12. Senator Sommer.

13. SENATOR SOMMER:

14. Mr. President and members, Amendment No. 1 as I have it is the

15. one that restricts the application of this bill to enlisted recruits

16. in the National Guard. I would ask for favorable consideration of

17. this. This is the one we put on the Senate version of the bill.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Wooten.

20. SENATOR WOOTEN:

21. Yes. We have agreement all the way up and down the line on this

1. SENATOR WOOTEN:

2. We have a division on this one, Mr. President. The division  
3. by the way runs right through the middle of the sponsor of this  
4. bill because as the members who recall that bill will perhaps...

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Just...just one minute, Senator. Just a moment, please. Will  
7. all persons not entitled to the Floor, please leave the Floor.  
8. Will all persons not entitled to the Floor, please leave the Floor.  
9. Senator Wooten.

10. SENATOR WOOTEN:

11. We went through this in arguing Senate Bill 24. I objected  
12. to the inclusion of private colleges. The House sponsor, however,  
13. endorses the idea of the addition of private colleges. It seems  
14. to me to make the bill a little too expensive. I am torn between  
15. my professional courtesy, I believe, to the House sponsor to put  
16. the bill in the shape he wants it, but at the same time, I do think  
17. that it makes the price tag on this just a little bit too high. I  
18. am willing to abide by the wishes of the Body regarding this, and I  
19. think we're going to have a sufficient division that we're going to have

23. SENATOR GLASS:

24. Question of the sponsor of the amendment. Senator Sommer,  
25. does this...did you say this would take private colleges out so that  
26. the scholarships would not be available to National Guardsmen attending  
27. private colleges?

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Sommer.

30. SENATOR SOMMER:

31. Yes, Senator Glass, that's exactly what it does. That correlates  
32. with the policy of this Body on Senate Bill 24.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Glass.

2. SENATOR GLASS:

3. Well...thank you, Mr. President. Well, I...I would oppose this  
4. amendment. It seems to me that assuming the...the amount of  
5. the scholarship to the private colleges would not...exceed that  
6. that's available to the public colleges, that the price tag  
7. shouldn't go up markedly, and if the point of the bill is to encourage  
8. persons to serve in the National Guard whether they go to a  
9. private college or a public college, I don't think should matter,

1. now moves to Table Senate Bills 812, 1456, 1457 and 1476. All  
2. in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The bills are Tabled. Senator  
3. Johns.

4. SENATOR JOHNS:

5. Thank you, Mr. President. I have a motion filed with the  
6. Secretary of the Senate. It reads pursuant to...Senate Temporary  
7. Rule No. 11. I move to take Senate Bill 579 from the Table and  
8. place it on the order...on the Calendar on the order of 2nd reading.  
9. Now, I'd like to explain this a little bit. Senator Harris is  
10. aware of this, the leadership on the other side of the aisle. This  
11. bill was defeated in Executive Committee...

12. PRESIDENT:

13. ...Just...just one moment. Is your motion here? Yes, go  
14. right ahead. The motion..

15. SENATOR JOHNS:

16. Thank you, Mr. President. I...I wish to do this for the  
17. simple reason, this particular bill is concerned with nursing  
18. homes and it enables the State of Illinois to receive or be the  
19. recipient of many millions of dollars in Federal funding, and that  
20. will be in jeopardy if we let this particular bill die due to the  
21. United States Supreme Court ruling on the citizenship requirement  
22. in the act as it stands. And, so I ask leave of this Body to bring  
23. this back and place it on the Calendar on 2nd reading, and then  
24. we'll amend it to make it acceptable to the Body.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Johns moves to take Senate Bill 579 from the Table and  
27. place it on the order of 2nd reading. All in favor of that motion  
28. will vote Aye. Senator Graham.

29. SENATOR GRAHAM:

30. Was this a motion or request reduced to writing or when do we  
31. get it? I...

32. PRESIDENT:

33. It has been reduced to writing. It is in the Secretary's office.

1. They're bringing it out.

2. SENATOR GRAHAM:

3. And the bill number. I...

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senate Bill 579. It's the one he says he discussed with

6. Senator Harris. I thought there was no controversy about it.

7. ... (Machine cut-off) ... further discussion? Senator Daley. Senator

8. Buzbee. Is there further discussion? The question is shall... Senator

9. Johns has moved to take Senate Bill 579 from the Table to place it

10. on the order of 2nd reading. All in favor will say Aye. Senator

11. Graham.

12. SENATOR GRAHAM:

13. Mr. President, this bill was defeated in committee, was it not?

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Yes. He said that in his explanation, Senator. That the bill...

16. SENATOR GRAHAM:

17. Yeah, but I couldn't hear him over here. I'm a little far away.

18. Now...

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Well, Senator, would you make the explanation again. I... there may

21. be others who did not hear it.

22. SENATOR JOHNS:

23. Senator Graham, appreciate your consciousness about this

24. particular bill. As you remember, there was a series of bills that

25. I handle like twenty-seven or twenty-nine yesterday in Executive,

26. and we killed those bills due to the United States Supreme Court

27. requirement obliterating the citizenship requirement within those

28. special professions that the Department of Registration and Education

29. speak on. Now, Senator Harris coming on the Floor, he's been...

30. he's cognizant of this desire by the Department. This particular

31. bill enables us to be the recipient of the State of Illinois many,

32. many dollars. It's a nursing home requirement, and all we want to

33. do is bring it back to 2nd, hold it, work it up to its proper status

1. and then if you so desire, we'll move it. But the Department's  
2. been very serious trouble on this particular bill.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Harris.

5. SENATOR HARRIS:

6. Well, I indicated to the representative of the Department that  
7. this bill should be separated from the committee report, and then  
8. it would give us an opportunity to work it out. Now, I just made the  
9. assumption that that was done. I would agree that there is a serious  
10. problem as relates to this one specific licensing requirement, and  
11. that in the bill relating to the licensure of nursing home operators  
12. ought to be treated separately. We...we did not get to the specific  
13. points involved in this, but I...I don't what...you see, my thought  
14. was that this bill would not be reported, be...remain in committee  
15. and we'd take it up in committee. That's really the way to cure  
16. the problem, it seems to me, procedurally.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Well, the problem is that the bill did not remain in the  
19. committee. The bill is on the Table. He's making a motion to  
20. take it from the Table to bring it to the order of 2nd reading  
21. with the understanding that it would stay there...

22. SENATOR HARRIS:

23. Well, I would suggest that you...that you...

24. PRESIDENT:

25. ...with the understanding that it would stay there until such  
26. time as that...agreement had been made or worked out.

27. SENATOR HARRIS:

28. Well, I'm saying that it ought to go back to the committee and  
29. not be worked on here. This does involve some rather significant  
30. dialogue, and the place to do that is in the committee, it seems to me.  
31. Can't we have a motion to recommit this bill?

