President and Members of the Senate, Today, I rise to honor the life and legacy of Dr. Cheryl Green, a pioneer leader in Illinois higher education and our beloved President of Governor State University. Who passed away, a few weeks ago. Dr. Green was more than an academic administrator. She was a trailblazer, a champion for equity, and a beacon of compassion for countless students and faculty alike. When she assumed the Presidency of

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Governor State University in July of 2020, in the midst of a global pandemic, she became the University's first African American President and one of the few women of color to lead a Public University in our State's history. Her leadership was not defined only by her intelligence and vision, but by her profound humanity. She established University Social Justice Initiative. She launched Latinx Resource Center. She spearheaded the creation of both an honors college and a college of graduate studies. These weren't just institutional milestones. They were lifelines for students seeking opportunities and belonging in higher education. She believed that education would be transformative, accessible to all. She backed that belief with action, often using her own personal funds to support students in crisis. Her dedication to equity and inclusion was not just performative, it was personal, and it was powerful. Her legacy extends beyond University Park and Governor State University. She served on numerous statewide and national boards, enriching our higher education system with her voice, experience, and unrelenting dedication to service. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, Dr. Green left an indelible mark not only in the campus of Governor State University, but across the landscape of higher education in Illinois. Her example challenges each of us in this Chamber and beyond to lead with purpose, to serve with empathy, and to uplift those who are often left behind. So, on behalf of the Illinois State Senate, I hope that we can extend our deepest condolences to her family, the Governor State Community, and the many lives she touched. Thank you, Mr. President.

If the fitness center fails to do so, then it must honor the original terms of the membership for the life of the customer. Mr. President, I know of no opposition to the bill, but there -- I have spoken to the Attorney General's Office and we -- we have some technical cleanup language to add

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on. I'm asking that we are -- be allowed to pass it out of the Senate, let it get fixed in the House, come back for a concurrence.

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 637, amends the Cook County Forest Preserve District Act. It would allow a zoological park, in this case Brookfield Zoo, to sublease or license up to 15 acres of land within -- within its boundaries for recreational use to a governmental or nonprofit -- nonprofit organization to gain revenue and support of the zoological parks mission. This helps resolve a -- an issue around a parking lot with the zoo and Riverside Brookfield High School and, standby to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Seeing no discussion. The question is, shall Senate Bill 637 pass? All those in favor vote, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And Senate Bill 637, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. I'm going to go to page 7, we're going to go to Senate Bill 798, Senator Aquino. Senator Aquino seeks leave of the Body, to return Senate Bill 798 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading, now Senate Bill 798. Mr. Secretary, any Floor amendment approved for consideration?

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declared passed. We're going to go to page 8 towards the bottom of the page it's Senate Bill 1274, Senator Glowiak Hilton. Senator Glowiak Hilton seeks to leave of the Body, to return Senate Bill 1274 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading in Senate Bill 1274. Mr. Secretary, any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

Senator Glowiak Hilton, to explain your bill.

SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 1274, as amended,

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allows a sexual assault survivor -- services voucher beginning January 1st, 2026, to be used to seek payment for rideshare or taxi services, if available to the survivor's home, a shelter, or the transfer hospital they initially present it to. This document was created by -- it's an -- it's suggested by the Illinois Sexual Assault Medical Forensic Services Implementation Task Force that this ride share service be an option for support for sexual assault survivors. The current law requires hospitals to issue a sexual assault services voucher at the time of sexual assault. Survivor receives medical forensic services. And this just adds that the voucher may also be used to seek taxi services or use a rideshare care program.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Seeing no discussion. The question is, shall Senate Bill 1274 pass. All those in favor vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Senator Murphy seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 851, to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 851. Mr. Secretary, any Floor amendment approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Murphy.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Murphy, on your amendment.

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SENATOR MURPHY:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to adopt and explain on 3rd.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Any discussion? All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, the amendment is adopted. Any further Floor amendments approved for consideration.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

3rd Reading. Now on 3rd Reading, Senate Bill 851. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 851, an Act concerning transportation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Murphy, to explain your bill.

