everyone in the local fire district moved out of the district, and this sets a system up for the surrounding communities to pick up the service for those communities that divides the assets and protects the taxpayers. So, I know of no

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opposition, and I would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5166 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 57 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5166, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Koehler, on House Bill 5190. The gentleman seeks leave... Yeah. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5190, an Act concerning transportation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Koehler.

SENATOR KOEHLER:

Thank you, Madam President, Members of the Senate. This bill provides that effectively immediately, funds from the township bridge program that are allocated to a county which are not obligated within 48 months, shall be considered lapsed funds. It also further provides that these lapsed funds shall be used to provide additional funding for townships and road districts that have sufficient{sic} (insufficient) funding for construction of bridges that are 20 feet in length or more. Finally, it repeals the Section of Illinois Highway Code which requires a local match of \$1 in local funds for every \$4 of Township Bridge funding program, and I will be happy to answer any questions.

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Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5190 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5190, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Villa, on House Bill 5218. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5218, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Villa.

SENATOR VILLA:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5218 would remove any impractical eligibility requirements for individuals seeking to take a nursing assistant certification exam in Spanish. House Bill 5218 would require the Department of Public Health to create rules to offer the exam in Spanish, while preventing restrictions on eligibility. The exam is actually currently available in Spanish however, no individual has ever been able to take the exam to -- due to the impractical requirements needed in order to take the Spanish exam. This change will ensure the process is equitable by allowing applicants the ability to take the test in their preferred language. This bill does not include any changes to requirements regarding a candidate's ability to complete their training in English, or to use English in the workplace. Establishing a simplified process to offer CNA exams in Spanish, will allow more

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qualified candidates to become certified nursing assistants. Being bilingual is an asset, and having more bilingual CNAs will support patients in diverse communities across the State. I'd be happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, oh, excuse me. Senator McClure, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR MCCLURE:

Will the sponsor yield?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Sponsor indicates she will yield, Senator. Senator McClure.

SENATOR MCCLURE:

Thank you, Madam President. So, Senator Villa, we had a great discussion about this in Committee. So you touched on the training, but the training is several weeks. It's not just like 1 or 2 classes and that's all in English. Is that correct.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Villa.

SENATOR VILLA:

That is correct.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator McClure.

SENATOR MCCLURE:

And you talked about the -- so this is currently allowed if you meet certain criteria. And yet not a single person has been able to take the test in Spanish?

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Senator Villa.

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SENATOR VILLA:

That is correct. These requirements are very impractical and restrictive.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator McClure.

SENATOR MCCLURE:

Thank you. To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

To the bill, Senator.

SENATOR MCCLURE:

I thank the Senator for bringing this bill. At first, we had quite a few questions. They were thoroughly answered in Committee before you take this test in Spanish, which, by the way, cost a significant amount more money than if you take it in English. You have to go through training all in English. And so we've got the situation, we've got bilingual folks who are more comfortable taking written exams in Spanish, which makes sense. We've got a lot of people that don't speak English in our nursing homes, and they need to be cared for, and this is not an automatic entry into a position. After you take this test, you still have to apply for a job, and the nursing home or facility needs to interview you to make sure you would meet the requirements for this particular facility. So, I think this is a good bill. As I said, the clarifications that we needed to make sure this was done for the right reasons were there. And so it is a good bill, and I do encourage everyone to vote Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Further discussion? Seeing none. Senator Villa, to close.

SENATOR VILLA:

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Thank you, Madam President. This bill still requires people to take their trainings in English. Sometimes under a testing environment, you can have high pressure. And so those folks who have another native language, like Spanish might be a little more under pressure. And therefore, this test is just a practical way to increase the workforce. I urge an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there -- the question is, shall House Bill 5218 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 51 voting Yea, 6 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5218, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Feigenholtz, on House Bill 5224. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5224, an Act concerning civil law. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Feigenholtz.

SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

Thank you, Madam President, and House Bill 5224 is an initiative of the Chicago Bar Association, and it is supported also by the State Bar. It is a clarification that under the Adoption Act, any parental rights are terminated in an adult adoption, just as they are for a minor. This is a response to an appellate court decision that created some confusion to this issue. It was an inconsistent decision, with decades of practice treating adults over the age of 18 and minor adoptees the same to

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termination of rights. I'm happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5224 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5224, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Simmons, on House Bill 5238. Gentleman indicates he wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5238, an Act concerning safety. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Simmons.