32. PRESIDENT:

33. The bill...the bill is on the Table. It would have first to, if

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1. addition on this specific act, there are some other serious  
2. problems. We didn't discuss it at all. It seems to me, that  
3. it ought to be discussed in committee and it's that simple, as  
4. far as I'm concerned.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Johns.

7. SENATOR JOHNS:

8. Okay. You know. I didn't anticipate any real hubbub over  
9. this. I want to put it where it should belong and where it can  
10. get the best job done. Okay. Mr. President...

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Please. Attention, please. Senator Johns.

13. SENATOR JOHNS:

14. I didn't have the...the slightest dream that it would cause this  
15. great consternation, but I'll tell you what I'll do. I've always  
16. been very flexible. I'll move it back to committee, as Chairman  
17. of the Executive Committee. I move now from the Floor that I  
18. Table this motion and I withdraw it, and I wish for it to be re-  
19. referred back to committee where we can work on it, no big sweat,  
20. just thought I'd move it as expeditiously I...as I could. Thank you,  
21. very much.

23. Senator Johns has now withdrawn the motion and now moves to

27. SENATOR MOHR:

28. Senator Johns, just talking about that one bill out of that big

32. ... (Machine cut-off) ... Daley.

33. SENATOR DALEY:

1. Mr. President and fellow Senators, I ask leave to re-refer  
2. House Bill 131 which is in Senate Judiciary to Local Government  
3. cause there's an identical Senate Bill 278 which is in...presently  
4. in Local Government. Is there leave?

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Oh, that has already been accomplished.

7. SENATOR DALEY:

8. Okay. Also, Mr. President, I'd like to waive the six day notice  
9. for the...following bills in the Senate Judiciary Committee and...

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Daley, they have already...the...the...it has been  
12. already done waived for the period up to the 2nd of May.

13. SENATOR DALEY:

14. Okay. Thank you.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. ...six day notice is waived on all bills up to the 2nd of  
17. May, that is Senate Bills. ...(Machine cut-off)...Buzbee.

18. SENATOR BUZBEE:

19. Yes, Mr. President. A point of personal privilege. In the  
20. balcony, to my right rear, there is some people I would like to  
21. introduce to the Chamber. Professor Joseph Coughlin of the SIU  
22. Criminal Justice Department and eight of his graduate students.  
23. Professor Coughlin, by the way, is a former assistant director of  
24. the Department of Corrections. I'd like to have them stand and...

25. PRESIDENT:

26. In the South Gallery.

27. SENATOR BUZBEE:

28. Thank you.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senate Bills on 3rd reading. We'll start where we stopped  
31. yesterday. First bill is Senate Bill 302, Senator Buzbee. Senate  
32. Bill 317, Senator Course. Read the bill.

33. SECRETARY:

1. Senate Bill 317.

2. (Secretary reads title of bill)

3. 3rd reading of the bill.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator Course.

6. SENATOR COURSE:

7. Thank you, Mr. ...thank you, Mr. President and members of the  
8. Senate. This bill amends the Illinois Aeronautics Act to increase  
9. various penalties under the Act from Class B and Class C misdemeanors  
10. and petty offenses to a Class A misdemeanor. Now, the reason for  
11. this is, Ladies and Gentlemen, is various penalties right now are  
12. petty offenses and they want to increase them to a Class A misdemeanor  
13. with a...a one year jail sentence and/or a fine of a thousand dollars.  
14. Now, the present fine is twenty-five dollars, it's like I say a petty  
15. offense. This if for the failure to report an accident. Now, this  
16. could be detrimental, Ladies and Gentlemen, if the area where a pilot  
17. has wing damage to his plane and he doesn't report it, and he continues  
18. to operate the aircraft without having the aircraft reinspected. This  
19. isn't that...it isn't the intention to put these people in jail for a  
20. year or to fine them a thousand dollars, but with this hanging over  
21. their head, they'll think twice without reporting this accident to  
22. the Illinois Aeronautics Board. And it...raised the penalty for  
23. operating an aircraft while its registration or nonresidents operating  
24. privilege has been...revoked or suspended. It raises this from a Class  
25. B misdeminer...misdemeanor up...which is up to six months in jail and  
26. a fine up to five hundred dollars. The...another reason for this is,  
27. Ladies and Gentlemen, is the fact that many of these corporations  
28. refuse to or they just don't register their aircraft with the Bureau  
29. of...the Illinois Aeronautics Board, and thus avoiding the payment of  
30. personal property tax. This is an administration bill. It's requested  
31. by the Bureau of Aeronautics, and would...appreciate a favorable roll  
32. call.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Any further discussion? Senator Nimrod.

2. SENATOR NIMROD:

3. Mr. President, I'd like to know if the sponsor would yield?

4. PRESIDENT:

5. He indicates he will. Senator Course.

6. SENATOR NIMROD:

7. This...this is the matter of...of information. Is...is...I don't  
8. oppose this particular bill, but on our...Advisory Board, was...was  
9. this one ever discussed or does this have the approval of the Board  
10. or the group or is this something independent of that or...Senator  
11. Course?

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Course.

14. SENATOR COURSE:

15. I'm sorry, ...Senator Nimrod. I didn't hear you.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. The question was is this a part of the Advisory Board recommenda-  
18. tion or was it ever heard there. That is his question.

19. SENATOR COURSE:

20. Yes.

21. SENATOR NIMROD:

22. Well, I'm a member of that board and I don't remember having him  
23. being approached to even be a cosponsor. And number one, I wouldn't  
24. mind doing that, but I don't even remember having this discussed at  
25. the...at any of the meetings, but I just think that we have these kind  
26. of boards and groups. I think we ought to at least have an opportunity  
27. to discuss these things so we can take some cooperative action on  
28. them.

29. SENATOR COURSE:

30. Well, it was.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Any further discussion? Senator Course may close the debate.

33. SENATOR COURSE:

1. Well, this was discussed at the last board meeting, and  
2. unfortunately, we were in Session then and we...none of the members  
3. didn't not attend. I didn't call the Advisory Committee to attend  
4. the board meeting because we were in Session at that time, and I  
5. imagine that it was discussed then and we would have heard the  
6. discussion had we been there.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Any further discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill 317  
9. pass. All in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The  
10. voting is open. Take the record. On this question, the Ayes are  
11. 55, the Nays are none. Senate Bill 317 having received a constitutional  
12. majority is declared passed. The Chair...recognizes Senator Glass.