SENATOR MURPHY:

Thank you, Mr. President. As amended, because these

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amendments are mostly just clarifying and technical amendments. But what this bill does is allows the school district that does not transport their students in the morning or afternoon, so they have no bus service for morning or afternoon, but it will allow them then to transport students during the school day to educational functions, to internships, to other schools, for various classes. So, everyone is brought to an agreement by the amendments. Happy to answer any questions, but I know of no opposition.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Seeing no discussion. The question is, shall Senate Bill 851 pass. All those in favor vote, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And Senate Bill 851, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. I'm going to go to page 9 we're going to go to the top of the page, Senate Bill 1486,. Senator Aquino seeks leave the Body, to return Senate Bill 1486 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 1486. Mr. Secretary, any Floor amendments approved for consideration.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Aquino.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Aquino, on your amendment.

SENATOR AQUINO:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to adopt the amendment and explain it on 3rd.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 3, offered by Senator Aquino.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Aquino, on your amendment.

SENATOR AQUINO:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to also adopt that amendment and explain it on 3rd.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

3rd Reading. Now on 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 1486. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1486, an Act concerning business. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Just one second, we have a request for WGLT to record and take photos. Seeing no objection, leave is granted. Senator Aquino, on your -- on your bill.

SENATOR AQUINO:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 1486 creates a Junk

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Fee Ban Act. Just to kind of give some context, our -- our economy unfortunately, is -- we see sort of pervasive throughout there in a lot of different industries that when a consumer goes to purchase an item or get a service that at the -- when they go to pay and they get a receipt of what they're paying for there's a lot of sort of hidden fees that aren't explained that are added on and tacked on. And this is costly to the American consumer, to the Illinois consumer, and so this -- this bill aims to seek -- clarity and make sure that consumers are able to know exactly what they're paying for why they're paying for something and not surprise when they get a final bill that they somehow are spending a lot more money than they intended to when trying to purchase something or -- get a service. And so, we spent a lot of time working on this bill. It took two years that we meticulously sat down with a number of industries to -- to work hard to make sure that we kept the integrity of the bill, of seeking transparency. But at the time -- at the same time not being overburdensome to industries that are already regulated either on the federal level or State level. And so, I think we've come to a good place where I ask respectfully for an Aye vote and I would ask -- ask the -- Mr. President if I can have an opportunity to close at the end of -- before we take the vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion, Senator Tracy?

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you. I have questions of the sponsor, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Indicates he'll yield.

SENATOR TRACY:

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Thank you. Senator Aquino, you have worked very hard. We've heard this bill for several years in Judiciary. It started out with quite a few opponents, hundreds perhaps, and you've whittled that down. But the Amendment No. 3 was just filed. And could you go through what that Amendment No. 3 does because we did not hear that in Committee.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Aquino.

SENATOR AQUINO:

Thank you for that question. So, the Senate Floor Amendment is a page line amendment that makes a technical change to the definitions of display price and the retail merchants' establishment to ensure clarity and consistency with the bill's provision. It was a change that IRMA and the IHLA requested that we were more than willing to add on.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you. And is there anything in there about the clear and conspicuous, conspicuous language that we talked about a lot in Committee yesterday?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Aquino.

SENATOR AQUINO:

That -- that portion is already in the bill, not in the amendment.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

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And did -- did I think there was a few remaining opponents one way Door Dash, maybe StubHub has that -- has your amendment changed any of the proponents or any of the opponents or any of that remain neutral?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Aquino.

SENATOR AQUINO:

I haven't reviewed the proponents and opponents today, but I do not believe it changed the opponents from yesterday, from Committee. As I said, this was requested from IRMA and IHLA, and so they continue to be in support of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you. And to the bill, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

To the bill.

SENATOR TRACY:

Certainly, we have heard this bill in Judiciary Committee for a number of years, and kudos to the sponsor. He's really worked it and tried to make a good consumer bill, good to have a transparent amount -- awareness of fees and taxes being paid by consumers when they buy certain products. And I commend him for all the work and I encourage and Aye vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Further discussion, Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

Thank you, Mr. President. A question of the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

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Indicates he'll yield.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

Senator Aquino, I appreciate your -- your hard work on this. Quick question, it relates to this bill, but I see it often, and it always kind of strikes my curiosity. Some of the most pervasive taxes and fees that we see as consumers are those levied by government. And so why -- why is government once again exempted from this bill and you know, the fees and levies that they charge consumers?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Aquino.