SENATOR SIMMONS:

Thank you very much, Madam President, Members of the Senate. HB 5238 amends the Illinois Modular Dwelling and Mobile Safe -- Structure Safety Act. It requires that every newly installed manufactured home be equipped with a radio -- weather radio supplied by the person who installed the manufactured home. The radio must be equipped with a tone alarm activation, a specific alert messaging encoding, and a public alert standard certification. The bill also encourages the operator of a manufactured home community to provide a written reminder to the owners of a manufactured home in communities to replace the batteries in weather radios and smoke detectors each year during National Fire Prevention Week. This is supported by the

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Manufactured Home Owners Association. I know of no opposition, will take any questions. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Senator Bryant, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR BRYANT:

Thank you, Madam President. To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

To the bill, Senator.

SENATOR BRYANT:

I would just like to remind the Body that almost everyone has a cell phone. The cell phones have weather alerts on them. That's important, because what this bill does is it mandates new construction requirements on all new manufactured homes in Illinois. And it makes this very popular, affordable housing option, more expensive for the people who need them the most. While we should be encouraging affordable housing, this bill actually discourages it. So, for those reasons, I urge a No vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Further discussion? Seeing none. Senator Simmons, to close.

SENATOR SIMMONS:

Thank you so much, Madam President. I thank the -- the Senator for -- for her comments. I just want to say that -- that the -- the argument that was just made about this legislation making affordable homes more expensive, it couldn't be further from the truth. You know, folks that live in manufactured homes often have no clue when a tornado is coming, they may not have phone service, they may not have a cell phone, they may not even have the towers nearby to them to alert them that there is a

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weather disaster. So, that is -- that is absolutely not accurate. And -- and I welcome any legislation to increase the production and preservation of affordable housing. That's all I've been talking about for the three years that I walked into this building. I urge an Aye vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

The question is, shall House Bill 5238 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 39 voting Yea, 20 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5238, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Villanueva, on House Bill 5239. Out of the record. Senator Glowiak Hilton, on House Bill 5247. The lady wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5247, an Act concerning civil law. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Glowiak Hilton.

SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

Thank you, Madam President. This project began in 2017, in Elmhurst. And House Bill 5247, is the result of negotiations that were in progress for many years. Back and forth between the owner and the Village, and Elmhurst went through all the steps, appraisals, affidavits, negotiations. And if this quick-take is approved, the City will file a motion for determination and for preliminary just compensation. So, the owner of the property will be paid for the -- the strip of land and the strip of land, let me

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remind everyone, is only about a 60-foot sidewalk area on the edge of the property. So, the sidewalk would connect Lake Street to another street, that's a critical part of the streetscape. And for pedestrian safety, it's really important that we -- that we do this project. I am happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion, Senator Anderson, for what purpose do you rise.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

To the bill, Senator.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

Thank you, Madam President. While I don't doubt the intent of -- of the sponsors legislation here, I do want to point out that this is a quick-take bill and it is taking property from -- from a private owner. So, with that, I would urge a No vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any further discussion? Seeing none. Senator Glowiak Hilton, to close.

SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

Thank you, Madam President. I just have a photo here of a kind of scrubby piece of land with a little sidewalk on either side of it, that connects. It's a gas station. Just want to let you know what this actually looks like. And it is actually, .0095 percent of the total amount of property that the owner owns. So, this is less than 0.01 percent that is needed just for sidewalk pedestrian safety. So, I do urge an Aye vote.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. The question is, shall House Bill 5247 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 42 voting Yea, 11 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5247, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Please turn your Calendars to the top of page 10, top of page 10. Senator Faraci, on House Bill 5256. Gentleman indicates he wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5256, an Act concerning State government. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Faraci.

SENATOR FARACI:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5256 simply changes the language in the trainee program for persons with a "disability" to include Autism Spectrum Disorder. And I appreciate an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5256 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5256, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Villivalam, on House Bill 5258. The gentleman indicates he wishes to proceed. Please read the bill.

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SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5258, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Villivalam.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5258, requires group or individual policies of accident and health insurance that provide dependent coverage to make that coverage available to the parent or stepparent of the insured. This only applies if the parent or stepparent meets the definition of a qualifying relative under the International -- Internal Revenue Code and lives within the accident or health insurance policies service area. I know of no opposition and would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5258 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5258, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 5276. Senator Koehler, on House Bill 5276. Out of the record. Senator Holmes, on House Bill 5282. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5282, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

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Senator Holmes.

SENATOR HOLMES:

Thank you so much, Madam President. Currently, the Insurance Code requires coverage for the treatment of mental, emotional, nervous, or substance use disorders in line with the definition of essential health benefits for pregnancy and newborn care under the federal Affordable Care Act. But, there is no requirement to provide those services in the case of miscarriage or stillbirth. House Bill 5282 adds coverage for individuals needing those services, as the result of a miscarriage or stillbirth. I would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5282 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5282, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 5285, Senator Villanueva. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5285, an Act concerning criminal law. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Villanueva.