13. SENATOR GLASS:

14. Thank you, Mr. President and Senators. On a matter of personal  
15. privilege, seated in the President's Gallery are a group of students,  
16. eighth grade students from Washburn School in Winnetka together with  
17. Mrs. Joan Ellisberg and other members of the facility, and I would  
18. ask if they would stand at this time and be recognized by the Senate.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senate Bill 318, Senator Bruce. Read the bill.

21. SECRETARY:

22. Senate Bill 318.

23. (Secretary reads title of bill)

24. 3rd reading of the bill.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Bruce.

27. SENATOR BRUCE:

28. As the manuals for assessing have become more expensive, the  
29. department has found it necessary to institute a charge for those so  
30. that they are properly used by those who request the instruction  
31. manuals and appraisal manuals, and this would allow them to charge those  
32. who request them. Senator Berning and I and the committee agreed that  
33. the money should go into General Revenue as opposed to any special

1. trust fund and that amendment has been adopted. This is similar  
2. to the provision we already have with Business and Economic  
3. Development on their surveys that they charge for them.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Any further discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill 318  
6. pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay.  
7. The voting is open. Have all voted who wished? Take the record.  
8. On this question, the Ayes are 47, the Nays are 3. Senate Bill 318  
9. having received a constitutional majority is declared passed. Senate  
10. Bill 319, Senator Lane. Read the bill.

11. SECRETARY:

12. Senate Bill 319.

13. (Secretary reads title of bill)

14. 3rd reading of the bill.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Lane.

17. SENATOR LANE:

18. Mr. President, members of the Senate, Senate Bill 319 simply  
19. increases the minimum limits of the insurance coverage of an aircraft  
20. owner from five thousand to twenty-five thousand. The original limits  
21. were established in 1951 and are inadequate. There's no opposition to  
22. this bill. I pray for a favorable roll call.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Don Moore.

25. SENATOR MOORE:

26. Will the sponsor yield for a question, Mr. President?

27. PRESIDENT:

28. He indicates he'll yield.

29. SENATOR MOORE:

30. What are the present limits now?

31. SENATOR LANE:

32. Five thousand, increased to twenty-five thousand.

33. SENATOR MOORE:

1. Why are the present limits inadequate?

2. SENATOR LANE:

3. Well, they were established in 1951 and the economy today and

4. plus hospital costs and other soaring costs just have proven the cost

5. inadequate.

6. SENATOR MOORE:

7. You mean the cost of living and the inflation and so forth,

8. Senator?

9. SENATOR LANE:

10. Yes, Senator.

11. SENATOR MOORE:

12. All right. Thank you.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Graham.

15. SENATOR GRAHAM:

16. Mr. President, will the Senator yield to a question?

17. SENATOR LANE:

18. Part-time.

19. SENATOR GRAHAM:

20. Have you checked with our airplane lobby in the Senate, Senators

21. Regner and Bruce?

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Lane.

24. SENATOR LANE:

25. No, I haven't, Senator.

26. SENATOR GRAHAM:

27. You might be in a little trouble. Thank you.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Any further discussion on Senator Lane's first bill? Any

30. further discussion? Senator Lane may close the debate. Well,

31. Senator Course is recognized.

32. SENATOR COURSE:

33. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate, this is a...a good

1. bill. As Senator Lane has said, these standards were set back  
2. in 1951, I believe, and today you can...you can go out with your fists,  
3. Ladies and Gentlemen, and hit a plane and cause ten thousand dollars  
4. worth of damage. That's how delicate these...these wings are and  
5. some of the parts of the plane are. Now, if a plane is damaged,  
6. what it means that they'll have to take the fabric off the plane,  
7. the...the plating off the plane, go in and see if there's any wind  
8. damage...or any wing damage, structural damage and where...years ago  
9. in 1951 or if you could do that for a couple of thousand dollars,  
10. I know from my own experience one plane on...on the...on the field  
11. it had a slight wing damage and the...the cost was ten thousand dollars.  
12. This isn't excessive not in today when the planes are...are running  
13. from twenty-five to a million and a half dollars. It's a...it's a  
14. good bill, and I would vote for it. Thank you.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Harris.

17. SENATOR HARRIS:

18. Will the Senator yield to a question?

19. PRESIDENT:

20. He indicates he will.

21. SENATOR HARRIS:

22. Does this bill have a preamble?

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Lane.

25. SENATOR LANE:

26. I haven't seen any.

27. SENATOR HARRIS:

28. Thank you. That answers my question.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Any further discussion? Question is shall Senate Bill 319  
31. pass. All in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The  
32. voting...(Machine cut-off)... Have all voted who wish? Take the record.  
33. On this question, the Ayes are 54, the Nays are none. Senate Bill 319

1. having received a constitutional majority is declared passed.  
2. Congratulations on your first bill. Senate Bill 322, Senator  
3. Hickey. Senate Bill 329, Senator Knuppel.

4. SECRETARY:

5. Senate Bill 329.

6. (Secretary reads title of bill)

7. 3rd reading of the bill.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Knuppel.

10. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

11. This is a very simple bill. It allows...it raises from twenty  
12. to thirty days, the time allowed to appeal to the Tax Review...  
13. Board of Review.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Any further discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill 329  
16. pass. All in favor will...vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The  
17. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this  
18. question, the Ayes are 52, the Nays are 3. Senate Bill 329 having  
19. received a constitutional majority is declared passed. Senate Bill  
20. 338, Senator Hickey.

21. SECRETARY:

22. Senate Bill 338.

23. (Secretary reads title of bill)

24. 3rd reading of the bill.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Hickey.

27. SENATOR HICKEY:

28. Mr. President, this amends several acts simply allowing for the  
29. use of certified mail instead of registered mail so that it will save  
30. the State money. This came out of committee with a unanimous Do Pass.  
31. There's no opposition, and I ask for a favorable roll call.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Any further discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill 338

1. pass. All in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The  
2. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On  
3. this question, the Ayes are 51, the Nays none...Senator Course.

4. SENATOR COURSE:

5. I don't know. Mr. President, somebody...turned my key here,  
6. and I didn't vote. I did punch my button so I'd like to be recorded  
7. as voting Aye.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. On this question, the Ayes are 51, the Nays are none. Senate  
10. Bill 338 having received the constitutional majority is declared  
11. passed. Let the record show that Senators Course and Savickas desired  
12. to vote Aye on this bill but did not have that opportunity. Senate  
13. Bill 339, Senator Kenneth Hall.

14. SECRETARY:

15. Senate Bill 339.

16. (Secretary reads title of bill)

17. 3rd reading of the bill.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Hall. Kenneth Hall.