SENATOR AQUINO:

So, this bill doesn't -- address taxes and so forth. It does address the -- the fees that are tacked on in -- in folks' bills. And again, and unfortunately throughout our economy in a number of different industries. And so, I think that most consumers would understand that there are some taxes that are going to be paid when they either purchase an item or get a service rendered, but those are explained and those are understood of -- like it goes, you know, the sales tax or, you know, goes to the county, to the State or federal government and so forth. But some of these hidden fees are quite literally just tacked on with no explanation at the end of -- of -- of the purchase. And people are just burdened with having to pay for an amount on something that they were not anticipating that they were going to have to pay. And so, this -- this cost American families, I think it was somewhere on average \$3,000 a year. Again, it's pervasive throughout a number of different industries, unfortunately, and we're just trying to see more transparency.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

I -- I know largely because of your -- your hard work on this bill, a lot of groups have -- have that were initially opposed, have gone neutral or -- or maybe even are proponents. I'm not certain, because I know you have worked hard on this. It exempts a large number of groups, large number of organizations. So, I guess seeing all of the people that are exempted from this, who -- who, you know, if it goes into law, who do you see that it applies to?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Aquino.

SENATOR AQUINO:

So, what we did was -- we wanted -- we didn't want to make this bill overly burdensome. And so, if -- if there is an industry that already has to -- that has over -- regulations that they have to adhere to, either on the federal level, the State level, for instance, as aviation. We didn't feel that it was necessary to add on and make things even more difficult for businesses to -- to operate. That wasn't the intention of this bill. The intention was to make sure we were protecting consumers, getting more clarity in terms of what people are preparing for -- and in a way where -- again, we took a long time to ensure that we were balancing -- protecting consumers and -- and getting clarity, but also making sure that we weren't being overly burdensome to businesses.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

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No, thank you. I appreciate the sponsor's work on this. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Aquino, to close.

SENATOR AQUINO:

Thank you, Mr. President. As it was noted in this discussion, this has been a bill that we've worked on for the last two Sessions. It came over from the House, and it was one of those things that we did have many, many opponents when I first took this to Judiciary. And we've whittled that down, I -- I think, again, finding a balance of making sure that we're protecting consumers and their and their money in their pockets, their hard-earned money and not being overly burdensome to -- to businesses. And so, we took our time to be meticulous and understanding that there is -- that good legislation is a balancing act, and that's what we've done here. So, I want to take just a quick time to thank this staff member to my left and Ted Teros who just led us up on this bill in such a great way. I mean, he really kudos to Ted. I hope to be standing next to him when this hopefully gets signed into law. He should be proud of the work he's done there. But to all the proponents that ESP and all those that have -- have -- have helped with this bill in some sort of way, I want to thank them and I want to thank all the -- the businesses and industries that initially had paused with this bill but came to the table and diligently worked together with us to make sure that we have a good final product here. And I think that's what we have with this -- this bill and these amendments. So, thank you, and I -- and I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

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So, the question is Senate Bill 1486 pass. All those in favor of vote, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there 51 -- 53 voting Yea, 1 voting Nay, none voting Present. And Senate Bill 1486, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. On page 9 in the middle of the page we have Senate Bill 1911. We have a letter on file that changes -- that allows President Harmon to present Senate Bill 1911 on the Order of 3rd Reading on the behalf of Senator Mattie Hunter. President Harmon seeks leave the Body, to return Senate Bill 9 -- 1911 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is leave is granted. Now in the Order of 2nd Reading in Senate Bill 1911. Mr. Secretary, any Floor amendment approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 3, offered by Senator Hunter.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

President Harmon, on the amendment.

SENATOR HARMON:

Thank you, Mr. President. I move to adopt the amendment.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

3rd Reading. Now on 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 1911. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

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SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1911, an Act concerning revenue. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

President Harmon, to explain the bill.