SENATOR VILLANUEVA:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5285 is a technical bill that will clarify the status of certain special probation

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programs so that employers, landlords and other reading records know that the participation in these programs is not a conviction. Right now, while someone is participating in one of these programs, background checks show that they pled guilty and were sentenced to probation. Even though judgment is withheld, the record is still being misinterpreted as a felony conviction. It's a good bill. We're just trying to clarify language to make sure that people have the second chances that they were looking for, that they got by a judge, and so that there isn't misinterpretation of the law.
PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5285 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 57 voting Yea, 1 vote Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5285, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Holmes, on House Bill 5287. Please read the lady's bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5287, an Act concerning local government. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Excuse me, Senator Holmes. Senator Holmes, on your bill.

SENATOR HOLMES:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5287 requires the State Board of Elections to remit to each county the amount of the stipend dictated in statute for county officers in counties of less than 2 million inhabitants, rather than directly to the individual officer. The bill also provides that the county shall

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be responsible for State and federal income tax reporting, withholding and pension employer contributions for the county official stipends rather than the State. This is an initiative of the State Board of Elections. I'd ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5287 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5287, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Villivalam seeks leave of the Body to return House Bill 5288 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading is House Bill 5288. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Villivalam.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Villivalam, on Amendment No. 1.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Madam President. I would like to adopt the amendment and explain it on 3rd Reading.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

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Floor Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Villivalam.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Villivalam, on Amendment No. 2.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Madam President. I'd like to adopt the amendment and explain it on 3rd Reading.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is House Bill 5288. Mr. Secretary, please read the gentleman's bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5288, an Act concerning transportation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Villivalam.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5288 provides that the Secretary of State may issue the 100 Illinois Club (100 Club of Illinois) license decals to residents that meet certain qualifications. This is an initiative of my State Representative, Mike Kelly, who's a first responder. The 100 -- 100 Club of Illinois is a nonprofit organization that provides support to the families of first responders killed in the line of duty and

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supports active duty first responders throughout our State. Their mission is to help these families navigate after the loss of a loved one and to support the needs of active -- active duty first responders in any way possible. Both amendments were adopted to address administrative issues that the Governor's Office requested. Would ask for an Aye vote and -- to support this special cause. And I know of no opposition.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5288 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5288, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Holmes, on House Bill 5295. Please read the lady's bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5295, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Holmes.

SENATOR HOLMES:

Thank you so much, Madam President. I promise I'm through for the day after this one. House Bill 5295 requires a group or individual policy of accident and health insurance or a managed care plan that is amended, delivered, issued, or renewed after January 1st, 2026, to provide coverage for medically necessary hormonal and non-hormonal therapy to treat menopause symptoms. There are some restrictions as the therapy must be recommended by

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an approved qualified health care provider, proven safe and effective by peer-reviewed research, and include all FDA approved methods of administering the medication. The bill also extends coverage to Medicaid patients for menopause that's been induced by a hysterectomy. I would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Senator Rezin, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR REZIN:

Thank you, Madam President. To the bill, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

To the bill, Senator.

SENATOR REZIN:

Thank you. I'd like to thank the sponsor for bringing this bill forward. The expansion of coverage will make a significant difference in the lives of women throughout our State by ensuring that they have access to the care that they need. I urge an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Further discussion. Seeing none. Senator Holmes, to close.

SENATOR HOLMES:

I just would ask for an Aye vote. And I want to say thank you to my colleague across the aisle for her support.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you. The question is, shall House Bill 5295 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting

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-- ope, two more snuck in there. 58 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5295, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 52 -- House Bill 5296. House Bill 5296, Senator Villa. The lady indicates she wishes to proceed. Please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5296, an Act concerning conservation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Villa.

SENATOR VILLA:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5296 creates the Homeowners' Native Landscape (Landscaping) Act. This measure would allow residents living in neighborhoods with a homeowner's association to grow native plant species in their yards, as long as the area is maintained. House Bill 5296 provides proper rules and oversight to ensure that these plants are grown responsibly, while still ensuring prosperity of these native habitats. Illinois is home to almost 200 native plant species, which are crucial to our ecosystem, as they provide food and shelter for our pollinators and therefore support our agriculture. I know -- know -- I know of no opposition. I'm happy -- I'm happy to take any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you. Is there any discussion? Senator Tracy, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you, Madam President. I'd like to speak to the bill, please.

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To the bill, Senator.