20. SENATOR HALL:

21. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. Senate Bill  
22. 339 amends the Illinois Vehicle Code, and it imposes a ten dollar filing  
23. fee for each annual report filed with the Illinois Commerce Commission  
24. after the time prescribed by the Commission. Now, the purpose of this  
25. bill is under the authority there are many motor carriers to file  
26. annual reports on or before May 15th of the year following the annual  
27. report. Frequently, however, certain motor carriers do not file their  
28. annual reports on or before the date required resulting in numerous  
29. and costly warning notices. So, the reason that the Commission...  
30. Illinois Commission asked this to be introduced is they believe that  
31. the carrier should bear part of the cost, and the Commission anticipates  
32. that this fee will make them file at a time prior to the deadline.  
33. Prior to the year of 1974, the Commission had been spending an

1. estimated thirteen thousand dollars annually trying to inforce  
2. this. Now, if this is only fifty percent successful, it will  
3. mean a saving of over nine thousand dollars to the Commission.  
4. This is an administration bill. The Illinois Commerce Commission  
5. supports this bill, and I'll ask your most favorable support.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Any further discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill 339  
8. pass. All in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The  
9. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this  
10. question, the Ayes are 49, the Nays are none. Senate Bill 339  
11. having received a constitutional majority is declared passed. Senate  
12. Bill 340, Senator Kenneth Hall.

13. SECRETARY:

14. Senate Bill 340.

15. (Secretary reads title of bill)

16. 3rd reading of the bill.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Kenneth Hall.

19. SENATOR HALL:

20. Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 340 amends the Motor  
21. Vehicle Code. It provides that the indemnity bonds or insurance  
22. policies filed with the Illinois Commerce Commission by motor carriers  
23. the property be a continuous nature and effective until cancelled.  
24. Now, the reason for proposing this bill is that except for authorized  
25. interstate carriers and those granted exemptions pursuant to Section  
26. 18-701 B - Motor carriers of property have the responsibility to have  
27. on file, with the Commission, and in effect good and sufficient  
28. indemnity bonds or insurance policies in the amount to the extent  
29. providing in this Section. Such bonds or policies remain effective  
30. until the date prescribed by the motor carrier. It is not uncommon  
31. that such policies are issued for a period of one to three months. When  
32. the record of the Commission indicates that any motor carrier certifi...  
33. of insurance is about to expire, the motor carrier is notified, and

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1. the records they have on file with the Commission by specific date,  
2. evidence signed by the insurance or bonding company. The motor  
3. carrier is also warned in this notice that failure to do so will  
4. result in suspension of operating authority. Now, up until this  
5. time it has been the...burden of the insuring that the motor carriers  
6. have coverage for the protection of the public in place before the  
7. Commission. This is supported by the Illinois Commerce Commission,  
8. and I would ask your most favorable support.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Any further discussion on this bill? The question is shall  
11. Senate Bill 340 pass. All in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will  
12. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the  
13. record. On this question, the Ayes are 51, the Nays are none.  
14. Senate Bill 340 having received a constitutional majority is declared  
15. passed. Senate Bill 346, Senator Vadalabene.

16. SECRETARY:

17. Senate Bill 346.

18. (Secretary reads title of bill)

19. 3rd reading of the bill.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Vadalabene.

22. SENATOR VADALABENE:

23. Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. Senate  
24. Bill 346 appropriates one million, three hundred and sixty thousand  
25. dollars to the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Illinois Arts  
26. Council, and I'd appreciate a favorable vote.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Any further discussion? Senator Mitchler.

29. SENATOR MITCHLER:

30. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate, I would like to  
31. point out that the Illinois Arts Council is in for a rather substantial  
32. increase. This is a over a million dollars, in fact, over a million  
33. and a quarter, one million, three hundred sixty thousand dollars for

1. fiscal year '76. I want to point out that the original intent  
2. of the Illinois Arts Council back in 1965 was to mainly encourage  
3. local resources on behalf of the arts. Now, what has happened here  
4. is that you have a council that finds it has the accessibility  
5. to a large amount of tax dollars. When you talk about a million  
6. and a quarter, that's a large amount, and they take it upon them-  
7. selves to distribute this in various sums for various things through-  
8. out the State. And they do this as they see fit. There is literally  
9. no control. Now, many of you probably just the same as I do every  
10. now an then you'll get a nice letter from them and say in your  
11. district, we gave five hundred dollars over to Humpty-Dumpt College  
12. so that we could have a piano recital played by somebody and so forth.  
13. Well, that all sounds good but I don't think that the State of Illinois,  
14. that is the taxpayers of this State, should be appropriating a million  
15. and a quarter to be distributed around and have brochures printed.  
16. I've got a file. I've maintained a file on this Illinois Arts Council  
17. for some time, and now I find that this last year, and this is one  
18. that really disturbs me, and I hope it disturbs all members of this  
19. Body, the Illinois Arts Council appropriated some twenty-five hundred  
20. dollars to film a Vietnam War deserter, sort of the history of his  
21. life, why he would do such a nice thing as that. And in committee  
22. when they asked them - why didn't you take a Vietnam War here? Well,  
23. they could have done that but they thought it would be more fun and  
24. more exciting if they took a Vietnam War deserter. Now, I don't think  
25. that the taxpayers of this State want their tax dollars spent to film  
26. Vietnam War deserters and try to aggrandize them and use them for  
27. whatever their going to use that film for. I'm going to try to get  
28. a copy of the film. I don't know where it is. I haven't had time  
29. down here and find out what that's all about, but that's the type of  
30. thing that this Art Council is getting in. Now, they've turned me off  
31. completely, and they're going to get a No vote from me, and I'd like  
32. to see some negative votes on this bill.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Buzbee is recognized.

2. SENATOR BUZBEE:

3. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. I'm especially pleased to  
4. see this morning that the Senator from Oswego is concerned about  
5. printing costs. I certainly hope that he follows this tact as...  
6. as the...days go on and perhaps not inundate all of our desks with all  
7. of his xeroxed copies, and I think it's very good that he is being  
8. the fiscal conservative that he is that he's concerned now about  
9. printing costs.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Harber Hall.