SENATOR HARMON:

Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I'm honored to be presenting this bill on behalf of Senator Mattie Hunter and wishing her well in her recovery. Senate Bill 1911 extends and refines the Affordable Housing Special Assessment Program in the Property Tax Code. It is -- was supported unanimously in the Senate Executive Committee. It is roundly supported by stakeholders. I am not aware of any opposition, and I would hazard to try to answer any of your questions if you have them, though I hope you do not. I ask for your Aye votes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Seeing no discussion, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1911 pass. All those in favor vote, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 54 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And Senate Bill 1911, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. We're going to go to the top of page 10 we're going to go to Senate Bill 2253, Senator Villivalam. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. Senator Villivalam seeks leave of the Body, to return Senate Bill 2253 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. And now on the Order of 2nd Reading of Senate Bill 2253. Mr. Secretary, any Floor amendment approved for consideration.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

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Floor Amendment No. 3, offered by Senator Villivalam.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Villivalam, to explain your amendment.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to adopt the amendment and explain it on 3rd Reading.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

3rd Reading. Now on 3rd Reading, is Senate Bill 2253. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2253, an Act concerning local government. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Villivalam, to explain your bill.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 2253 with Floor Amendment -- Senate Floor Amendment 3 is legislation that is an initiative of the Illinois Department of Transportation. It really speaks to the challenges that we all have experienced and heard, which is the need for IDOT to get projects out the door faster. It has four main provisions. One, it updates notice to property owners to align with federal regulations and provides more ways to contact them. Second, it clarifies the language and statute that a case

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can be brought to eminent domain if the property owner cannot provide documents needed to show clear title. Third, it adjusts the required disclosures required by property owners. This change will allow for publicly available information on ownership to satisfy that requirement. Expand who may sign the disclosure and remove secondary and tertiary levels of disclosure for IDOT highway projects. Lastly, and this is the biggest change in the amendment, this bill provides a timeline for IDOT cases going before the ICC, when bringing in an action to acquire property needed for highway projects owned by utilities and railroads, the ICC will essentially have a fast-track process of six months to come to a decision, with an allowance for a three-month extension. This has been heavily negotiated. Know of no opposition. Want to thank all the stakeholders. Also want to thank our -- our staff member, Montana, for all of her hard work on this. Happy to answer any questions, would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion, Senator Tracy?

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you, Mr. President. Questions of the sponsor, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Indicate he'll yield.

SENATOR TRACY:

Senator Villivalam, if you will, I'd like to kind of go over the questions that I asked yesterday in Committee. Certainly, for the record. Was this bill brought because you felt like the ICC process was too slow and did not enable IDOT to meet a timely work frame to begin construction?

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Senator Villivalam.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

This -- this process has been brought forward by this -- this legislation was brought forward by IDOT as they identified land acquisition as a challenge to get projects done faster. The average project timeline I think, was approximately 418 days, which is well over a year. And so, this is an attempt, to meet where the opponents -- the position of the opponents initially their position was to keep the ICC process instead of completely removing it, which is what the underlying bill did. So, we're keeping the ICC process and we're creating a fast track, which is six months and an extension of three months. And then obviously they have to make a decision before it moves forward.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you for that. And we didn't discuss this much in Committee, but I've become aware that IDOT has become short staffed, in some ways. I just learned recently that my District Engineer had retired in December and has not been replaced. Do you think that IDOT has sufficient staffing at this point in time to fulfill those requirements?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Villivalam.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

So, I think staffing at IDOT and every State agency is a conversation we're going to continue to have. I would say that this process and this legislation has identified a specific problem and is presenting a specific solution, which is the challenge of

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land acquisition. And so having this process continue with the ICC is what the railroads, utilities, and others had wanted. We agreed to that with them. We worked with the ICC to determine the process that works for them. And now we not only have a fast-track process, but we also have certainty over the land acquisition process. So, I believe that this takes a big step forward to ensuring that IDOT is able to work with those stakeholders to acquire land and get projects out faster.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

If IDOT finds that this solution doesn't actually become the solution. Do you think that we'll go back to the prior procedure and process?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Villivalam.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