SENATOR TRACY:

I am a gardener. I have a beautiful flower garden. I love monarch butterflies, I love pollinators. But it's in my backyard. This bill is an intrusion on what a homeowner's association can do. And if you choose to live in a homeowner's association subdivision or the like, you know that when you buy the property. And isn't it better for local control to decide what the rules of the homeowner's association plan to do? I don't think it's within the purview of the State legislature to intervene and tell, all of a sudden, people that have bought land in a homeowner's association expecting what's the rules and the regulations according to what they have chosen to live in, that now we -- we circumvent those rules. I -- I note -- imagine that... I mean, I think that the whole idea of -- of building awareness of what pollinators do and the value they are to the ecosystem is great. It -- it needs to be done. But here again, we're -- we're putting our views over a homeowner's association, their rules and regulations, and saying, "No, you can't do this anymore". And, you know, if you look at the language it -- it says an association may adopt reasonable rules and regulations governing a planned, intentionally maintained native landscape that do not impair the landscape. But it goes on to say, that, so long as the vegetation does not extend over onto a neighboring property, public or common sidewalk, path, streets, or other public or common areas or elements. And I'm sorry, I miss -- I miss -- missed the part I'm trying to address. So long as the area is maintained predominantly free of weeds, invasive species, and trash. Trash. And vegetation does not extend over onto the -- the sidewalk. I think what you might have is very good neighbors

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that have an attractive, no noxious weeds type of situation. But I also think you can have neighbors that will see this statute, if passed and signed into law, as a way of growing an abundance of vegetation in their yard that will harbor wildlife. That maybe the association and the homeowners and the neighbors do not wish to have. And, so I think -- I think it goes a step too far. Let's let the homeowners' associations decide what they want to do, what the requirements are. So, that's my take on it. And so, I urge a No vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you. Senator Villa, to close.

SENATOR VILLA:

Thank you, Madam President. The Community Associations Institute, which is the homeowners' associations, are proponents of the bill. I do understand some of the points that were made by the previous speaker, but property owners should still have jurisdiction over what they choose to do with their lawns, and this measure encourages planting of native species. We know that pollinators give us life, so I urge an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

The question is, shall House Bill 5296 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 42 voting Yea, 17 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5296, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Syverson, on House Bill 5317. Gentlemen indicates he wishes to proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

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House Bill 5317, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Syverson.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Thank you, Madam President. This legislation is on behalf of the Dental Society, and it requires that all carriers use a uniform claim form so it will be easier for a dentist to be able to file claims with the carriers. All concerns have been worked out and know of no opposition. Ask for a favorable roll call. Thank you very much.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5317 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, 2 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5317, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Rose, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR ROSE:

I am rising to admit that I made a mistake. Thank you, Senator Plummer. And I wish to be recorded as voting Yes on House Bill 5317. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

The record will reflect your intention. Senator Anderson, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR ANDERSON:

What he said.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

The record will reflect his intentions. Senator Villivalam, on House Bill 5325. Mr. Secretary, please read the gentleman's bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5325, an Act concerning transportation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Villivalam.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Madam President. As another transportation related bill, initiative of the Illinois State Police, it is their omnibus legislation, among other provisions, that would provide that whenever a peace officer issues a citation for reckless driving with willful and wanton disregard for the safety of others, the arresting officer may have the vehicle impounded for a period of five days. It also provides that the Illinois State Police may use an online payment system for the collection of fees related to furnishing copies of crash reports, and to accept fees for police escorts. I know of no opposition, would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5325 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 voting Yea, 1 vote Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5325, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Faraci, on House Bill 5344. Senator Faraci seeks leave of the Body to return House Bill 5344

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to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading is House Bill 5344. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Yes. Floor Amendment 1, offered by Senator Faraci.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Faraci, on your amendment.

SENATOR FARACI:

I'd like to adopt the amendment and explain on 3rd.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is House Bill 5344. Mr. Secretary, please read the gentleman's bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5344, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Faraci, on your bill.

SENATOR FARACI:

Thank you, Madam President. With the adoption of Amendment No. 1, it removes any opponents and allows IDFPR adequate time to review behavioral analyst applications. And I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

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Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none. The question is, shall House Bill 5344 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 57 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5344, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Stadelman. Senator Stadelman, on House Bill 5349. Mr. Secretary, please read the gentleman's bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5349, an Act concerning State government. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Stadelman.

SENATOR STADELMAN:

Thank you, Madam President, Members of the Senate. House Bill 5349 is an initiative of the Illinois Department of Transportation. This is basically a cleanup language that will help IDOT collect money that is owed after purchasing railcars. Not aware of any opposition? Ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you. Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 5349 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5349, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Glowiak Hilton, on House Bill 5353. The lady indicates she wishes to

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proceed. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5353, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Glowiak Hilton.

SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5353 is a follow up to the IDFPR reforms that passed in the fall of 2023. With that, we provided an expedited procurement process and authority to extend licenses for IDFPR. This looks to expand on those changes with a focus on behavioral health. And the bill also allows for temporary portability licensure for service members and their spouses for the duration of their assigned duty in Illinois, or until the expedited application process is complete.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Senator Plummer, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR PLUMMER:

To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

To the bill, Senator.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

I -- I just want to thank the sponsor for bringing this forward. I'm proud to have co-sponsored this piece of legislation. Not only does this help members of the military, but it also helps their families. All too often, I think as -- as a country and as a Body, we forget the sacrifices military families make, to support the service of their loved ones. This bill is a great opportunity

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to support them and help them advance their careers. So, thank you to the sponsor for bringing this forward. And I urge an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Senator Glowiak Hilton, to close.

SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

Thank you, Madam President. I appreciate the kind words of my colleague and I would appreciate an Aye vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

The question is, shall House Bill 5353 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 voting Yea, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting Present. House Bill 5353, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Hunter, in the Chair.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Toro, what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR TORO:

Hi, yes. Can you let the record reflect that I vote Yes on HB 5344, please?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Thank you. The record -- the record will so reflect that. Senator McClure, what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR MCCLURE:

Thank you, Madam President. I'd ask for the record to reflect that it was my intention to vote Yes on HB 5325.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

The record will so reflect that Senator. Senator Feigenholtz, House Bill 5354. Senator Fine. Corrections. House

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Bill 5354. Please present your bill. Well, Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5354, an Act concerning employment. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Fine.

SENATOR FINE:

Thank you, Madam President. This bill moves a pilot program that we created in 2020 into a demonstration program. It is the Customized Employment for Individuals with Disabilities Act (Customized Employment Demonstration Program). It extends the program for five years with the goal of serving at least 75 individuals. The program improves employment outcomes for people with disabilities.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5354 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the... On that question, there are 59 Yeas, 0 Nays. The bill will be so reported. Received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Harris, on House Bill 5357. Senator Harris seeks leave of the Body to return House Bill 5357 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading House Bill 5357. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Yes. Floor Amendment 1, offered by Senator Napoleon Harris.

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Senator Harris, please present your bill.

SENATOR N. HARRIS:

I'd like to adopt the amendment and explain on 3rd.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments opposed -- approved for consideration?

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

3rd Reading. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5357, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Harris.

SENATOR N. HARRIS:

Thank you, Madam President, Members of the Senate. HB 5357, as amended, requires insurance companies to provide information available for coverage that's caused by sewer backup or overflow for sump pumps. This was brought about because most people buy insurance and don't understand that there are packages as relates to flooding, and this to make sure that insurance companies notify and obtain information regarding the flooding that goes on with those packages. There's no opposition and I request a favorable vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill

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5357 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. There are 59 -- 58 Yeas, and 0 No's -- Nays, and 1 Present. House Bill 5357, received the required -- having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Villivalam, House Bill 5369. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5369, an Act concerning education. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Villivalam.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5369 is an initiative of the Bricklayers and Allied Craftworkers Union. It amends the Career and Workforce Transition Act. It allows for students at approved institutions to receive up to 30 credit hours from a public community college. The legislation would add masonry to a long list of applicable trade and technical professions listed in the existing statute. I know of no opposition and would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5369 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 Yeas, 0 Nays and 0 Present. House Bill 5369, having -- having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill -- Senator Villanueva, House Bill 5370. Mr. Secretary,

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read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5370, an Act concerning transportation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Villanueva.

SENATOR VILLANUEVA:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5370, adds emergency scenes to Scotts law and defines emergency scenes to mean a location where a stationary emergency vehicle is present and has activated its oscillating, rotating or flashing lights. Additionally, the bill provides that vehicles entering a construction or maintenance zone reduce speed to a speed that is reasonable with regard to traffic conditions and change into a lane that is not adjacent to construction workers, if possible, to do so. This passed unanimously out of the House and I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5370 pass? All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. House Bill 5370, having 59 Yes, 0 Nay, 0 voting Present. Having received the required constitutional amendment {sic} (majority), is declared passed. Senator Harriss, House Bill 5394. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5394, an Act concerning education. 3rd Reading of the bill.

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Senator Harriss.