12. SENATOR HALL:

13. Mr. President and fellow Senators, I'm beginning my ninth  
14. year in the General Assembly of Illinois, and my first year in  
15. 1967, I had occasion through the Legislative Audit Commission to  
16. look into the works of the Illinois Arts Council because they  
17. were not doing a very good job of keeping track of their records.  
18. In that, I found out that the Arts Council was appropriated fifty  
19. thousand dollars for that year. Since that time, they have come in  
20. and asked for enormous raises, increases in the funding for the  
21. Council to now they want one million, three hundred thousand dollars  
22. in a period of eight years. Now, really, Ladies and Gentlemen, I  
23. think that we have to...look with scrutinizing eyes to all our  
24. appropriations, but here is one that has had this phenomenal increase  
25. in funding at taxpayers expense, and while I will admit that many  
26. of their programs are good and of value, I think it's time that  
27. we say that the Arts Council should contain their expenses and  
28. reduce their operation rather than continue to increase. I know  
29. they have on their agenda in their plans in the future of receiving  
30. up to ten million dollars per year, so the phenomenal growth they have  
31. had is not any more than they intend to get in the future. I have  
32. one other point to inform you about, and that is the level of contri-  
33. butions through...through people who have a philanthropic desire to

1. help the Arts. Until the State of Illinois got...involved with  
2. the Arts Council, they received all their money from people who  
3. wanted to give to them, and now since we are funding them, those  
4. people say - why should I give my money to them when the State  
5. taxpayers are funding them. So, I think we've turned off the  
6. people who really have the arts at heart and are willing to give  
7. and instead reimpose the right out of the taxpayers pocket, the  
8. funding for this particular function. I intend to vote No on this  
9. bill, too.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Any further discussion? Senator Hickey.

12. SENATOR HICKEY:

13. Mr. President and colleagues, I would like to join Senator  
14. Vadalabene in the support of this bill. I'm one of those, as  
15. Senator Hall said, who has the arts at heart. I also think that  
16. in particular in these tough times when tensions are increasing,  
17. we need to look at different ways to try to relieve those for  
18. people. This is one of the ways that local groups can be encouraged  
19. to draw in new members and indulge in...in expanded practice of the  
20. arts on a local level. I'd like to submit to Senator Mitchler that  
21. perhaps he should look at that film before he votes against this  
22. for that reason, since he hasn't seen it, it may be that that film  
23. agrees with his viewpoint. It's...it's very possible. I'd hate  
24. to see him vote that way on something when he hasn't even seen it.  
25. As far as the...the size of the increase, that's because it's had such a  
26. long way to go. The Arts have needed government help for a long time,  
27. and true, they have had private help in the past, but I, for one, who  
28. have been interested in them for a long time am certainly not taking  
29. my interest away from them or very small contributions. I really think  
30. this is something that needs everybody's support in the State of Illinois.  
31. Thank you.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Senator Howard Mohr.

1. SENATOR MOHR:

2. I think Senator Hickey raised a real good point in...in  
3. suggesting that perhaps Senator Mitchler should see the film  
4. before he makes a determination, and on that basis, Mr. President,  
5. I would suggest that maybe the sponsor hold that bill and have  
6. a showing of the film. That might persuade some of us that we're  
7. inclined to go for the bill prior to this discussion, but I'll  
8. defer to Senator Vadalabene for his consideration.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Regner.

11. SENATOR REGNER:

12. Sponsor yield for a question?

13. PRESIDENT:

14. He indicates he will.

15. SENATOR REGNER:

16. Senator Vadalabene, just one quick question and it comes from  
17. a...the findings and report that Haskins themselves made after their  
18. audit. As you know, certain directors making certain amount of  
19. money are required to file economic interest statements, and I would  
20. like to ask if all the members that should be required to file their  
21. statements of economic interest, members that are members of the  
22. Arts Council have filed those statements.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Vadalabene.

25. SENATOR VADALABENE:

26. In my opinion, and I really can't give you a straight answer,  
27. but if they haven't, I believe they would be in jail.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Regner. Does that answer your question?

30. SENATOR REGNER:

31. No...

32. PRESIDENT:

33. ...Senator Regner, you...all right...

1. SENATOR REGNER:

2. I just...I just want to make a statement that they have  
3. not filed their statements, they're not in jail, and I want to  
4. know why they haven't got after them. I would suggest the sponsor  
5. find that out before he sends the bill over to the House. I  
6. am...like to make a further statement that I'm delighted each  
7. of the last two years, I was the only member of the Senate that  
8. voted No on the Arts Council, but it's obvious that a lot more  
9. people are paying attention as to what this group is doing. Another  
10. finding of the Haskins themselves report states that, in the statute,  
11. Section 3 of Senate Bill 369 states - No vouchers against this  
12. appropriation shall be payable to the Arts Council or the Illinois  
13. Arts Council...Foundation. And yet there have been State vouchers  
14. paid to individuals who in turn have endorsed them over to the Arts  
15. Council, and the question here is - were they coerced into doing it  
16. or what? And I just suggest a No vote. This has been a...a bad agency  
17. since its inception and all it's doing is costing more each year.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Schaffer.

20. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

21. Well, I think in the past few years, I unlike Senator Regner,  
22. have supported the Arts Council, and as recently as this week supported  
23. or resisted amendments to reduce the appropriations. But, Senator  
24. Vadalabene, Senator Mohr made a suggestion and I think it was an  
25. excellent one. I'm not particularly interested in seeing any agency  
26. of this State become involved in political propoganda films of any  
27. type, and if this bill is to be called today before we've had a  
28. chance to view that particular film, as Senator Hickey points out,  
29. it might be a very fine thing and might be a valuable contribution. But  
30. on the surface, I have very grave reservations, and if you persist  
31. in calling this bill today for the first time in my three years here,  
32. I will be forced to cast a negative vote on this bill. I want to  
33. see that film. I want to see what they're doing, and I hope you would

1. hold it until such time as we can...see that film.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Any further discussion? Senator Harris.

4. SENATOR HARRIS:

5. So many years ago when I was a member of the Budgetary  
6. Commission, Representative, Senator, Lt. Governor, Congressman,  
7. Paul Simon was also a member of the Budgetary Commission at that  
8. time. He proposed the original bill creating the Arts Council and  
9. requesting an appropriation for fifty thousand dollars, and as  
10. has already been mentioned here, it was to be a vehicle through  
11. which local grants could be stimulated and not commit the State  
12. of Illinois to a significant amount of its resources. It's reached  
13. the point now where I think we are talking about, I haven't really  
14. looked at the final figure here, but I think we're talking about  
15. well over a million and a half dollars, and I recall also two years  
16. ago, Governor Walker attracted significant headlines to the fact that  
17. he was proposing a significant cut in the budget of the Illinois  
18. Arts Council. Well, the cut relates itself now as far as the compar-  
19. ison between fiscal '75 and this request for fiscal '76 of over a  
20. four hundred thousand dollar increase. I would just say that the  
21. time has come to say No to this whole operation. And, if in fact,  
22. the Council wants to...revert to the original suggestion of Congress-  
23. man Simon and for a fifty to a hundred thousand dollar apparatus to  
24. encourage contributions to sustain the arts - fine. But when they  
25. squander money and particularly when the choice is to make a film  
26. for and extolling a Vietnam deserter or to determine whether such  
27. a documentary extolling the life and virtue of a Vietnam hero and  
28. the choice is to go the deserter route, I've had it with this outfit.  
29. I would hope that a significant majority of this Body would join me  
30. in expressing the conclusion that we've had it. I've been a supporter  
31. of this agency over the years, but it's certainly gone too far and its  
32. request is thoroughly unrealistic.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Any further discussion? Senator Rock.

2. SENATOR ROCK:

3. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.  
4. I rise in support of this bill and would say to those who advocate  
5. censorship of some sort or another, not one of us to my knowledge  
6. has seen this motion picture which was in part funded by the...Arts  
7. Council. In addition to that, the Chairman, Mr. Sagan, was in  
8. committee, did not...was not afforded the opportunity to respond to...to  
9. those suggestions. I think the time is right. Let's pass the bill  
10. and move on.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. ...Senator.Vadalabene. Oh, Senator Nimrod.

13. SENATOR NIMROD:

14. Mr. ...Mr. President and fellow Senators, if, in fact, the  
15. Arts Council has not had an opportunity to respond to this, then  
16. we are certainly remiss in attempting to pass this bill. I am a  
17. supporter of the Arts Council. I am not a supporter of the Arts  
18. Council getting itself involved into documentary films that involve  
19. areas outside of their...jurisdiction. When their concern is Vietnam  
20. Veterans or deserters, then that is out of the Arts field. Now, I  
21. went to see a documentary just to be educated not long ago that won  
22. an Academy Award, and I want to tell you, if this...if this documentary  
23. is anywhere near that documentary, I want to tell you that the whole  
24. area of the monies that's spent in this area are just lost and we have  
25. the wrong kind of board. If...if they have come to the point that  
26. they are acting without guidance and without limits, then maybe we  
27. ought to get together and get some redirection, and if it needs leg-  
28. islation to correct this, I would certainly support it. I would  
29. hope that we would at least let them know that we're unhappy with  
30. them. The fact is that they should be here to explain these things.  
31. We should know about it when it comes on this Floor, if it's not,  
32. then this ought to be voted down and put on postponed consideration  
33. or else taken out of the record, and I would so ask our fellow

1. colleagues to do.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Any further discussion? Senator Vadalabene may close the  
4. debate.

5. SENATOR VADALABENE:

6. Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I  
7. would appreciate a favorable vote.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. The question is shall Senate Bill 346 pass. All in favor will  
10. vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all  
11. voted who wish? Record the record. Senator Bruce, for what purpose  
12. do you arise? On these...on this question, the Ayes are 34, the Nays are  
13. 16, Present 6. Senate Bill 346 having received a constitutional majority  
14. is declared passed. Senator Bruce. There's a call for verification.  
15. You want the affirmative votes, is that correct? The Secretary will...  
16. will the members be in their seats. The Secretary will call the  
17. affirmative votes.

18. SECRETARY:

19. The following...the following voted in the affirmative:  
20. Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll, Chew, Clarke, Course, Daley, Davidson,  
21. Demuzio, Donnewald, Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Kenneth Hall, Hickey,  
22. Hynes, Johns, Joyce, Knuppel, Kosinski, Lane, McCarthy, Merritt,  
23. Mitchler...no, I'm sorry. I'm sorry.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. We all make mistakes. That's why they have erasers on pencils.  
26. Continue, Mr. Secretary.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Merritt and Mitchler voted No. In the affirmative again:  
29. Morris, Netsch, Newhouse, Rock, Romano, Savickas, Smith, Swinarski,  
30. Vadalabene, Welsh, Wooten, Mr. President. That would be Lemke.  
31. I'm sorry. We have to change our roll calls when we take them inside.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Senator Bruce.

1. SENATOR BRUCE:

2. Having voting on the prevailing side, I now move to reconsider  
3. the vote by which Senate Bill 346 passed.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator Carroll.

6. SENATOR CARROLL:

7. I move to Table Senator Bruce's motion.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Heard the motion. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed.  
10. Motion carries. Senator Vadalabene.

11. SENATOR VADALABENE:

12. Yes, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. State your point.

15. SENATOR VADALABENE:

16. From our neighboring state of Missouri, right next to the  
17. 56th Senatorial District, is a group of St. ...is a group of eighth  
18. grade students from St. Clement School of St. Louis. I would like  
19. for them to rise and be recognized.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senate Bill 353, Senator Newhouse. Senate Bill 359, Senator  
22. Knuppel. Senate...the Chair recognizes Senator Knuppel.

23. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

24. I'd like leave to return the bill to the order of 2nd reading  
25. for the...

26. PRESIDENT:

27. ...purpose of an amendment.

28. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

29. ...adoption of an amendment, yes.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Is there leave? Leave is granted. The bill is now on 2nd  
32. read... (Machine cut-off)... Bill 359, Senator Knuppel.

33. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

1. The amendment was distributed last week. All it does is  
2. fix the terms at the...and it fixes the terms of the men who serve  
3. on this commission at the...at the will of the Director of the  
4. Department, and this is done pursuant to Senator Latherow's request.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Is this Amendment No. 1?

7. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

8. I move the adoption, Amendment No. 1, yes.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Any further discussion on the amendment? Senator Knuppel  
11. moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 359. All  
12. in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. The  
13. amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? 3rd reading.  
14. 364, Senator Knuppel.

15. SECRETARY:

16. Senate...Senate Bill 364.

17. (Secretary begins reading title of bill)...

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Hold it. Hold it. Take it out of the record. Senate Bill  
20. 365, Senator Knuppel.

21. SECRETARY:

22. Senate Bill 365.

23. (Secretary reads title of bill)

24. 3rd reading of the bill.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Knuppel.

27. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

28. Senate Bill...Senate Bill 365, Mr. President and members, cleans  
29. up the Public Utilities Act with respect to deposits on utilities  
30. tax that are...that are held so that the...the Commerce Commission doesn't  
31. have to hold them over a certain period of time, and they don't have  
32. to...refund amounts of less, I think it is, than ten dollars nor do...  
33. does anyone have to pay if it's less than one dollar.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Any further discussion? Question is shall Senate Bill 365  
3. pass. All in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The  
4. voting is open. Have all voted who wished? Take the record. On  
5. this question, the Ayes are 48, the Nays are none. Senate Bill 365  
6. having received a constitutional majority is declared passed. Senate  
7. Bill 36...359, Senator Knuppel.

8. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

9. Senate Bill 359 does what the synopsis says it does. It amends  
10. the...

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Wait a minute. May we read the bill. Let's read the bill a  
13. moment.

14. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

15. Oh. Excuse me.

16. SECRETARY:

17. Senate Bill 359.

18. (Secretary reads title of bill)

19. 3rd reading of the bill.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Knuppel.

22. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

23. Senate Bill 359, Mr. President and members, does what the  
24. synopsis says it does. It amends the Timber Buyers Licensing Act  
25. and creates a...a board or committee to pass on revocation. It  
26. collects together the provisions in the Act with respect to revocation  
27. of license and the procedures to be followed.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Any further discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill 359  
30. pass. All in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The  
31. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this  
32. question, the Ayes are 51, the Nays are none. Senate Bill 359  
33. having received a constitutional majority is declared passed. Senate

1. Bill 370, Senator Bell. Read the bill.

2. SECRETARY:

3. Senate Bill...Senate Bill 370.

4. (Secretary reads title of bill)

5. 3rd reading of the bill.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Bell.

8. SENATOR BELL:

9. Yes, Mr. President, Senate Bill 370 does away with the counter-  
10. signature provision that has been in the Illinois Insurance Code. It  
11. ...the doing away of this countersignature provision is supported by  
12. the Department of Insurance and, in fact, should work to the benefit  
13. of the consumer by lowering his cost as to the cost of preparing and  
14. doing a policy. I...Senator Rock, you had a question before I go  
15. further...

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Rock, for what purpose do you arise?

18. SENATOR ROCK:

19. I'm sorry. I was off the Floor. I would...I...I have had a  
20. ...a request and I wonder if you would mind holding this, please.

21. SENATOR BELL:

22. Hold it.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Take it our of the record. Senator Davidson.

25. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

26. Mr. President, point of personal privilege. I'd like to  
27. introduce to the members of the Senate, the fourth and fifth grade  
28. from Vachel Lindsay School from here in...Springfield who happens  
29. to have the nephew and the niece of...one member of this Chamber and  
30. an employee of this Chamber, the niece of Pat Cadigan and the  
31. nephew of Senator Terry Bruce. Will they please rise so the Senate  
32. can recognize them. Right over here behind us.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. In the south Gallery, will you stand and be recognized by  
2. the Senate. For what purpose does Senator Demuzio arise?

3. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

4. Mr. President, members of the Senate, I'd like to take this  
5. opportunity also to recognize the sixth grade class from my home  
6. town and their teacher George Taseff who is in the Gallery right  
7. behind me and introduce them to the members of this Body. If they'll  
8. rise and please be recognized by the Senate.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senate Bill 375, Senator Howard Mohr. Senate Bill 377, Senator  
11. Davidson.

12. SECRETARY:

13. Senate Bill 377.

14. (Secretary reads title of bill)

15. 3rd reading of the bill.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Davidson.

18. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

19. Mr. President and members of the Senate, the synopsis of this  
20. bill tells exactly what it does. The School Code lets volunteers  
21. work for the school as a volunteer but made no provision for them  
22. to be identified by the school board against any damages. This bill  
23. came...out of a suit from down in Effingham, Illinois, and I know of no  
24. opposition. It came out of committee unanimous. Appreciate a favor-  
25. able roll call.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Any further discussion? The question is shall Senate...Bill  
28. 377 pass. All in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote No. The  
29. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this  
30. question, the Ayes are 46, the Nays are 5, 1 Voting Present. This  
31. bill having received a constitutional majority is declared passed.

32. Senator Newhouse.

33. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

1. Thank you, Mr. President. I wonder if I could get the  
2. attention of all the Senators. I'd like to make an announcement  
3. as regards...

4. PRESIDENT:

5. This is an announcement that many of you will be asking later  
6. what he said.

7. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

8. This announcement regards the Pensions and Personnel Committee,  
9. and I wish I could have your attention for just one moment. The  
10. Pensions and Personnel Committee meets at 8:30 in the morning. It  
11. will meet at 8:30 tomorrow morning. The Pensions and Personnel  
12. Committee has been a very lonely committee, despite the fact that we  
13. have almost a hundred bills backed up. Tomorrow morning at 8:30 the  
14. gavel will fall. We will begin to call the bills in sequence. We  
15. will kill all the bills that do not have a sponsor or whose sponsor  
16. does not make a request for those bills to be heard. We're taking  
17. the tact that we have to protect the committee's health and welfare  
18. as well as the health and welfare of the members of this Body. As  
19. long as everybody understands that, that's the way we will function  
20. tomorrow. At 8:30 the gavel will drop, and we will begin to call the  
21. bills. Gentlemen, please, Ladies and Gentlemen, if there is a bill  
22. that you want held for any reason, please inform us today, otherwise,  
23. tomorrow we're going to clean house. Thank you, very much.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator Savickas.

26. SENATOR SAVICKAS:

27. Mr. President and members of the Senate, I, too, rise for  
28. announcement. The Labor and Commerce Committee will meet tomorrow  
29. morning at 8:30 a.m. in Room 212. Senators have requested that  
30. their bills be called, and I would appreciate and expect them to be  
31. at the hearing to have these bills called. We will meet once more  
32. next week, but at the present time we are far behind in hearing  
33. on the bills, and these bills that the Senators requested for to-  
morrow, if they do not appear and if they are not called, will be

1. put till to the end of the call next week and possibly not heard at  
2. all.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Speaking of next weeks call, let the Chair announce that  
5. tomorrow morning there will be a schedule of next weeks activities.  
6. We will make it tomorrow after we've made an accessment as to how  
7. many committees have to meet on what dates to accommodate the rest  
8. of our Calendar. We will be at ease one moment. Senator Romano.  
9. SENATOR ROMANO:

10. Mr. Chairman, I would like to be shown as a cosponsor on  
11. Senate Bill 412.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Is there leave for Senator Romano to be shown as a Senate  
14. sponsor...cosponsor of Senate Bill 412? Leave is granted. Senator  
15. Smith.

16. SENATOR SMITH:

17. President, may I announce that the Committee on Public Health,  
18. Welfare and Corrections will be...

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Just one moment, please. One moment. Now, we're having  
21. announcements. It behooves us to listen, so that we don't get  
22. confused as to where we're to be and where we are. You can  
23. continue, Senator Smith.

24. SENATOR SMITH:

25. Thank you, Mr. President. The Committee on Public Health, Welfare  
26. and Corrections meeting this afternoon will be held here on the  
27. Senate Floor. If possible, beginning imediately after 2:30 o'clock.  
28. And now, Mr. President, I should like to make a motion, if I may.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator Smith.

31. SENATOR SMITH:

32. Senate Bill 933, sponsored by Senator Berning. That bill is  
33. before our committee and had been set for this afternoon. However,

1. Mr. President, the bill does not belong in this particular  
2. committee. I recall to the good Senator this morning that  
3. last year this same bill was before the Judiciary Committee,  
4. and I now move that Senate Bill 933 be transferred from the  
5. Public Health Committee and be referred to the Judiciary  
6. Committee.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Smith moves that Senate Bill 933 be discharged  
9. from the Committee of Public Health and re-referred to the  
10. Committee on Judiciary. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed.  
11. Motion carries. The bill is re-referred. Senator Berning,  
12. you want to speak to this matter? Senator Berning.