I -- I believe there -- IDOT, in my time, as Chair, Transportation over the last five years. This is -- their legislative agenda. This year has been very focused on getting projects out the door. So, I believe that this will help in doing so. So, obviously, we're not going out of business here. So, if we need to come back and have continuing conversations, we'll do that.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

And finally, we discussed how public interest is defined and what criteria are used to help in that definition. Could we go back over that and give us the definition of what public interest

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is, and what criteria are going to be looked at?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Villivalam.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you for that question. So, the interested party in the ICC provision would be IDOT, the railroad, or utility, or the ICC themselves. Any of those entities would have the ability to request a three-month extension for good cause.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you. I appreciate the answers to my questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Villivalam to close.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you. I want to thank Montana on staff, again, for all of her hard work. I would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

So, the question is shall Senate Bill 2253 pass. All those in favor vote, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And Senate Bill 2253, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Murphy, on Senate Bill 2426 at the top of page 11. Senator Murphy seeks leave of the Body, to return Senate Bill 2426 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 2426, which is --. Mr. Secretary, any Floor amendments approved for consideration.

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SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Murphy.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Murphy, on your amendment.

SENATOR MURPHY:

I'd like to adopt and explain on 3rd, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Mr. Secretary, any further Floor amendment approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

3rd Reading. Now on 3rd Reading, we have Senate Bill 2426. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2426, an Act concerning regulation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Murphy, to explain your bill.

SENATOR MURPHY:

Well, thank you, Mr. President. As amended, and the amendments remove all of the opposition to this bill. But this would simply -- create the automatic traffic control system to work speed safety camera zones. And -- and that's all that it will do. It maintains the same definitions. It removes language, providing the information collected on the program must be destroyed, not less than two years. And -- and it basically has given a wonderful tool for us to prevent crime in a number of

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areas. And we just ask for this to continue.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Seeing no discussion. The question is, shall Senate Bill 2426 pass. Those in favor of vote, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. Senate Bill 2426, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared.. We've -- we've already voted on this, but do you want to just explain what the right bill was?

SENATOR MURPHY:

Mr. President, so Senate Bill 2426 is not a Transportation title. Although, its tree transportation. And what this bill actually does is it allows for transporting -- out of our forestry divisions where people cut down trees, and it just makes them have to define what they are transporting and to make sure that it was legally tendered.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Thank you. We're going to go to Resolutions, on page 20. We have Senate Resolution 25, Senator Anderson. Mr. Secretary, please read the resolution. Senate Resolution 25.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Resolution 25, offered by Senator Anderson.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. I apologize it wasn't popping up on here and I can't keep numbers straight, so thank you. Senate Resolution 25 just brings focus on PWS or -- or Prader-Willi

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Syndrome. This is an issue that came to me from my district. It's -- it's a -- it's an issue that is kind of growing nationwide and we just want to bring some awareness to it. This is a disability that that causes a multitude of -- of issues, especially with young children. One of the biggest things that it does is -- a lot of these -- a lot of these folks that have this disability, they are unable to be satiated, meaning they continue to eat, and they never feel full. And you can imagine as a -- as a little child this is detrimental. And it's -- it's a hard thing to go through, and we just want to make sure that we're bringing more light to it with this resolution. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Seeing no discussion. The question is, shall Senate Resolution (25) pass. All those in favor vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. Towards the bottom of the page we have Senate Resolution 100, Senator Fine. Mr. Secretary, please read the resolution.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Resolution 100, offered by Senator Fine.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Fine, on your resolution.

SENATOR FINE:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Resolution 100 declares the week of May 4th through the 10th as "Compost Awareness Week" in the State of Illinois. It recognizes and promotes the importance of composting and the use of composting in growing healthier food and supporting healthier soils and ultimately creating a more just and sustainable world. If you have not tried to compost yet, I would recommend you do and you will see how much garbage you

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actually save from your home and how much good you do for your garden.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Resolution 105, offered by Senator Fine.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Fine, on your resolution.