SENATOR E. HARRISS:

Thank you, Madam President. This bill is about protecting kids. We want to make sure if the unthinkable situation happens, that someone there is trained to help. This bill provides school districts establish a cardiac emergency response plan. Having someone trained on staff can and will save lives. There is no doubt that AED save lives. They provide immediate intervention during critical moments when every single second counts. The availability and use of AEDs have also shown to significantly increase chances of survival and recovery. Not only can they save lives, but my hope is that this can and will also provide peace of mind to parents when they drop their kids off at school. I would ask you to join me voting Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5394 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On the question, there are 59 Yeas, 0 Nays. House Bill 5394, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 5405, Senator Morrison. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5405, an Act concerning State government. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Morrison.

SENATOR MORRISON:

Thank you, Madam President. This bill requires any State

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entity or hospital that receives funding from the NIH for conducting clinical trials of drugs or medical devices to increase the diversity of participants in clinical trials. It also requires the Department of Public Health examining what demographic groups and populations are currently underrepresented in clinical trials in Illinois, and to identify barriers to participation. Aware of no opposition.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5405 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 57 Ayes, 1 Nay. House Bill 5405, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 5408, Senator Harmon. House Bill 5412, Senator Stadelman. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5412, an Act concerning revenue. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Stadelman.

SENATOR STADELMAN:

Thank you, Madam President, Members of the Senate. House Bill 5412 is a cleanup initiative of the Department of Revenue. It provides that if a REV or MICRO tax incentive recipient fails to report required data to DCEO, then they may be ineligible to receive tax incentives under the REV and MICRO Acts. Ask for an Aye vote.

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Are there any questions? Any discussions? The question is, shall House Bill 5412 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 Ayes, 0 Nays. House Bill 5412, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Halpin, House Bill 5418. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5418, an Act concerning education. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Halpin.

SENATOR HALPIN:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5418 would allow buildings owned by Regional Offices of Education and Intermediate Service Centers to be eligible for school maintenance project grants, so long as the building actually houses an academic facility. So administrative only, buildings would not be covered by this. It's only to address those service centers and regional offices that have academic structures within it. I'm not aware of any opposition. I would ask for a Yes vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5418 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Senator Fine, House Bill 5429. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

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ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5429, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Fine.

SENATOR FINE:

Thank you, Madam President. This legislation requires assisted living and shared housing developments to submit architectural drawings to the Department of Public Health for review, the Department -- before they can do any major construction. The Department believes this is necessary to ensure the physical health and safety of its residents. I know of no opposition and I'd appreciate your support.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any question? The question is, shall House Bill 5429 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 Ayes, 1 Nay, 2 not voting. House Bill 5429, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Edly-Adams{sic} (Allen), House Bill... Scratch that out of the record. Senator Halpin, House Bill 5450. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5450, an Act concerning education. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Halpin.

SENATOR HALPIN:

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Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5450 would change some reporting requirements that for the Illinois Board of Higher Education. And then amend the dates for certain reports under the Veterans Services Act from September 1st to October 15th. It's part of convenience for the Board to make sure those reports get entered at the right time. I will stubbornly answer any questions and I'd ask for your Yes vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall -- shall House Bill 5450 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. There are 59 Ayes, and 0 Nays. House Bill 5450, having received the required constitutional amendment {sic} (majority), is declared passed. Senator Cervantes, House Bill 5457. Senator Villa. Correction. Senator Villa, House Bill 5457. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5457, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Villa.

SENATOR VILLA:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5457 is an initiative from the Community Behavioral Health Association, which aims to remove language barriers for licensing exams. House Bill 5457 would require IDFPR to provide individuals whose primary language is not English, reasonable accommodations during licensing exams. This measure applies to licensing exams for social workers, marriage and family therapists, and professional counselors. This measure

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simply codifies the accommodations that IDFPR already provides these applicants under ADA requirements. The bill will add protections against discrimination based on current or perceived immigration status of applicants seeking accommodations. It's vital that people in our communities have access to behavioral health professionals who can speak their language, and removing these barriers will allow more bilingual applicants to receive their licenses and address the shortage of behavioral health professionals in Illinois. I'd be happy to answer questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any questions? House Bill -- House Bill 5457. Pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the question. Take the record. On that question, there are 39 Yeas, and 19 Nays, 1 not voting. House Bill 5457, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Villivalam, House Bill 5459. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5459, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Villivalam.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5459 requires public utilities that provide drinking water services to provide water usage data to a municipal wastewater agency or a unit of local government that handles wastewater upon request for purposes of calculating wastewater billings. This is an initiative of the

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Illinois Association of Wastewater Agencies. Would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any question? The question is, shall House Bill 5459 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 57 Ayes, and 0 Nays. House Bill... And 2 Nays. House Bill 5459, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Harriss, House Bill 5465. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5465, an Act concerning courts. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Harriss.

SENATOR E. HARRISS:

Thank you, Madam President. It is important we create a pathway to expunge criminal records for victim survivors of human trafficking, as they seek to recover from the trauma they've experienced to pursue a normal life. House Bill 5465 actually builds on legislation that we passed last year by creating an easier process for child victims of trafficking to have their juvenile records expunged or sealed as a result of any criminal acts that they were forced to take part in while they were being abused. I'm not aware of any opposition to the bill, and it passed unanimously in the House. Thank you for your attention to this topic and I'd appreciate an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

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Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5465 pass. All those in favor say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 Ayes, 0 Nays. House Bill 5465, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. On page 12, at the top. Senator Villa, House Bill 5488. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.
ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5488, an Act concerning conservation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Villa.

SENATOR VILLA:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5488 would establish a Legacy Tree Program Task Force. This Task Force would be responsible for submitting recommendations to the General Assembly on the creation of a statewide legacy tree recognition program to promote the identification, awareness, commemoration, and preservation of significant trees across the State. This initiative would help promote and maintain the beauty of our environment. I'm happy to answer any questions and I urge an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5488 pass. All those in favor vote, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 54 Ayes, 2 Nays. House Bill 5488, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Harris, 5493.

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Out of the record. Senator Harris, Napoleon Harris. Correction. House Bill 5493. Please read -- Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5493, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator N. Harris.

SENATOR N. HARRIS:

Thank you, Madam President, Members of the Senate. House Bill 5493 is the Department of Insurance Administration bill, which simply just resolved some technical inconsistencies.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5493 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 Ayes, 0 nays. House Bill 5493, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Feigenholtz, House Bill 5495. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5495, an Act concerning State government. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Feigenholtz.

SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5495 is an initiative of the Illinois State Police in response to some audit findings that were released by the auditor. It clarifies six different pieces, from forensic science commissions to training academies,

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training records for officers, things having to do with the Board of Education. I'm happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5495 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 Ayes, 0 Nays. House Bill 5495, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Villivalam, House Bill 5502. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5502, an Act concerning civil law. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Villivalam.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5502 amends the Condominium Property Act to prohibit a condominium association from exercising any right of refusal option to purchase or right to disapprove of a sale by a unit owner in the Association for discriminatory or otherwise unlawful purpose. This initiative is supported by the Illinois Realtors Association and Community Associations Institute. Would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5502 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? 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constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Joyce, House Bill 5522. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5522, an Act concerning wildlife. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any question? Oh, Mr. Secretary? Oh, I'm sorry. Senator -- Senator Joyce, please read your bill, sir.

SENATOR JOYCE:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5522 authorizes IDNR to issue Nuisance Wildlife Control Permit not only to any person who is providing nuisance wildlife control services for a fee, but also any person who solicits customers for themselves or on behalf of a nuisance wildlife control permit holder for a fee or compensation. I know of no opposition. Ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Now is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5522 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 Ayes and 0 Nays. House Bill 5522, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Villivalam, House Bill 5530. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5530, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Villivalam.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

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Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5530 amends the Pharmacy Practice Act, among other provisions, that removes a current provision that allows for pharmacists to administer injections of long-acting or extended-release form opioid antagonists for the treatment of substance use or disorder pursuant to a valid prescription. Supported by the Illinois Pharmacist Association, the Illinois Association of Behavioral Health, and others. Know of no opposition and would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5530 pass. All those in favor will... All those in favor will vote, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 Ayes, and 0 Nays. House Bill 5530, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Fowler, House Bill 5539. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5539, an Act concerning utilities. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Fowler.

SENATOR FOWLER:

Thank you, Madam President, and Members of the Senate. House Bill 5539 amends the Public Utilities Act, adds public universities of higher education explicitly to the list of governmental organizations from which cost-effective energy efficiency measures may be procured for purposes of the Act of the Public Utilities. This is supported by all -- all universities. Passed the House

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unanimously and ask for an Aye vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5539 pass. All those in favor will say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 Ayes, and 0 Nays. And House Bill 5539, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Hastings, 5546. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5546, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Hastings.

SENATOR HASTINGS:

Thank you, Madam President. This bill rewrites the Illinois Underground Utilities (Utility) Facilities Damage Prevention Act, and it makes several substantive and technical changes. This bill has been voted on unanimously out of Committee. And I urge an Aye vote. Thank you, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5546 pass. All those in favor will vote, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 Ayes, and 0 Nays. House Bill 5546, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Morrison, House Bill 5559. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

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House Bill 5559, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Morrison.

SENATOR MORRISON:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 5559 requires auto insurers upon the determination of a total loss of an insured vehicle to provide the insured individual with a description of how that determination was made. This must include any available repair estimates, estimated vehicle salvage value, assessed market value, and any other costs or calculations used.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? the question is, shall House Bill 5559 pass. All those in favor will vote, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 Ayes, and 0 Nays. House Bill 5559, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Hastings, House Bill 5596. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5596, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Hastings.

SENATOR HASTINGS:

Madam President, I believe there's an amendment on the bill. I like to adopt it, if I haven't adopted -- did I adopt it already?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Hastings.

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SENATOR HASTINGS:

Thank you, Madam President. This bill maintains, I apologize here. This bill as amended, creates an exemption from the licensure for day care homes and group day care homes serving children and military personnel. If the day care is located on a military base or federal property and is certified as a child development program by a brand of the US Department of Defense or the US Coast Guard. I urge, an Aye vote. Thank you, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5596 pass. All those in favor will vote, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 59 Ayes, and 0 Nays. House Bill 5596, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Bennett, House Bill 5640. Mr. Secretary, read the bill. Nope, no. House Bill 5643, Senator Fine. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5643, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Fine.

SENATOR FINE:

Thank you, Madam President. This legislation requires insurance coverage for pregnancy tests to help patients taking medication that require these tests.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 5643 pass? All those in favor will vote, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The

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voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. There are 58 voting Aye, and 0 voting No. House Bill 5643, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Page 3, Senate Bill 3rd Readings. Senator Villivalam, Senate Bill 898. Senate -- Senator Villivalam seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 898 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave granted. On the Order of the 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 898. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Villivalam.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Villivalam.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Madam President. I'd like to adopt -- adopt the amendment and explain it on 3rd.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

3rd Reading. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 898, an Act concerning transportation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Mr. -- Mr. Villivalam, please proceed.

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SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Madam President, and thank you for getting my name right every time. This is an initiative of the Illinois Automobile Association. Senate Floor Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 8898, provides that an Illinois automobile dealer must obtain an Illinois title for any vehicle which is held for sale in Illinois. Additionally, it provides that any vehicle with a title issued by another state but showing an Illinois address for the owner must acquire an Illinois title before the owner can transfer that vehicle to another person. I know of no opposition, would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 898 pass. All those in favor will vote, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Senator Simmons, Senate Bill 727. Mr. Secretary, read the bill. Senator Simmons seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 727 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 727. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Simmons.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Simmons.

SENATOR SIMMONS:

Thank you very much, Madam President. I like to adopt the

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amendment and discuss it on 3rd.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? Are there any -- all those in favor will say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

3rd Reading. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 727, an Act concerning health. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Simmons.

SENATOR SIMMONS:

Thank you so much, Madam President. Members of the Senate, Senate Bill 727, as amended, creates the Safe Public Drinking Water Act, which will essentially bring Illinois in line with setting maximum contaminant levels for our public drinking water supplies. We know from study after study and from the US EPA that a number of the contaminants that are in our water and PFAS, otherwise known as forever chemicals, are making people sick. It is slowing down the rate of early childhood development. It's leading to an accelerated pace of chronic disease progression. And it's really something that we've got to get our hands around because everybody deserves to drink clean -- clean drinking water. Clean drinking water is a human right. And as somebody that loves water, I appreciate everybody supporting this legislation today. I want to

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thank the IEPA for their patience and working with this legislation and getting us to this point of having the amendment. I appreciate their support on setting this -- this maximum contaminant level for the two compounds that are mentioned in this legislation. And what's also excellent about this bill is that it will codify proactively the regulations that were put into place by the US EPA on April 10th, where the federal government is now setting maximum contaminant levels on six PFAS. So Illinois, by passing this legislation, will proactively codify those requirements in case the federal regulations, environmental regulations get gutted. That is something that, unfortunately, could happen with the rate that the Supreme Court is going on environmental protection. So, this is an excellent bill. I thank you all for your attention today and would urge an Aye vote and we'll take any questions. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

SENATOR HARMON:

Thank you, Madam President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. House Bill 3886 is an initiative of my State Representative, Camille Lilly. It requires the Department of Public Health to develop and implement a crisis standards of care plan for health care providers across the State. This is derivative of our experience with the COVID pandemic, so that health care providers are better prepared to deal with health care crises the next time around. Happy to answer any questions, if you have them.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

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Representative and Mayor Brad Stephens, represents Rosemont, next door to the airport. What the bill would do would create the O'Hare Driver Safety Act, effectively banning drivers from parking on the shoulder of the highway while they await arrival of passengers at O'Hare airport. This is a bill that's clearly in the interest of the safety of drivers, passengers departing the airport, and airport workers. Not aware of any opposition. And I ask for your Aye votes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)