13. SENATOR BERNING:

14. Thank you, Mr. President. May I then request of the  
15. Chairman of the Judiciary Committee that...

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Daley.

18. SENATOR BERNING:

19. ...Senate Bill 933 be set at the next meeting.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Daley.

22. SENATOR DALEY:

23. That would be tomorrow in the afternoon. Would that be  
24. acceptable, Senator Berning?

25. SENATOR BERNING:

26. Tomorrow at...

27. SENATOR DALEY:

28. ...you want it Thursday or Friday?

29. SENATOR BERNING:

30. Friday is all right.

31. SENATOR DALEY:

32. Friday. Friday morning at 8:30 a.m.

33. SENATOR BERNING:

1. Thank you.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Rock.

4. SENATOR ROCK:

5. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.

6. I would ask leave to be shown as the chief sponsor of Senate Bills

7. 1248 and 1256. They are as introduced, introduced by the President,

8. Senator Partee. I'm asking leave at this time to be shown as the...

9. as the chief sponsor. They are set...they are assigned to Judiciary.

10. I would ask the chairman to post them for whatever day he chooses.

11. 1248 and 1256.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Merritt.

14. SENATOR MERRITT:

15. Yes, Mr. President. I'd like to have leave of the Senate to

16. be shown as a cosponsor on Senate Bill 1094.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Ozinga. Senator

19. Glass.

20. SENATOR GLASS:

21. Thank you, Mr. President. I would ask leave to be shown as

22. a cosponsor of Senate Bill 848.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator McCarthy...Pardon me.

25. SENATOR GLASS:

26. If I...I'm sorry, Mr. President. Very briefly, the remainder

27. of the students from Washburn School in Winnetka are in the President's

28. Gallery, and I would like to ask them to be...to stand at this time

29. and be recognized by the Senate.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Harris.

32. SENATOR HARRIS:

33. Mr. President, I would like leave of the Senate to be added as

1. a cosponsor to Senate Bill 619.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Is there leave?

4. SENATOR HARRIS:

5. I wonder...

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Leave...leave is granted. Senator Harris.

8. SENATOR HARRIS:

9. I have one more...motion. I discussed with Senator Hynes,  
10. Chairman of Appropriations, the possibility of discharging Senate  
11. Bill 653 from that committee. It's got tremendous numbers of  
12. bills, the companion bill, the commission bill does have the  
13. favorable action of the Executive Committee, and I would like  
14. leave now...or I would move to discharge. It has the approval of  
15. Senator Hynes further consideration by the Committee on Appropria-  
16. tions of Senate Bill 653.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. And where is it to be re-referred, Senator?

19. SENATOR HARRIS:

20. And advanced to the order of 2nd reading.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Oh. You heard the motion. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed  
23. Nay. Motion carries. Senate Bill 653 is now on 2nd reading. ...  
24. (Machine cut-off)...McCarthy.

25. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

26. Yes, this relates to House Bill 591. House Bill 591. Senator  
27. Rock and I have agreed that I'd like to be shown as or be shown as  
28. the sponsor of this bill. I'd like to have leave of the Body.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Is there leave to show Senator McCarthy as a cosponsor of  
31. House Bill 591? Chief sponsor of House Bill 591. Is there leave?  
32. Leave is granted. Senator Mohr.

33. SENATOR MOHR:

1. Yes, Mr. ...Mr. President. I would like leave of the Body  
2. to show as cosponsors on...Senate Bills 1309, 10 and 11. The...  
3. all of the members of the Space Needs Commission, these are com-  
4. mission bills. Included in those names along with me would be  
5. yourself, if you...so desire, Mr. President, Senator Harris,  
6. Senator Donnewald, Senator Graham and Senator Dougherty.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Nudelman.

9. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

10. Mr. President, Senator Carroll joins me in requesting that  
11. I be removed as chief sponsor of House Bill 276, and that he be  
12. shown as sponsor of that same bill.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Is there leave? Leave...leave is granted. Senator Nudelman.

15. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

16. Mr. President, I would ask leave of this Body to...to Table  
17. the following enumerated bills.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. But first, Senator, where are the bills? Are they all in the  
20. same posture?

21. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

22. They are all not set and in Rules, and I think the simple  
23. way would be to Table them right now. Starting with House Bills  
24. 1190, 1191...

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Are these House or Senate Bills?

27. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

28. Excuse me. Senate Bills, of course. Excuse me. Senate  
29. Bills 1190, 1191 going to Senate Bill 1190 through...1193 through  
30. 1246, no, 1246 inclusive. Adding Senate Bill 1261 through Senate  
31. Bill 1281, inclusive, and adding Senate Bill 1482. I would ask  
32. leave to Table all of those bills.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Nudelman, would you hold that motion till I have  
2. an opportunity to talk with you? Would you hold that motion  
3. till I have an opportunity to talk with you?

4. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

5. No, Sir.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Well, the motion is out of order because the motion is not  
8. in proper form. ...(Machine cut-off)...Bloom.

9. SENATOR BLOOM:

10. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. I'd ask leave to be put on  
11. as a cosponsor of Senate Bills 1124, 1148 and 1149, if I could  
12. please.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Lemke.

15. SENATOR LEMKE:

16. Mr. President, I'd like to introduce to the Senate, a fine  
17. group of our senior citizens from the towns of...Stickney, Forest View  
18. and the Golden Age Club and...and who have contributed much and are  
19. very...elated that our chief executives see the wisdom of both  
20. Houses assigned to the Senior Citizenship Bill...

21. PRESIDENT:

22. They're sitting in the rear Gallery. Will they please rise  
23. and be recognized by the Senate. ...(Machine cut-off)...further  
24. business to come before the Senate? Senator Newhouse.

25. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

26. Mr. President, I'd like leave of this Body to be listed as  
27. a cosponsor on Senate Bills 1020, 21 and 22.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Is there leave? Leave is granted. ...(Machine cut-off)...  
30. Bruce.

31. SENATOR BRUCE:

32. I filed a motion on Senate Bill 723 to have it heard and  
33. argued next Tuesday the 29th.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Is there leave? Leave is granted. (Machine cut-off)...  
3. there any further business to come before the Senate? Senator  
4. Berning.

5. SENATOR BERNING:

6. Thank you, Mr. President. It would be...out of order to  
7. request a return to the order of 2nd reading?

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Is this an emergency, Senator? It's really out of order.

10. SENATOR BERNING:

11. Okay.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Any further business to come before the Senate? Senator  
14. Nudelman moves that the Senate do now adjourn...be now adjourned  
15. until 11:30 tomorrow morning. All in favor. Senate is adjourned.

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