SENATOR FINE:

Thank you. Senate Resolution 105 also declares May 4th through 10th as Tardive Dyskinesia Awareness Week in the State of Illinois. TD is a condition that is marked by uncontrollable, abnormal, and repetitive movements of the face, torso, limbs, or extremities. About 60 percent of the estimated 800,000 U.S. adults living percent with TD remain undiagnosed, and even mild TD symptoms can be stigmatizing and impair physical, social, and emotional well-being. So let us declare this as an education for us all to learn more about our neighbors and show compassion.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Seeing no discussion. The question is, shall Senate Resolution 105 pass. All those in favor will say Aye. Those opposed will say, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. We'll go down to Senate Resolution 241, Senator Sally Turner. Mr. Secretary, please read the resolution.

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Senate Resolution 241, offered by Senator Sally Turner.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Turner, on your resolution.

SENATOR S. TURNER:

Thank you, Mr. -- Thank you, Mr. President. Today we bring forward a resolution on ALS, and most of us are familiar with what ALS is, in that many people that you know have ALS or have passed from ALS. ALS has no cure. And every 90 minutes someone is diagnosed with ALS, and with ALS, someone passes away from on the average of that 90 -- every 90 minutes. And patients diagnosed with ALS only survive 2 to 5 years from the time of diagnosis. So today, we'd like to recognize that and our thoughts and prayers go out to those people that are suffering from this ailment. Thank you, sir.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Seeing no discussion. The question is, shall Senate Resolution 241 pass. All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, will say Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. Senate Resolution 248, Senator Villa. Mr. Secretary, please read the resolution.

Senate Resolution 248, offered by Senator Villa.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Villa, on your resolution.

SENATOR VILLA:

Thank you, Mr. President. On the 50th -- 15th anniversary of Latino Unity Day. This year's theme is the infamous Quinceañera. The Quinceañera is a cherished milestone in Latin American culture that is celebrated when a young woman turns 15 years old. The

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Quinceañera celebration blends Spanish culture -- culture with indigenous traditions, incorporating influences from both Aztec and Mayan civilizations. When these indigenous tribes traditionally taught young women who turned 15, the skills needed to take on their roles in society and to prepare them for adulthood. Today, the Quinceañera celebration sees the young women wearing lavish ball gowns that can take up to seven months to make. The celebration has family members and godparents in attendance, followed by a reception with the young woman getting a coronation with a crown, and a father-daughter waltz, and the waltz of honor from her court of honor. The Quinceañera has provided new generations with the ability to recall their cultural heritage, preserve traditions, and strengthen the bonds between family and community and Latin American culture. So, on this day, May 8th, this resolution declares today as Quinceañera Day in the State of Illinois. It's almost like a holy occasion as well, now that we have our new Pope as Quinceañera's typically start off at a mass in a church. So, the new Pope from the United States, from Chicago, it's almost like an additional celebration that we have going on. I hope to see all of you tonight at the Latino Unity Day reception. Thank you so much.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

SENATOR FOWLER:

Thank you, Mr. President. This is a -- a local school district cleanup resolution. No -- no opposition, passed Committee 14-0. Just ask for its adoption, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Seeing no discussion. Oh -- pursuant to the School Code, a roll call vote will be required. The question is, shall Joint -- Senate Joint Resolution 33 pass. All those in favor vote, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And Senate Joint Resolution 33, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared adopted. Mr. Secretary, Resolutions.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Joint Resolution 37{sic} (38), offered by Senator Ellman.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Mr. Secretary, read the resolution.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Joint Resolution 37 {sic} (38), Resolved by the Senate of the 104th General Assembly of the State of Illinois. The House of Representatives, concurring herein that when the Senate adjourns on Thursday, May 8th, 2025, it stands adjourned until Tuesday, May 13th, 2025, until the call of the President and when the House of Representatives adjourns on Friday, May 9th, 2025. It stands adjourned until Tuesday, May 13th, 2025, or until the call

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of the Speaker.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. We will now proceed to the Order of the Consent Calendar celebrations of life resolutions. Mr. Secretary Resolutions.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Resolution 304, offered by Senator Cunningham and all Members this is a celebration of life resolution, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Resolutions Consent Calendar. We will now proceed to the Order of the Consent Calendar, celebration of life resolutions. With leave of the Body, all those resolutions read in today will be added to the Consent Calendar. Mr. Secretary, have there been any objections filed to the resolutions on the consent Calendar.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:
